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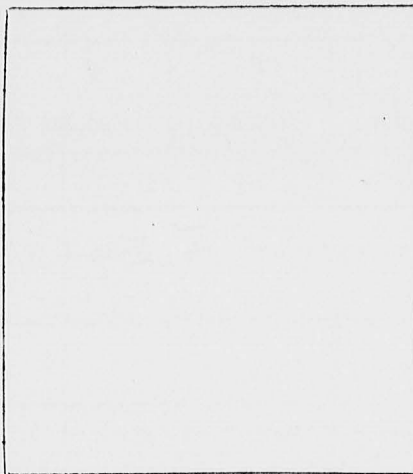

Since the spring semester of 1935

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No university credit is given for any course with a grade of "2" or less.

MERIT POINTS for a course are obtained by multiplying the number of credits for the course by the merit value of the grade received.

AVERAGE GRADE is the ratio of the total number of merit points obtained within a certain period of time to the corresponding total number of credits registered for the student. In general three kinds of average grade are distinguished and used in the University: *semester average grade*, *annual average grade*, and *general average grade*. If a student enters the University with advanced standing, his work in the former institution may be given credit, but such accepted advanced credits will not be used in the computation of the general average grade.

* Where there are reasons to believe that the achievement of students in a course is distributed normally, or that the students are relatively unselected, the following table, set up in 1941, is taken as a guide for deciding the proportion of students to be placed in each grade:

These proportions are usually applicable in elementary courses or in classes that are fairly large in size; in advanced courses or in classes that are small in size, instructors will naturally use their own judgment in departing from them.

STATUS: Students whose general average grade is 1.00 (old marking system) or above are in good standing. Only students in good standing are allowed to graduate. Students whose semester average grade falls below 3.4 (new system), whose annual average grade for any year falls below 0.80 (old system) or whose annual average grade for each of any two consecutive years falls below 4.2 (new system), are dismissed on account of poor work.

A CREDIT HOUR in the University is 50 minutes of class work per week throughout a semester of 18 weeks requiring about two hours of outside preparation. Three hours per week of laboratory or field work throughout a semester are considered equivalent to one credit hour.

CLASSIFICATION : Students in the undergraduate Colleges are classified once a year before the registration period for the fall semester. Except under special conditions, they are classified on the basis of the number of credits obtained prior to September 1 according to the following table :
