



Dear Mr. Evans:

Relying to yours of August 15th referring to Mr. Taylor's letters re Moore fund. I was not aware that the "Moore Fund" had been transferred into pounds sterling. I wish you would check to make sure that he is not referring to the later Moore gifts as distinguished from the account in the Hongkong and Shanghai Bank, which I understand is in Chinese dollars.

We have sent Mr. Small to Chengtu and authorized him to proceed with the building of the hospital, therefore(I think it advisable to authorize Mr. Taylor to transfer this amount of £ 3,620-3-9 to the University Hospital account in the Bank of China, Chengtu. I think it advisable to ask Mr. Taylor to ascertain whether this amount of British money can be sold in Chengtu at a better rate then if sold in Shanghai and transferred to Chengtu in Chinese currency. I know that there has been difficulty in getting Shanghai money to Chengtu. Mr. Tyalor ought to assure himself as to the best procedure and be authorized to telegraph Chengtu for all necessary information if such is desirable.)

In the meantime, I will write a letter to the University regarding the use of this money. There are so many demands for money and such a willingness to do what seems necessary that we must take unusual precautions to guard against the expenditure of these funds for purposes other than those specifically designated.

You are of course aware that there should be N.C. dollars 75,000 from the British Indemnity Board for hospital building. I am afraid that this fund has been drawn upon and that Mr. Small will lack funds for the extensive purchases of materials required. Consequently it is well to have this fund in Chengtu. It is I believe about the safest place in China and the Bank is as safe as the government of China and even more so, for should the government collapse Szechuan would not go down at the same time, and the banks would function.

Replying to yours of August 16th. In view of all the circumstances I think it necessary to pay the American Cystoscope Makers, Inc. "Our Order 81465-81466" amounting to \$629.80. Also, bill of same firm, "Our Order 7893", amounting to \$35.90. Also, the Hospital Supply Company, "Order Number W-85072," amounting to \$14,12. Please charge these three accounts to the Rockefeller Foundation Equipment Fund.

I am returning to you the General Medical Book Company bill amounting to \$31.25. This I deem should not be charged to the Rockefeller Foundation account. If you cannot provide it otherwise, I suggest that you make it a charge against the two hundred odd dollars which Dr. Liljestrand left with you.

In regard to these Rockefeller bills I would like to have a copy of all invoices paid on this account. We should have an addi-

tional copy to send to the Rockefeller Foundation when I report the purchases authorized as per my agreement. Will you therefore please send to me an additional copy of the American Cystoscope Company, "Our Order 7893" for \$35.90, and also an additional copy of Our Order 81465-81466, amounting to \$629.80. You need not send the Hospital Supply Company, for I have two of these statements already.

I am requesting the Rockefeller Foundation to pay to West China Union University, Ass't Treas., \$10,000 for the O.P.D. University Hospital Building, and \$5,000 for equipment. Since we have to report on these items separtely I would suggest that they be so entered on your books. I will state to the Foundation that I am requesting the payment of the \$10,000 for immediate transfer to Chengtu, and the \$5,000 as a credit on our University books against equipment bills.

I will appreciate it if your will transfer this \$10,000 as soon as received to Chengtu through the Bank of China in the usual manner, securing from them a statement of the gold transferred, and the amount of the credit in Chinese currency in the Chengtu Bank of China. I specify this because we will be required to report our expenditures in Chinese dollars. I note that the rate of exchange is not quite so good today as it was two days ago, but I assume that this \$10,000 will bring about \$60,000 Chinese currency.


Just to make sure that you are kept busy these cool days I will appreciate it if you will check up on this Found Sterling fund that fell due June 10th. Where was the money when it was converted into Pound Sterling? And how much was the amount? What was the amount of money sent out originally under this account and how much did it bring in National Currency and what was the accrued interest? I would like to have these items for the information of the donor as well as for other reasons.

Dear Dr. Beech:

That typewriter of yours is certainly a considerable help, an I appreciate the extra labor it must have taken in order to write your letter of the 18th.

I am sorry but you will have to return to us the invoices which we sent to you, as we have no other copies. We will send you all the copies you desire when we have the originals on hand.

I note what you say regarding the transfer of \$3,620-3-9 to the University Hospital account, and will investigate the process necessary and take action accordingly.

We are going on the assurance that you gave us that you are communicating with the field regarding the use of these funds. Enough emphasis cannot be laid on this, especially when one hears from first hand sources of the procedures that are ging on out on the field.

Referring to those invoices, which we questioned you about, as they come in from time to time, we should be glad to receive any help you can give us as to the accounts to which they should be charged.

We will be looking for the remittance from the Rockefeller Foundation, and will make remittance to China of the \$10,000, and will hold the \$5,000 for equipment here on our books. We hope we will be able to do better than the LC\$60,000 which you anticipate. The rate was 16.85 to one on yesterday's market.

You have given us something of a little task in digging out the exact facts on the Moore Fund. I will do it though in a day or two.

Dear Dr. Beech

As extra curriculur activity I have taken pleasure in studying bout the moore Moore Fund and its various ups and downs. It has been mostly up. Step by step as you read down the page, you will se what happened.

October 19, 1931 Mrs. Benjamin C. Moore sent us US\$10,000.

In October, 1932 the Board of Governors instructed the Treasurer to transmit this to the Associated Mission Treasurers, convert into silver and deposit same in Shanghai until it could be used for the purpose intended. Two banks were recommended for safety.

On November 7, the Associated Mission Treasurers were authorized to draw US\$10,000 for investment as above stated.

On December 1, the Associated Mission Treasurers notified us of the receipt and conversion into local currence \$49,517.22. Ath their discretion, it was deposited at the Hong Kong-Shanghai Bank at 25% interest.

January 4, 1933 interest accrued in America on the fund amounted to US\$245.26. It was transmitted to the Associated Mission Treasurers.

On March 10,1934 the fund had grown to LC\$52,150.12, and was continued with the Hong Kong-Shanghai Bank. The rate, however, was reduced to 2%.

The Executive Committee of the Board of Governors on April 24 refused the request of the field to transfer the fund to a more speculative institution.

There is an interval herein which correspondence cannot be readily located, but on March 10,1938, this fund had grown to L6\$60,991.24. The field had been instructed by the Executive Committee on January 7, 1938 to transfer Chinese currency funds into Canadian, Sterling, or U.S.dollars, holding them either in Shanghai or New York. As a result, this fund yielded £3,613-8-3. This was placed on deposit with the National City Bank in Shanghai at \$\frac{1}{2}\$ of \$13.

I am not sure that the letter I wrote you the other day answers one question which is raised in the opening paragraph of your letter of August 18th.

The Moore Fund which Mr. Taylor refers to in his communication of July 25rd, and which we wrote you about, is the original fund, which, upon instruction of the Board of Governors, was transferred into pounds Sterling. You were present at the meeting when this action was taken.

Mr. Taylor states that this matures on September 10th and wishes instructions before that time as it was renewed on a three months\* basis.

I am leaving the office tonight to be gone until September 6th, and I hope by that time you will have a communication awaiting me, confirming the transfer of this into local currency as outlined in your letter of August 18th, and which you state you are making available for the hospital building. It will be necessary for us to cable Mr. Taylor to avoid a continuance of the loan at the bank.

This is especially true of the Rockefeller Foundation funds appropriated for various institutions, but it is likewise true of the closing of the general budget.

Just as soon as I have opportunity to study through the West China accounts, I will write you further regarding the Plant Section. For your information, however, we have received a cable dated September 1st reading as follows:-

"IMPORTANT HOLD FUNDS NEW YORK HUATA."

We have not been sending any funds out, except as they have been drawn, and we are rather at a loss to interpret this cable.

I trust, however, your efforts with the H. Y. I will be successful in securing funds from the Unrestricted Account.



I am also acknowledging your letter of September 10th in reply to mine of the 9th. This refers to the cablegram regarding the holding of funds here in America. The next day we received a letter from Miss Priest enclosing West China drafts for \$3,000. This had been handled through the Manking U. S. Dollar Account, in view of the greater ease of converting the check into local currency.

I am wondering if it would not be a good idea for West China to have such an account here in the United States, as it works very advantageously with the other universities. It is possible that a request for such an account will be coming through at a later date.

## Memoranandum to Mr. Evans

I have a letter from Dr. Wilford from Vancouver dated October 1st, in which he states that he has received the goods ordered from the George P. Pilling Co. in Philadelphia and the Flarshein Co. of Cincinnati. + Capt

You will remember that these goods were ordered by Mr. Dean of the Rockefeller Foundation. (I am of the impression that there were three companies involved in that order, but he only mentions two, and he says that he does not have invoices.) He should have at least two or three invoices for Customs purposes.

He requests that invoices be sent to him, as follows:
Care Phillips House
32 Mody Street Kowloon, Hongkong

These invoices should be on thin paper and forwarded by the next Clipper mail.

He also states that these shipments for the New Hospital will involve him in expenditure of about \$20. He expects considerable expenditure for transportation from Hongkong to Chengtu. He asks for money, and makes a suggestion that it be sufficient for meeting possible expenditures, any reserve on arrival at Chengtu to be reported back to you. I would suggest that you send him a draft at Hongkong for about US\$200. I will prod him to make return to you as soon as possible after his arrival at Chengtu.

Dear Dr. Lindsay:

This deals particularly with the use of emergency funds as secured through the Associated Boards. The total allocation from the Associated Boards was \$17.800. All of this was paid in to the West China Treasurer. The cost of the program for promotional work was actually \$8,173.00, but, as larger income was received from other sources, only \$7,063.37 was used for expenses. The schedule is as follows:-

At the meeting of the Executive Committee of January 7, 1938, E-1334, \$5,000 was voted from emergency funds for hospital laundry, leaving a net balance available of \$5,736.63.

Your letter states that you are drawing the balance of \$5,736.63, which, in effect, completes the emergency funds. You have already drawn upon us for \$2,500.00 for special buildings. We assume that this is for the Isolation Hospital Emergency Building, and therefore, if it is intended that this is to come from emergency funds, there will be only \$3,236.63 available as a balance.

You state, however, that you are also drawing \$6,000.00 as a portion of the \$7,500.00 Rockefeller grant. As this is in excess of the emergency fund, there is no other course for us but to charge this to the general budget, which we will do. Presumably, by the same reason, you will be drawing \$1,500 more to complete what you believe to be the Rockefeller appropriation, and, quite naturally, we will, of necessity, be compelled to charge this to your current budget. This means that your current budget would be charged with the \$7,500.00 which you believe to be the Rockefeller grant, plus the extra \$2,500.00 you have drawn for building. The Journal Voucher for the June 30th closing showed all transactions very clearly, listing the items carried in Accounts Payable in Journal Voucher 316, and the charge against emergency relief funds in Journal Voucher 317.

We know you will realize, when studying the matter still further, that we do not have the funds available to cover all your drafts from emergency funds and, therefore, any overdrafts must be charged to the current budget.

re emergency funds emergency drafts from the Field. I am now fully convinced that you would do well to cable the following imformation in the following imformation the following imformation in t they may not have applied the proceeds to causes beyond recall. If they have used the money for items beyond the lists, they may be in the impossible situation of no funds for salaries . Of course it would be owing to their precipitate drawing of cash, of drawing first and enquiring afterwards, but, we here should leave no stone unturned to prevent them getting in a bad-hole. The cable will be evidence that we tried to forestall trouble for them by stating our only recourse was to charge their budget. By code this message may be inexpensive, especially if "deferrid" class.

Thinking over the points made by Mr. Hull in his appeal or demand for the "Open Door" in his massage to Japan, especially that first accusation that Japan depressed Chinese currency; I foresee action by the National Government to set its own rates of exchange for their new Western Empire since they are cut off from all ports and the power of Japan to depress Chinese money is greatly increased.

I there fore request that you arrange with the Bank of China, N.Y to open an account for University Outpatient Building in Sze or Nat'l currency for the proceeds of the Rockefeller Building gift of US\$15000. Rate of exchange to be fixed by you at the time the payment of U.S. money is made to the N.Y. Bank of China . This will be in accord with the R--F-- instructions to expend the fund prior to next May. As soon as I hear from you I will wire them re purchase of adequate building materials. We can ignore their cable to hold building funds since that cable was based on an erronious impression that they could sell gold in Chengtu as a rate much better than we could in N .Y. (Please refer to Lindsays letter and the stated exchange of the US \$5000 at the rate of about 17cts for one dollar Chinese. This was about the rate then prevailing here and obtainable at the Bk of China.)


There will be adequate building funds in your hands to meet any drafts they may have drawn on building of hospital account., should such drafts come along in the near future. As soon as we can learn if drafts have not been drawn, we should export the balance of our building funds to Chengtu. This applies to Shanghai funds, even more

than more than funds in foreign currencies. Will you therefore please recheck on the original Moore gift of about five years ago. If it is in National Currency we must get it out to Chengtu, even at the loss of some undue interest, at once. You can of course keep these funds in Chengtu in the name of the Governors treasury and subject only to your withdrawal, if such action seems wise. If you find there is \$60000 thinese in building of hospital cash in Shanghai, please wire by code to Taylor for the rate at which he can transfer it to Chengtu Bank of China, with earliest possible date for such transfer, with considerable to the recommendation of the re

One other matter. Now that Waichow, ninety miles west of Canton on the southern coast of China, is under bombardment and may be occupied, that port will be cut of from commercial planes landing there as Canton was after the American-Chinese plane was shot down. Such being the case, if and when it is, our clipper mails will go by clipper to Hongkong (%) thence by boat to Haiphong, Indo China, thence by rail to Kunming, thence by plane to Chengtu. This means a loss of one to two weeks depending on connections. The British Imperial Airways should do a better job and in less time and at less money if mailed from British territory. I suggest that you take up with Dr. Anderson, Secretary of the United Ch. Bd of Missions, To ronto the question of forwarding mail we enclose to them intended for Chengtu, depositing with them a small amount for postage for British Stamps. If you do not know Dr. A, well enough to take advantage of his good nature, you may commission me to try it.

All well here. I plan to go to Erie in about two weeks, and will then move on to 150-5th., letting you know in due time for mail, and desk room I trust. If the R\*-- F-- forwards to you the funds that I requested, please let me know as my trip to Erie related to the contracting under these funds.



I had a conference with Dr. Huntington and Dr. Howard Monday, and it seemed to be their understanding that the Baptist Board was to take over such funds as were appropriated from Harvard-Yenching sources for the support and travel of Dr. Graham, and that after these expenditures were made they would then take over the complete support from funds which they would have to secure themselves. In adjusting the balance, the Board states that the following items are chargeable to this fund:-

Naturally, the Baptist Board would have to take the responsibility for any additional cost in travel or other expenses. Is this a satisfactory adjustment according to your understanding, and will you not kindly send me a note accordingly if you agree?

There has been a thought ejected here in the office that only a proportionate amount of travel and expenses should be borne by the Harvard-Yenching Fund, of which the Baptist Board has no record.

It is to clear this situation which prompted me to write you at this time, and I trust you will accommodate me with a reply by return mail.

Dear Mr. Evans:

Thank you for your statement of the Dr. Graham account. It is perfectly clear and satisfactory. But the following ought to be said to make it perfectly clear to all concerned and to cover the "thought injected" re proportion of travel and expense.\*

1. In my conversations with Dr. Decker, as I recall them, it was agreed that the H.Y.Funds would care for Dr. Graham to Febuary first, 1938 and as much longer as Dr. Elisseeff might promise to undertake. The H.Y. Funds were understood to be adequate to cover our share of travel and furlough period.\*

Since you have provided for salary from Feb.1 to Aug. 31/38 and \$2000 for travel, I think this might be acceptable to all parties as adequate to cover all of our financial obligations on Dr. Graham's account, even those that I tentatively assumed in my conversations with Dr. Decker. Surely the Baptish shouldbe happy about it as our riginal understanding was \$20,000. But they have carried Dr. Graham along in University service and plan to do so for the remainder of his present term. They have done more than agreed, and if we pay them \$24000, we will have done more than originally agreed.

Therefore, I suggest that you close the accound with them, that is the Baptist Board, by payment of \$24000; or \$24,078.87 if required, for all services -past, present and future, and expenses connected therewith, that is, the Baptist Board, Dr. Graham and his connection with H.Y. Funds. (The \$78.87 would be a charge on our own H.Y.credit balances.) The settlement should clearly record that no further financial obligations, on account of Dr. Graham, rests upon the H.Y Funds or the University.

Again thanking you, Cordially

\* P.S. If one wished to go into proportions in regard to these two items, I judge it would be 5/7 of travel and one half year of furlough. I thonk it more fair and satisfactory to accept their, the Baptists' understanding or terms as expressed in your letter at bottom of page one.

Re emergency drafts and forwarding Hospital Funds.

Dear Mr. Evans:

Your form of cable, as stated in yours of Nov.2/38 seems quite clear to me and should serve notice of what is in store with the "beyond" drafts.

As to the question of \$3,236 or \$5736, what can you do with that "special building" draft of \$2500? It was exactly the same terminology "special building" as the other two for \$5000 which was clearly emergency money. Hence if you are still in doubt, I am not, for emergency building the Rockefeller grant, better try to close out the doubt in your wire, lest you be left holding-the-bag for \$2500 after authorizing them to draw \$5736. Since drafts may be on the way, this cable is to guard against them using the money before your explanatary letter arrives. It will do no harm if they are on the safe side in spending unothorised drafts, hence I favor the smaller amount. Add the word "writing "or "written" to soften anger or wrath.

Re forwarding money. To-day the rate is 16.10 they will transfer at approximate daily quotation, by all means have \$15,000 exchanged as a deposit in Chengtu Bank of China, Chinese Currency, Hospital Building with payments made on signatures of Bursar, p President, Meddean. Such cable charges as may be required for clarity and speed are well justified under the circumstances. This joint, or the tripple, signature will keep it from current funds.

I note in the Chicago Tribune today the following item, from Shanghai, A Japan embassy spokesman disclosed that Jap soldiers were encouraging the circulation of vast amounts of military script in occupied areas. This to help pay war expenses, institute a new currency system. -- -- etc.

Dear Dr. Beechs

Your letter of the 3rd came to hand yesterday and we immediately took steps to have the \$15,000.00 from the Rockefeller Foundation transmitted to China. It had not been received then, but it came to hand this morning and we immediately communicated with the bank and secured the low rate of 16.10, whereas the purchasing draft rate this morning was 16.15.

We conferred together here in the office and agreed with your proposition, but thought it best to get the reaction of Dr. Cartwright, the Treasurer, before going ahead. He has confirmed the action and, as a consequence, we are sending the \$15,000.00 to be exchanged at 16.10 deducting the cost of the cable. Other instructions which you gave to be followed out explicitedly.

We are closing up with the Baptist Board on the basis of paying them \$24,000.00 for the services of Dr. Graham. Did we bring up the subject of a pro rata amount of travel and pix months furlough, we would pay them \$800.00 more than the total of \$24,000.00. As it is our very definite understanding and that of the Baptist Board that they were to secure such funds as the Harvard-Yenching Institute elected to appropriate. The Baptist Board is very happy to settle on the basis proposed which closes all negotiations and obligations "past, present and future".

Fear Mr. Evans:

Thanks for yours of the 5th, with all it contains that manifests the "heart you spend"in our behalf, that too often does not have its own reward.

Now other matters that also require "forst-aid".

If it is not perfectly understood, I request that
you ascertain if that first gift of Mrs. Moore, at latest report
amounting to over Mex\$60,000 is still on deposit in Chinese Currency
in one of the Shanghai Banks. If on deposit in Chinese currency,
ascertain from Mr. Taylor, directly or through the Baptist Board,
the cost of transfer and loss of value we must sustain to move
it to the University Hospital account in Chengtu. Next, if the s
sacrifice is not too great, take immediate steps to get it to
Chengtu, either by bank transfer or by payment to Dr. Peterson
who sails from Vancouver, Nov. 12 -due Shanghai circ. Nov, 29th,
if that is feasable and advisable.

In a communication from Shanghai read this day, I note that a party who got permission to go from Shanghai to Nanking by the Japanese authorities, was forced to pay in Japanese money, who regarded the Chinese notes as worthless. This is but another straw that calls for money in Chinese account should be gotten from Shanghai and into Chengtu, before the Chinese government makes it impossible to transfer, in self protection, against the script being forced on Chinese by the Japanese military.

a You may be able to get the answer to some phases of this mitter from the Baptist or M.E. treasurers who are dealing with West China through Shanghai. But, I hope you will take such action as may be necessary, cable or otherwise, to get the information and authorize the transfer of Chinese money in Shanghai, if possible without serious loss.

I note by the Cabinet Minutes, Sept. 13/38 that they authorized Miss Priest to sell \$5,000 U.S. for Hospital Building Acct. \$50, perhaps, that \$2,500 special building may have been for the hospital account, as future letters may tell us.

Please have record made on your books of the amount of the deposit made in Chengtu from the sale of R.-F. \$15,000. We should have that at hand for future reference in making final accounting to the Foundation. Then again there may be some gold orders for foreign goods, such as hardware etc, that we must charge back at the rate paid by Bank of China for theis \$15,000.

I am risking the price of a cablegram from here, to emphasize the purpose of these R\*Ffunds and the need for speed and priority in this matter. This, despite, the reported bombing of Chengtu. Perhaps of followers of the Rising Sun learned that Madame's herd of blooded cattle was moving to the University.

Dear Dr. Beech:

I am dictating another letter replying to separate items in your letter of November 9th, as I desired to keep the two items, referred to in my previous letter, separate from other considerations.

One reason that I am not taking immediate action is that one lot of money is held in pounds sterling and the other is with the National City Bank.

I note what you say regarding the Cabinet Minutes relative to the US\$5,000 for the Hospital Building Account and trust that some definite information will be coming to hand very soon.

The record of the local currency equivalent to the Rockefeller Foundation US\$15,000 is carried on our books, as it was transferred to local currency here in New York.

Yes, Chengtu has been bombed. Apparently, however, no damage was done to the campus.

foll LAUELEO November 10, 1938 Your air mail letter of the 9th came to hand this morning, and we are replying immediately. Your letter of November 1st also calls attention to this same situation of funds on deposit in Shanghai for the Hospital Building Account. The follow-Original Moore Fund of US\$10,000.00. This primarily was sent to the field and translated into local currency. Up to March 10, 1938, it had accrued interest to make a total of LC\$60,991.24. By instruction of the Board of Governors, which I believe you suggested, it was transferred into sterling and yielded \$3,613-8-3. On July 23rd, Mr. Taylor advised us that 16-15-6 interest had accrued, making a total of 13,620-3-9. On August 15th, I wrote to you that Mr. Taylor had notified us that this fund, which had been carried with the National City Bank, would mature on September 10th and asked disposition. I find no place where you replied to this letter and presumably they must have redeposited, with the National City Bank. The Balance of Hospital Fund \$15,922. This fund was sent to the Associated Mission Treasurers through the Bank of China on June 3, 1937 and yielded LC\$53,286.48. It was placed on deposit with the Hongkong-Shanghai Bank Corporation, and on August 7th, we were notified that interest had accrued to the amount of \$2,131.46 and, as it was to be used for the hospital, it was redeposited with the National City Bank 25,000 at 5% for six months. 15,000 at 3% on demand. 10,000 at 35% in a savings account. Balance was credited to the account of the West China Board. I propose we cable to the Associated Mission Treasurers at once instructing them 1. Transfer all available funds in the latter account to the Bank of China at Chengtu, even if we have to bring it back to the States (if it can be done without loss). 2. Ask A. M. T. (a-la-Roosevelt) advice on IC\$25,000 six months 3. Ask A. M. T. advice on original US\$10,000.

Reply to letters, Nov. 10 Regarding Hospital Funds at Shanghai. (Etc Etc)

Forst let me reply to the Etc. Etc.

1. You should have my long letter of Aug. 18 which began with a reply to yours of Aug. 15th re the disposition of the £3620 /3 /9 and several other matters. See first two paragraphs. Since this matter has not been attended to , for which I am glad, seeing that we are sending the other two funds to Chengtu, I think it all right to redeposit this on 3 months periods, or on demand, if not already so deposited by Mr. Taylor.

This money in Sterling may depreciate still more than it has in the past two months, but since the present European affair has been postponed, it may be best to keep it in Sterling for the present. This is doubly true since we have sent the R-F. \$15000 and are considering transfer of the Chinese currency, in Shanghai Bank, to Chenghtu.

2. Re the Transfer of Chinese Currency.

(in Chinese Currency) I fully approve of transfering all available funds/in Shanghai to the Bank & China , Chengtu, to Hospital Building Acct., unless the transfer is attended by toogreat sacrifice. As to methods there appear to be three; transfer direct through bank or AMT -Shanghai to Chengtu; transfer into American money and then exchange to Sze dollars; entrust to Peterson in bank drafts on Chengtu.

But since you are doing this by cable, I judge the simple statement: "Transfer Chengtu available/hospital funds. Cable if inadvis-

able." Of come/such/cable graph, (Chinese Currency) or Some such cablegram, followed by a Clipper letter next Tuesday may do what we desire. If the loss is not too great, the difference in interest at Chengtu will compensate for losses in exchange or loss of interest in Shanghai.

Thank you for your prompt reply in this matter . Sorry to add to your burdens in these hectic days . I hesitate re going to New York while Hollywood is camped in your back yard. If I can see my way clear and profitable I may turn up about Monday the 21st. With greetings to your goodly company,


You may remember receiving a letter from Chengtu signed by Mr. H.B. Robertson and Dr. A.W. Lindsay with two enclosures setting forth the situation in the Science Building, and the need for a building for chemistry. I have exact copies of these letters but signed by Mr. Robertson and President Dsang.

Mr. Robertson was led to write these letters because of what he found in the teaching of chemistry on his arrival. Evidently our charity for other Universities is making it next to impossible to teach our own students properly or to serve others well. Since that was written the University has responded affirmatively to the request from Cheeloo to move their Arts and Science Colleges on to our campus and into our classes. That act adds to the beneficent charity but it must make the situation even worse. This is, in fact, really an appeal for and from Nanking, Ginling, Cheeloo, Soochow, Central University--Medical and Dental, and W.C.U.U.

Compelled to give the pre-medical sciences for the Central University, Cheeloo University and our own University students plus students from the occupied areas. a heavy burden is placed on the Science department for pre-medical sciences alone. That as I see it endangers our College of Science unless better provision is made for the teaching. Teachers appear to be plentiful but space and equipment is in such a bad state that they are robbed of their teaching service.

I am sure that all these institutions named above will add their meed of praise if this can find place on your emergency lists.



Thank you for your letter air mail of November 28th regarding the quetion raised by Mr. Greene relative to E.E.N.T. instruments. I will be writing to Mr. Greene regarding a letter sent to him by Dr. Kilborn relative to the disposition of the China Foundation grant to the University Medical work. I will also refer to this matter of Dr. Cheer's contingent fund. But for your guidance in reply to him I state the following from correspondence from and to Dr. Cheer.

Quotation from Dr. Cheer's letter dated 25/7/27 R.C. "As regards your letter of June 27th, which just reached me today, I am not very clear about the grant of \$3,000 gold from the Rockefeller Foundation. Is this \$3,000 granted to the West China Union University or to the Central University or to the three Universities including the Cheeloo University? I sent in an application to Dr. Gregg for a portable electrocardiograph and a basal metabolism tester withthe exact quotation from the Sanborn Company. If that \$3,000 is granted to the West China Union University, I should not use that money for any equipment that will be taken along with us on our return from Chengtu to Nanking. If that sum is granted to Medical College of the Central University by the Rockefeller Foundation, then I would appreciate very much if you would kindly find out from Dr. Gregg the exact things I applied for, and I have another long list of instruments for the E.N.T. department of the Central University to be bought on that money. The cost of the E.N.T. instruments will be about \$900 gold. If that \$3,000 is not granted to the Cenrtal University, then please do not order these E.N.T. instruments in the enclosed list, but just kindly hold it till I can raise some money to make the purchase."

The lists of instruments accompanying Dr. Cheer's letter consisted of two orders as follows: (1) George Pilling and Son Co., \$534.50 (2) V. Mueller and Co., \$882.45. Since Dr. Cheer requested that these E.N.T. instruments were not to be ordered unless this grant was of \$3,000 was made to the Central University, of course I have not placed the order.

On August 18th I requested Dr. Kilborn to convey the following statement to Dr. Cheer.

"The entire \$35,000 was given by the Rockefeller Foundation to the West China Union University. But in order to make sure that any equipment which Dr. Cheer might require would be available, I was asked to get his advice for items up to \$3,000. The official statement in connection with this particular grant or item read as follows: '\$3,000 contingent upon recommendation of Dr. Cheer'."

On November 14th I wrote Dr. Kilborn as follows: "Regarding the \$3,000 subject to recommendation of Dr. Cheer. Dr. Liljestrand took with him the cardiograph and the basal metabolism outfit, the first cost of which was \$582,63. Orders for brain and chest surgery amounting to \$1520.03 plus to \$200 advanced for transportation charges were charged to this account and shipped with Dr. Wilford. Written upon these orders was this statement, 'To be paid for by the Central University.' I assumed that this order had the approval of Dr. Cheer and tentatively charged it to the \$3,000 contingent upon his recommendation."

I beleive that I reported to Dr. Peterson the receipt of the above mentioned lists of E.E.N.T. goods for Dr. Cheer. But insofar as I have information the \$1100 or thereabouts orders for E.E.N.T goods place by Dr. Aterson were goods that he considered necessary for carrying on these departments under present conditions. Since I do not have the invoices for Dr. Peterson's orders here I cannot check his items with those on Dr. Cheer's lists, but I think it is fair to assume that some of Dr. Cheer's items may be on the orders purchased by Dr. Peterson.

In your quotation from Mr. Greene's letter I note the statement that I was supposed to have received a requisition for E.E.N.T. instruments for use in the new out-patient department, temporarily housed on the grounds of the General Hospital of the Canadian Mission. If this refers to a different list than that referred to above in the quotation from Dr. Cheer's letter of 25/7/27 R.C., I have not received it. Dr. Peterson did not report that he had received such a requisition and Dr. Cunningham has not reported it. Dr. Cunningham's order was not paid for through the Rockefeller Foundation grant.

Since Cunningham on left Hongkong for Chengtu on November 2nd and since Dr. Peterson now on the Pacific, and Dr. Liljestrand is already in Chengtu with his goods, I trust that they will have adequate supply of instruments for the temporary out-patient departments, FINT.

I made requests that Dr. Peterson's orders should be charged against the \$5,000 R.F. grant. Therefore the last statement in your letter which implies that part of Dr. Peterson's orders were chargeable to the \$3,000 grant is not correct. My statement to the Methodist Board was to the effect that charges for Dr. Peterson's account rendered to us should not exceed \$100. If any of Dr. Peterson's goods were purchased at the request of Dr. Cheer we will charge them to the \$3,000 account when so notified, but until so notified his orders remain chargeable to the \$5,000 grant. I am sorry to have written so much but I thought it well to give you the entire story in order that you may make it perfectly clear to Mr. Greene.

Dear Dr. Dsang and Mr. Robertson:

Your joint letter asking for a new science building was received. The matter was taken up with Dr. Garside, but it was felt it must come from the W.C.U.U. Executive to find acceptance with the Emergency Committee. No Executive meeting until January, but there seems little probability the Emergency Committee can include it in their immediate program for West China Union University.

Since this is called for at this time because of the visiting colleges, the question of ownership might be ignored as the question of service is ignored. My own opinion is somewhat as follows:

This project might get in a preferred position as to emergency capital projects if it was made a joint project and backed by each group individually to their own constituency and jointly to the Associated Colleges Emergency. If Nanking, Ginling, Cheeloo, Soochow, and Government Central University Medical-Dental could each approve the project as a united need and transmit it to their Trustees, and at the same time send a united appeal to the Associated Colleges and to me, The Central Medical might be willing to ask Rockefeller to participate, if they did so I would gladly second the appeal. There can be no medical work without premedical science and since sciences in the occupied area seem bound for extinction sooner or later, if if continued under occupation, the call for science in West China should be very strong. If you all see it strongly enough to back this project in this matter do so at once. I would request that you call the leaders of all these groups in conference and put this matter before them, ---- building and its equipment, and if favorable action can be taken, let us have it by Clipper or cable before the January meetings.

Dear Dr. Beech:

Let me acknowledge receipt of your letters of November 23rd and November 28th.

Your letter of November 23rd discusses our procedure in bringing the request for a special appropriation for the Science Building before the Associated Boards for inclusion in our emergency campaign.

We are planning to have a meeting of the North American Section within the near future. I will bring to the attention of this group the urgency of the need for additional chemistry accommodations at West China and will suggest that they take an action endorsing the request of the West China Executive Committee to the Associated Boards. If we have a meeting of either the Nanking or Cinling Boards before the West China Executive Committee meets, we will have them take similar action.

I am somewhat hazy as to the exact amount which West China will need from the Associated Boards emergency fund in order to erect this building. Will you help me out by giving me either the exact amount involved or, if that is not available, as close an estimate as possible.

Your letter of November 28th comments on the urgent request sent by President Dsang and Mr. Robertson on Uctober 26th for an advance of \$3,000 from the 1938-39 emergency fund of West China toward the expenses of the United Hospital. Our situation as regards the 1938-39 emergency fund is as follows:— Thus far the Associated Boards has not made any distribution of funds. Only \$10,000 or \$15,000 is actually in hand, and part of this is tied up in such a way that it could not be immediately distributed. The Harvard-Yenching Institute is in process of making a grant of \$50,000 which we hope it can pay over before the end of the year. If such a payment can be made, it will be possible for the Associated Boards to make a substantial initial contribution. West China's share would be more than this \$3,000 so we would then be in a position to cable, or authorize the field to draw, that amount.

Until some progress has been made along these lines it would be impossible for us to send a cable promising definitely that funds would be forthcoming. But as soon as the distribution is made we will be glad to act.


Sorry for the confusion, but their is crossing of many wires in these orders and slips expected. The following consideration determines the amount of Dr. Peterson's departmental grant, from the RF \$5000 grant, namely, that the total was to come under \$1100.

In your statement there is a charge of Am. Hosp. Supply Co \$127.99. This was Dr. Wilford's order carried out with Dr. Paterson. So, subtract it from Peterson account, which is now \$972.01. Add the bill of \$270.39 from the RF per Mr. Dean. Total amount is now \$1242.40 I ask that yyou BayltoothecMEfrBd \$3131193dinsteadoofe\$463119; on thetMuelleneaccountin and them to charge this additional \$150 to Peterson's equipment account with them. This will bring the total Peterson charge against our RF grant to \$1092940 . Since there is an express account which does not appear in your statements, this \$1092.40 is near enough to let it stand. In so far as your accounts are concerned , only one correction or change is called for, viz, to pay ME. Bd \$150 less than appears on your statement. or, a total of \$313.19 instead of \$463.19 . Dear Dr. Beech: Your letter of December 3rd came to hand and I immediately reported the first paragraph to Mr. Garside regarding the Chemistry Building. I find that there has been no mention of the amount of money needed for this building and it might be advisable for you to notify us what the anticipated cost will be. As I view it now, no progress can be made until a definite application is presented. We are having the cablegram to the Associated Mission Treasurers traced and will let you know the outcome as soon as we receive a reply. I am not so sure that we can follow out your instructions at the present time regarding the \$1100.00 for Dr. Peterson. We settled up on the basis of \$463.19 and Mr. McKenzie wrote to Dr. Peterson by the last Clipper mail. Mr. McKensie calls attention to the possibility of Dr. Peterson having used the \$150.00 by the time the next announcement would reach him. Nowever, if you think it advisable to make the adjustment you suggest at this end and notify Dr. Peterson in the next Clipper mail, we will do so. We have called up Mr. W. N. Ridge's office at 302 Broadway and his secretary states that he is staying at his home in Lynbrook, Long Island and is coming into New York, and, as a matter of fact, is at his office this morning. We have received a letter from Mira L. Sawyer quoting an authorisation from you relative to the purchase of an ether vaporizer. Dear Joe:

On receipt of an unsigned cable from New York requesting that we "transfer Chengtu available Chinese currency hospital fund", I advised the Bursar of the University that I was sending him CC\$25,000.00 through the Standard Oil Company. They later wired back to cancel the Socony remittance as they had received CC\$90,000.00 from you.

Of course, nobody knows just what may happen in China, but from what I can gather, I see no reason for the undue anxiety there seems to be in New York in regard to funds held in Shanghai. Some of us still believe that both China and her currency will survive. In case they do not, it might be better to have one's funds in Shanghai rather than in Chengtu.

Mr. Robertson recently requested statements covering all University funds held by me in trust as of September 30th, and I am enclosing copies of same for your files, especially since they answer some of the questions in your letter of November 12 to Dr. Peterson.

The Sterling Fixed Deposit No. 10291 at the National City Bank of New York for \$3,624-14-0, you will note, matures today. The University authorities have requested that both the principal and interest be renewed in the same back for one year.

By referring to page No. 5, you will note that Fixed Deposit No. 10010 and 10091 for CC\$25,000 and CC\$15,000, respectively, have both been withdrawn, and credited to the University account on our books. Likewise, CC\$5,000 has been withdrawn from the National City Bank Savings Account No. 5852, and credited to the above account. This leaves a balance in the Hospital Fund now on investment in our hands, as per page No. 4, CC\$5,058.33.

On November 8th, Mr. Robertson requested me to look up an item of CC\$50,000 referred to in a statement appended to the Board of Governors Minutes, Annual Meeting, October, 1935. Evidently, from Mr. Robertson's letter, the University had no record that this amount was transferred by Dr. Main to New York on May 11th, 1936.

I have been unable to find in the files any connecting link between the GC\$50,000 in question and the CC\$53,286.48 sent to Mr. Fuller on or about June 24th, 1937. We are assuming that they are related, and that the excess of the larger amount is made up of interest and gain on exchange.

Yesterday, we sent you, in reply to your cablegram of November 4th, the fellowing message:"REFERRING UNSIGNED CABLE FOURTEENTH CHENGTU ADVISES HOLD BALANCE HOSPITAL FUND SHANGHAI STOP STERLING DEPOSIT MATURES TOMORROW CHENGTU REQUESTS RENEW ONE YEAR" TAYLOR.

Glad to know of their fears regarding deposits with the Bank of China , Chengtu , as well as their ability to sell checks on New york. But I am glad they have the RF building grant there, with the knowledge of the donors. My advices to the field building committee were to order necessary building materials immediately. If they have done that a "mora-totium" will not greatly delay or cause difficulty.

I do not share fears regarding the ability of the Bank of China or their actions re moratorium. Such action at a time when they seek and secure \$25,000,000 equal to Sze \$150,000,000 and the Secretary of the Treasury notifies the world that they can have more from the United States is not the time to refuse our University funds on deposit, especially as the British are also partners in the University and credits to China. They have agreed to advance funds for the building and equipping of the Burma-Sze RR as I lerned in Canada. Moratorium there may be if the public gets in a panic, of course, but unless the "rulers are those who knew not Joseph" we would get the cash as me needed, I believe.
