Our last letter to you was on June 13. Since that date we have received your favor of June 7, in which you enclose trial balance of May 31 and the cash statement for the month of May, also disbursements on Managers' current budget, and a copy of the journal voucher Nos. 103, 105, and 107. These various items have had our attention.

In connection therewith there is a matter which we would like to call to your attention. My dear Mr. McCann:

but same has been taken up with our Accounting Department, and the payment of Draft #1130 for \$700.00 noted.

We also find that remittance of income on the Date Library Fund for 1928-29 has not been forwarded. We are therefore enclosing check for 6.\$51.28 to cover this account. We regret exceedingly that this was overlooked.

We note what you say regarding the Property Account. We have not been able to study this question in detail since the receipt of the May 16th letter, but hope to do so within the next few days.

It is quite a relief when we find that some gruesome reports are not entirely true. We wish that this could be said of the incident which was reported upon yesterday. This relates to Dr. Stubbs' assassimation at West China. It was a horrible affair, and even though we had meager news as early as the first part of June, still when the details were received, it proved to be most depressing.

Surely China seems to be in a horrible state. The reports of these few weeks regarding the actions of different factions are not at all reassuring. In fact one wonders just how and when and where everything will end up. Surely if some of the influences that are at present prevailing are allowed to continue, only a pitiable plight can be the outcome.

My dear Mr. McCann,

I enclose herewith four copies of the form for the University's annual report to the New York State Educational Department.

As you know, all the figures for this report are supplied by the field, though sometimes the field treasurers ask for our confirmation as to the investments reported under Item 6 (B). Our closing figures as of July 31st 1930 give us the following information relative to investments:-

I note that Mr. McClure's report for last year showed G.\$162,697.02 as the amount of the University's investments as of July 31, 1929. Since this is G.\$500.00 in excess of the amount shown on our books, I presume he included G.\$500.00 of investments held on the field.

Last year Mr. McClure signed the report. But since the form requires that the report be executed by the presiding officer it would be well to have President Lin sign the document. The New York Department of Education usually requires that the report be sworn to before an official authorized to administer such an oath. In the absence of notaries public in China, the department accepts attestation before an American or British consular official.

I have this week gotten back into the office and Mr. Evans has just begun a richly deserved vacation. I hope you are getting a bit of rest this summer.

Closing entries are shown on Journal Youcher #114. The Mex. amount budgeted being \$55,463.33, exclusive of the China Medical Board which was sent out to the field in Mex. drafts as received, and the amount disbursed as shown on the Statement of Disbursements on Managers Current Budget \$48,670.30, shown a balance of Mex.\$3,793.03 due the field. This we have brought over as gold \$2,728.13 in Account #130- Accounts Payable to the Field.

My dear Mr.McCann:

Let me acknowledge receipt of your letter of July 12. This letter discusses two items on which I will comment.

Budget. You call attention to the fact that when we transmitted to the field the income received during 1928-29 from the Mrs. Henry Date Library Fund we charged this amount to the current budget rather than to non-budget items within the Special section. You point out that previous to July 31, 1928 this type of income was transmitted to the field outside the budget, and express the belief that the same procedure should have been followed in 1928-29.

The procedure we adopted with relation to the 1928-29 income from the DayeLibrary Fund was in accordance with the budget for that year as approved by the field and as approved by our Fukien Trustees. Previous to 1928-29 funds received for scholarships and for such other special items as the Library Fund were considered as entirely outside the current budget. However, beginning with 1928-29 the field adopted the policy of including these special items within the current budget. I presume that this change was made in order to show a maximum income for the University and thus bring our finances more nearly up to the standard required for registration. In the budget estimates for 1928-29 as submitted by the field we find under the head of the general items following proposed expenditure "University Scholarships (Endowment) Mex.\$568.00". Under Anticipated Income we find the following: "Psychology Endowment Fund

So far as I have been able to ascertain in a hasty glance through the budget estimates, the expenditure of G\$50 from the "Psychology Indoment Fund" is not set out as a separate item. Expenditures for scholar-ships are set down as equal to anticipated income.



When the Trustees on July 9, 1929, approved the budget for 1928-29 they included in their contribution of Mex.\$53,675.04 the anticipated income from Mrs.Date's Library Fund, together with anticipated income from the scholarships and aidships. If we had not included these items the amount the Trustees should have undertaken to provide would simply have been that much less. You will remember that at the end of the fiscal year 1928-29 the Trustees had transmitted the entire amount they undertook to provide.

A further examination of our books here in New York shows, however, that, after all, we did send out all the scholarship and aidship funds as in addition to our obligations to the current budget. The only item we sent out under the current budget was the income from Mrs.Date's Library Fund. Our office discovered this fact about a month ago, and in order to make our procedure consistent we sent you a special check for \$51.28 to cover the income received from the Date Fund during 1928-29.

Thus, as the matter now stands, the field has received, over and above the amount underwritten by the Trustees for 1928-29, the total remittances we sent out for scholarships, aidships, and the Library Fund. Since our 1928-29 accounts have already been closed out and have been audited, we are quite content to let the matter rest as it now stands, and are happy that the field has profited to this extent by the way in which the matter was handled.

For 1929-30 the field likewise included within the budget income and expenditures from scholarships, aidships, and the Date Fund. The Trustees in passing on the budget assumed responsibility for contributing sufficient funds to balance the budget on the basis drawn by the field. Our New York office, however, in preparing its Monthly Budget Report deducted from the total underwritten by the Trustees the amount anticipated from scholarships, aidships, and the Date Fund. This avoided the duplication of payment made in 1928-29.

Remittance of Scholarship Funds. You call attention to an entry in Voucher 107 showing the income received to May 31 on various scholarship funds and ask that we remit these amounts to you. While our office distributes to the various accounts at the end of each month the amounts received from our endowment securities, we have always transmitted scholarship funds to the field at semi-annual intervals rather than at monthly intervals. The amount received in any one month is so small that we would hardly be justified in sending special remittances to you so frequently. On January 31 and July 31 of each year we send you the entire amount of income received from scholarship and other special funds during the preceding six months.

These explanations are rather more prolonged than I intended to make but I hope they may succeed in clarifying our procedure on these particular points.

Dear Sirs:

We wrote you on August 26, enclosing several items connected with last year's account preliminary to forwarding you the financial statement.

In the last paragraph but one on page 1, I stated that we were able to report a surplus of Mex.\$8,956.72. This statement was made in error, overlooking the fact that the gold exchange is a credit for your account and can not be reckoned as a surplus on operating expenses. The profit on gold exchange amounted to Mex. \$4,485.84, leaving a surplus on operating expenses of Mex.\$4,470.88. In connection with this latter figure, I would point out that this surplus is altogether due to savings on personnel items on the budget: travel and outfit for Miss Eva M. Asher \$1,200.00, Dean's salary \$2,287.50, Social Science salary \$762.50, and Business Manager salary \$675.00, making a total of \$4,925.00. We will go more into detail in regard to this matter when sending you the audited's statement of account.

We have for acknowledgement your letters of July 29, enclosing check for G.\$51.28, account 75/4, and also your later letter of August 1, enclosing two drafts, one for \$115.12 and one for \$57.41, both for account 175.2.

We expect the auditors to return to-morrow and finish examining our accounts, and hope to send you the statement at an early date.



In regard to the annual report to the New York State Educational Department and the irregularity which took place last year in Mr. McClure signing the report instead of

President Lin, I would say, in explanation, that you were urging a prompt remittance of the report. At that time President was absent in Shanghai; so rather than have further delay, Mr. McClure signed the report and sent it on.

This year President Lin is attending to that, and you will find the report, in duplicate, enclosed here.

Referring to the matter of investments, your surmise is correct. In that Mr. McClure included G\$500.00 which represents M\$1,000.00 held on the field as the Methodist Jubilee Scholarship. This would make our figures coincide.

Referring to the several items which you give in this letter, it appears as if some revision and correction is necessary. Item No. 1 From Gifts and Bequests \$31.85 should be \$20.00. Item No. 2 Income of Former Investments should be \$11.85, endowment for E. C. Jones, your voucher No. 97. You have apparently emitted an additional item of \$24.77, your voucher No. 112, July 31, 1930. With these corrections and this addition, you figures will correspond with ours.

On September 19 we sent you 30 copies of our Annual Financial Report. These were sent in two packages and I hope you will receive them in good order. I do not believe that there are any special explanations to make in connection therewith. I hope that the details furnished will make the report quite clear.

My dear Mr. McCann:

Your letter of August 23rd reminds us that we have not issued authorizations for drafts on Current Budget. In making a study of the situation we find ourselves in the same position as a year ago when the Board of Trustees accepted the suggestion of the field and established the budget on a Mex. basis. The rate this year, however, is 2.40 to 1. Although we wrote the field last year relative to our method of handling the budget, still no change was made in handling funds in the field Treasurer's office. We have had some interviews with Mr. McGlure and we believe that he sees the necessity of following a uniform method, but we will write more of that later on. The present thing in hand is to give authorizations against the funds as approved by the Board of Trustees.

For the sake of convenience we are separating the items in the budget into two classes. As Class "A" contains the funds with which we shall have most to say, we shall dispose of Class "B" first. In this classification we have the Rockefeller Foundation, representing item (c) in the budget and special items representing item (f) in the budget. The total of these two amounts is M\$10,724.80. These items are to be sent to the field without any relation to the funds being raised by the Trustees, and there is no particular desire on our part to have these bear any relation to the gain on exchange. They are therefore eliminated from consideration and placed into Class "B".

Class "A" consists of the balance of the budget. The items are as follows:-

This last balance is approximately the amount against which we should issue authorizations to draw. You will notice that it leaves a balance of L.C.\$7,787.20 which can be adjusted by check during the latter part of the year or it may be used for paying for purchases here in the States. It is a relatively small amount for us to reserve for this purpose. The authorizations are as follows:-

- #3104 On or after Apr. 1, 1931, you are authorized to draw, at sight, on account of the Current Budget, \$6,000.00 L.C., to be charged to account 31.
- #3105 On and after May 1, 1931, you are authorized to draw, at sight, on account of Current Budget, \$6,000.00 L.C., to be charged to account 31.

#3106 - On or after June 1, 1931, you are authorized to draw, at sight, on account of Current Budget, \$6,000.00 L.C., to be charged to account 31.

It is quite possible that you will make use of some of the amounts included in the above authorizations for payments in the States. In that case kindly make allowances by either omitting certain drafts or adjusting the amount to suit the occasion.

One of the outstanding reasons for setting up our authorizations in this manner is to ensure our being able to ascertain our standing with the field at any time. Therefore in drawing, you will of course be governed by the \$6,000,00 L.C., but when the draft reaches us it will be in Gold, and if you use the authorisation number, having it appear somewhere on the draft, we will know that it is a Gold draft, the equivalent of which is \$6,000.00 L.C. If there is any variation from these amounts, of course you will let us know immediately.

Your letter of August 23rd stated that you were drawing \$5,000.00 but you did not indicate whether it was Gold or Local Currency. In making our analysis you will note that we used the Gold figure. We should know at the earliest possible moment the equivalent in Local Currency.

If there are any further details you desire to know regarding the operation of this plan, we are referring you to my letter of February 14, 1930.

We enclose herewith an order from Professor Beeman for the Department of Chemistry, addressed to Messrs. Leeds and Northrup Co., Philadelphia. Will you please place this order, obtaining the best possible price and charging same to the Managers' Current Account. In connection with this order, I might add that Mr. Beeman is very anxious to obtain same at the earliest possible date.

We have also another request from Professor Farley, in which he asked us to make payment of his insurance premium G\$220.90 which is due on November 1, on the policy of Malcolm F. Farley, policy No. K-430100, due to the United States Veteran's Bureau, Insurance Division, Washington, D. C. We hope that the delay in making this payment will not in any way invalidate the policy.

We would also like to enquire about book orders. A number of the publishing houses in the United States have established agencies in Shanghai with the local firms and referred orders which we sent to them back to Shanghai. They charged us in local currency at a very infavorable rate of exchange. In order to economize and make the books available to the students at the lowest possible rate, we would like to know if we could send the orders to you and have you place them for us. In this way they would not be violating their agreement with their local agencies. I might add that in connection with purchases for the American Board Mission, we have followed this policy. If your office could help us along this line, it will be a great service to the University. In selling books to the students we write the price on the current rate of exchange, so that we do not want you to think that these sales are being made at the rate fixed by the Board of Trustees.

Circumstances have interferred with my replying to your letter of August 15 and August 22.

The former enclosed your statement for the peiod ending July 31. In the disbursement there was one item which we believe must be an error, namely, 31 Lawrence L. Lau - cable to Dr. Lin, \$4.50. This is a small matter, but does it not belong to your New York Expense Account? Formerly all such items have been charged to that account.

If you will pardon me, I would like to take up the matter of exchange in regard to University funds as handled by your office. Your method is very difficult for me to understand or to adjust myself to. From what I have been told and from what I have gathered from correspondence, I understand that you established a fixed rate of exchange for the year 1929-30 of gold \$1.00 equal to Mex.\$2.10. It was on this basis that we operated the University account on the field.

Beginning February 30, you charged certain items on your statement at a rate of 2.49. On what basis, I do not know, because 2.49 has no relation that I know of to anything in heaven above or on earth beneath, at least not to the authorized rate of 2.10 or to the current rate which prevailed at the period on which you made these exchanges.

For thirty years I have had to do with mission accounts involving exchange which in the last fifteen years have approximated one-third of a million gold annually. I am frank to say that if our home office has handled our exchange as you do for the University, it would have been impossible to keep the accounts adjusted.

When you fix a rate of exchange, would it not simplify matters generally if you enter all items on your account at the fixed rate for that financial period and allow your field treasury to report the actual amount realized by sales on the field? These could be reported monthly, and adjustments in

connection with them will only require one added entry on your books, which according to your present method is necessary any how and our books would not require any adjustment. If necessary, we can obtain the bank certificate on each sale for you information.

I understand your practice it is to charge items paid by you in New York at the fixed rate of 2.10, and if we issue a draft here, you charge it to us at 2.49. To quote two specific cases, I will take your statement of March 31, item dated March 3, draft 1121, Professor Martin insurance, \$200.00 gold which was charged to us at 2.49 as Mex.\$498.00. In your April statement, the following item appears: April 1, N. Beeman Insurance, \$200.00 gold. This was converted to Mexican at the fixed rate of 2.10. I cannot understand the reason why such a difference should be made in these two items which are for the same purpose.

I am not so much concerned about what rate of exchange you use, but that we use a uniform rate and thus eliminate the adjustments which makesour accounting in this office of little value. In this statement of July 31, you report as paid to the Managers' Current Account gold \$21,372.79, which you report as Mex.\$48,670.30. At 2.10 this will be Mex.\$44,882.86, a difference of Mex.\$3,787.44 which practically cancels the item we have reported to you under the head of gain on exchange working on 2.10 basis. We reported a gain on gold exchange of Mex.\$4,485.84. From this we will have to deduct the amount which we have referred to above, namely, \$3,787.44. Attached you will find a statement showing how the amount we reported as gain on gold exchange is affected by your reckoning.

Turning to your letter of August 20, in which you explain the method of charging scholarship and special funds. We have some difficulty in reconciling your explanation with the data which we have on hand.

Referring to the minutes of the Board of Trustees, April 17, 1929, page 5, vote T839 reads as follows:

Towards general bidget . . . M\$66,263.33
For strengthening Department
of Chinese Studies . . . 4,200.00

These added together make the sume of \$70,463.33 as per your monthly budget report of July 31, 1930. A further item on this vote is for "Scholarship and Special Items" \$581.70. This latter item we understand is made up as follows:

Therefore it appeard to us that these items for the year 1929-30 come under the head of Scholarship and Special Funds and not included in the budget. If our understand is incorrect, you will be able to set us right on this matter.


I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr. McClure and hope that in conference with him, you can reach some satisfactory arrangement in regard to these matters.

This statement from you giving us authority to draw will be a great help in keeping our records, and we will try to abide by it as strictly as possible. After the tuitions came in, we found that we have sufficient funds on hand for local current expenses up to the end of December. The five thousand dollars gold which we sold on August 23 realized M\$17,167.38. M\$5,167.38 will be 1/6/36 redited to Gain on Exchange. I think your grant as outlined is quite clear to us and does not require any further explanation. Exchange has been holding steadily at between 29 and 30. Rates are somewhat more favorable in Shanghai, but after reckoning the cost of transfer the gain is not as large as one might think it would We are also enclosing a letter which came to hand from the Nippon Yusen Kaisha office in San Francisco relative to transportation for Professor Farley and family and Professor Sutton and family. 



Your letter of October 14 came to hand this morning. Immediately thereafter we addressed a letter to Messrs. Leeds and Northrup Company for the order, stipulating that it is to be shipped on the educational discount basis.

We have also paid the insurance premium for Professor Farley, and if November 1 is the exact due date, there is a thirty days' period of grace and there will be no question regarding the continuance of the policy. We are not, however, raising any question at the present time. Just as soon as the receipt comes to hand, we shall forward it.

The question you raise regarding book orders is one that our office has made a special study of in order to facilitate shipment to the field on all classes of publications at a considerable saving. Two things are to be considered in this relationship. One is that on orders required for rush delivery the parcel post charges will mount up to a rather large figure. If the order can be sent far enough in advance to use freight shipment where we can consolidate the entire order, there will be a large saving. In either event, however, the discounts we have been securing more than offset transportation charges together with a considerable margin of discount. In the case where two or three books from one publisher are ordered, this can go by book rate and at a very low cost. On more than three books from one publisher, it is better to collate them in our office and ship by freight.

We can do almost anything you desire and shall be very glad indeed to cooperate with you.

My dear President Lin and Mr. McCann:

We enclose herewith a copy of the minutes of the meeting of the Fukien Trustees held on November 18. This letter will comment on some of the most important matters discussed at that meeting.

Statements by Mr.Scott and Mr.McClure. Both Mr.Scott and Mr.McClure made exceedingly fine statements to the Board. Mr.Scott's statement was in written form so the Board requested him to allow his statement to go out as an appendix to the minutes. In this way it will come before the members of the Board who were not present and will also be available for distribution to other friends of the University.

Trustees' Treasurer's Report. Since this report had been distributed to the members of the Board of Trustees in advance of the meeting it was not made a part of the minutes. I am, however, enclosing herewith a copy of this report for your information.

I believe that no comments are necessary on thessections of Endowment Funds and Plant Funds. In the Current General Section we had a great deal of difficulty in closing out the accounts for the fiscal year 1929-30 due to the fact that we had not received from the field the information we had requested as to the Mexican proceeds of the funds drawn by the Field Treasurer in the form of drafts on our office. I went over this point at some length with Mr. McClure in advance of the meeting. After a conference with him we decided to accept the figure of Mex. \$4,485.84 given on the first page of the Field Treasurer's report as representing, approximately at least, the amount of these remittances yielded above the defined rate of 2.10 to 1. This would give L.C.\$25,397.81 as the approximate proceeds of this item of G\$9,958.08. Using this figure as a basis, the amount disbursed by the Board of Trustees toward the 1929-20 budget has amounted to L.C.\$64,368.71, leaving a balance of L.C.\$6,094.62 still to be transmitted to complete the Trustees' appropriation of L.C.\$70,463.55 as defined by action T-859 passed by the Trustees April 17, 1929. Further details as to our method of arriving at this figure will be found in the minutes and in the copy of the Treasurer's report.

In accordance with the authorisation of the Trustees contained in minute T-908, we are enclosing herewith with Mr.McCann's copy of this letter a Changhai draft for L.C.\$6,094.62. We purchased a draft on Shang-

hai, rather than one on Foodhow, because of the fact that the rate of exchange on Shanghai here in New York at the present time is much more favorable than that on Foodhow. It would have cost approximately G\$150 more to purchase a draft for the same amount on the Foodhow branch of the Hongking and Shanghai Banking Corporation. While it is probable that Mr.NcCann may lose something on exchange in negotiating this draft on Shanghai, I believe it is unlikely that he will lose as much as the L.C.\$500 or more which would have been required to purchase a draft here in New York on a Foodhow bank. If there is any loss in negotiating this Shanghai draft I would suggest that Mr.McCann charge it against the amount he will probably soon be drawing on us for Plant needs, as discussed below, and will notify our office of the amount of the charge he thus makes, so that we can correct our records accordingly.

You will notice that by action T-909 the Trustees disposed of the surplus here in New York as follows:-

Accordingly the Field Treasurer is authorized to draw on us at three days a draft for the sum of C\$3,845.18. As explained above, if any loss is incurred in connection with the enclosed Shanghai draft for L.C.\$6,094.62, such loss should be met from the proceeds of this draft for C\$3,845.18. The remainder is the amount allocated by the Trustees in action T-909 for meeting the Plant needs of the University. President Lin's recent letters have placed the need for two additional residences as the most pressing problem you are now facing, so we presume that you will wish to use these funds for that purpose.

You will note that by action Told the Trustees authorized the allocation of \$75 received from Mr.G.C.Holmes to assist in meeting the urgent Plant needs of the University. We are enclosing herewith in Mr.McCann's copy of this letter a check for \$75.00. The Trustees made no further designation of this gift than that it be used "to assist in meeting the urgent Plant needs of the University". Because of the urgency of the need for residences we are tentatively charging this \$75 to Residence Account. Perhaps, however, the field may have some other specific Plant need which a small gift of this kind can meet. There is, of course, always an advantage to being able to report to the donor that his gift was used for a certain specific objective, rather than merged with larger funds in meeting such a general need as the erection of a residence.

Report of audit. We are enclosing with Mr.McCann's copy of this letter a copy of the report of our New York auditors for the fiscal year ending July 31, 1930. You will note that this covers much the same ground as the Trustees' Treasurer's report.

Field Treasurer's Report. Copies of this report had been distributed to the members of the Board of Trustees in advance of the meeting. Mr.McClure pointed out some of the most important features of the report. In considering the field surplus of L.C.\$4,470.88, the Trustees recognized that since this surplus has been saved by the field as a result of your carefullfinancial administration, the allocation of the surplus is largely a matter for decision by the field. However, the Trustees in action T-913 suggested that because of the urgency of the need of Plant additions, it is probable that the field authorities will wish to use part or all of this surplus for this purpose. If some or all of the surplus is used for this purpose we would appreciate it if the Field Treasurer would send us a report to that effect in due course so that we can make the proper debit and credit entries in the Plant Section of our New York accounts.

Mr.McClure and I were not certain whether the figure we arrived at here in New York as the amount still due from the Trustees on the 1929-30 budget could be reconciled in the figure given in the Field Treasurer's report. According to our reckoning, the amount thus due from the Trustees was only L.C.\$6,094.62. On the first page of table 1 of the Field Treasurer's report the amount shown as due from the New York Treasurer is L.C.\$25,183.33. This latter figure will be substantially reduced by disbursements made by the New York Treasurer during June and July, which were not included in the Field Treasurer's report, and I believe will also be reduced by certain items which you were keeping as a charge against the New York Treasurer such as the item for the Kellogg Travel Funds. I trust that when these adjustments are made your books will reconcile with ours. If they do not your surplus will probably be affected by the amount of the difference.

As Mr.McClure has already written, he is hoping that he may succeed in obtaining gifts here in America to meet the cost of erecting the residences urgently needed at the University. If such gifts are obtained it will then be possible to restore for some other allocation the surpluses which the Trustees have appropriated for constructing Residences. The Trustees recognized this possibility when they took action but felt that the course they have adopted would have the advantage of making these funds immediately available for meeting your needs.

Other financial matters. The other two financial matters dealt with by the Trustees, ovizzethe change in the budget appropriation for 1930-31, and the character of Plant accounts, required rather detailed discussion so I will write separate letters on these two subjects.

Minutes of meeting of the Board of Managers May 15. The two items requiring special study in these minutes are the correlated program and coeducation. I believe that the actions of the Board on these two subjects are sufficiently full and complete as to require little additional comment.

As regards the correlated program, the Trustees studied with keenest interest actions M-614 and M-615. It was, therefoxxex their judgment, however, that, inasmuch as the policy here in America has always been to leave the working out of the details of the correlated program to the institutions and correlating agencies in China, specific action by the Trustees here in America on the changes suggested by the Board of Managers was undesirable. We all felt sure that the field representatives of Fukien will be able to present these actions of the Managers to the

Council of Higher Education in a way that will secure the most sympathetic consideration.

The problem of So-education is such an important one that the Trustees felt it deserved further study than the Board was able to give at this meeting. As a result, a special committee was appointed and was requested to present a report to the Board at the earliest opportunity.

Plans for Mr.NcClure. I believe the minutes of the Trustees on this subject are self-explanatory. I sincerely hope that these actions will carry out the wishes of the field as expressed in President Lin's letters.

Within the next few days I will write further in regard to warious matters here in the Trustees' minutes. However, it will not be possible to get such letters in the China mail closing this afternoon.



We have for acknowledgement your letter of October 30 and November 6, which arrived here on the 4th and 3d of December respectively. The former enclosed the draft for \$2,500 Mexican, and the latter was an acknowledgement of the receipt of our certificates on the Wabash National Bank. We thank you for your attention to these matters.

Doubtless you are following the very decided drop in silver. It has again reached almost the four to one point. I know of no special reason for the drop, and a recent letter from the head of one of the finance institutions in Shanghai I know that it was unexpected in financial circles. The practical stoppage of trade in China causes the market in the port cities to be glutted with silver. Under normal conditions there is a large demand for silver in the interior. But with the situation there is at present, everything that can be brought out is brought out to the coast. We sincerely hope for more settled conditions, and this not without some reason at the same time there are many factors operating which are discouraging.

We have for acknowledgement your letter of November 11, enclosing the usual monthly balance sheet and cash statement as of October 31, with the supplementary statement accompanying same. These will have our attention.

Also your letter of November 12. We note that you have received the copies of the Annual Report to the New York State Educational Department, and also a copy of our Annual Financial Report. We will be glad to hear further from you in connection with the latter to make any adjustments which may seem necessary after your conference with Mr. McClure.

We wrote you on December 12 in regard to the deposit to the credit of the University Book Store account with the Union Trust Co. We are glad that this deposit has been made.

You will doubtless notice by the financial reports how the bottom seems to have fallen out of the silver exchange. Doubtless President Lin has written to you, acknowledging the cablegram authorizing us to draw on you for \$3,000 gold at three days sight for the account of a new residence. We sold that amount, drawing on you by draft No. 1146. I got a rate of 26 on this exchange. In other words, we received \$11,538.46 local currency. I would have received something of a better rate if I had been able to sell at sight. I think I could have squeezed another 1/8 out of the bank for a sight draft.

For four days now the rates have been holding as above. What the future holds, no one seems to know. If one has to purchase gold, we only receive about \$24.50 for \$100 local currency.

As our cash balance is being reduced, we may take advantage of this favorable exchange and dispose of some drafts






