#### FACULTY

The total number of faculty members this semester including part-time teachers is 175 as compared with 187 in March 1949 and 173 in September 1948. The distribution is summarized as follows: (For details, see Statistics #1)

It is seen in the above table that there is not much change in number of teachering staffs in either college. However, the students enrollment this semester (1359), while smaller than last semester (1430), is considerably larger than that in September 1948(1203). Counting three part-time teachers as one full-time member, the ratios of number of students per teacher for the last three semesters are shown in the following table:

In the last report prepared in Merch 1949, we reported that "it was most fortunate that Lingnan was able to secure the services of a few nationally known scholars such as ....". We are happy to report now that the statement " a few nationally known scholars" should be modified to "quite a number of .....".

The arrivals of Professors Chiang Li-Fu(Mathematics), Tao Pao-Kai(Engineering.), Chen Yung-Ling(Engineering) etc. mark another definite step forward in making Lingnan one of the best universities in China. The Civil Engineering Department, which has long been known as the largest but weakest department in the College of Science and Engineering is now one of the if not the strengest department in the University, thanks to the simultaneous arrivals of Prof. Kwai. Tao and Chen. Never has Lingnan engaged three new full professors for one department in one semester. We believe, however, that this bold step has made or at least is making the Lingnan Civil Engig

Department (the largest department in student enrollment) one of the best in the country.

Comparing the teaching staffs this year with those in September 1948, we are happy to report that there has been considerable improvement in almost every department, especially in Engineering, Economics (the two largest departments), medicine and mathematics. With the professors we now have, we stand among the best universities in China without having to offer any apology.

# STUDENTS ENRULIMENT

The total enrollment up to date is 1359. This represents a slight decrease compared with last semester but an appreciable increase compared with last September The extremely heavy enrollment last semester was due to the fact that there were more than a hundred guest students most of whom went back to their own colleges after one semester's temporary stay. A few of them did satisfactory work here and continued on as transferred students. We accepted no guest students this semester except for a few in the senior class. The following table shows the distributions for the various colleges during the past three semesters.

It can be seen from the above table that during the past three semesters, there has been a steady increase in enrollment in the colleges of Science & Engineering, and Agriculture. There was a sudden jump in the Arts College last semester due to the guest students being mostly in that college. This semester, there is a sudden jump in the Medical College. The Department of Economics and Business Administration for a long time the largest department in the University, drops to second place in favor of the Civil Engineering Department which exchanged position with the Economics Department.

We do not find this tendency any too encouraging, however. The extremely large number of freshmen students who have to take Chemistry, Physics and Biology has made it almost impossible to work out a satisfactory laboratory schedule. In freshman chemistry, there were more than 400 students, in physics, more than 350. The physics laboratory, for instance, is opening every morning, afternoon and evening, operating after the fashion of a three-shift factory. With the equipment and personnel we have at present, this is not at all very satisfactory. We hope that this unbalanced distribution would not last too long.

In view of the present political situation, it is almost amazing to find so many students come to Lingnan. The girl students have dropped slightly in number but the men students have increased making the ratio of men to women students 2.6 as compared with 2.1 last semester.

# COURSES OFFERRED

There are altogether 232 courses offerred this semester in the four celleges. They are summarized in the following table:

# ENTRANCE EXAMINATION AND NEW STUDENTS

Two entrance examinations were given during this summer. The first was given on July 7 & 8 and the second on August 19 and 20. In the first examination which took place in Canton and Hongkong concurrently, there were altogether 1255 applicants of which 374 were admitted. In the second examination, there were 583 applicants and

Before the war, Lingman had an "acredited school" system whereby some of the best students graduated from schools of long good-standing may be admitted to Lingman without entrance examination. This system was temporarily suspended since 1945. Mean while it gave a chance for us to observe and study the work of the students from a schools which we formerly recognized as acredit school. After some deliberate be negligible, with the following modification: (1) The first best 5% of the graduating class from an "acredit school" will be admitted without examination (2) The next 20% (that is, within the first quarter of the graduating class) are allowed to take examinations in four subjects only, namely Chinese, English, mathematics and Intelligence test. The above rule is subjected to change from year to year.

Acredit schools this year are: (1) Lingman Middle School (2) Pui Ching (3) Pui To (4) Hip Wo (5) True Light (6) Pui Ying and (7) Weh Ying. For details, see

# DEPARTMENT OF MATHEMATICS

We are pleased to report that the Ministry of Education has granted our patition. of re-opening the Department of Mathematics. It has been mentioned previousely in this report that we were fortunate to secure the service of Dr. Chiang Li-Fu as the head of the department.

# DISTRICT URIGIN OF STUDENTS

Of the 1359 student, more than 60% come from districts near Canton. There are 50 students from Fukien province and about 100 from other provinces. For details, see Statistics #7.

The number of oversea students has dropped from 115(last semester) to 59. This is of course due to the present uncertain political situation in Cantin. For details, see Statistics #9.

# SCHOOL ORIGIN OF STUDENTS

This is shown in Statistics #8. The general pattern remains the same as that of the past few years with our own middle school leading the list (15%), followed by Pui Ching (14%), Pui Ying, Pui To, Wah Ying, True Light and Hip Wo, Chee Yung, Municipal first, etc. in the order named.

# DISQUALIFICATION, SUSPENSION & PROBATION

A total of 187 out 1436 students enrolled in the last semester received penalties varying in degrees from disqualification to probation. The ratio of 187 to 1436 is just about the same as the figure for last semester (159 to 1202).



# LINGNAN UNIVERSITY ACADEMIC REPORT FIRST SEMESTER, 1947-48 Y. Y. HUANG, DEAN OF THE UNIVERSITY

### ENTRANCE EXAMINATION

Two entrance examinations were given on July 1st and 2nd and on Sept. 1st and 2nd respectively. The total number of applicants for the first examination were 1184 admitted 161. Percentage of admission 13.6%. Ratio of admitted about 7.3 to 1. The total number of applicants for the second examination were 460. Admitted 71. Percentage of admission 15.4%. Ratio of admitted about 6.5 to 1.

The grand total of applicants for two exeminations were 1644. Admitted 232. Percentage of admission about 14%. Average ratio of admitted about 7 to 1. Last Semester the ratio of admitted was about 5 to 1. The limited capacity of the dormitories compelled the University to refuse what more than it could accept. Thus the standard of admission was raised above that for the last two years. From the academic point of view, this is a good move, because we have chance to select better students. (See Statistics 1).

To meet the emergency of the sutuation created by the raising of the admission standard with the effect that applicants, who could have been admitted last year, were not accepted as a freshmen this year, a make-up class of sub-freshmen standard is set up with the purpose to take in students who are eagerly seeking admission to Lingnan for one reason or other. This make-up class will concentrate the students on Chinese, English and mathematics to prepare them for entrance examination next Spring or next Autumn. That is to say, the students sitting in the make-up class must pass on entrance examination before promoted to freshmen class. The virtue of this plan is obvious. On the one hand, to meet the Constant requests from friends desirous of sending their children to Lingnan and on the other to maintain a high admission standard. There are now 38 already enrolled. The number is expected to run up to 70 (See Statistics 2 Sub-freshmen Column).

## ENROLLMENT

The total enrollment for this semester up to date is 1058. For last semester 939. An increase of 119. The distribution for all Colleges is as follows:

To compare with figures of last semester, The College of Arts still leads in the number of students (427 this year 392 last). The college of Sc.& Eng'g gains considerably (360 this year. 282 last). The College of Agriculture remains more or less the same (98 this year 105 last). The College of Medicine has a slight increase (171 this year 150 last).

The re-inauguration of the Exchange student system brings to us a fine group of 9 American students--6 boys and 3 girls representing six colleges in the U.S.A. Two are college graduates with the status of teaching fellow, because each helps in giving a course in English.

In the past the Exchange Students system did work beneficial both ways. Their presence is a healthy and sound stimulation to the campus life in many ways. It offers a chance for the youth of China and that of America to understand and appreciate each other.

The number of graduate students has doubled this year. There are now 24 with 16 males and 8 females. They are mature and serious minded. The undergraduates look up to them as a source of inspiration for scholarship.

# HONGKONG STUDENTS

287 students come from Hong Kong. There were 234 last semester. An increase of 53, 217 of their folks are in business at Hong Kong. The rest are mere residents. About out of every 4 Linguanites, one is from Hong Kong. (See Statistics 3).

# SCHOOL ORIGIN

Out of total of 1058 students, 649 come from : our own Middle School 251; Annan Lingman Branch School, 24; Puiching, 130; Union Girl, 58; Pui-ying, 48; Pu-Toi, 42; True Light, 39; Waiying, 36; and Puilen, 21. These schools are all Christian in character. So the bulk of our students are from Christian schools. The University is lucky to draw the other less than half from many other schools of Canton, Hong Kong, and different districts of Kwangtung, Kwangsi and Fukien. (See Statistics 4).

# COURSES OFFERRED

Courses offerred number 230 this semester. Last semester 212. An increase of 18 courses. As time goes on courses have to be stepped up to meet the pressing demands if finance allows to take in more teachers with the hope that a full and comprehensive program can be mapped out in the future. (See Statistics 7).

#### TEACHERS

The total number of teachers of the four Colleges for this semester is 143. For last semester 148. A decrease of 5. There are 139 full time and 4 part-time. Last semester there were 137 full time and 11 part-time. Only 15 out of 31 teachers of the Medical College are on the University payroll. Thanks to the support of the Central Hospital and Hackett Hospital 16 teachers are given voluntarily one or two courses without pay from Lingnan. Their service deserves commendation. (See statistics 8)

#### DISTRICT ORIGIN

As it was before, the majority of students totalling 721 out of 1058 about 70% comes from the eight districts around Canton. 83 students about 8% come from other provinces. (See Statistics 5).

## PROBATION ETC.

As a result of last semester's work, 36 students were disqualified, 4 were suspended from school for at least a semester. 107 were put on probation. A total of 147 out of 939 students about 12.5% were penalized in degrees deserved by individuals according to their degrees of deficiency. (See Statistics 6).

Mr. Pride is appointed as Instructor in Horticulture. The cordial relationship between Penn State and Linguan is continued and strengthened by having the Prides with us.

Miss Augusta Walker B. A.; M. A. (Univ. of Michigan) who once taught at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina, just arrived to join the English Department as in Instructor.

The MaryKnoll Mission for the first time sends out two fathers to teach at Lingnan. Father J. A. Hahn B. S. (M. I. T.) who has a long training in Philosophy and theology and teaching experience is now an Assistant Professor of Civil Engineering. Father G. Putmann B. A. (Georgetown University) who is also interested in philosophy and arts is now an Instructor of Sociology.

### FOREIGN SCHOLARSHIPS

Under the support of fellowships offerred by the ABCCC, three teachers were enabled to take up post-graduate work in America. Prof. Pong Tek-ming of History and Government Department, attends Chicago University to major in Political Science. A. degree from Texas College this summer, is going to Columbia University to continue her study in English literature. They are expected to rejoin Lingnam University afterwards.

Now, therefore, the said Trustees of Lingman University, in view of the purposes for which they are incorporated and have operated since the issuance of their original charter in 1893, and in view of the fact that considerable parts of the said land of the University, and a considerable number of its buildings were paid for with funds originating from Chinese sources, hereby reaffirm that they will hold all of the said land and buildings in trust, to be used only for the furtherance of the purposes set forth in the said agreement between them and the Directors of Lingman University.

# SUMMER SCHOOL

A Summer Session was run during the months of July and August under the able and efficient directorship of Dr. P. C. Feng. Courses offerred: 15 regular, 3 make-up; 1 reading and 2 thesis. The total enrollment--327. Financially, it was self-supporting. Besides eliminating irregularities of courses which may confront many students during the regular sessions, the result turns out that it also pays to run a Summer Session because it left some net profit.

Due to a lack of systematic studies on Chinese children and insufficient attention given to the solution of their problems, work among children is usually carried on in a haphazard manner. Conserving Normal children who are growing up in their own homes, they do not nessarily receive the best care and training. As to those who are forced by circumstances to grow up in institutions, they may be fed and clothed, but individualization of treatment and education is sadly lacking. However, the scope of child welfare work is much broader than physical care. Numerous as are the cases of desperate need, there is even a larger number of young children who are growing up without the benefit of proper guidance in regard to health, behavior and education.

With these in mind, the Lingman Child Welfare Training Program would wish to trainworkers for a varied and many-sided program in child welfare activities, such as Child Realth Centers, Guidance Clinics, Day Nurseries, Nursery Schools, Children's Clubs, nutritional aid, handicraft training, as well as institutional care for dependent, defective and delinquent children. At present, such social agencies, except orphanages day nurseries and feeding centers, are still lacking in quantity and quality.

Students who major in the Child Welfare Program have to take a minimum of 28 credits of required courses in Child Welfare, besides prescribed sociology courses, and a certain number of electives from related subjects. (The curriculum is listed separately). In addition to class instruction, students are required to do practical work dealing with children of different age groups. The different groups of children in the University Campus afford a rich field for observation and studies. They are as follows:

# I. THE CHILD DEVELOPMENT CENTER

The Center occupies a modern 2-storied building with four large rooms and six smaller rooms, and an outdoor playground adjacent to it. There is enough space to carry on the following program of activities:

- A. Nursery School
  It admits staff dildren from 2-4 years of age for half a day. The equipment and toys aim at the enrichment of experiences, stimulation of diversifed interests, and coordination of movements and control. The teacher of pre-school education is in charge, and directs the students doing practice work.
- b. Psychological Laboratory
  Students are given a chance to observe the behavior of children unnoticed. It is hoped that their records of observation of various groups will prove valuable materials for comparison with other scientific studies. Different tests are also being revised for use.
- It gives periodic physical examinations to the nursery children and others who come to the Clinics and Clubs. Health education is carried out in the weekly Well-Baby Clinic and the bi-weekly Nutritional Aid Clinicfor the workmen's children. Many of the working mothers are too

busy to attend the regular Clinics, the public health nurse goes to visit the homes and gives instruction and minor treatment there. The Lingman Industrial School for Orphans and the S.C.A. School for work- Men's children are also under our care as far as health prevention is commerced.

- D. Children's Clubs
  It is part of a student's training to know how to organize clubs
  for different age groups. The playground facilities of the Center
  are opened to children under 12 in the afternoons, and organized
  activities are conducted by students and staff. Major students also
  help to organize clubs for the orphas in the Industrial School.
- The Parent-Teachers Club meets once every month to discuse the problems of the Nursery School children. During Dr. Osborne's visit, several Parents' Meetings were arranged for Campus parents. Home visitation is also done to acquaint students of home life and mangement.

# II. STUDY OF INSTITUTIONAL CARE AND MANAGEMENT

The Lingman Industrial School for Orphans being closest on hand is being used as a sort of laboratory testing ideas and trying out practices. The problems being studied at present are as follows:

- A. Administrative problems like personnel training, division of duties, supervision of household chores, budget making and etc.
- B. Curriculum studies such as shortening of the standard primary course, introduction of vocational subjects, handicrafts teaching, and measurement of scholaristic standing,
- C. Working out a minimum standard diet for children with the limited resourses on hand. Attention is also given to methods of cooking and kitchen management.
- D. Inquiring into the methods of discipline and conduct guidance, especially case studies of problem children, in take policies and placement of graduates.

### III. WORK FOR THE UNDER-PRIVILEGED SCHOOL CHILDREN

The S.C.A.School for workmen and village children is sponsored by the Student Christian Association and staffed by volunteer workers among the student body. Sociology major students have always taken an active part in this service project. The Child Development Center intends to help through the following services:

- A. Health work for the children like immunization, vaccination, and treatment of trachoma and skin troubles. Nutritional sids like codliver oil and milk are being distributed as long as GNRRA supplies will last.
- B. Some forms of mental testing and educational measurement will be carried out. The studies of the Faculty Children, the University Primary School Group, the Workmen's Children and the Orphans will be interesting for comparison purposes.

April, 1947

The Department of Education was one of the first collegiste departments opened at Lingnan, when the University was known as Canton Christian College early this century. Up to 1935, it has graduated scores of young men and women, who are now holding responsible positions in schools and other educational institutions of South China. Others have received diplomas and junior and senior certificates and become teachers of Chinese middle schools and schools of oversea Chinese in America and South Sea Islands. Unfortunately, it was changed into a minor department in 1935 on account of the fact that the number of students who wished to take education as a major was small while those who were majoring in other departments but intended to teach these major subjects by having a few courses in psychology and methods of teaching were many.

Soon after this organization, the Ministry of Education at Nanking made a new policy of teacher training by opening a number of national teachers colleges, with the result that no private institution would be able to undertake such training. It was not until after Victory that the Ministry began to feel that such a course of action might be modified. It happened that Dean C.H. Chuang of Lingnan College of Arts was then in Chungking and consulted with authorities in the Ministry about the possibility of respensive Education as major department at Lingnan. As soon as he got back to Canton early in the Spring of 1946 a petition was sent/to the Ministry for such a reopening and by the University/and it was duly granted.

The major curriculum prescribed by the Ministry for the Department of Education in Teachers Colleges is quite heavy. A second petition was sent by the University to reduce the number of required subjects as well as the number of credits of a few of the remianing ones. This was also granted with one or alternations made by the Ministry. The Department was ré-opened in the fall of 1946 with Dean Chuang as its chairmen and Mr. W.Y.Chit, a graduate of Sun Yatsen University and for many years Principal of the First Provincial Normal School of Kwangtung, was appointed as intructor to assist him. Dr. H.P. Chen, formerly of the Institute of Child Welfare at State University of Iowa, who was appointed as Assistan Professor of Psychology for the Child Welfare. Training Program of the University, is giving courses in psychology, which are also taken by education students.

There are now 29 men and women taking major work in education, among whom 18 are sophomores and 11 are freshmen. All sophomores are transferred from other departments, such as sociology, economics, Chinese and English, of the College of Arts, but two agriculture and one medical students have also changed their majors to education. The Education Club was also re-formed. In addition to social activities, several lectures by outsiders have been given. Among them, we mention one on the History of the Department given by Dr. Y.K.Chu, formenly Chairmen of the Bepartment for many years and now connected with the United Service to China, another on Human Resources by Dr. Chu-sam Tsang, formerly professor of the Department and now Editor of the Modern Childeren's Magazine, and a third on Motives of Becoming Teachers by Dr. Ernest G. Osborne, Professor of Education, Teachers College, Columbia University, who was invited by the University to assist in the founding of the Child Welfare Program.

WHEREAS an opportunity is now presented for registering all of the land owned by Lingman University under on deed, and

WHEREAS the Directors of Lingman University, a body incorporated under Chinese law are now, in accordance with the terms of an agreement entered into between them and the Trustees of Lingman University, incorporated under the laws of the State of New York, USA, conducting the administration and operation of the University, and

WHEREAS the said Directors of Lingman University have signified their desire, in view of the history and other circumstances of the institution, to have the said land registered as the property of the said Trustees of Lingman University,

Now, therefore, the said Trustees of Lingman University, in view of the purposes for which they are incorporated and have operated since the issuance of their original charter in 1893, and in view of the fact that considerable parts of the said land of the University, and a considerable number of its buildings were paid for with funds originating from Chinese sources, hereby reaffirm that they will hold all of the said land and buildings in trust, to be used only for the furtherance of the purposes set forth in the said agreement between them and the Directors of Lingman University.
