June 2, 1931

During recent months we have been receiving from the Uni versity of Nanking expressions of hope that you might be able to return to missionary service at the University next year.

As yet I have not corresponded with the United Christian Missionary Society, so I cannot say definitely whether they would be able to resume your support, but aside from this one uncertainty, I can assure you that everyone interested in the University of Nanking. would be very happy indeed to see you return to the field.

I would very much appreciate any word you can send us as to the possibilities of your return to the field, and also any information you may have as to the attitude of the United Christian Missionary Society on the subject of resuming your support.

As you know, Nanking has been rather seriously handicapped ever since the disturbances of 1927 because of the shortage of Western staff members. We rejoice the more, therefore, at any hint that it might be possible for a veteran like yourself to re-enlist in the ranks once more.

I shall greatly appreciate hearing from you as to the prospects for your outgoing. We shall be happy to assist in any way that we can.

I do not know whether or not word has happened to reach you that for the present session at Columbia University I am serving on the Philosophy Faculty as Visiting Lecturer On Oriental Religions. Estate of Selma Hammargren, deceased. Dear Sir:-I enclose a copy of the will in the above entitled matter. The bequest in which you are interested is on the second page, subdivision d., paragraph Ninth. You will observe that the will was drawn in July, 1922, and I seriously doubt whether there will be any substantial sum left for legacies after paying the funeral and administration expenses and the debts of decedent. The Teachers Retirement Fund, mentioned in clause Sixth of the will, amounts to a fairly substantial sum and had Miss Hammargren turned that into her estate instead of re-leasing it to the Teachers Retirement Fund, her estate would have amounted to \$15,000.00 or \$16,000.00, I believe. As it stands, outside of the Fund, it is a question whether \$3,000.00 will be realized. Yours very

PIGHTH: I direct that all the rest of my personal property be seld and turned into each.

HINTH: If anything remain after the foregoing bequests and directions have been complied with, I then make the following bequests to be paid in the order made:-

- (a) To Alice H. Roberts, my sister, \$100.00, which she shall forfeit if she centests this will.
- Amsterdam Avenue, New York City, \$1500.00, which shall be invested and the income used to pay the annual rent of the pew new eccupied by me, in remembrance of my mother, Margaret Hammargren. Should this bequest be declared to be invalid or of no effect by a court of competent jurisdiction, I then give and bequeath \$1500.00 to said church absolutely.
- New Tork City, \$1,000.00, to be invested and one-half of the income to be devoted to the regular fund or purposes of the church, the other one-half of such income to be used for or paid to Mr. Allan's Bolivian Mission. Should this bequest or any part thereof be declared to be invalid or of no effect by a court of competent jurisdiction, I then give and bequests \$1000.00 to said church absolutely.
