Mr. Lin La Chuang offered the opening prayer.

The Chairman asked the Board to rise up as a token of welcome to the new members, Mr. Lin La huang and Pastor Ung Huai Iu, representing the Methodist and the Congregational churches. respectively.

The Secretary read the minutes of the Executive Committee of the Board of December 10, 1927, which were adopted as minutes of the Board, and signed by the chairman.

Mr. Lin Ching-Jun then made a report of his trip to Shanghai with Professors Beach and Beeman, as representatives of this University at the meeting of the Council on Higher Education, which was held on January 17-19, 1928. Before the meeting opened, with two or three days to spare, Mr. Lin went to Nanking the capital of the Nationalist Government, where he interviewed some of the leading educational people. In regard to registration of this university, it was reported to him that the documents had already been forwarded to the central office, but recognition had been delayed for one reason or another. It was also pointed out to him that there were two things unsatisfactory. One was the system of presidency rather than commission should be used; another was that there are too many religious courses. Mr. Lin gave explanations for both these objections.

That the report of Mr. Lin's Nanking trip be accepted. M-519 VOTED:

> Concerning the meeting of the Council of Higher Education, Mr. Lin reported that sixteen universities and colleges were represented by more than forty people. The two important problems discussed were "University Standards", and a "Joint Financial Campaign for the

Christian Universities in America". According to the Grading Committee of the Council of Higher Education this university is ranked as B, there being only two universities ranked as A in all China.

M-520 VOTED: That Mr. Lin's report re the meeting of Higher Education be accepted.

Messrs. Sing Ce Dung and $^{\rm D}$ avid S. Hung having tendered their resignation as members of the Administrative Commission, it was

M-521 VOTED: That their resignation be accepted.

M-522 VOTED: That hereafter the system of presidency should be adopted for this University; and that the educational authorities should be duly informed of this change.

M-523 VOTED: That Mr. Lin Ching-Jun should be elected as President of this University (unanimous) which was signified by a rising vote.

The Ten-year Program for Fukien Christian University as prepared by the Faculty was then presented by President Lin, and discussed. The following amendments were made concerning Professors:

M-524 VOTFD: That the entire Ten-Year Program for Fukien Christian University as amended be adopted, as shown on separate sheet.

M-525 VOTED: That the next meeting of the Board be held on March 1 or 2 at 5:00 p.m. in the Y. M. C.A. to meet with Mr. Cressy, Secretary of the Council of Higher Education, who is visiting Foochow on his tour in South China.

Rev. W. M. Norton was asked to say the op ening prayer after tea served by the host.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted by the Board.

That President Lin having consented to take office, there should M-526 VOTED: be conducted an Inauguration Ceremony, the committee for which shall consist of two representatives from the Board of Managers, two from the Faculty, two from the Students Association, and one from the Alumni Association.

That Messrs. Lin La Chuang and C. D. Sheng be the representatives M-527 VOTED: of the Board on the committee of Presidential Inauguration. (Vote cast by ballot)

That Mr. Ting Chao Wu be co-opted as a member of the Board, being M-528 VOTED: the fifth man co-opted as permitted by the constitution.

That Rev. H. R. Caldwell be requested to serve as the Honorary M-529 VOTED: Curator of the University Museum.

President Lin reported that the Council of Christian Higher Education has invited him to be a member of the Chinese Advisory Committee of the said Counoil (total 14 persons) to fulfil the obligation of which he needs to go to Shanghai two times to attend meetings.

That we approve of President Lin going to Shanghai twice, to M-530 VOTED: attend meetings of the Chinese Advisory Committee of Christian Higher Education.

M-531 VOTED: That during President Lin's absence, Professor Lin Tieng Lang be invited to serve as Acting President and Dean.

The faculty having requested that the "Ten year program of the Fukien Christian University" be amended further, after some discussion, it was

M-532 VOTED: That it again be amended as follows:

Professor of Biology 3 changed to 2.
Instructor of Physics and Mathematics 1 annulled.
Add Professor of Agriculture 1, and Instructor 1.
Professor of Chinese Literature and History 4 changed to 3.
Professor of Political Science, History, Economics, Sociology 5 changed to 3.
Leaving a total of 22 professors.

.2 Instructors of Education and Psychology be annulled.
1 Instructor of Religion and Philosophy be annulled.
Leaving a total of 6 instructors.

Under ADMINISTRATION Publicity be raised to \$400 Catalogue and publications \$400

Under MISCELLANEOUS Sericulture be cancelled, and instead put "Agricultural Experiment". The figures to be raised to \$4,050 Contingencies \$5,000 to be cut down to \$1,500

M-533 VOTED: That the following "Aim of the 10-year Program of the Fukien Christian University" be adopted:

"To be a small college of high standard, giving a first class A.B. degree, and serving Fukien Province especially.

While it is planned to continue the work of Pre-medical training for which purpose the college has from the beginning been subsidized by the Rockefeller Foundation, it is also believed that one unique contribution can be made for the province by this college, as an Agricultural Experiment Station, specializing in pomology, forestry, and animal husbandry."

Since these two are rather important actions, I think it advistable to write and inform you especially. The rest of the minutes, has, I am sure, been forwarded to you separately.

At this critical time, when Christian education is passing on to a new era, we need men of sound training, of sterling character, and of intense zeal for service and sacrifice; and we believe that in his choice, we have secured the right person for this important work.

The Chairman, Rev. Lin Yu Shu, called the meeting to order punctually, and asked Rev. Wang Chien Ho to give the opening prayer.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, and approved by the Board, and signed by the Chairman.

The following miscellaneous business was first disposed of:

- (a) The Secretary reported that both the motions of Dec. 10, 1927 (Number M-515) and Feb. 23, 1928 (Numbers M-522, M-523) had been conveyed to the Board of Trustees in New York City, with covering letters, and that a reply acknowledging receipt of the same, and showing approval, had been received.
- (b) The Secretary also reported that the motion of the annual meeting of Nov. 14, 1927 (Number M-513) had been conveyed to Dr. Gowdy with covering letter and that the latter had also replied expressing his appreciation of the

action of the Managers.

- (c) The Secretary also reported that Mr. C.J. Lin had written in answer to the call of the Managers to be the President of the University, and said that he had already assumed duties of the Presidency
 - (d) The Rev. H.R. Caldwell reported that ow ing to the stringency of both time and money, he is not able to serve as Honorary Curator of the University Museum.
- M-534 VOTED: That the Secretary, Rev. Lin Pu-Chi, be added to the Committee of Presidential Inauguration, due to the imminent departure of Mr. C.D. Sheng to Shanghai. (The Inauguration was postponed to June.)
- M-535 VOTED: That the budget for the current year 1928-1929 as presented by President Lin be tentatively adopted, and transmitted to the Board of Trustees in New York City, and that the new teachers as provided by the said budget shall only be engaged after obtaining approval of the Trustees.

Total Estimated Expenditure M. \$143,852.00

(Copy of complete Budget enclosed)

M-536 VOTED: That the Board of Managers shall appoint a Finance Committee to study the present financial situation of the University, as well as proposed budget, and to devise means for raising money to meet the deficit.

M-537 VOTED; That the following be appointed to serve on the said Finance Committee, President Lin (Ex-officio), Treasurer Havighurst (Exofficio), Messrs. Wang Yung Chung, David S. Hung, C.D. Sheng and H.R. Caldwell. (President Lin to be convenor)

M-538 VOTED: That beginning with the Fall Semester, Mr. Lin Tieng Lang be appointed as the Dean of the University.

M-539 VOIED: That President Lin be empowered to raise the salary of Mr. Lin Tieng Lang in his discretion, but not to exceed \$600. per annum.

M-540 VOTED: That the "Statement and Programmes" as prepared by the Faculty for the Chinese Advisory Committee of the Council on Christian Higher Education be adopted and that the Board would prefer Programs B and C to the other programmes. (Copy of the Statement and Programmes enclosed)

The meeting was closed with a prayer offered by Rev. E.M. Norton.

The Chairman, Rev. Lin Yu Shu presided, and asked Rev. Mr. Caldwell to give the opening prayer.

By general consent, the Faculty Finance Committee, consisting of Profs. T. L. Lin, Scott, Beach, Beeman, and Miss Asher, were invited to sit with the Managers for discussion.

A letter of sympathy from Manager Ting Chao Wu was read, who though unable to come on account of an important meeting of the Provincial Commission, sent a representative in the person of Mr. Wang Shu Kai, of the Bureau of Construction, and an alumnus.

President Lin reported that on the evening of May 28, at about 8 p.m., when the students were all attending a meeting in the chapel, a fire broke out in the Gardner Hall, Jr., Memorial Dormitory. Upon its discovery, no time was lost in trying to put it out, but all efforts failed. The Fire Brigades of Foochow were also notified, but were unable to come on account of the distance. The fire continues till about 12 p.m., and the whole building was burned. Some students were able to move out their things. No life was lost.

The next morning, temporary measures were provided to house the students in the Faculty residences and in the old dormitory. Cablegrams were sent to both the Trustees in New York, and to the Fire Insurance Co. in

Shanghai concerning the fire. (The building was insured for \$50,000; its actual cost when built was about \$112,000.)

In the course of the two succeeding days, many people came to offer their sympathy to the University. The Chairman of the Provincial Government, Fang Hsing Tao, also appointed a representative to come expressing sympathy and regrets for the mishap, and encouraged the University to go on; and said that the Government would be pleased to render financial help for the re-building.

President Lin also reported that the Faculty have decided to carry on the term's work to its proper finish.

Manager David S. Hung of the Bureau of Construction reported that he had on his part pointed out the importance of this case to the leading officials, and urged their assistance in whatever way possible.

M-541 VOTED: That the Board of Managers highly appreciate the spirit of determination with which the Faculty have decided to carry on the term's work to its proper finish, and are resolved to support them in the best of their ability.

At this juncture tea was served; and a welcome was given to Mr. Ch'en Ming, Secretary of the Provincial Government, who was duly authorized by the Government to come and extend regrets and sympathy of the latter to the Managers, and to all concerned with this University. He also wanted to find out what the Government can do to help out, and was told that there are two things that the Managers want done: firstly, the finding out of the criminal or criminals, if it was a case of incendiary, meting out to such severe punishment; and the future protection of life and property within the compound with absolute certainty. After his departure, the discussion was resumed.

- M-542 VOTED: That in regard to the recent burning down of the new dormitory the Managers should make definite approach to the Provincial Government, requesting the latter, (1) To make real efforts to investigate and arrest those involved in the incendiary, if it be such, and to mete out to them severe punishment; and (2) To render sure and effective protection of the life and property within the University compound in the future.
- M-543 VOTED: That Messrs. Lin Yu Shu and C. D. Sheng together with President Lin be asked to return the call of the Provincial Government, and to present in person the requests of the Board as contained in M-542.
- M-544 VOTED: That in the judgment of the Managers it is a matter of necessity that new dormitory or dormitories should be erected as soon as possible, and that a committee, to be appointed by the President from among the Faculty members, shall be created to devise means for raising money, for re-building, and for urging the reimbursement of the insurance money, the findings of which to be reported to the Board of Managers for approval.

In regard to the deficit of the current year 1928-29 (see M-535), President Lin reported that Prof. Farley has voluntarily offered to stay on

another year, thus reducing the deficity by \$2,500.00 Mex., and that he was waiting on the decision of the Managers. Whereupon it was

M-545 VOTED: That the Managers having heard with pleasure the voluntary offer of Prof. Farley to stay on another year, thus reducing a substantial item of furlough expenditure from the budget of the current year 1928-29, appreciates the spirit of sacrifice on the part of Prof. Farley, and accepts his offer to stay on another year.

M-546 VOTED: That it is the opinion of the Board of Managers that Prof.

Metcalf should again be engaged at the termination of his
furlough in America; if, however, there should be any change
or deduction in the Rockefeller Foundation grant, then the
Board will have to reconsider the possibility of re-engaging
Doctor Metcalf as professor of the Fukien Christian University.

The meeting adjourned with a prayer by Rev. Mr. Norton.

The Chairman, Rev. Lin Yu Shu, took the Chair, and asked Rev. E. M. Norton to give the opening prayer.

The Chairman expressed the welcome of the Board to Dr. Gowdy on his return to Fukien, and his presence at the meeting.

The Secretary read the minutes of the last meeting, and the minutes of the Executive Committee, both of which were duly approved, and signed by the Chairman.

The annual report of the President was read and accepted.

Dr. Gowdy then gave a report of his year's work in America. He told the Board of the sympathy of the Trustees towards the reorganization and registration of Fukien Christian University, and of his efforts to raise money for endowment for the University. He emphasized the wonderfully sympathetic spirit of the Trustees towards our situation here, and said that the Trustees were eager to do their best to cooperate with the Managers in carrying on Christian education in Fukien.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers Fukien Christian University, September 28, 1928.

- U-543 Voted: That the Board of Hanagers unanimously express its hearty appreciation to Dr. and Hrs. Gowdy for their untiring work for the University in securing endowment funds in America towards the permanent maintenance of the University, in spite of Dr. Gowdy's poor health. It is hoped that Dr. Gowdy will enjoy his health in China now, and will continue to give his invaluable service to the University. The whole body rose in expressing this vote of thanks.
- M-544 Voted: That Dr. Gowdy be welcomed and invited, as the field representative of the Trustees, to participate in the discussion of the proposed revision of the By-laws.

Dr. Gowdy made a report of the sympathetic attitude of the Trustees, and pointed out certain specific items to be changed.

- M-545 Voted: (a) That the proposed revision of the By-laws of of the Trustees be accepted in general.
 - (b) That a special committee of three be appointed to arrange the form of the revision so as to meet the requirement for registration with the Nationalist Government, and the approval of the Trustees.
 - (c) That the Committee consist of President C. J. Lin, Dr. Samuel Leger, and Rev. Lin Pu Chi.
- M-546 Voted: That the financial report of the Treasurer be accepted, subject to auditing.
- M-547 Voted: That Rev. R. W. IlcClure be asked to audit the University accounts for the period August 1, 1927 July 31, 1928.
- M-548 Voted: That the Board of Hanagers give a vote of thanks to Hiss Asher, the University Treasurer, for her efforts to clarify the accounts, and for the clearness of the present form.
- M-549 Voted: That the Trustees be requested to grant the gain in exchange for gold sold, a net gain of M\$2,770.14, to help meet the deficit of the budget for 1928-29.
- M-550 Voted: That we request the Trustees to grant the surplus balance on hand at the end of the year, July 31, 1928, M\$8,902.88 after deducting specific obligations brought forward from the 1927-28 accounts, to help meet the deficit on the budget and any emergencies which may

come up during the year, and perhaps a part of the building debt.

M-551 Voted: That President'Lin's salary be increased by \$50.00 per month.

M-552 Voted: That the budget for 1928-29 as amended by vote M-551 be accepted by the Board of Managers, to be transmitted to the Board of Trustees.

M-553 Voted: That the Board request the Methodist Mission to give us two teachers to fill the vacancies left by Dr. R. II. L. Sites and Dr. John Govdy. It is especially desired that these two persons shall have such qualifications and training as will fit them for work in the Department of Religion.

M-554 Voted: That this Board request the Church Missionary Society to raise its annual appropriation to the full minimum quota of \$1,500.00 gold per year, and furnish a full time man to join the University faculty.

The problem of securing some one to take over the Treasurer's work during Miss Asher's furlough was discussed, and by mutual agreement it was decided that it be referred to the Executive Committee for further consideration.

President Lin made a report on the Financial Campaign for the building of new dormitories.

M-555 Voted: That the Faculty Committee on New Building Plans be asked to continue its work and make reports to the Executive Committee.

The election of the officers of the Board was as follows:

Chairman, Rev. Lin Yu Shu Secretary, Rev. Lin Pu Chi Treasurer, Rev. F. C. Havighurst

Rev. E. M. Norton and Rev. Wang Chien Ho were elected as the other two members of the Executive Committee.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer by the Rev. Harry R. Caldwell.

In regard to the correlated program for Christian Colleges in China, it was

- M-561 Voted: A. That the Board endorse the general principles outlined by the Correlated Program for Christian Colleges in China.
 - B. That Fukien Christian University's part in the Correlated Program be so modified as to give a student body of 300 instead of 200; the reason being that Fukien's student enrolment in normal times has come to near 200, that some room should be provided for for the next few years in the Province of highest density of Christian population in China without a government institution of higher learning.
 - C. That in regard to the relation between this University and Hwa Nan College, a committee of three be apointed to meet and discuss with representatives of the Board of "anagers of the latter, concerning any possible co-operation between these two institutions. For this purpose President Lin, Mr. C. D. Sheng and Dr. Gowdy were appointed, and President Lin was instructed to notify the President of Hwa Nan regarding this action.
- M-662 Voted: That the plans for rebuilding the burned dormitory as an Arts Hall be approved, costing M\$48,000.00 in addition to the M\$34,740.10 from insurance.
- M-563 Voted: To approve of the plans for altering the two double faculty residences at a cost of M\$5,000.00 each, for use as dormitories to

aco nodate fifty students each, and to ask the Trustees for permission to carry out this plan.

- M-565 Voted: To approve of the division of house No 762, now occupied by Mr. Farley, into two flats to acommodate two families, at a cost of M\$2,500.00. (Dr. Gowdy reported that the Trustees had already given permission for this change some years ago.)

The specific recommendations adopted are as follows:

- 1. "That there should be two separate documents: one for the general university, including the power and duties of the Trustees and the Managers; and another for the Managers alone, with definite reference to their relationship with the Trustees!
- 2. That one of the documents should be called the Constitution of Fukien Christian University, and the other the Constitution of the Board of Managers of Fukien Christian University.

 - (a) In place of the By-laws, there should be a constitution, hence the document will be called the Constitution of Fukien Christian University.
 - (b) Article VIII on Amendments should be amended to read as follows:

Any amendment to Articles V, VI, and VII must have the consent of the Board of Managers.

 - (b) Article III "the co-operating churches or missions of" be changed to read "the Churches co-operating in the University.
 - (c) The words "or missions" be deleted throughout the document.

The Government gift of \$40,000.00 toward Fukien Christian University's building fund was reported by President Lin. The advisability of accepting the gift was discussed; and by general agreement the question was deferred for further consideration by the Board.

President Lin also reported on the proposal of the Department of Education of Fukien Province to co-operate with Fukien Christian University for holding a summer school at the University for training middle school teachers of this province; of the possibility of the Government endowing chairs in F.C.U. for professors in Education; and of the promise from the Commissioner of Education to grant a substantial subsidy to F.C.U. if it is desired. All of these matters were discussed and deferred for further consideration by the Board.

There was a general agreement that Fukien Christian University's name need not be changed in Chinese nor the word "University" into "College".

The meeting adjourned.

Chapter I - NAME AND PURFOSE

- Article: I. The name of this Board shall be the Board of Managers of Fukien Christian University.
- Article II. The Board of Managers accepts full responsibility for the control of the private institution known as Fukien Christian University, founded by the Christian Mission Boards in America and England, as represented by the Board of Trustees in America, with the purpose of maintaining the spirit of love, sacrifice, and service, for which they stand, of cultivating the highest type of character, of pursuing higher learning, and of meeting the needs of society.

Chapter II. ORGANIZATION AND DUTIES OF THE BOARD

(A) Membership

- Article III. The Board of Managers shall consist of representatives appointed by the Churches co-operating in the University.
 - Article IV. Each of the cooperating Churches shall, upon meeting the conditions of representation described in Chapter II, Article VII, of this constitution, be entitled to appoint four members of the Board of Managers.

These four members are appointed in the following way. In the first instance, one shall be appointed for four years, one for three years, one for two years, one for one year, and the Churches shall annually appoint a person for a term of four years to fill the place of each retiring member, and shall fill vacancies whenever they occur.

Article V. The Board of Managers may co-opt as full members of that Board not more than five persons for terms of four years each.

Chapter II. ORGANIZATION AND DUTIES OF THE BOARD (Con't)

(A) <u>Membership</u> (Con't)

Article VI.

Members of any faculty of the University shall not be members of the Board of Managers, except under special circumstances and with the consent of this Board.

(B) Basis of Representation

Article VII.

Cooperating Churches may secure their representation in the Board of Managers in accordance with the following:

- (a) Each Church cooperating in the University shall be entitled to full representation (i.e. by four members) on the Board of Managers, upon meeting the following requirements:
 - (1) At least two teachers, who shall be specialists in their departments, shall be provided for, who may become members of the faculty upon appointment by the Board of Managers.
 - (2) An annual appropriation of not less than \$6,000.00 Mex., or \$3,000.00 gold, toward current expenses; shall be guaranteed until such time as these expenses together with those arising from development, are so amply covered by endowment that such funds are no longer required for the maintenance and proper development of the University.
- (b) Any Church which cannot meet all the conditions for full representation, as stated in (a) of this Article, may secure partial representation as follows:
 - (1) By providing two qualified teachers and \$3,000.00 Mex., \$1,500.00 gold, for current expenses, a Church may secure three representatives on the Board of Managers.

Chapter II. - ORGANIZATION AND DUTIES OF THE BOARD (Con't)

(B) Basis of Representation (Con't)

- (2) For one qualified teacher and \$3,000.00 Mex., or \$1,500.00 gold, for current expenses, a Church may have two representatives.
- (3) For one qualified teacher or for \$3,000.00 Mex., or \$1,500.00 gold, for current expenses, a Church may have one representative.

(C) Officers of the Board

Article VIII. The officers of the Board of Managers shall be a chairman, a secretary, and a treasurer. These officers shall be charged with the duties usually pertaining to these offices.

Article IX. The President of the University shall be ex-officio a member of the Board of Managers, with a vote

(D) Meetings

Article X. A meeting of the Board of Managers shall be held annually in the month of August or September, at which meeting a full report of the operation and condition of the University, and a statement properly audited of all receipts and disbursements during the year, shall be made.

Article XI. Special meetings shall be held at the request of three members of the Board, or at the call of the Executive Committee.

(E) Quorum

Article XII. Two thirds of the Board of Managers, at least a majority of the cooperating churches being represented, shall constitute a quorum. All matters shall be decided by a majority present voting.

(F) Rules and Regulations

Article XIII. The Board of Managers shall have power to make for itself any rules and regulations not inconsistent with this constitution.

(G) Executive Committee

Article XIV. The officers of the Board, the President of the University, and two members elected by the Board shall constitute the Executive Committee.

irticle XV. These members shall exercise the functions of the Board of Managers during the interim between meetings. Upon approval by the Board, the record of all actions taken by this committee shall be incorporated in the minutes of the Board.

Article XVI. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall always, if possible, be attended by its entire membership. Where this is impossible, however, representatives of at least three of the participating Churches shall constitute a quorum.

(H) Duties

article XVII.

The duties of the Board of Managers shall be:

- (a) To control and keep up all the property.
 (b) To provide and control all the finances.
- (c) To establish departments and approve courses of study.
- (d) To appoint the president, officers, and members of the faculties.
- (a) To establish salaries of all teachers and officers.
- (f) To provide suitable buildings and appliances.
- (g) To fix all tuition fees.
- (h) To grant degrees upon recommendation from the faculty.
- (i) To perform all other duties necessary to the general administration of the University.

Chapter III. - THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE UNIVERSITY

Article XVIII.

The general administration of the University shall be invested in the office of the President of the University.

Chapter III. - THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE UNIVERSITY (Con't)

Article XIX.

The duties of the President shall be:

- (a) To supervise and guard the interests of all departments of the University.
- (b) To officially represent the University.
- (c) To exercise a general oversight of the property, finances, and business of the University.
- (d) To appoint, and, for sufficient cause, discharge all employees.
- (e) To make an annual report of the University to the Board of Managers.
- (f) To recommend, in consultation with the deens of the departments involved, appointment or dismissal of members of the faculty to the Board of Managers.

Chapter IV - THE SENITE

Article XX.

The Senate shall consist of the President of the University, the deans of all departments, and the professors of the several faculties.

article XXI.

The duties of the Senate shall be:

- (a) To plan courses of study.
- (b) To establish rules of government and discipline.
- (e) To decide such cases as referred to it by the dean of any department.
- (d) To pass upon the estimates of expenses presented by each department, and, through the President, make its recommendations regarding the same to the Board of Managers.
- (e) To have under its consideration and oversight all of the various departments of the University, including the Library, make plans for their development and expansion, and through the President, make recommendation to the

Board of Managers regarding existing departments; or in regard to the establishment of new departments.

(f) To do such work and have such powers as may from time to time be delegated to it by the Board of Managers.

Chapter V - DUTIES OF A DEAN

Article XXII.

The duties of a dean of a department shall be:

- (a) In the absence of the President, to preside at meetings of the faculty of his department.
- (b) To superintend the teaching and to maintain order in his department.
- (c) To receive and to dismiss when necessary the students of his department according to such rules as the Senate may enact.
- (d) To inform the President of the University of all important matters relating to his department.

Chapter VI - FACULTIES

Article XXIII.

The faculty of a department shall consist of the President of the University, the Dean of the department, and all teachers of professorial rank in that department.

Article XXIV.

The faculty of a department shall be under the direction of the Senate and shall be responsible to that body for the faithful performance of its duties.

Article XXV.

The faculty of a department shall prepare annually a list of estimates of expenses, and present it to the Senate for its approval.

Article XXVI.

Any member of a faculty may, for sufficient cause and after due notice, be removed by the Board of Managers.

CONSTITUTION OF THE BOARD OF MANAGERS OF F.C.U.

Chapter VII - AMENDMENTS

Article XXVII.

These articles may be amended at any annual meeting of the Board of Managers, by a three-fourths vote of those present, provided that all members shall have been notified at least two weeks in advance.



Heavy furniture will be provided on the field by the University, which determines both the amount and the quality. In the event of a person leaving for any cause before the end of the term of service, the disposition of the furniture shall be decided by the University.

4. Residence

Suitable living accomodations will be provided by the University.

5. Medical Care

Free medical attention is provided by the University for all ordinary cases. Full provision for special cases, such asmajor operations, is not assured, but the University would expect to give substantial help. Whenever possible the University should be first consulted before any major medical of surgical work is undertaken.

One half of dental bills will be paid by the University if approval is obtained before the bills are contracted.

Special and dental cases under this aection apply to furlough period also.

6. Language Study

The University will provide a maximum of M\$120 per year for each adult to engage a language teacher while he is actively studying the Chinese language.

7. Furloughs and Furlough Allowances

After five full years (or ten semesters) of service, a furlough covering 12 months, including the time spend in travel, will be given with salary and allowances as specified below. A person leaving before the close of a semester or returning late for the opening of a new semester without special permission will forfeit his salary for period of his extended absence.

Subsequent furloughs will be at the erd of six years (twelve semesters), dating from the time of return from last furlough.

Children's allowances will be the same as when on the field.

A maximum monthly rent allowance of \$20 gold per single person and \$50 gold per married couple will be allowed for a period not exceeding 10 months. It is understood that this money will not be drawn unless actually used to pay house or room rent.

An allowance of \$35 gold for a single person and \$75 gold for a family will be allowed for medical attention during furlough. In case special medical attention is needed the Board of Managers will join with the candidate in requesting the Trustees to make special provision. Special and dental cases under Section 5 apply to furlough period.

The University accepts no responsibility for providing funds for study during furlough for persons who for any

reason are not returing to the field. But for those who fully expect to return, the University will consider each case on its merits. Any furlough scholarship grant must be approved by the Board of Managers.

8. Travel and Freight Allowances

During travel to and from the field salary will be paid the same as when on the field.

The University will provide travel allowance from the home of the individual to the University and vice versa as per the maximum scale tased on residence on the Atlantic scaboard. Shorter distances will be reckoned in proportion. The maximum travel allowance is as follows:

Per adult
Per child travelling half fare 250 "
Per " . under half fare, according to the percentage charged by the carrying company.

A freight allowance of one ship ton will be allowed for each adult and one half ton for each child, when traveling to or from the field. It has been found that the allowance described above is sufficient to cover the freight charge in ordinary cases, and without special permission the maximum allowance described above will be expected to cover freight. An exception may be made when the candidate first comes to the field, when an allowance of three tons may be made for each adult, one half ton

9. Pensions

The University assumes no responsibility for pensions, but it does grant a maximum allowance of \$100 gold a year for each adult, with the understanding that this sum will be used only for the purchase of some form of insurance or annuity.

10. Medical Examinations

The cost of medical examinations reliminary to appointment to the field will be raid by the University. The usual innoculations, vaccinations, etc. are required and will be paid for by the University.

11. Extra-University Activities

No member of the University staff (including wives of staff members) will be allowed to engage in extra-University activities, except those of a purely social

Nature, without special permission from the President.

12. Termination of Service

If a staff member does not return from furlough, he may receive furlough salary until he enters into regular employment. But in no case will more than six months' salary be paid.

Bishop Gowdy reported that he received a request from the Methodist Board of Foreign Missions in New York for W. Y. Chen's service in America. It was noted that the University has been supporting Mr. Chen's studies abroad and his family in Foschow from the generous gift of Dr. Wm. B. Hill of our Trustees for the Religious Education work in the University, and that the University has been waiting for Mr. Chen's return to meet the urgent needs here for overthere years, it was

M-613 Voted: That the Board of Managers refuse to entertain any outside request for Mr. W. Y. Chen's service, and that Mr. Chen be instructed to return in time for the pork at the University in fall, 1930.

The Correlated Program

The Board noted the fellowing points in the general program of correlation: (1) the rather anomalous position of the Shanghai College as being outside of the general program of correlation and yet at the same time receiving support in personnel and money from the East China Federated University; (2) the alletment of 18.21% of the national budget to the East China Federated University; and (3) the total emission of the Hua Nan College in Foochow in the program,

With regard to Fukien the Board noticed: (1) amount of money allotted to Fukien is far too small to meet the standards as set by the Council of Higher Education itself; (2) the omission of an item for our practice school and another item for our agricultural experimentation work which has been carried on for several years and was granted by the Council in 1928; and (3) the over-estimate of our increased income from a students body of 300. (Fukien only has to admit 158 new students to come to the 300 student limit. At present charge of Mex. \$82.00 is made on each student per year. The amount will be raised to Mex. \$92.00. 158 students at \$92.00 yields Mex. \$14.536.00, plus \$10 each on the 142 present student body, the total will be \$15.956 instead of Mex. \$20,000.00 as in the program.) It

M-614 Voted: That the Board of Managers of Fukien Christian
University approve the general principle and program of correlation for the Christian Colleges
in China as adopted by the Council of Higher
Education on January 31, 1930, except the anomalous plan with regard to Shanghai College.

M-615 Voted: That the program for Fukien be amended as follows:

- (a) Fukien should be a 4-year college of arts and science, together with professional and vocational training in education and agricultural experimentation work, with a student body of 300.
- (b) That a sum of Mex.\$15,500 be added to the Fukien current budget, that is, \$6,500.00 for the School of Education, \$5,000.00 for again cultural experimentation work, and 4,000.00 to supplement the overestimated increase in student fees, making the total increase to Mex. \$76,500.00 instead of Mex. \$61,000.00.

To meet the above increases of Mex.\$5,403.00 as per M-620-M-324 as well as Mex.\$928 less tuition income, the President pointed out that there is a cut from the treasurer's salary of M.\$3,700 and other savings, leaving only a deficit of M.\$1,379.56 to be met by the cash surplus from the 1929-30 budget
