with reference to my conversation with

Lieutenant Shimizu yesterday concerning the rice and flour which belongs to our Relief Committee, but which we have not been able to get delivery of since the Japanese Army entered the city. Let me give you briefly the following facts. a total of 20,009 bags of rice were assigned to us by the former Manking City Government for relief purposes. Of these we received 9,076 bags. Since the occupation of the citywe have not been able to obtain delivery of the remaining 10,933 bags. In addition to the rice, 10,000 bags of flour were also assigned to us. Of this we have not received a single bag as the entire stock was taken over by the Japanese Army before it could be brought by us into our godown.

in regard to these stocks of rice and flour, but in the confusion naturally attendant upon the occupation of the city, the matter was not settled. To would therefore now renew our request that the Army authorities release to us the stocks of rice and flour above mentioned, which are rightly and properly ours, and which see needed now for the relief of the people.
