I. A BILINGUAL COURSE LEADING TO THE A. B. DEGREE.

The Faculty is in hearty sympathy with the Board of Managers' ambition to have as soon as possible a change made in staff and curriculum so that any student who so desires may get his A.B. degree largely thru the use of the Chinese language.

Thus it recommends that preparations be made to offer a bilingual course, i.e. both in English and Chinese, leading to the A. B. degree, starting in the fall of 1928.

Such a proposal involves:

1. Giving the fundamental courses of certain groups in Chinese, and giving majors in some subjects in English, and in others in Chinese.

It is recommended that the Sciences be taught largely in the laboratory with two teachers present, one speaking English and one Chinese. No changes are to be made in the requirements. That the Group II in Chinese

be called the "Modern Languages", and that the necessary instructors (English, Japanese, French, German) be arranged for as soon as possible.

2. A minimum addition to the staff of:

- a. A head of the Department of Chinese Language & Literature (preferably specialized in Chinese Philosophy.).
- b. A professor of Sociology and Education: to provide for Group 4; to take the lead in socializing the studies of Group 3 & 4.

3. A definition of entrance requirements as follows:

- a. Students would be admitted who possessed an efficiency in English equivalent to that of graduates of the Government Senior Middle School Course.
- b. Provided that their knowledge of Chinese was correspondingly higher than that of students who have heretofore been admitted to the English Course.
- c. Other requirements than language the same as before.
- d. Such students to take the Non-accredited Entrance Examinations thru the medium of Chinese.

II. REPORT ON CO-EDUCATION.

It is possible to introduce Co-education into F.C.U. when the following minimum requirements have been met. This report does not discuss the merits of Co-education but assumes the merit as unopposed. (Assuming also that proper understanding should have been made between the F.C.U. Board of Managers and the Hwa Nan College).

Minimum Requirements:

- 1. Adequate housing. A new building. (Faculty Houses are needed for proposed increase in Faculty)
- 2. A Chinese Dean of Women. (Problems will be such that one person at least, must be set aside to think them thru fully and care for them.)
- 3. Readjustments of entrance examinations or requirements; accrediting and investigating schools.

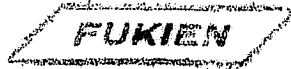

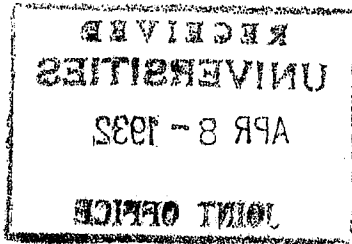

Mr. Lin spoke in the morning at Danforth United church, while other Chinese members of the group, Miss

Mr. Lin spoke in the morning at Danforth United church, while other Chinese members of the group, Miss Djang Biao-sung and Mr. and Mrs. Lin Yuke Char, were guests at churches co-operating in the Syracuse council of churches program.

Aids Government Program

Outlining the achievements of Fukien Christian university in the field of science, Mr. Lin said that his university has become one of the most important centers for scientific research in China, being constantly called on, as are other universities, to aid in the program of the national government.

"In biology we have collected some of the finest zoological and botanical specimens in China," he said. "We have probably the rarest Chinese collection of semi-tropical birds."

But in biology as in the other sciences, the Chinese are utilitarian, having almost no time to spend in the study of abstract theories, Mr. Lin pointed out. "Our biologists concern themselves with rice improvement, silk culture, and the economic possibilities of the frog, which is a favorite Chinese food."

The chemistry department at Fukien has discovered that clays found in that province can be used to make the best porcelain for use in the laboratory, as it withstands the highest temperatures, he reported. Tool making and machinery are favorite subjects for many.

Speculation Left to Buddhists

"You see, it is practically all utilitarian. We have no time to speculate, that is left for the Buddhists," he said. The Buddhist philosophy of contemplation has no place for the activities of science.

Fukien Christian university was established in 1915. Today, he said, it has an enrollment of 170 students. The tuition is \$100 a year, a sum equivalent to the entire income of skilled artisans.

"But from the students," he said, "China is recruiting her leaders, who by the sacrifice of their lives are demonstrating that a new day is being brought forth in China, and only thru them will it be hastened for the benefit of all China."

Miss Djang, a graduate of Gintling

college and candidate for a Ph. D. degree at the University of Michigan, addressing a group of Syracuse university students and faculty at a Hendricks chapel vesper service, explained that China needs not only educated women but educated women radiant with the Christian spirit of sacrifice.

Altho her topic was "The Place of Educated Women in China," she said that by "place" she meant no place of wealth or of honor, but of usefulness of opportunity to serve, and of demonstration of the Christ spirit.

After citing China's urgent need of educated women, she recounted the success of several women acquaintances who have risen to high positions in government, education and social work. "It is only when men and women work and progress together that any real progress in civilization is made," she declared.

"Until this century women were denied public appearances and weighty responsibilities, and civilization suffered for the one-sided dominance. Now that women begin to assert themselves to be men's equals in intelligence and ability, we want least to support the position of exalting women to the point of tramping upon men's rights."

A warning that China—once the sleeping giant of Asia—is awake was voiced by B. A. Garside, executive secretary of the associated boards for Christian colleges in China, who also spoke at Hendricks chapel.

"The forces latent in China today, if

marshaled into one united movement of hatred, would shake the very foundations of the civilized world," he declared. "For 40 centuries China has exalted peace and abhorred war. But if in our world today the scholar's pen is no longer a forceful weapon, young China can and will train its hand to the sword."

He said the amazingly courageously and skillful fighting of the 19th route army in Shanghai proved what she might do.

Other members of the group of 10 who constitute the team, who spoke at morning and evening services at 14 other churches, are Dr. Francis Heath Hughson, Francis S. Hutchins, Mrs. Eva B. A. MacMillan, O. D. Wannabaker, and Dr. N. Gist Gee.

Today's meetings will include a round table discussion in Plymouth church at 10.30 o'clock this morning, luncheon in that church this noon, a tea and discussion in Hendricks chapel at 4.30 o'clock and a mass meeting in Danforth United church at 7.45 o'clock.

Tomorrow some of the group will go to Rochester for the opening of a two-day conference there. Others will visit Ithaca, Oswego and Auburn. Mr. and Mrs. Char will return to New York city where they are enrolled in the Columbia university graduate school.

MIDDLETOWN, Conn., June 13.—Ching-jun Lin, president of Fuzien University, Foochow, China, and president of the China Christian Educational Association, which correlates Protestant Christian educational activities, will receive the honorary degree of doctor of letters at the 103d commencement on Sunday, at Wesleyan University. Mr. Lin has lectured recently at the Hartford Seminary and has spoken in thirty cities to university and church groups. He is a graduate of Johns Hopkins University.

The commencement program begins tomorrow with the annual meeting of Phi Beta Kappa and will continue for three days, concluding with Wesleyan's first Sunday commencement in its history.

Alumni and class day will be held Saturday, followed by the twenty-fifth annual meeting of the Alumni Council, the trustee meeting, and the Alumnae Association meeting. The alumni will parade in the afternoon to the Williams-Wesleyan baseball game.

Dean William G. Chanter, '14, will give the baccalaureate sermon on Sunday at 11 a. m. Dr. James L. McConaughy, president of the university, who has given the baccalaureate for the last ten years, is in England.

The academic procession will precede the commencement which will begin at 6 p. m. George W. Davison, '92, chairman of the board of the Central Hanover Bank and Trust Company, of New York City, and president of the board of trustees, will preside. C. Britton Harris, of Wyncote, Pa.; David Jaffe, of Great Neck, L. I., and Bernard H. White, of Washington, will be the commencement speakers, competing for the Rich Prize.

Guests of honor at the commencement will be Governor Wilbur L. Cross; Senator Carter Glass, of Virginia; and Samuel H. Fisher, chairman of the State Tercenary Com-

proportion. Visitors will be welcome at the church where the rector will speak briefly afterward on the memorials. Vespers are said following the recital at 6 o'clock.

Wesleyan University Honors Chinese College President

President Ching-Jun Lin, one of three Chinese Christian college presidents to visit the United States this year, will receive tomorrow the degree of Doctor of Letters from Wesleyan University of Middletown, Conn. Mr. Lin has spoken in Boston on several occasions and in recent months has lectured at the Hartford Seminary Foundation on present movements and conditions in the Far East, as well as on the changing philosophy and religious concepts of his people. He is thirty-seven years old, and became president of Fukien Christian University at Foochow, China, in 1927. Mr. Lin also serves as president of the China Christian Educational Association, which co-relates Protestant Christian educational activities from primary school to college ages.

Mrs. Lin, who spent the full year in the United States with her husband, is a physician who graduated from the Johns Hopkins University and has been active in Fukien University's rural service and agricultural experimental programs. Ching-Jun Lin graduated from Fukien and engaged in post-graduate study at Harvard and Columbia Universities and Oberlin College in Ohio. The university which he heads is co-educational and serves a population in Fukien province of 18,000,000.

Other college presidents in the United

States in recent months were Dr. Francis Cho-Min Wei, president of Hun Chung College in Central China, and Miss Lucy C. Wang, president of Hwa Nan College. These institutions, like Fukien Christian University, are represented in this country by the Associated Boards for Christian Colleges in China, together with eight other institutions for higher learning.

The Flower Teas of Foochow

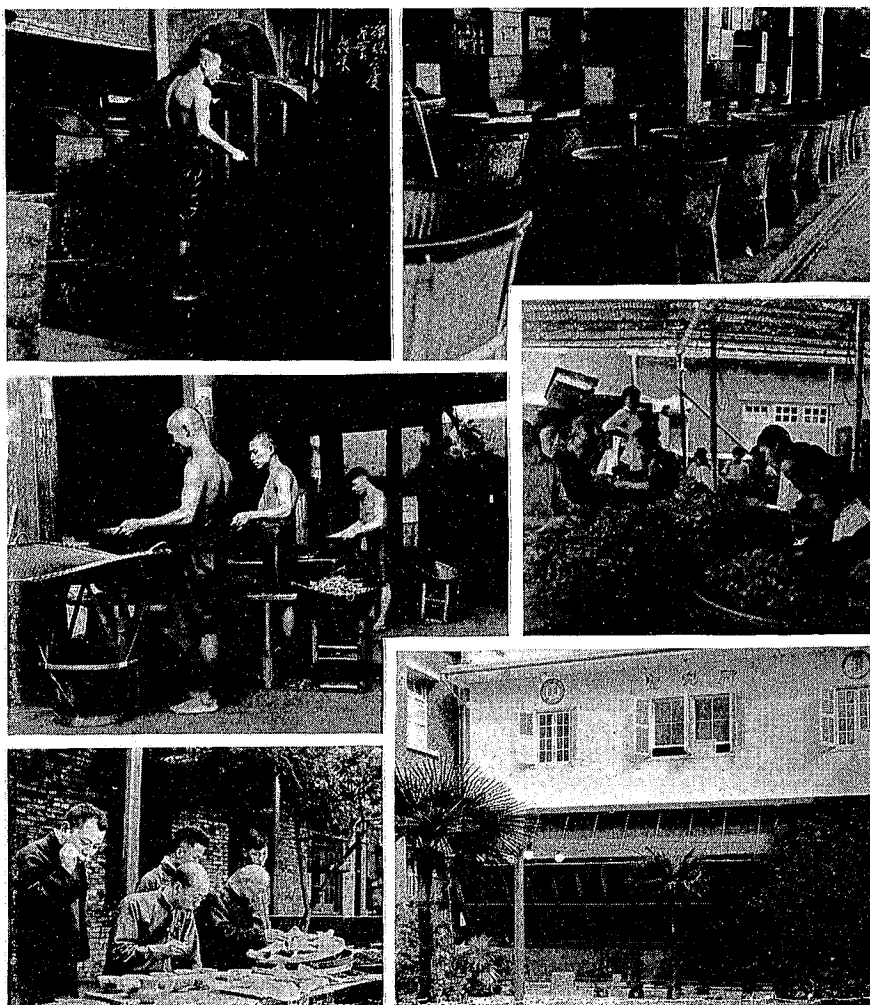
TEA is generally classified into two main groups, black and green. Contrary to general belief, black and green teas are manufactured from the same tea leaf by slightly different methods. The characteristic flavor and aroma of black tea are due to the essential oil and oxidized tannin products formed during fermentation, a process carefully prevented in the manufacture of green tea.

Green tea, in addition to the flavor which is either present in the fresh leaf or is developed without the aid of enzymes during rolling, derives its characteristic flavor from scenting with flowers. Although green tea is primarily for Chinese consumption, its popularity in foreign markets is growing.

Tea drinkers in the west have acquired a taste for black tea, and hence they judge the quality of a tea by the "thickness" and color of its infusion. A good liquor should be bright red amber in color. In judging the quality of green tea, however, a different set of standards will be needed. The color of the infusion should be greenish yellow-brown. Red or dark colors are considered bad. Its first taste is slightly pungent followed by a pleasant and sweet flavor giving a mild stimulus to the secretion of saliva. By scenting with jasmine or one of many other flowers, a most characteristic flavor and aroma may be added to the fine qualities of green tea. Its infusion makes a most refreshing beverage without the addition of milk and sugar and it is highly favored by many tea drinkers.

Foochow is almost the only place where scented tea is prepared and the tea factories engaged in its manufacture number eighty or more. Approximately half of these are owned by tea merchants of Chekiang and Anhwei, the two most important green tea producing provinces in China. These tea merchants transport tea from their respective provinces to be scented in Foochow and then back for consumption. The local Foochow tea merchants use Fukien tea as well as Chekiang and Anhwei teas, and their product is, to a large extent, sent to North China markets.

The process of scenting as adopt-

ed by the Foochow tea manufacturers is, in brief, as follows: prior to scenting, the tea is sorted by sifting through a series of bamboo sieves of different mesh and winnowed by means of a fanning mill. Thus from a tea as received from a tea grower, as many as nine grades may be separated. It is next "fired" in bamboo baskets over a charcoal fire. The basket is of hour-glass shape, twenty-five inches in diameter, and twenty-two inches in height; halfway up there is a bamboo mat on top of which the tea is spread evenly.

The charcoal fire is carefully covered with warm ash and its temperature is carefully adjusted. In firing, not only is the moisture driven off but the fine flavor is imparted; too much as well as too little firing is harmful to the quality; smoke caused by spilling leaves could easily spoil the tea. All these conditions

demand that the firing process be attended by experienced operators only.

The tea, after being "fired" is spread on matting in a layer a few inches in thickness and upon which a layer of newly blown flowers is spread; another layer of tea is added, followed by more flowers and so on. The tea and fresh flowers are mixed and put in wooden boxes to stand for a period of from twelve to eighteen hours, after which the flowers are sifted out.

The tea thus scented has absorbed from the flowers their characteristic fragrance as well as a considerable amount of moisture which must be driven off by subsequent "refiring" in order to restore its keeping quality. To drive off moisture from the tea without appreciable loss of its absorbed fragrance is a delicate task, indeed.

This traditional method of preparation of scented tea is in many ways in agreement with scientific principles, although the manufacturers themselves may not be aware of it. The finest Chinese teas, green or black, produced by the methods used fifty years ago have never yet been surpassed in quality by products from any other part of the world.

A comment made by a writer on the Government's efforts at Keemun is worth noting. "An attempt was made to use modern methods in the production of Keemun tea, China's finest type. The result was an excellent imitation of Ceylon tea, valued nominally at ten pence a pound in London, but since Keemun tea when prepared in the traditional way is distinctive all over the world and brings one to three shillings a pound on the same market, the experiment cannot be called a success."

China's problem today is, therefore, not to imitate the methods used in Ceylon, India, Java, or Japan, but to restore and preserve the secrets of her own. Scientific studies and researches especially on the "why" of the traditional methods which will eventually result in greater improvements are, of course, recommended.

In recent years, there has been a general realization throughout China of the decline of its tea trade. Definite steps towards improving the growing conditions, organizing of marketing, and improving the quality of tea have been taken. Several experimental stations have been established at various centers, one of which is in Fu-An, Fukien. Experiments such as use of fertilizers and modern machinery and improvements, in methods of manufacture, packing, etc., are tried. The experi-

mental station at Fu-An is closely connected with a vocational school in which children from tea-farming families are educated.

Another significant change is the inauguration of the National Tea Inspectorate with testing laboratories at various ports of tea transport. No tea from any manufacturer is allowed on the market without being first proven to conform to the standards adopted by the Ministry of Industry. The Inspectorate, through its publication, the *China Tea Journal*, publishes monthly popular and interesting articles on tea, news and reports, so as to keep all those in the trade informed of conditions in China as well as in other countries. In addition, a China National Tea Corporation has been organized jointly by the government and leading tea merchants of six tea-producing provinces, Anhwei, Kiangsi, Fukien, Chekiang, Hunan and Hupeh, with its main office at Shanghai. This corporation centralizes and controls all tea exports. By their own initiative, some of the more progressive manufacturers have put up private laboratories for testing and research.

In view of the fact that all these important changes have taken place in the last year or two, and the prevailing desire of the government and those in the trade is for the revival of the industry, the future for China tea is bright.

The amount of flower used is, in general, from twenty to thirty-five parts to every one hundred parts of tea by weight; and the process of scenting may be repeated two or three times according to the degree of fragrance desired. In the last scenting, the proportion of flowers used is much less, generally from four to six parts to every one hun-

dred parts of tea is used and the subsequent "refiring" is omitted. This imparts a "freshness" of the fragrance to the tea.

Among the several kinds of flowers employed for scenting, jasmine, owing to its unique flavor imparted to the tea, is most extensively used. Due to the fact that flowers of *Gardenia florida* and *Citrus maxima* are available earlier in the season, it has been a common practice, especially in recent years, to have tea scented once with one of these flowers prior to the use of jasmine.

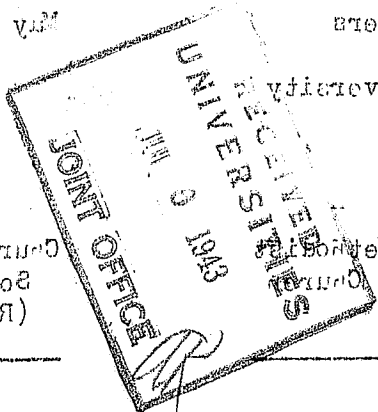

Dear Mr. Evans:

Enclosed herewith please find a copy of personnel information of Dean T. H. Wang of the F. C. U. College of Science. As you will notice that Dean Wang has been continuously serving his Alma Mater since his return from America on our special call since 1929. Since Dr. Sutton's return to America he serves also as head of our Chemistry Department. He should be on the top of our list for a refreshment furlough. Kindly arrange for his studies at Cornell University as early as possible. If not, then at any other suitable institution and send back the institutions admission letters and the Associated Boards certification for the support of his expenses. If the Associated Boards authorities are not ready to do that please arrange with our own Trustees and pay Dean Wang's travel and support from our Furlough Reserve Fund. We must not fail a loyal scholar and a most faithful servant of Christian higher education as Dean Wang.

Mrs. Lin and I hope to spend our year of furlough at the Union Seminary, New York City, if we can get a small apartment there. I would like to put my major time studying philosophy and Ethics, and Mrs. Lin spends hers at the Medical School of Columbia University. She has her M. D. from John's Hopkins in 1924, and worked in P. U. C. etc. until our marriage in 1929. If our Trustees approve of these ideas would you please take the matter up with the Union Seminary authorities and reserve the apartment for us for 1946-47. Our Board of Managers in its last annual meeting asked some outfitting allowance as well as the travel expenses for us. They know that all our personal belongings were lost during the Japanese occupation, and that we have been in rags since the war days. But we do not want to have our Trustees grant us special favors which the Associated Boards are not ready to do to other college presidents. We would be glad to be informed of what may be the decisions of our Trustees or of the Associated Boards.

Three other personnel information notes of our faculty are ready, and I am sending them along to you to avoid delays. I know you will do what you can for them. I shall try to write about them a little later.

A few of our younger staff have sent applications direct to U. S. institutions for admission and for fellowship or scholarships aids with my recommendation letters. Please find a list of their names and the institutions to which they sent their applications for your reference.
