Dear Mr. Gee:

Enclosed herewith please find two copies of a comparative statement regarding the contributions of the cooperating mission boards toward the work at Fukien Christian University as suggested in your last letter.

You will notice that although the financial contributions from the various mission boards remain the same during the period covered the personnel contributions have been greatly reduced since 1927. I already wrote you about the announced cut in annual financial appropriation by one of the mission boards for 1932-32.

You will also notice that even the existing total financial contribution from the various mission boards can meet only about half of the expenses of our science departments. Leanwhile the work of our arts and education departments need support from that came source. The income from our small science indowment fund is not enough to take care of the present departmental maintenance expenses. Should the annual grantfrom the Bockefeller Foundation be discontinued it would cut off at least half of our science staff and maintence budget. This drastic reduction could not be possibly carried out both on account of the nature of our science work which we have steadily built up during the past fourteen years with the Pockefeller Foundation aid and on account of our contract obligations to our teachers.

It costs us about \$4,000 a year to keep a western member on our staff basides his residence provisions on the campus, we have four of them in our science departments. It is our hope that the Foundation will be willing to support

We hope that when the economic conditions are better our cooperating mission boards will be able to take over the support of the western members on our staff.



My dear Doctor Weaver

When last we came before the Rookefeller Foundation in 1929 with a request for a three-year continuation of your great toward the sup ort of the work in Natural Science at Fukien Christian University, we hoped that by the time that appropriation terminated the University would have been able to obtain from other sources sufficient additional income to permit at to continue its high quality of work in Natural Science, and to develop this work still further, without additional support from the Foundations

During the three years which have passed since then the governing boards of Fukien Christian University, both in America and in China, have been making every possible effort to realise this hope, but we have been unsuccessful because of factors over which we have no control. Fukien has been cooperating with the other China colleges in planning for a large scale appeal to Western donors for increased, support for a unified program of Christian higher education in China, and both in China and in the West steady progress has been made toward the working out and adoption of such a program. It has been quite impossible, however, to launch as yet any such appeal for support on account of the severe commits depression.

Two years ago the loss of the largest of the University's doraitories through fire made it necessary for the governing boards in the Nest and in China to give major exphasis in their search for funds to appeals for expital contributions to provide more adequate doraitory accommodation for the students. It has also been necessary to obtain funds for additional faculty residences and for an urgently needed arts Hall. As a result it has not been possible to obtain any large increase in either capital or current funds for work in Natural Science.

As we seek to evaluate the assured resources of the next few years, it is obvious that the present economic depression will inevitably cause

substantial reductions in our present sources of income. The four mission boards cooperating in the University have heretofore maintained their contributions to the institution, both in personnel and in finance, without any substantial reduction, even though all these boards have been forced by decreasing receipts to make radical outs in other departments of their work. Within the last few months, however, one of these mission boards has informed us that they must make a 18% reduction in their appropriation for the coming year, and there is a possibility that some of the other boards may be forced to do likewise. Within the present week we have received word that the dividend on Aluminum Preferred Stock, which forms a substantial part of the ondownent given to the University by the estate of Dr. Charles M. Hall, will be reduced by 50% beginning April 1, 1932.

On the basis of these facts the Fukien Board of Trustees has given its strongest endersement to the request presented by the field authorities of the University through the Poining office of the Rockefeller Foundation "that the Foundation grant the sum of 685,000,000 annually, for five years begin ing July 1982," in continuation of the Foundation's support of the work in Natural Science at Fukien.

During the past three years Fukien has unde gratifying progress in many directions, and has demonstrated that it has an important and permanent place in the program of Christian higher education in China. The University has received most cordial cooperation and support from the people and the governmental authorities of Fukien Province. Under the leadership of President C. J. Lin the institution has come into much closer and mere cordial relations with the Chinese people and officials than would otherwise have been possible, and has been able to extend the coope of its service in a number of directions. The Chinese staff of the University has been greatly strengthened, and at the same time an efficient foreign staff has been retained.

My dear Doctor Weaver

In accordance with the promise we made you at our conference last week, I am sending you herewith an itemized statement showing the income and disbursements for work in Natural Science at Fukien Christian University during the past four years.

I have also prepared in revised form the statement of income for current work at the University during the past four years so as to include the contribution of the cooperating mission Boards in personnel as well as their cash grants.

as to the necessity of a continuation of support from the Rockefeller Foundation for a few years longer, if we are to avoid an abrupt and serious decline in the standard of work done at Fukien Christian University, particularly in the Departments of Natural Science.

While the estimates for the expenditures necessary to maintain the work in Natural Science during 1932 at the same level as has been attained at present have not been prepared in final form, a close examination of the details of expenditures this year shows thatit will be extremely difficult to reduce expenses much below the G\$22,694 being spent this year. Our salary scale at Fukien both for Westerners and Chinese, is substantially lower than in any of our Christian Union Universities, and cannot be reduced very far without losing many of our most valuable men and disrupting the whole work in Natural Science. Departmental expenses are already at a low level, and cannot be cut down very much without seriously crippling the work.

If expenditures for next year were undertaken on the same level as for the current year, and if no continued support were received from the Rockefeller Foundation, it would be necessary for us to take G\$17,619 of general University funds in order to care for the work in Natural Science alone. An examination of estimated income for the entire University for 1932-33 indicates that the total amount of unallocated University cash income will be around G\$19,411.11. This would leave only about G\$1,800 to care

for the administration and maintenance of the University, together with the work in all departments aside from a few having special funds allocated to them (the departments receiving special support are Chinese Language, History and Literature, and Religion). Even with the G\$5,000 asked from the Rockefeller Foundation we would be expending approximately G\$12,600 for carrying on work in the Departments of Natural Science out of the total available cash of G\$19,441.11.

I know that both on the field and in our Board of Trustees everyone working on the Fukien finances has accepted the necessity of a substantial reduction of expenditures for next year. Our request to the Rockefeller Foundation for a renewed appropriation on a basis of \$65,000 will not by any means eliminate this necessity for the exercise of the most rigid economy. This grant would, however, enable us to earry on through a very critical stage in the University's history. Without the support it is difficult to see how we can escape losing many of the valuable results accomplished by the University during the last decade.

I am transmitting herewith a copy of the report prepared by the field treasurer of Fukien Christian University, giving the expenditures made during the fiscal year 1931-32 for the work in Natural Science.

We trust you will find that this report satisfactorily meets the conditions of the grant made by the Rockefeller Foundation on March 8, 1929, whereby it made a contribution to the Natural Science work at Fukien for a three year period, the last year being 1931-32, "with the understanding that present standards of staff and maintenance be kept up during that period of time." You will note that the total expenditures for 1931-32 amounted to M\$49,426.09. This is only a few hundred dollars less than was expended for the work in Natural Science during the previous year, in spite of the fact that, because of a change in the date of closing our fiscal year, the present report covers only eleven months.

Dear Mr. Garside:

This will acknowledge your letter of October 19 enclosing a statement of expenditures in the Science Departments of Fukien Christian University for the year 1931-1932.

I am sure you will be patient with me in this instance, as you have been in the past, relative to my difficulties in interpreting such statements. These perplexities all arise from the difficulties involved in interpreting the effect of the widely varying rate of exchange. In some connections the increased rate of exchange is an advantage, in others it is a disadvantage; and in this instance, as in all others, I do not feel able to come to any decisive judgment unless I have before me a detailed statement which separates, both in income and expenditures, gold and local currency.

For example, it seems to me that there are three possible ways of attempting to say whether or not the expenditures during 1931-1932 actually are in accord with the understanding that past standards of staff and maintenance be kept up. One might simply compare the total figure of Mex.49,426.09 with the total expenditures,

expressed in local currency, of preceding years. This procedure, however, obviously assumes that expenditures in local currency are of practically unvarying effectiveness. This assumption must surely be contrary to the fact, and is not in accord with the reasons which led the Foundation to amend, on January 14, 1931, the previous appropriation so that you would receive gold rather than local currency.

Secondly, one might compare half of the Mex. 49,426.09, namely Mex. 24,713.05, with the previous gold expenditures. This procedure makes use of the two to one ratio which used to operate, but which is now entirely artificial. This would accordingly seem so artificial to me that I could not draw any conclusions from the result.

Thirdly, one might analyze the situation in detail, dividing all of the income and expenditures into gold and local currency, in accordance with the detailed circumstances.

I gather from your letter that the first of these procedures is the one which you suggest; and I assume that the third procedure is not practicable.

In view of these circumstances, it would seem to me that the most satisfactory way to handle the matter would be for you to state, on your own or other suitable authority, that the standards

of staff and maintenance have actually been kept up. I would feel more definitely reassured by such a statement than I would by a financial statement, unless it is possible that the latter be much more detailed and illuminating than the present one.

My dear Dr. Weaver:

I am sorry to be so slow in replying to your letter of October 26th, in which you ask for certain information regarding expenditures in the Science Departments at Fukien. My delay has been partly due to a constant succession of meetings with the resultant work of minutes and correspondences; and partly to the necessity for taking time to make a rather thosough study of our Matural Science expenditures at Fukien.

I am attaching hereto a comparative statement of expenditures in 1928-29 and 1931-52. You will remember that when the Executive Committee of the Rockefeller Foundation met on March 8, 1929 it made its three-year appropriation to Fukien Christian University "with the understanding that present standards of staff and maintenance be kept up during that period of time." It is for this reason that I have taken 1928-29 as a basis for comparison with this past fiscal year which is now under review.

The material from which I have prepared this comparison consists of (1) the report we transmitted to Dr. W. S. Carter on October 29, 1929, and (2) the report which I transmitted to you on October 19, 1952.

The Problem of Exchange Sation. In both the reports referred to above the field has used an arbitrary rate of 2 to 1 in converting expenditures from local currency into 0. S. currency. Obviously, however, this does not give us a satisfactory basis for comparison, since the value of the local currency dollar was very much different in 1928-29 from what it was in 1951-52. I find that the average rate of exchange during 1928-29 was 2.20 to 1, and for 1951-52 was slightly more than 4 to 1. It was necessary fourefore, for us to refigure the gold equivalence of the local currency expenditures on some different basis than that used by the field Treasurer.

A number of the items of expenditures were made directly in gold, so flugictuations in rates of exchange do not make any material difference. This applies to the salary and allowances of Western staff members on furlough, to insurance premiums and other disbursements in gold made on behalf of Western staff on the field, and to purchases of equipment and supplies from the West. For the items we have enumerated above therefore, we can take the gold figures given in the

Field Treasurer's reports. If any questions were raised regarding these items, it would be as to the amount of the local currency equivalent of these gold figures, which have been converted into local currency figures at the rate of 2 to 1. Since, however, we are primarily concerned with the gold values, I believe that it is not necessary to attempt any correction of the local currency figures.

The salaries of Chinese members of Staff, some purchases made locally, and most of the costs of departmental maintenance, represent expenditures made in local currency. Therefore, when these items are converted into gold figures, the prevailing rates of exchange should be used. On all such items I used the rate of 2.20 to 1 for 1928-29 and 4 to 1 for 1931-32.

Some items on the list were spent partly in local currency and partly in gold. It would be very difficult, and sometimes impossible, for us to ascertain exactly what proportions were spent in each of these two ways. This applies to departmental equipment and maintenance; and for 1951-32 applies to salaries of University supported Western staff. For these items I used the rate of 2.10 to 1 for 1928-29, and 3 to 1 for 1931-32.

General Comparison of Expenditures for the Two Years. It will be noted that the expenditures in gold for 1931-32, computed on the above basis, slightly exceeds the expenditures in gold for 1928-29. The comparison shows that about G. \$2,500 more was spent for staff, and about \$900 less was spent for equipment and maintenance, in 1951-32. Expenditures for staff were made unusually heavy, because of the fact that Dr. Kellogg and Mr. Beeman were on furlough, and the cost of their travel had to be added to their regular furlough salary and allowances. This substantially increased the totals for 1931-32. On the other hand the fiscal year 1931-32 covered only eleven months, since the year was closed on June 50, 1932 instead of July 51st as has been done heretofore. Had the fiscal year contained the normal twelve months, a number of the items of expenditure would have been increased by approximately one-eleventh the amounts shown.

Staff. You will note that in 1928-29 there were ten members of staff carrying on work in Matural Science, of whom one was on furlough and mine were actively at work on the field. This does not take into account Mr. Blakney, whose name appears in 1928-29, but who was absent from the field and received no payments except one small remittance for an allowance for which he put in a claim after he left the field. Neither do the above figures include Mr. C. C. Tang who served for less than a month.

During 1951-52 the number of teachers serving intthe three departments of Matural Science was eleven - as compared with ten in 1928-29. Two of this number were on furlough, so nine were actively at work on the field, the same number as in 1928-29. In 1951-52 there were four Western members of staff and seven Chinese members of staff in the Matural Science Departments, as compared with five Western members and five Chinese members in 1928-29. This increase in the number and proportion of Chinese staff is in line with the tendency now found in all of our China colleges.

Equipment and Maintenance. The amount of local currency expenditures for departmental equipment and maintenance was about the same in 1931-52 as in 1928-29. However, the gold equivalent of these purchases was somewhat less in 1931-32. This difference might be explained in part by the fact that there were only eleven months in the latter fiscal year.

Summary. From the above facts, I believe it can fairly be said that Fukien Christian University during 1951-32 met the condition of the Rockefeller grant

that the standards of staff and maintenance existing in 1929 be continued. During 1931-52 Fukien was seriously affected by the economic depression, and the total amount of funds available for the University's work was substantially less than in 1926-29. The large drop in the value of local currency dollar was an advantage to the University where contributions were made in gold, but was a marked disadvantage where contributions were made, or fees were collected, in local currency. The salaries of Chinese staff, most of the operating costs of the University, and a part of the salaries of University supported Western staff, were budgeted in local currency. The drop in the value of local currency was therefore, borne largely by the staff members, who received substantially less, on a gold basis, in 1951-52, than they would have received for the same work in 1928-29.

I trust that this will answer in a satisfactory way the various questions raised by your letter of October 26th. If there is any further information which you desire that we supply, please let me know.



This is in reply to your inquiry of October 14th, regarding the rate of exchange used in transmitting U.S. dollars to Fukien Christian University, Foochow, China.

The quarterly remittances from the Rockefeller Foundation are not converted into local currency by our office, but are forwarded directly to the University in U.S. dollars. In studying this situation I have discovered that Mr. Garside wrote to Dr. Neaver under date of November 17th, 1932, reviewing the exchange situation. If we were to compute the average rate used for 1932-33 in remitting our general University funds, the rate would be a fraction under four to one. The market rate for the period was higher, but gold expenditures in the United States were charged to the field on the basis of three to one, which was the ratio approved by the Trustees.

The total local currency expenditures in Science amounting to \$45,091.99 compared favorably with the \$49,426.09 expended during the previous year. The decrease of above \$4,000.00 can be traced to the smaller costs of staff because Mr. Beeman did not return to the University. It will be recalled that Mr. Beeman was sent home on sick leave, but after a period of convalesence did not feel that he could return to the University. His position has been filled by the employment of a competent Chinese teacher, and it is our understanding that the quality of the work has not been impaired. It is our conviction that the Science Department of Fukien Christian University has maintained its high standard of work throughout the lest year.

I trust you find the report in order and that remittances covering the past due portion of the current year appropriation will be forthcoming.

Statement of Requests to the Rockefeller Foundation

I. Science Work

1. We request the renewal of the present Rockefeller Foundation grant of \$5,000.00 U.S. Gold per year for a period of three years beginning 1935.

The work of the science departments at Fukien Christian University has won a very high reputation both in China and abroad. The beginning of this work as well as its rapid and steady progress has been due chiefly to the unfailing support of the Rockefeller Foundation. We had planned to find means of securing other sources of support for this work after the expiration of the present grant from the Foundation in 1935, but the economic conditions of the past few years both in China and abroad made it impossible for us to carry out any of our plans. Not only that, our cooperating mission boards have been obliged to decrease their annual appropriations to us from year to year. As a result of such reductions in regular appropriations and the loss of other sources of support on which we previously relied, we are now confronted with a very serious financial condition. Should the Foundation discontinue its grant after 1935, not only would further progress in our science work be impossible, but the present standard of work would be seriously jeopardized. Therefore, we request that the Foundation renew its grant for another period of three years.

- 2. We request the Foundation to help us secure an endowment fund of \$200,000.00 U.S. Gold for our science work, by a grant of \$150,000.00 U.S. Gold conditional upon the raising of \$50,000.00 U.S. Gold by the Trustees of Fukien Christian University during the period of 1935-1938, to match.
- 3. We request a Rockefeller Foundation Fellowship to permit Prof. T. H. Wang, of our Chemistry Department, to continue his studies in the United States for two more years. Professor wang was granted a Rockefeller Foundation Scholarship in 1928-1929, during which he had a year of fruitful study at Chicago University and Cornell University. He returned to teach at Fukien Christian University in 1929, and has during the last four years made a splendid record both as teacher and as research scholar.

For the last eight or nine years we at Fukien Christian University have been carrying on to a limited extent a program of rural betterment through such activities as rice selection, sericulture, bee keeping, poultry raising, and various forms of social service in the villages. A special gift recently received from a friend has enabled us to strengthen this work. We have just engaged a man specially trained at Yale University in the field of rural economics, and we are now reorganizing the different phases of our rural service work into a co-ordinated program. The general outline of this program has already been submitted to the Foundation. Through the newly organized Fukien Union Rural Service Council, our program at Fukien Christian University is brought into co-ordination with the work of the Foochow Union Middle School and other agencies engaged in rural work in Fukien Province.

Our program calls for the continual support of two fulltime specialists in rural work and two or three assistants. The annual salaries for these workers will amount to seven or eight thousand dollars per year. The initial expenses of the first two years require a larger financial appropriation, but in the later years we expect that the work will yeild enough income to cover a large part of the running expenses and a part of the salaries of assistants.



Dear Doctor Stevens:

As promised in the course of our conversation in your office some time ago, I am submitting to you the following statement about our cellection of rare Chinese books at Fukien Christian University, Foochow, China, and our plan for the new library building. Under separate cover I am sending you several photographic facsimiles from some of those books, and a colored sketch of the proposed building. There is a brief account in English on the back of each of the photographs.

The collection was donated by the), the Grand Tutor Honorable Chen Pao-Chen (to Emperor Hauan Tung (Henry Pu-Yi) (1908-1912) of the last Manchu Bynasty. In September of 1935, the large part of the collection was moved to the campus of Fukien Christian University. Owing to the lack of space in the University, a small portion of the collection still remains in the donor's residences in Peiping and Tientsin. and in his ancestral home in Foochow. The part that is now in the University numbers 21,814 volumes, consisting of a little over 80,000 books. It is divided into 2,513 sections, and are closely placed in 27 old artistic Chinese stock-cases, which also came from the donor. Several other thousand volumes are in 90 specially made boxes with their proper titles carved on the outside.

As you will see from the sample facsimiles, a great number of the books are extremely valuable; several are straight hand-copied sets, some are copies directly printed from the Tang Dynasty(618-907 A.D.) editions, and some are from rare Sung (960-1279 A.D.) and Ming (1368-1644) outs and prints.

We have also a few fine works, produced in the early part of the Ch'ing Dynasty (17th century), that cannot now be duplicated anywhere in China, for they were prohibited works in the Manchu Regime, and all of them were supposed to have been burned. In practically every book one can find seals of famous scholars who once owned it, and there are not a few which bear the hand-writings of some of our illustrious scholars and emperors. The entire collection is in the best of condition; all the books are well bound, and broken pages and missing parts of older editions have been properly restored.

The present general Library of Fukien Christian University is housed in the second floor of the Arts Hall. There are about 21,000 titles in Chinese and 12,000 in foreign languages, together with over 200 bound Chinese, and 1,100 English standard periodicals and journals. These volumes have already filled up the available space in the Arts Hall. The Chen collection of 80,000 books is in the large attic room of our Science Hall. The room is not fire-proof, and is, therefore, not made accessible to the general student body or the public.

We are urgently in need of a new library building which will not only accommodate our general library, and the entire Chen collection, but also our existing art museum and the private museum of the Honorable Chen Pac-Chen. The Grand Tutor has promised to lean to the University for an indefinite period of time, when we have a proper place to house the same, his invaluable collections of porcelains, bronses, jades, as well as paintings and other articles of art from the ancient times, through the Shang (1766-1150 B.C.) and Chow (1150-221 B.C.) Dynasties, to the modern times. We have in our library his two-volume catalogue giving the entites and illustrations of that collection.

We have been working on our new Library building plan for some time. The colored sketch which I am sending you under separate cover will give you some idea of what the building may look like. It will house about 350,000 volumes, with large reading and exhibition rooms, and seminar accommodations. There will be ground in back of the building that could be used for additional wings, should the library need enlargement in the future. We have already selected the location for our new library building, which will have a central place on our campus. The University now owns all the land that will be necessary for the purpose. It is our

plan to have the first two stories built of granite quarried from our own hills, as we have done in our other large buildings. The upper structure will be of bricks burned at Fukien. All of the floors will be reinforced concrete, and the book stacks will be of steel. The approximate cost for the building will be about U.S.\$80,000.00. There should be enough current income to insure its minimum annual maintenance, and we hope to secure an additional U.S.\$50,000.00 as an endowment fund. We are, therefore, in need of U.S.\$150,000.00 for our library work.

We appreciate your interest in our work at Fukien Christian University. We hope that you will cooperate in our effort to make the rare Chinese library available
for the use of the scholars, and for the general public.




