REAT and manifold were the bleffings, most dread sovereign, which Almighter God, the Father of all mercies, belfowed upon us the people of England, when fait he fent Your Majefty's Royal Perfon to rule and reign over us. For whereas it was the expectation of many, who wished not well unto our sion, that upon the setting of that bright Occidental Star Queen Elizabeth of most happy memory, some thick and palpable clouds of darkness would so have overshadowed this land, that men should have been in doubt which way they were to walk; and that it should hardly be known who was to direct the unfettled state: the appearance of Your Majerty, as of the Sun in his firength, instantly disperied those supposed and surmised mists, and gave unto all that were wellaffected, exceeding cause of comfort; especially when we beheld the Government established in your Highness, and Your hopeful Seed, by an undoubted Title, and this also accompanied with Peace and Tranquility at home and abroad,

But amongst all our joys, there was no one that more filled our hearts, than the bi-field continuance of the Preaching of God's facred Word amongst us 3 which is that inclinaable treasure, which excelleth all the righes of the earth; because the fruit thereof extendeth itfelf, not only to the time fpent in this transitory world, but directeth and difposeth men unto that eternal happiness which is above in Heaven.

Then not to fuffer this to fall to the ground, but rather to take it up, and to continue it in that flate, wherein the famous Predecellor of Your Highness did leave it : nay, to go forward with the confidence and resolution of a man in maintaining the truth of Christ, and propagating it far and near, is that which hath to bound and firmly knit the heart of all Your Majesty's loyal and religious people unto you, that Your very name is precious among them; their eye doth behold You with comfort, and they bless You in their hearts. as that fanctified Person, who under God, is the immediate Author of their true happing is. and this their contentment dorn not diminish or decay, but every day increaseth and taketh strength, when they observe, that the zeal of Your Majesty toward the house of God doth not flack or go backward, but is more and more kindled, manifesting itself abroad in the farthest parts of Christendam, by writing in defence of the Truth, (which hath given fuch a blow unto that man of fin, as will not be healed,) and every day at home, by religious and learned discourse, by frequenting the house of God, by hearing the Word preached, by cherishing the teachers thereof, by caring for the Church, as a most tender and loving nursing Father.

There are inhalte arguments of this right Christian and Religious affection in Your Majesty, but none is more forcible to declare it to others, than the vehement and perpetuated defire of the accomplishing and publishing of this work, which now with all humility, we're-Ent unto Your Majefty. For when Your Highnels had once out of deep judgment apprehended how convenient it was, that out of the Original Sacred Tongues, together with comparing of the labours, both in our own and other foreign Banguages, of many worthy men who went before us, there should be one more exact Translation of the Ploly Scripture into the English Tongue: Your Majesty did never defix to urge and to excite those to whom

it was commended, that the Work might be haftened, and that the business might be expedited in fo decent a manner, as a matter of fuch importance might juffly require.

And now at last, by the mercy of God, and the continuance of lour labours, it being brought unto such a conclusion, as that we have great hope, that the Church of England thall reap good fruit thereby, we hold it our duty to offer it to Your Majesty, not only as to our King and Sovereign, but as to the principal Mover and Author of the Work : humbly craving of Your most Sacred Majesty, that fince things of this quality have everbeen fubject to the censures of ill-meaning and discontented persons, it may receive approbation and patronage from folearned and judicious a Prince as Your Highness is, whose allowance and acceptance of our labours thall more honour and encourage us, than all the calumniations and hard interpretations of other men shall dismay us. So that if, on the one fide, we should be traduced by Popish Persons at home or abroad, who therefore will malign us, because we are poor instruments to make God's holy Trutls to be yet more and more known unto the people, whom they defire still to keep in ignorance and darkness; or if, on the other fide, we should be maligned by self-conceited. Bretkren, who run their own ways, and give liking unto nothing but what is framed by themselves, and hammered on their anvil; we may rest secure, supported within by the truth and innocency of a good confcience, having walked the ways of simplicity and integrity, as before the Lord; and fultained without by the powerful protection of Your Majesty's grace and favour, which will over give countenance to honest and chriftian endeavours, against bitter censures and uncharitable imputations.

The Lord of heaven and earth blefs Your Majefly with many and happy days, that as his heavenly hand hath enriched Your Highness with many singular and extraordinary graces; so You may be the wonder of the world in this latter age, for happiness and true felicity, to the honour of that great Goo, and the good of his Church, through Jefus Christ our Lord and only Saviour.
