



Dear Miss Wong:

Your letter of March 31 has just reached us, and I am semewhat concerned to know that you are seeking assistance for another year. It had been our impression here that you were expecting to complete your work during this school year. Until this letter came to us, we had no indication that you would be asking for assistance this coming year. Our instructions to the presidents of the colleges regarding scholarships is that all requests must be in our hands by the first of November, preceding the year in which the grant is to be used. Our scholarship committee met early in January to consider the applications which had been received and at that time all money available for next year was allocated. It is, of course, too late to make any change in these allocations since the people to whom they have been given have been notified and have made their plans accordingly. I do not know of any source to which we could turn for additional funds.

I am very sorry, indeed, to have to reply to you in this way, but I do not, at the present time, see any way in which we can help you for the school year of 1941-42.
