Dear Sirs:

February 10, 1937.

I am writing in behalf of a member of the staff of our Department of Sociology, Miss Yu-wen Lin, who wishes to make application to the New York School of Social Work for a fellowship for the year 1937-38. It has been suggested that she apply for either the Elizabeth Lowe Gamble Foreign Fellowship or for the Willard Straight Foreign Fellowship, and I would like to recommend Miss Lin to your consideration for one of these grants.

Miss Lin graduated from Ginling College in 1934 with a major in Sociology, and she has been an assistant in that Department since her graduation. She was a good student and took a particular interest in her major field and was active in the extra-curricular activities on the campus which were related in any way to that field. She was instrumental during her student days in helping to raise funds for a community center to serve the poor people in the neighborhood of the College, and since she has been on the staff of the Department part of her work has been the supervision of work in that center. She gives herself completely to her work, and has shown initiative in working with the neighborhood people.

With the background of her undergraduate work in the field of sociology and her experience in the department, both theoretical and practical, I consider her well-qualified to take graduate work in social work, and I should like to see her have an opportunity for further study. The field of social work is being opened up in China and there is need for well-trained workers both in colleges and in the fields of practical work.

As Ginling is a missionary institution, the College is in no position to give Miss Lin financial help. She is therefore unable to come for graduate study without fellowship help. We shall therefore appreciate any consideration you are able to give her application.

Dear Miss Voris:

I think you for the honour of asking me to write to you about Miss Lin Yu-wen, a candidate to a fellowship offered by your school.

Miss Lin has been assistant to the Sociology Department at Ginling College, Nanking. In the field work supervision she often led the students to do social works among the poor people, such as visiting the wives of these families, organizing school and clubs for their children, etc. Since Ginling College is an American Missionary School, I don't think she would have difficulty adjusting to a new language country, and since she herself had led the class in doing social works in Nanking, she would have also no difficulty adjusting to your professional school where practice is stressed. Her long connection with Ginling College gives her the opportunity of making familiar with your social life.

I have known Miss Lin Yu-wen for the past 3-4 years and would like to describe some phases of her work for your consideration.

1. Her connection with the Nanking Municipal Public Health Service. Miss Lin was a social worker in the service. She took the part of visiting various poor centers of the city and saw what could be done to the hygienic side of the people. She took the record of the poor patients of the Municipal Hospital and tried every means to help the needy one.
2. Her connection with the Anti-Epidemic Commission of the League of Nations. The Commission was established soon after our war with Japan. Miss Lin helped the Commission in various phases.
3. Her connection with the Prostitutes' Welfare Service in Nanning, Kwangsi. In Kwangsi the prostitutes are put in the Special District so that medical care can be easily afforded. Miss Lin was in charge of the service and under her there were several women doctors, nurses, and social workers to work with. She took a personal interest with the prostitutes; she tried to comfort and help them by importuning their personal. I have read a report written by her on the Survey of the Prostitutes at The Special District, Nanking, Kwangsi. I appreciate her service highly.
4. Her connection with our Station. Miss Lin was granted a fellowship (1933-39) by the Sino-British Boxer-Indemnity Fund Trustee to carry on research work on social problems. To this she picked the migratory farmers' resettlement program and came to work in our Station. Miss Lin's project is to make a survey on the social and financial side of the farmers, and work out a program for the

improvement on future work. We have about 2000 migratory farmers resettled on our station. I have read her report and appreciated very much her creative ideas in organizing and improving their poor monotonous lives. It surprised me to find her deep and keen interest on the women's lives especially. If it were not her ambition of going to Szechuan to continue on her research work fixed by the fellowship, I certainly will add her name to our staff list to work for the welfare of these farmers.

Miss Lin's record of work certainly impresses me that she is a hard worker, eager to do and accomplish something, which is right. Her ability of organizing and her sympathy with the poor people are two main factors to impress people that she is a first-class social worker. In China we need women social workers to work on the improvement of thousands of women and children, and Miss Lin is the person fit for such leadership. If you can grant her the opportunity of further study in your country, you are certainly helping our country a great deal. Furthermore, you will find Miss Lin a pleasant personality, very easy to make friends with.

Whatever you can do for her will be highly appreciated.

1. Miss Lin Yu-wen joined our staff on July 1st. As director of the Health Administration. I have known her about four months.
2. She held a position as Head of the Social Service Department in our Health Administration. Under this department we have nine divisions, namely;
 - a. Department for Relief Work
 - b. Sewing
 - c. Soy-bean milk
 - d. Farming
 - e. Dairy
 - f. Traffics Service for the Anti-Opium Hospital
 - g. Public Bath Room
 - h. Laundry
 - i. Dining Hall for the staff

Miss Lin is in general charge of the above.

3. Miss Lin has the ability to think and to express herself clearly. She is responsible for her work. She is sensitive enough to feel the need of other people. She can control herself emotionally. She looks up to her social work as a very high position and sticks to it with her loyalty. She can supervise and cooperate with her co-workers.

I have no special comments to make as to the candidate's limitations.
