My dear Mr. Greene:

From your letters of May 8th and October 2nd, 1924, I understand that there is available for the Science Departments budget of Fukien Christian University for 1926 the sum of \$1982.59, and for 1927 the sum of \$11,400. as new payments to be made by the China Medical Board.

It was understood, I believe, that these payments would be made on evidence of carrying through the conditions of the grants as stated in your letter of May 8th. I do not have from Fukien yet the subdivision between salaries on the one hand and maintenance of libraries on the other, but a cablegram from the Treasurer reports that in the year 1925 was expended for the Science Departments US \$21,968, and during 1926 the sum of \$24,094. This data seems to me to indicate that the University has more than furnished both the supplemental sum required and also has applied to the purposes of the appropriation the amounts paid earlier but redistributed in your letter of May 8, 1924.

It would therefore seem to me in order that there should be furnished to us by you \$1982.59 on account of 1926.

I also wish to ask if it would be appropriate for you to make a payment on 1927 as an advance as you do in the case of some of the other institutions. I am not clear whether the conditions stated at the end of your letter of May 8th would make that an impossibility. I have, however, advised Dr.Gowdy to report fully to Mr.Gee.

I am presenting this matter now without waiting for letters from Fukien because we are somewhat hard pressed for the funds for our current budget. The work at the University, however, is proceeding as usual and I understand that the entire staff is there with the exception of Mr.Blakney who went to Manila with his own family and four of the mothers and children from other families at the University.

Dear Dr. Gowdy:

My attention has been called to a part of the financial report for the period 1924-1926 (transmitted with your letter of February 10, 1927, to Mr. Gee) which seems to indicate that for the year 1924-1925 you did not spend on salaries and maintenance the amounts required by our revised agreement with you.

Before proceeding to this point, may I ask you to explain why the academic year 1924-1925 is described as from "July 1, 1924-July 31, 1925", a period of thirteen months, while the next year is from August 1, 1925-July 31, 1926?" Have you changed your fiscal year? If so we can only count twelve-thirteenths of your expenditure for 1924-1925 against our appropriation.

The schedule agreed upon with your New York office provided for contributions for the two years in question as shown below. I have added a column showing the amounts you reported, February 10, 1924.

You will observe that your combined expenditures for salaries and maintenance for 1924-1925 are not as much as the agreed amount for salaries alone, while there is a considerable excess for 1925-1926. You then report expenditures on equipment as follows:

Strictly speaking, expenditures for equipment do not concern us, since our appropriation for equipment (as well as building) was, at the request of your trustees, converted into a contribution for endowment at our Board meeting of April 9, 1925, it being stated by your trustees that the family of Mr. Jones was providing for that capital expenditure.

If, on the other hand, these so-called equipment purchases consisted of current supplies, replacements of equipment and minor additions to the initial equipment, such as are commonly included in annual departmental budgets, these expenditures should be included in the maintenance expenditures to make a clear picture.

I am surprised to see how much larger your expenditures for 1925-1926 salaries and maintenance were than those for 1924-1925. Is it possible that some items properly chargeable to 1924-1925 were actually charged to 1925-1926? The fact that your 1924-1925 report appears to cover thirteen months makes this difference still more surprising. Is it possible that some 1924-1925 charges have not been included at all?

will you look into all these questions and send me a revised statement, giving separately for each year the figures for (a) salaries and (b) other maintenance expenses, and including under "maintenance" any part of your so-called "equipment" expenditures that can properly be regarded as belonging to the annual departmental budgets? It is possible, also, that you have not given the full annual cost of your teachers. The original estimate in 1917 was on a basis of \$2,500 average annual cost per

teacher. The cost may have increased in the interval and if so the correct cost for 1924-1925 should be used.

There is no need for any report on strictly capital expenditures for equipment in the new financial statement for which I am asking, though I should be glad to have in your transmitting letter any information as to extra-budget expenses of this sort that you care to give me, after deducting any items which can properly be charged to maintenance.

I am sorry to bother you with these details at so late a date, but we must get the information in proper shape in order to settle our accounts and permit payment of further instalments.

I trust that theoutlook for your work next year is encouraging and shall be glad to have any news that you can send me about the local situation as it affects the University.

Under date of September 1, I sent you two reports covering the two periods, 1925-26 and 1926-27, showing expenditures by the University for salaries and allowances of Science teachers and for maintenance of laboratories. As stated in my letter, at that time I was unable to send a revised report for 1924-25 as I was away from the University and did not have access to the books for that period. However, I am now enclosing such a report covering the period from July 1, 1924 - July 31, 1925.

months, only twelve-thirteenths of the actual expenditures is counted, as suggested in your letter. I had thought that I could make up the report as from August 1, 1924, but in making it up I found it more feasible to make it for the entire thirteen months and count only twelve-thirteenths as mentioned.

This report represents all payments properly chargeable within this period, that is payments chargeable to this period but which do not show on our books until the following period, because of delayed statements.

As you will see from the summary at the bottom of page two, there is an excess of G\$631.40 on salaries and a deficit of G\$1,084.99 on maintenance of laboratories. However, this deficit is more than covered in the two periods following.

Dear Dr. Greene:

Your letter of August 3rd to Dr. Gowdy re the financial report for 1924-26 has come to me for a reply, Dr. Gowdy having returned to America in May.

Evidently Dr. Gowdy did not send to Mr. Gee a copy of the detailed report prepared by the Treasurer's Office in which expenditures for salary and maintenance were shown separately, but sent only a summary of same which was prepared for a cable to the New York Office. I will take up your questions in order.

- l. You were correct in your assumption that the academic year 1924-25 is described as from July 1, 1924 July 31, 1925, because we changed our fiscal year in 1925 to begin with August 1st instead of July 1st. We did this in order to make the expenditures of each term more evenly distributed. Before that, the expenditures for the fall term were much heavier than those for the spring term.
- 2. The deficit in the 1924-25 report and the excess in the 1925-26 report are partly accounted for in that some of the payments for 1924-25 did not show on our books until 1925-26, because they were made from the New York Office and their statement for same did not reach us until after the books had been closed for that period. Another reason for this is that the furlough expenses of the science men were heavier during the period for 1925-26 than for 1924-25 more of them being on furlough during that period. Also, Mr. Blakney's (Professor of Mathematical Physics) expenses were not included in the 1924-25 report, and they should have been.
- 3. I am not sure but that some of the charges for equipment could rightfully be charged to maintenance, but I would not venture to make the adjustment without first consulting with the science men, and they are not here this summer.

I am enclosing herewith statements for 1925-26 and 1926-27. I am sorry not to be able to send a revised statement for 1924-25 at this time, but I am now at the summer resort near Foochow and do not have with me the records covering the fall of 1924.

I have revised the 1925-26 report by deducting payments that properly belong in the period for 1924-25, even though they do not show on our books until 1925-26, on account of the delay in receiving statements from the New York Office. Likewise, 1925-26 payments which, for the same reason, do not show until 1926-27, have been added.

The 1926-27 report represents only payments properly chargeable to that period, as shown on our books at the end of July. I do not know of any payments made in New York for which I have not yet received statements other than payments made direct to the families who are in Manila on account of unsettled conditions, mention of which is made in the report under "Emergency Expenses." Salaries have been included, but some of the medical expenses have not. The women and children of five of the families coming under the China Medical Board, left here in January when conditions were so unsettled, four of them going to Manila and one to Formosa. The families in Manila have had a great deal of sickness, and three of them are still there. They plan to return to Foochow this month.

As soon as I return to the University, which will be in about a week, I will send you a revised copy of the report for 1924-25, beginning with August 1, 1924, thus making it for only twelve months.

As you will note, our expenditures for the two periods for which reports are enclosed herewith, are in excess of the required amount. If I have failed to make clear any point in these two reports, please let me know and I shall be glad to add any further information which I can.

Dr. Gowdy has resigned from the Presidency of the University, and we have had Chinese administration in the commission form of government since the first of May. Mr. Ching-Juh Lin, one of our alumnus of the Class of 1920, is Chairman of the Administrative Committee. He is a fine Christian man of real ability. In addition to puting in Chinese administration, we have made application for registration, and same has been approved by the Provincial Government and forwarded on to the Central Government at Nanking. Considering these two steps, together with the fact that we have been most fortunate in being able to establish very friendly relations with the local government, we feel that our outlook for the coming year is quite favorable. I believe it is the concensus of opinion that the present government in Fukien is the best we have had since the Nationalsit came in last Docember. We are now under the Navy.

Dear Dr. Gee:

I have received a letter from our New York office stating that an official notice had been received from the Executive Committee of the Rockefeller Foundation, reading as follows:

"At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Fockefeller Foundation held on March 8, 1929, the following action was taken:

RESOLVED that the sum of Sixteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$16,500) be, and it is hereby, appropriated, of which so much as may be necessary shall be used to purchase Mex. \$30,000. toward salaries and maintenance of the science departments of Fukien Christian University beginning July 1, 1929, in accordance with the following schedule:

with the understanding that present standards of staff and maintenance be kept up during that period of time."

We appreciate very much the continued help from the Foundation, and we are grateful to you for your assistance in making this renewal possible. I wish to assure you that we shall make the best use of these funds for the advancement of the science work in Fukien Christian University.

Could you explain to us whether the "present standards of staff and maintenance mean the amount of money we are required to spend, as under the old grant, or the standards of staff and maintenance in the terms of the size of personnel, their training and the quality of the work they do, and the maintenance which would enable us to do the same grade of work as we are now doing? You will notice that the standards of staff as measured by the money spent for salaries is not necessarily the same as the amount and quality of work which they do. For instance, we now have Mr. Chung Chun Yung in our Physics Department in the place of Mr. Blakney who left us in 1927. Measured by the amount of salary, we had to appropriate something more than \$5,500. per year for Mr. Blakney, while we are paying Mr. Chung less than \$2,000. per year. But in training, Mr. Blakney was only a new graduate of M. I. T., while Mr. Thung not only received his B.S. degree from M. I. T., but has had in addition three years of postgraduate work in the same institution. He is also a little better teacher than Mr. Blakney, both in his class room work and in his contacts with the students.

If we are required to spend the same amount of money for salaries as during the last five years, we will either have to displace Chinese professors with foreign professors or pay unnecessarily high salaries to the Chinese members of our science staff, which in turn would make a great disturbance in our salary schedule for the whole institution. Then, besides, we do not like to spend so much money in such a way in the science departments when there are so many needs in other departments. Je are also working on the policy that there should be at least one Chinese professor in each department. In the departments which at the present time there are no Chinese professors, we will try to replace a foreigner with a competent Chinese. We hope that the 'nterpretation of that clause "the present standards of staff and maintenance" may be intrepreted to mean the present standards of staff and maintenance as meas red by the size of personnel, their training and the quality of work done, and not by the amount of money expended.

This brings us to another question, the question of Dr. Franklin Pl Metcalf's return. As I wrote you under date of April 2, we do not feel it would be fair to ask Dr. Metcalf to come back on less favorable terms than other members of the science staff. On account of the reduced amount of the grant together with the increase of salaries to the older members, which is due to them on the basis of seniority, we would not be able to spend so much for another man of high salary. As I called to your attention the last time, it would require \$5,750. per

year in addition to what we have for the next six years if we asked for Dr. Metcalf's return. But in the meanwhile the term of renewal ends in 1932, three years from now. So we are trying to get a Uninese professor competent to carry on the work of the highest grade in the Department of Biology. In this way, we shall be able to increase our Chinese staff without greatly increasing our annual expenditure. So you will see that it is not for any reason of Dr. Metcalf's scholarship, for which we have the greatest respect, that we are releasing him, but it is for the best interest of the science work in this institution that we are looking forward to securing a competent Chinese professor in his place. We are writing to Dr. Metcalf on this point.

Would you be good enough to recommend some competent Chinese Biologists to us? With your wide acquaintance with the Chinese Biologists you will be able to pick some fit ones for our consideration. We have in mind a few possibilities of well trained Biologists whom we may ask to come to join us, but we have not made definite arrangements with any of them. We would particularly like to have a man who would be able to teach elementary and one or two advanced courses in Botany, with the ability to make practical applications to the needs of the Chinese agricultural life. I should appreciate it very much if you would put us in touch with some of your friends whom you think would be glad to invest their services in this way in our institution.

The acting field treasurer informs us that he has given two copies of this material to your Peping office. I presume, therefore, that your Peping office has forwarded, or will soon forward, one copy of this material for your information.

If you find these reports acceptable they will complete, I understand, our accounting for the expenditure of items 2, 3 and 4 under the amended form of appropriations C.M.2278, 2274, 2275 and 2276 as approved by the Executive Committee of the China Medical Board at a meeting held on May 7, 1824. Since item 1 of these amended appropriations has already been provided for through the setting up of an endowment fund of \$35,000 for carrying on work in natural sciences in Fukien, I believe that we have now completely discharged our responsibility to account for the expenditure of money appropriated under C.M.2273, 2274, 2275, and 2276. Please let me know if this does not agree with your understanding.

If and when you approve of this accounting for expenditures of 1928-29, we request that you arrange for the quarterly advances on the new appropriation of Mex.\$15,000 for the work in natural sciences in Fukien during 1920-30 as approved by the Executive Consittee of the Rockefeller Foundation on March 8, 1929. We request that this sum be advanced in quarterly drafts of Mex.\$3,750 each, drawn on some banking institution in Shanghai, and payable to the order of Fukien Christian University. Since the first quarter of this fiscal year beginning august 1, 1929 is now ending, we request that your first quarterly remittance be made in the near future and that the other three remittances be made about December 1, March 1 and June 1.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of our Fukien Board of Trustees held on February 3 we reported the generous action of the Rockefeller Foundation in so smending appropriation RF 29030 as to define its contributions toward the Matural Science work of Fukien Christian University during 1930-31 and 1931-32 in terms of gold dollars rather than Mexican dollars. The Committee expressed its sincere gratification in the following mirute:-

Fukien Christian University the Executive Consittee record its appreciation of the generosity of the Rockefeller Foundation in restating its appropriation toward the work in Natural Science at Fukien Christian University during 1930-31 and 1931-32 in terms of U.S.dollars rather than Mexidan dollars.

It so happens that Professor Roderick Scott and Mr.R.W.McClure, both members of the Fukien staff, are just now in America on furlough. The Committee suggested that we should take advantage of the presence of these two staff members through having them report to the Rockefeller Foundation in more concrete fashion than is possible through written communications, concerning the work that is being accomplished in the field of Natural Science at Fukien Christian University as a result of the assistance the Rockefeller Foundation has given in this field. If you would be interested in meeting these two members of the Fukien staff for a brief conference I would be glad to make arrangements to have them present at some mutually satisfectory date during the coming weeks.

Under separate cover I am sending you copies of Volume 3 of the "Proceedings of the Matural History Society of Fukien Christian University", and also the Ammual Report of Fithe President and the Deans of the University for the year 1930.

When you were in Foochow you were good enough to forward our formal request with your recommendation to the Rockefeller Foundation for its annual appropriation to us in gold instead of in Chinese silver dollars.

The gold exchange rate has been steadily going up. Mean-while the cost of living has considerably increased. We have to pay a large part of our Western staff salary and allowances in gold, and practically all of our science equipment and chemicals are bouget from abroad and paid for in gold.

We shall appreciate it very much if the Foundation will appropriate to us our present and next year's grant in gold at the original rate of exchange-two silver dollars to one dollar gold. It will help our annual budget considerably. We shall be glad to hear from you the result of your recommendation to the Foundation on this matter.

Do you know now when Dr. Mason is coming to China? I do hope that you will bring him down to visit us sometime this year. We are very anxious to have you and Dr. Mason inspect our work in both natural and physical sciences. We hope that the Foundation will also consider granting further aid to our science work.

#### Recent Progress at Pukien Christian University

The substantial support received by Pukien Christian University during the last few years from Chinese friends and government groups, climated by the recent approval of the Ministry of Education of the Mationalist Government to registration of the College of arts and the College of Science at Fukien Christian University, has marked the definite termination of the period of extreme difficulty and depression through which the University passed some years ago.

The registration of the Institution is a victory in another direction as well in that it marks the end of four years attack upon the University by a group of radical ex-students who were responsible, we believe, for the dermitery fire of 1928 and for the false charges circulated against us in Manking which frustrated for a long time every attempt at government registration. To the general visitor the most striking feature about Fukien is the development of quality and spirit in the student body and among the faculty. This has obtained for the institution a name throughout China and is slowly overcosing the chief physical handlesp, that of distance from the main centers of Chinese thought. The students who formerly transferred to colleges in these centers are beginning to come back.

The local government of Foothow and the more responsible elements in the local society show increasing interest in the institution; so much so that all plans for a provincial government university have been set aside.

For a long time the local Christian schools have been looking to President Lin for their leadership and he has done some very fine service in adjusting them to government regulations and providing them with a united program of service.

After a visit to the University by Dr.T.Z.Koo, he wrote under date of November 25, 1980, the following:-

During recent years the physical plant of the University has been increased through the construction or renovation of the following buildings:-

The Jones Memorial Science Hall
The Gardiner Hall Junior Memorial Arts Building (originally constructed as a dormitory)
The General Lu Dormitory (one wing) containing 30 students
The renovation of a double residence to provide a dormitory for 80 students
The erection of 4 residences.

ceived from the Estate of Dr.Charles E.Hall a second endowment fund of \$50,000, and from this same source there has been deposited with the Harverd-Yenching Institute, in trust for Fukien Christian University, an endowment fund of \$200,000 of which the income is to be used for developing and strongthening the work of the University in the field of Chinese cultural studies and for the purposes incidental thereto. All four Mission Boards cooperating in the University have continued undiminished their contributions, both of personnel and of money, this in spite of the fact that several of these Boards have been passing through periods of extreme difficulty and have been forced to reduce radically their support of many parts of their work on the foreign field. We had been hoping that at the expiration of the Sockefeller Foundation grant, the cooperating Boards would be able

to take over the support of the science men whose selaries have been drawn to a large extent from the Foundation's grants, but there is no hope for that at present because of the critical financial position of these Boards.

bers including the rank of instructor and above, and has nearly all the professors, assistant professors and instructors necessary for a college of its size. An important internal feature is that the proportion of Besterners to Chinese on the faculty has been readjusted so that it now stands at forty per cent Sesterners.

The student enrolment was badly cut into by the disturbances of 1927 during which we lost our big dermitory by fire. It has now begun to recover but at the same time the faculty has increased the severity of the entrance tests. Added to that our limited dermitory space will prevent the student enrolment from going above one hundred and fifty for the next few years. For another reason also we say not expect any large increase in receipts from student fees. The cost per student at present for tuition fees, board, and books alone is about \$200 silver a year. That represents at least two-thirds of the wages of a skilled artisan. To increase the fees would mean making it impossible for sons of any but the wealthy to come to our University.

Should gifts for a girls' dormitory and the salary for a deam of women make it possible for us to reorganize as a co-educational college our enrolment could then be increased and our fees proportionately increased. Likewise should gifts come for added dermitories for men, we would be able to increase our enrolment without materially increasing our overhead. But even then we would not be able to increase our income to a very great extent.

## Pakien and the Rockefeller Foundation Appropriation

The eagerness of the men in the Science Department to build up



well equipped laboratories and a strong teaching personnel has caused them
to use from year to year the full amount of funds available from the grants
of the Foundation and the general resources of the University. As a result
the Department of Natural Science is the best equipped and organized, and the
most popular division of the University's work.

The work in Matural Science is carried on in the very excellently equipped Jones Memorial Science Hall; and under the University's registration with the Mationalist Government this field of work has been reorganized as a well established College of Science.

The pre-medical course of the University is very popular, and about fifteen per cent of the student body enroll— for work in this department. Nedical study is China requires reserves of health, brains, persistence and cash above the average. Consequently the percentage of those who go on to actual medical study is such smaller, but quantity in China as elsewhere is to be beaten by quality. Two fukion graduates have son the P.U.E.C. scholarship for the highest entrance examinations. The character of the pre-medical work has elevated the medical profession in the eyes of the students. Every phase of Christian education will benefit from standards thus successfully upheld.

#### Science Departments at Fukien

the pursuit of two sciences for one year each. The fact that students elect Chemistry and Biology or Chemistry and Physics puts a double strain upon the Department of Chemistry. This has taxed even the large laboratories beyond their capacity. The staff of two Mestern and one Chimese professors, together with one instructor, have, however, been able to meet the demands.

2. Biology. Here the staff consists of one Western and one Chimese professor and one instructor. With the addition last year of a Chinese professor, Dr.Cheng, Professor Kellogg will find time for his special studies in Agricultural Economics, rice seed selection, and sericulture for which he is very well known in the United States Department of Agriculture (see for example his research work on the Japan beetle). The local government is very anxious that Fukiem should start some more extensive agricultural research although the united campaign for the Christian colleges designates Manking and Lingman alone for agricultural colleges with experimental stations only in other places.

5. Physics. After some years of struggle and adjustment on the part of members of the faculty, the Department of Physics was elevated to the level of the other science departments. One Sestern and one Chinese professor and one instructor do the work in Physics and Enthematics. Professor Sartin has been able to develop some practical work in Physics in strength of materials and in hydraulics.

## The Future of Hatural Science Nork of Pukien

The Past. Without the support of the Rockefeller Foundation grant obtained through the efforts of President E.C. Jones in 1918, renewed through those of President Gowdy in 1924, and again in 1929, Pakien would have had very inadequate science work. On behalf of all parts of the institution - Trustees, Managers, President, faculty, and constituency - we express our appreciation to the Bockefeller Foundation for these fifteen years of support to our science work. It has enabled us to become a first class institution within a very short space of time.

The future. In order to adjust the budget for natural science to (a) the diminishing amounts in the grants for the years 1929-52, and (b) the possible cessation of the grants after that, two lines of action are open to the administration:-

(1) To reduce the staff in this direction for the present at


least. The encient thing to do is to replace Western staff members with Chinese, although undoubtedly in the future the Chinese professor will cost as much as a missionary. Pursuant to this policy Dr.F.P.Metcalf, professor of botany, was released in 1928 and Dr.T.S.Cheng engaged in 1930. Dr.Cheng is an alumnum of the institution with his degree from the University of Nisconnia.

- (2) To look for other sources of support. Three lines of spproach are open to the University:- (a) raising funds on the field; (b) raising funds through private appeal at home; (c) the united campaign of the Committee for Christian Colleges in China.
  - (a) President Lin feels that he can raise some money from the Chinese and already has raised some twenty thousand silver dollars for building purposes, but we cannot expect much in that direction for some years to come; first, because of the present political and economic conditions; second, because our alumni body is still small and not well established in business; third, because the Chinese have not yet developed traditions for supporting such enterprises.

    Any increase in giving from the Chinese for the next decade at least, will be absorbed by the rising costs and normal increases in salaries.
  - (b) Private efforts at home on the part of former President Gowdy and of the acting Treasurer this year have, on account of economic depression and various other factors, not with but indifferent success.
  - (c) The plans for the development of Funion have been formally approved by the various consittees of the Cosmittee for Christian Colleges in China, but it is agreed by authorities in the United States that nothing further can be done with this campaign until the Laymon's Fact Finding Cosmittee has returned its reports. It will thus

be several years before substantial income can be expected from that direction.

In the light of all these factors in the present financial situation confronting the work in natural science at Pakien Christian University, the administrative boards of the University care to hope that the Sockefeller Foundation may find it possible to continue for a somewhat longer period the support which it has so generously given to this work during the past fifteen years. We can assure the Foundation that every possible effort is being made, and will be made, to secure from other sources the additional income required to maintain and strengthen this work in natural science. But at best it will probably be several years before any such additional income can be secured to an extent adequate to meet the need. It would be a real tragedy if we should at this time lose most of the progress made in this work during the last fifteen years, due to such a serious decline in income as now seems inevitable unless the Foundation finds it possible to continue its assistance for a few years longer.

Dear Mr. Gee:

Enclosed herewith please find two copies of our report on the expenditures for salaries, allowances and maintenance for our science work for the year 1930-31.

You will notice from the report that we have further strengthened our science staff, as well as increased our departmental service. The total salaries and allowances paid for 1929-30 was Mex. \$30,691.80 or G.\$15,345.90, while that of the year 1930-31 was Mex. \$39,632.64 or G\$19,816.32, an increase of about 29%. For the departmental maintenance, we spent Mex.\$10,446.85 or G\$5,223.42, while for 1929-30 only Mex.\$6,628.81 or G\$3,314.40, showing an increase of 57%.

You may also be glad to know that the quality of our work in our science departments during the last year has been greatly improved. The addition of Dr. Cheng Tao Hsin to our Biology Department has proved to be very valuable.

With the return of Mr. Cheng Ching Tuan to our Biology Department and Mr. Li I Ying to our Chemistry Department, together with a new full-time lecturer Mr. Lin Yu Chi in Mathematics for 1931-32, we are looking forward to an even better work during the coming year.

Dear Mr. Gee:

We wish to ask the Rockefeller Foundation to make us a grant of five thousand dollars silver(\$5,000) toward the building of a gas plant at Fukien Christian University.

You will remember that during your last two visits to Foochow we discussed with you the need of gas plant at the University, and you were good enough to say that the Rockefeller Foundation might be interested in giving financial aid to such a project. The increasing cost in alcohol and the unsatisfactory result in using it for laboratory work convince us that a gas plant cannot be much longer delayed.

We have made a careful investigation into the cost of such a plant. The estimate is as follows:

Cear Er. Gee:

I beg to present to you a formal request to the dockefeller Foundation for a continuation of its grant for the promition of science work in Tukien Christian University. We request that the Foundation grant us 5,000 gold annually, for five years beginning July, 1932, totalling the amount of \$25,000 gold. We on our part shall not only maintain our present recognized standard of work, but shall continue to further strengthen and improve it.

the reasons for our request. As I told you, we would have to close up quite a considerable part of our cience work, should the mockefeller Foundation grant be discontinued next July. Knowing our conditions as well as you do, you will agree that the kind and quality of work which we have been doing may deserve your favorable consideration of this request.

Later development of the generous grants from the china medical Board. Juring the last fourteen years we have developed our cience Departments to such an extent that they now compare well with those in any other college in this country. Our staff has been greatly strengthened during particularly the last three years, and our equipment has been steadily increased. Our graduates are found in foverment and private schools all over the Province and in other parts of China, all making definite and valuable contributions in science teaching. The enclosed statement will show you the growth along the above lines.

dwin 3. Jones Memoriall Hall, which cost wabout \$125,000 silver. It was well planned in every way. It have built up a science endowment fund of \$56,300 gold. There is a general endowment fund of \$107,000 gold for general purposes and \$200,000 gold in trust of the Harvard-Yenching Institute for Chinese Studies. With a fairly good library, and

three mermanent stone-and-brick dormitories for men. A new dormitory for women is now under construction. Four new residences for Science teachers have also been added, and two new ones will be started soon. Our student body has increased from less than 100 in 1928 to 175 this year.

"The Proceedings of the Natural History Society" has been published regularly since 1928. Its contributions to Natural Sciences have been recognized by scientists both in China and abroad. The "F.C.U. Journal", which was started in 1930, contains scholarly contributions from our Science staff. The service of our Science staff has been much sought after by the Government and the public. We never have enough science graduates to meet the demands of the schools and public institutions. Our premedical students have made enviable records in the Peiping Union Medical College and in other medical schools.

But our sources of supply are rather limited. ith the science endowment fund, as well as our other endowment money, we can only meet a small part of the regular annual expenses for staff salaries and laboratory maintenance, to say nothing of the needs arising from natural growth and expansion. The Support of the Mission Boards amounts to only a little over \$10,000 gold a year. They have not been able to give us any considerable increase during the last fifteen years, and recently on account of the business depression and the steady decrease in missionary support in America and England, we have received outs in our annual appropriations instead. So far as we can see, there is not much hope for increase of support from that direction for the next few years. Conditions in China have not been favorable for the financial support of such an institution as we have started. Although we have raised some money locally for our building purposes we could not look to this source for any important contributions for current main-

Therefore, we hope that the Rockefeller Foundation which has really made and helped us develop this institution to what it is now, will not fail to assist us during the next few years. We have yet to struggle very hard for existence before we can find reliable sources of support in China to meet the bare needs in maintaining the standard of our work.

with the Chinese National Government. Our program of work has also been recognized and accepted by the Council of Christian Higher Education in China in its Correlated Program.

Dear Mr. Gee:

Enclosed herewith I am sending you two copies of my formal request to you and the Rockefeller Foundation for continuation of support to our Science work. If there are any other lines of information which you think will be helpful for the consideration of the Foundation, we shall be glad to furnish the same.

Our request for \$5000 gold per year is based on a careful consideration of our minimum needs. The expenditures of the last three years show that we were only barely able to meet our current budget, and that we have been paying our staff at a salary scale lower than that in most of the colleges in China. We have exercised the most stringent economy all the time. We are hoping that our Trustees may in the near future provide enough fund to meet the needs due to the matural growth of our present work. But we have to look to the Rockefeller Foundation to continue help our existing staff carrying on the work here.

We ask for a five-year term, because we think that the economic depression throughout the whole world cannot be expected to return to normalcy within the next two or three years. We would also need a couple of years to cultivate new sources of income after the general public has sufficiently recovered from the present troubles. We hope that the Foundation will be willing to help us until the time when we hope we can get along ourselves.

I might also mention that early last March Messers Garside and Thorne from our New York Office and Scott and McClure from us here called on the officers in your New York office to express our appreciation for the assistance given in the past, to report what we are now doing in the science department, and to request a continuation of support. These men were given a very

sympathetic hearing and it was intimated that further grants might be given and that they would look forward to receive formal request from the field thru your office with your recommendation.

You have been studying our problem very closely and are always very sympathetic toward our needs. We are quite confident that you will do your best to make favorable recommendation to the Foundation with regard to our request. We firmly believe that it is not only the future existence of Fukien Christian University, but also the advancement of Science in this region of the country, hangs upon the continuation of the Rockefeller Foundation grant toward our educational service here.
