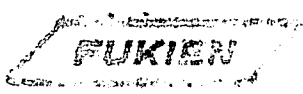

Registration for the spring term took place on February 15 and 16. Beginning the next day, students, faculty, office staff, and workmen started on the four days of labor which is required by the government of all male citizens between the age of 18 - 45. The government order did not include women, but our women students are doing their full share of work every day. F.C.U. got permission from the government to work on the campus - building a road leading to the public highway. Classes will begin on Monday, February 22.

President G. J. Lin went to Shanghai by Air on February 1 to attend the annual meeting of the Council of Higher Education, February 3, 4, 5. He is expected back today or Monday. Dr. and Mrs. S. Elisseff, Director of the Harvard-Yenching Institute, with headquarters in Cambridge, Massachusetts, will come with him.

Mr. Cheng Ching Tuan ('29), Instructor in Biology, was married to Miss Kao of Szechuen Province on January 17 in Nanking. Mr. and Mrs. Cheng returned to the campus several weeks ago.

Prof. T. H. Wang and Mr. Lin I of our Chemistry Department attended the meeting of the Research Institute of Applied Chemistry in Nanking, beginning February 1, for the purpose of training in gas defense.

Dean Li Gwan Fang visited her family and friends in Chinkiang and Shanghai during part of the vacation. She returned to the campus on February 11.

At the request of Governor Chen I our College of Rural Reconstruction made a survey of waste land along the coast of South Fukien during the week of January 23 - 31 with all expenses defrayed by the Fukien Government. Dr. Francis Chen was in charge of the project and was accompanied by Prof. C. R. Kellogg, Mr. William W. Overholt, Mr. Lin Tsing, and two government representatives. They visited the districts of Futsing, Hinghwa, Hwoian, and Tung An. It was found that in general the waste land in those sections is due to three causes: (1) banditry - the people were driven out sometime ago and they are afraid to come back although conditions are much improved now; (2) wind erosion, because of the lack of forestry; (3) areas flooded by the ocean, which is an engineering problem.

Dr. J. G. Anderson, Director of the Swedish Museum of Far Eastern Antiquities in Stockholm, distinguished archaeologist and world-famous discoverer of the Peking Man, was a guest on the University campus February 5 - 8. With him was his Secretary, Miss Vivian C. Dorf. After carrying out the Geological Survey of Sweden, Dr. Anderson came to China in 1914 as mining advisor to the Chinese Government. Later he became the chief foreign advisor to the Geological Survey of China. Dr. Anderson returned to China last November after an absence of thirteen years to see some of his publications in the Geological Survey Series through the press in Nanking. He also wishes to travel in Szechuen after which he will return to Stockholm to resume his duties in the museum there. Dr. Anderson came to the university campus as the personal guest of Prof. Farley whose archaeological work and extensive collection of archaeological material bearing on the early history of Fukien he was anxious to see. He was much impressed with the beauty of the campus and with the University in general. He declared the Fukien scenery to be the most beautiful he had seen in China.

Dr. Ralph A. Felton of Drew University is visiting professor this year at the Nanking Theological Seminary, and is now in Foochow in the interests of rural church work. Mrs. Felton is traveling with him.

We welcome to the F.C.U. campus Dr. and Mrs. S. Elisseeff, Director of the Harvard-Yenching Institute, who arrived last Wednesday, February 24, together with President C. J. Lin from Shanghai. Dr. and Mrs. Elisseeff will stay here until Thursday of next week when they will leave for Canton to visit Lingnan University.

Dr. Francis Chen has been appointed by the Fukien Government as Head of the Cooperative Bureau in the Department of Reconstruction in Fukien Province. Dr. Chen will, however, continue to be in charge of our Rural Service Centers at Wu Li Ting and Nicu Tien, and to give some courses in our Department of Rural Economics.

The new officers of the Women's Dormitory Council for this term are: Miss Shih Yin Yu, Chairman; Miss Yang Fu Teh, Vice-Chairman; Miss Lin Chih Hsiang, Athletic Chairman, and Miss Kuang Ching Hsiung, Sanitation Chairman.

Mr. Chu Hsiung of the Horticulture Department returned to the campus on February 24 after spending several weeks with his family in Shanghai.

Mr. Hsiung Shu Kuo, Athletic Director, returned to the campus yesterday after visiting his family in Honan Province.

A training conference for rural pastors and other workers in the Church is being held during the days of February 24 - March 2, inclusive, at the Union High School and at the University's rural service center, Wu Li Ting. It is being conducted under the auspices of the North Fukien Christian Council and has the assistance of Dr. Ralph Felton, Professor of Rural Sociology at Drew University. The training conference covers a wide range of subjects of importance to the practical needs of rural people, such as crop improvement, public health, rice selection, rural recreation, and the service of the Church to rural life.

Mr. Tan Jen Mei ('34) who went to America last summer and entered Drew University in the fall has now transferred to Crozer Theological Seminary, Chester, Pa., where he was granted a full scholarship. Mr. Tan is also doing part-time work in post-graduate studies in Education at the University of Pennsylvania.

The Sunday School for campus children will begin a week from tomorrow, Sunday, March 7.

The night school for workmen conducted by the Student Christian Association will open Monday night, March 8, with Mr. Wang Jen Yu in charge as last term.

The Training Conference on rural church work, concluded last Wednesday, was made up largely of practical demonstration on the concrete needs of rural life. Several members of the university faculty contributed to the program in various ways. Prof. C. R. Kellogg dealt with reform of agricultural practices and the selection of rice seed using illustrated charts; Prof. Francis Chen dealt with family life and with rural cooperative societies based on the Danish system; Prof. W. W. Overholt Mr. Lin Tsing demonstrated the selection of chickens and explained the standards for such selection; Miss Eunice Thomas demonstrated the possibilities in dramatics as a means of education and inspiration; Prof. E. M. Stowe with the help of five students, taught indoor and other games fitted to the means and the needs of rural life.

The university is receiving a year's complimentary subscription to WORLD YOUTH, a newspaper for young people. The first copy came this week and has been placed in the library. The purpose of the paper is to bring about friendly understanding between the youth of the world. The paper goes to subscribers in 30 countries of the world and receives articles from young people in 37 nations. Chinese students are invited to contribute articles. For the first article of 400 words a year's subscription will be given and for later articles 1/2¢ will be paid. For further details, see letter from World Youth posted on the bulletin board near the Treasurer's Office.

Dr. Anderson of the Medical College, West China Union University, Chengtu, visited F.C.U. yesterday. Dr. Anderson, as a representative of the Church Missionary Society, is here to make a study of medical work in Fukien Province. He was especially interested in the premedical work at F.C.U.

Launch Service. The university no longer maintains daily launch service between here and Foochow. The Business Manager's Office has however arranged with the Lin Puo launch to bring packages, etc., for the F.C.U. community. The boat stops at our jetty daily at 8:00 a.m. and 1:30 p.m., and leaves Foochow on the return trip at 10:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. The boat is usually docked between wharf No. 1 and wharf No. 2 just below the Big Bridge. People wishing to send packages by the boat should request a receipt for same.

Dr. J. Gurney Barclay, Secretary of the Church Missionary Society, with headquarters in London, was a visitor to the F.C.U. Campus yesterday.

The total enrolment for the Spring Semester is 168; 40 women students and 128 men students.

Prof. E. M. Stowe left the first of the week for Nanking to attend the Religious Education Conference of the National Christian Council which is being held in that city this week.

Mr. T. H. Huang who has had charge of the College Bookstore for more than seven years leaves F.C.U. the first of next week to take a position as Bookkeeper with the Texaco Company, Foochow. Mr. Lin Chi T'ien ('32), formerly of the library staff, will now take over the Bookstore work.

Dr. Henry S. C. Chen gave a vocal recital over the radio, from the Foochow Station, last Wednesday night, 6:30 - 7:00, accompanied on the piano by Miss Chiu Tsing Lien (January '37).

Under the direction of Dr. Francis Chen the Cooperative Department of the Provincial Bureau of Reconstruction is holding a Cooperative Training Institute for members of cooperative societies in different villages near Foochow. There are 92 villages represented in the Institute which is conducted on the basis of the Danish Folk Schools for farmers. Prof. C. R. Kellogg and Mr. Huang Hai Yuang of our Department of Agriculture have been asked to give lectures in the Institute.

The Alumni Association discussion group will meet at the home of Mr. Wu Chao Lien ('24), Vice Chairman of the Association, Sunday noon, March 14. Prof. R. Scott will speak to the group on the subject of "The Alumnus and the National Crisis".

The second issue of the F.C.U. news (in Chinese) has recently come from the press. Among other items of news it carries the President's report for 1935/36 and a full report by Miss Huang Siu Chi ('36) of her visit to America last summer as a delegate to the Pacific Area Conference of the World Christian Students Federation held at Mills College, Berkeley, California.

Dr. Li is giving typhoid inoculations on Friday mornings, beginning March 5. Three inoculations are required for immunity. After typhoid inoculations are completed Dr. Li will give inoculations for plague and cholera. Students and faculty families please see Dr. Li at the stated time.

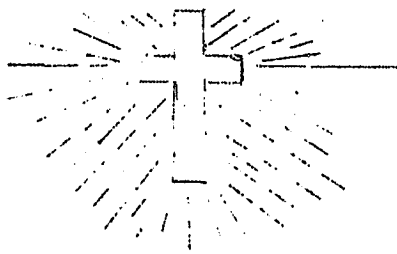

The Rev. Brewster Bingham and his wife, Mrs. Frances Beach Bingham, arrived from Peiping Friday of last week. They have been attending the Language School there, and will continue the study of Mandarin until their return from the summer on Kuliang. Mr. and Mrs. Bingham will make their home with Prof. F. P. Beach for the present. They are members of the American Board Mission.

The Spring Conference of the Foochow Christian Student Union will be held on Thursday, April 1, at Hwa Nan College. Each of the Christian institutions is entitled to a maximum of 20 delegates. The recreation hour in the afternoon will be led by F.C.U. students. President G. J. Lin will make the principal address of the day. The theme of the conference is "Christianizing Student Life".

The second class of the Cooperative Training Institute, held under the Cooperative Department of the Fukien Bureau of Rural Reconstruction of which Dr. Francis Chen is the head, met the first of this week. The Institute is held in the old Agricultural School at West Lake and it lasts ten days for each group. There are 90 representatives in the present group. Each representative comes from a Co-operative for the improvement of Jasmine in his own village. Several members of our Departments of Entomology and Horticulture - Prof. C. R. Kellogg, Mr. H. Y. Hwang, Mr. Lin Tsing ('33), and Miss Liu Tung Yeh ('36) - gave lectures at the Institute during the week on Injurious Insects, Means of Control, and the Life History and Control of Jasmine Insects. The Jasmine flower is one of the outstanding products of the Foochow District. It is the most used flower in making the world-famous Foochow Flower Tea.

Dr. Francis Chen spoke at the Foochow Rotary Club last Thursday on the subject of "The Cooperative Movement in Fukien".

We continue to hear interesting reports of our graduates who went to America last summer. President Tolley of Allegheny College reports that Mr. Lin Kung Hsiang's work has been of a very high grade and that he has proved to be an excellent assistant in the Department of Biology. Mr. Cheng Tien Hsi reports a very happy year at Dickinson College. Both Mr. Lin and Mr. Cheng are planning to transfer to a postgraduate school next fall for advanced work in Agricultural Botany.

Mr. Tan Jen Mei expresses great satisfaction with his new program of work at Crozer Theological Seminary where he is taking work in Theology, and at the University of Pennsylvania where he is taking postgraduate work in Education.

The Spring Conference of the Foochow Christian Student Union which was held at Hwa Nan College on Thursday, April 1, proved to be a successful gathering. Nearly 180 students attended for the day. The leading address was given by President Lin, who also summarized the thought of the later discussions carried on on the central theme, "Christianizing Student Living". Students from F.C.U. led four of the six discussion groups and conducted the recreational period of one hour in the afternoon.

Last week, as a part of the extension work of the College of Rural Reconstruction, Prof. C. R. Kollogg held a meeting in Pao, a village across the river from the university, to discuss the plan for a program of rice selection for the village. The pastor in the village has organized a cooperative agricultural society of some seventy members for the improvement of conditions in that region, and many of the members were present at the meeting. At the close of the session the men promised to furnish a small piece of land as an experimental plot in which to begin the work of rice selection. We have learned since that the land has been set aside, marked with a sign, and is being prepared for the seedlings.

Sometime ago when the Agricultural Commission, including several members of the F.C.U. faculty, appointed by the Governor of Fukien to survey waste lands along the coast, entered the small village of San San in the Futsing District they were pleasantly surprised to find three fine pure white Leghorn Chickens that had been hatched and reared from our Wu Li Ting stock by the pastor of the village. It is encouraging to find the effects of the Wu Li Ting work spreading out into the province. On this same trip some 40 hybrid eggs from our Wu Li Ting stock were distributed at several places, and we have since heard that in each place the chickens are being reared. Everywhere the people are eager for help in improving their farm products.

A number of persons have asked where to get records of Chinese tunes and hymns as played in the Friday chapel service. They are for sale at the Electric and Musical Industries Company, 1099 Route de Zikawei, Shanghai. A list of available records will be posted for the information of those interested.

During that time they went to West China where Bishop Gowdy presided over the West China Annual Conference. Later, they attended the East Asia Conference at which time Bishop Gowdy was re-elected Bishop and assigned to the Foochow Area.

A son was born to Mr. and Mrs. Chu Hsiung on March 25, in Shanghai. Mrs. Chu will return to the campus in a few weeks.

Dr. Chao Lin Fang, Head of the National Rice Breeding Station, Nanking, came to Foochow the first of the week on the invitation of the Fukien Government to make a study of agricultural conditions in this province. Dr. Chao visited the university last Tuesday, and will be here again tomorrow.

The London Illustrated News, beginning with the issue of February 13, is coming to our library through the courtesy of Consul G. E. Stockley, British Consulate, Foochow. The library is also receiving the Manchester Guardian through the courtesy of Dr. F. Sanger, Birmingham, England.

A Baby Contest was held at our Wu Li Ting Rural Service Station on Wednesday, April 7. 250 babies were registered and 180 were actually present, ranging in age from one to six years. Each child received a handkerchief and a cake of soap, and first, second and third prizes were given to the best three out of each of the six groups of ages, based on health, intelligence, and personal care.

A nurse with special training in midwifery is living in our Wu Li Ting Rural Service Station and working among the women of the surrounding villages.

A model toilet has been built in two villages of the Wu Li Ting area, under the direction of the Provincial Sanitary Engineer. In making any public improvements in the villages the matter of cost is one of the most important factors. If the project is too expensive the village people cannot adopt it for individual homes.

Mr. Yang Ming Sing has been collecting insects during the past year and sending them to the British Museum of Natural History for identification. He has sent 325 specimens, 12 of which are as yet unknown and may prove to be new species. Six of the specimens have been retained by the museum as being new species. The named insects have recently been returned by the museum and will be of great help in building up our local F.C.U. collection.

The following student organizations have been started and approved by the faculty: The Sophia Philosophy Club, the Harmonica Band, and the Ping Pong Club.

The university community is looking forward to the visit, during the coming week, of the Rev. Chou T'ing-chieh, '34. Mr. Chou returned to Amoy just a few months ago from England where he studied at Cheshunt College, Cambridge, after graduation from F.C.U. He is coming to Foochow at this time to lead in special religious services at F.C.U. and Foochow College. In addition to the services mentioned above, a time for personal interviews will be arranged, and possibly special chapel services.

The Alumni Secretary, Mr. H. P. Yang, has made arrangements for Alumni Week, April 19-24, during which a series of five lectures will be given by alumni who are engaged in active educational work in Foochow. The central topic of the lectures is "What F.C.U. Education has meant to my Educational Experience". Speakers named above.

Dr. Davis is making a study of the economic relations of the Chinese Church in preparation for the Hangchow Conference in 1938. He and Mrs. Davis spent Tuesday night and most of Wednesday at the university and will be here again tomorrow.

Dr. H. S. Chang, Chief of the Department of Plant Quarantine of the Central Government, with the Government Testing Bureau of Shanghai, is making a trip of inspection throughout South China. He visited F.C.U. last Thursday and showed much interest in our collection of insects and in the work in Economic Entomology. Dr. Chang expressed the hope of returning later to study the problem of injurious insects in Fukien and to look over the F.C.U. collection more thoroughly.

The class of twelve in practical nursing of our Wu Li Ting Rural Service Station was graduated on April 12, the exercises being held at the Sanitary Department of the Fukien Government. Certificates were given to the twelve young women by that Department, which will employ them to do practical nursing among the women and children in the eight villages from which they come.

The F.C.U. clinic, beginning yesterday, is giving a series of three plague inoculations one week apart. This service is open to all students and faculty. Students going to military camp are especially urged to take advantage of it.

President and Mrs. C. J. Lin left yesterday for Shanghai, where President Lin will attend the Biennial Meeting of the National Christian Council, May 5 - 12.

Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Overholt left Foochow the first of the week for Shanghai en route to America. They will leave Shanghai sometime during the coming week. Mail may be sent to them at Indianola, Iowa.

Among the recent additions to our Zoological Museum, the following specimens are of special interest:

A giant sturgeon caught near the mouth of the Min River. It measures about 5 ft. in length and weighs about 56 lbs.

A porpoise, one of the toothed whales, was caught from the Min River near the Five Tigers. The specimen has been identified as *Meomeris phocaenoides* (Cuvier). This is considered to be the first record of whales in the history of Foochow.

A muntjac deer, known scientifically as *Cervulus muntjac* Gmelin, was captured near our campus. The animal has straight horns. The skin of this kind of deer is used rather extensively in Foochow for making shoes.

All of the specimens are being mounted and will be placed on exhibition within a week or two.

Forty-two freshmen and six sophomores leave Tuesday, May 11, for Military Training Camp, Foochow. They will spend two months at camp.

The Students of the Rural Home Economics class gave a program at A-Gie Village, near the university campus, last Monday evening, May 3. The program consisted of a movie, scientific demonstrations, modern play, etc. More than 400 villagers turned out for the occasion. It was the first time many of them had ever seen a movie. Also some of the villagers said it was the first time a woman had ever been on the platform in the temple where the program was given!

The university library has recently received through the International Exchange Service, Nanking, approximately 2000 copies of important publications from various learned institutions of America, France, and Germany. The most valuable and interesting of the publications are those of the Carnegie Institute, Smithsonian Institute, Harvard-Yenching Institute, Field Museum of Natural History, American Museum of Natural History, Museum National D'Historie Naturelle, Societe Francaise de Microscopie, Cornell University, Universities of Minnesota, Washington, Missouri, California, etc., on such subjects as Anthropology, Archaeology, Zoology, Botany, Agriculture, Oceanography, Fishery, etc.

Dr. Francis Chen reports that the officials of Nai-Yeh Island, near Futsing, have asked permission to adopt our Wu Li Ting program on the Island. They have borrowed \$25,000 from the Cooperative Department of the Fukien Government for production purposes in the various villages, to be refunded by the farmers when the crops are harvested. In addition to the \$25,000 borrowed, the Provincial Government has given outright \$800 for rural improvements on the Island.

A survey of the community of Puo A, just across the river from the university, is being planned in connection with the national survey being carried on by the Nanking Theological Seminary of rural churches and their work. The survey will be carried on in connection with classes in rural education.

The Foochow Christian Teachers Association will meet at the university next Saturday, May 15, from 3:00 - 6:00 p.m. The party will leave Foochow by bus at 2:00 p.m.

The Vesper Service on May 16 is FAMILY SUNDAY. All families on the campus are urged to attend the service as families, children and parents together. A special service is being planned for the day. A more detailed announcement will be given in next week's bulletin.

President and Mrs. C. J. Lin plan to leave Shanghai by the Ching-an tomorrow which is due to arrive in Foochow on Tuesday of next week.

Mr. Tai Wen Sai ('33) has been granted a British Boxer Indemnity Scholarship for the study of Astronomy in England. Mr. Tai is now doing graduate work at Yenching University. After a short visit at his home in Amoy in the early part of the summer he will leave for England in August.

Mr. Cheng Tien Hsi ('33), now at Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pa., has been granted a Graduate Assistantship in the Zoology Department at Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois, for 1937-38.

Mr. Lin Wei Chieh ('34) has been granted a special scholarship by the Fukien Government for the study of Ceramics at the College of Ceramics, Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio. Mr. Lin is now teaching in a ceramics school in Chunking, Szechuan. He will leave for America sometime during the summer.

Dr. Henry Chen returned to the campus last Thursday after a short visit to Shanghai.

As the result of a cooperative effort on the part of the Bureau of Reconstruction, Fukien Christian University, and the Agricultural Department of the Foochow Electric Company, 275 pounds (210,000 individuals) of destructive litchi stink bugs were captured this spring. At the close of the campaign yesterday, in the presence of representatives from each of the three institutions, these insects were publicly burned in the village so as to counteract the rumor that they were being used as a source of medicine. Had these insects not been destroyed, and on the basis that half of them were females capable of laying yearly 100 eggs each, the 210,000 insects destroyed could have produced 10,500,000 offspring. The expenditure of the \$300.00 furnished by the Bureau of Reconstruction has already proved to be well worthwhile; practically no stink bugs can now be seen on the trees while the same trees last summer supported a large number of the insects, plainly visible.

Mr. Archie Brankston, Traveling Research Fellow in Chinese Ceramics under the British China Fund (Boxer Indemnity), made a visit to the university campus last Tuesday to see the ceramic collection of Prof. M. F. Farley. Mr. Brankston was greatly interested in the collection and he hopes to return a few weeks later for a longer visit.

The F.C.U. Education Club attended a meeting of the Hwa Nan College Education Club at Hwa Nan last evening. This is the third occasion for the education students of the two colleges to meet together for discussion and for social purposes. The topic for discussion last night was "The Place of Private Schools in a Democratic National System of Education".

The laboratories and offices of the College of Rural Reconstruction have recently been moved to the new Horticulture Building. Among the laboratories housed in the new building are those for Agronomy, Horticulture, Fruit Preservation, Entomology, and Botany. The new quarters are reported to be most satisfactory.

The experiment in rice selection under the direction of Prof. C. R. Kellogg is continued. The second crop is now being planted on the university farm, using twenty-four varieties selected over a period of twenty-three years for number of kernels per head. This in turn will be tested during the summer, selecting the four or five best for further testing and selection next year.

The workmen's library was officially opened last week in the presence of a large gathering of workmen and students who help in the various kinds of work carried on by the Student Christian Association for the laborers on the campus. The beginnings of the library consist of more than 100 books, newspapers, and magazines. Mr. Wang Jen Yu and his co-workers are to be congratulated on the fine piece of work they are doing. Through the night school and other channels they have built up a fine spirit of cooperation and desire for self-improvement among this group of people on our campus.

The F.C.U. News in English and in Chinese has recently been published, edited by Mr. H. P. Yang and Prof. R. Scott, respectively. The Chinese issue carries (1) a full report of Prof. S. Elisseoff's visit to F.C.U. last February, (2) History of the Fukien Culture Society, and (3) a full report of the Government Survey of Waste Lands in South Fukien made under the direction of the faculty of our College of Rural Reconstruction.

Faculty, students; friends: Greetings! The bulletin today again begins its weekly visit to you (bi-weekly for friends abroad). Faculty and students are invited, - nay, urged - to cooperate in making the bulletin a real news organ of the university by sending in news items to Miss Asher at the Treasurer's Office before Friday noon of each week.

In spite of war clouds hanging over this section of the country, Fukien Christian University is going forward with its regular program of study and work as was formerly planned, classes beginning Monday, September 13. Students registered to date number about half of the student body of last year. For the most part, students outside of Foochow have been delayed in coming, due to unsettled conditions and congested transportation service, but we have had word from many of them that they are planning to come.

All students are required to attend the flag-raising and the flag-lowering ceremony daily, except Sunday, at 7:45 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., respectively.

We are happy to welcome back to the "F.C.U. Family" group Professor Edwin Chen who arrived in Foochow from America on September 2. Prof. Chen spent last year at the University of Southern California where he received the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy in Economics.

Prof. and Mrs. R. Scott returned to the campus from Shanghai, via Hongkong, late last evening.

The faculty pre-session conference opened yesterday afternoon with a tea and social hour at the President's Residence, 4:00 - 5:00, followed by a short business session. The evening session opened with the presentation by President C. J. Lin of the subject, "National Developments of Greatest Significance for College Education", followed by discussion, and closed with a devotional service led by President Lin.

The conference continues through today and tomorrow noon. The main subject for presentation and discussion this morning is "The Concept of Curriculum-Guidance and F.C.U. Education", presented by Dean E.M. Stowe. The subject for this afternoon is "Campus Adjustments to war-time Needs." The various committees which have been appointed by the administration to work out plans for this will give their reports, to be followed by general faculty discussion. The topics to be considered are (1) protection against bomb and gas attacks, (2) food production and preservation, (3) physical fitness, (4) community service in war time.

At the Sunday morning session of the conference, the subject "Guidance and Student Life at F.C.U." will be presented by students and members of the faculty, followed by discussion, with the Student Relations Committee in charge. The conference will close at noon with a devotional service led by Dean Li Gwan Fang, - "Religion in Wartime."

Up to noon Friday, September 17, a total of 120 students had registered as students for the current academic year in F.C.U. They are divided by classes as follows: Senior 27, Junior 22, Sophomore 19, Freshmen 38, Visiting 13, Graduate 1. An additional number are coming from Amoy early in the coming week. The Fukien Government is sending a special bus to bring them. A special late examination of 19 candidates for admission was held yesterday and today.

With ~~the~~ exception the entire teaching and administrative staff were on the campus before the opening of the college. In addition to the regular staff, we have two new part-time lecturers giving courses in Education and Chinese studies. Professor Chiang Chi, formerly President of the National Chi-Nan University and now Principal of the Fukien Normal School, is giving a course in "Educational Philosophy". Mr. Yen Shu Hsia, a well-known scholar, poet, and calligrapher, is giving lectures on "Chinese Written Characters", "Comparative Grammar", and "Buddhism in China". We also have two new Graduate Assistants: Miss Lin Siu Ying ('37) in the Department of Biology, and Mr. Chou Chu Shen ('37) in the Department of Chemistry.

Dr. Carol Chen of Hua Nan College who has helped us in the past is again this term giving a course in "Methods in Teaching".

Mr. Huang Yu Shu of our Department of Education is reorganizing the schools in two of the villages under our rural service stations - the school at Nieu Tien and the school at Kwei-chi. The schools are being reorganized to meet the government standards and to provide certain experimental work for the F.C.U. Department of Education. Students in this department will do their practice teaching in these two schools.

✓ A special course on "War-time Knowledge" is being given this term. All students are required to take it. The course is given in six divisions with the following teachers in charge: (1) Gas Defense, Prof. T. H. Wang and Mr. Lin I; (2) First Aid and Public Health in War Time, Mrs. Hui Ching Yen Lin; (3) Communication and War Engineering, Prof. Y. C. Lin and Mr. Kao Tze En; (4) War Economics, Prof. Edwin Chen; (5) International Law in War-time, Prof. Lin Hsi Chien; (6) Food Production and Conservation, Mr. Chu Hsiung.

✓ Special training in physical fitness and military drill will be given three times per week, required of all students, beginning Monday. Faculty and staff members will also participate in this program.

Plans have been worked out for general precaution against air raids, including the installment of a signaling system, light control, providing several places of safety, facilities for fire protection, etc. Mimeographed sheets giving detailed instructions will be sent to residents on the campus very soon.

Also as a war-time measure all of the farm lands on the campus will be planted in food crops, such as potatoes, beans, wheat, and various kinds of vegetables. Some of the crops have already been planted. It is estimated that these food crops can make the campus self-sustaining for about two months.

The Sunday night launch will run as usual, leaving F.C.U. at 8:00 p.m., and leaving the Navy Jetty in Foochow at 9:00 p.m. for the return trip.

The Production Program in our rural service centers for the fall and winter is well under way. More than 60 families in Nieu Tien Village are making a specialty of raising Rhode Island Red chickens, improved stock supplied by the Experiment Station on the F.C.U. campus. Improved stock of goats, also from the F.C.U. Station, is being distributed to the villagers in the various centers. Mr. Lin Ching ('33) is in charge of this extension work.

Mr. Lin En Ching ('35) of the Wu Li Ting Station called together the farmers of Nieu Tien Village yesterday and explained to them the order of the Provincial Government that all idle land must be planted in food crops. A number of the farmers are planning to plant wheat immediately following the harvest of the second rice crop. Our Wu Li Ting Station is cooperating with them and is buying seed wheat for them. Twelve piculs have been bought, and effort is being made to get more. This is the fourth year that the farmers around Nieu Tien have planted wheat.

Dr. Henry S. C. Chen arrived on the campus last night after a six-day trip overland, via Yenping, from Soochow.

Mrs. Edwin Chen arrived yesterday from Shanghai by a special boat arranged by the Fukien Government to bring Fukienese from Shanghai.

The following new assistants have been secured during the last week: Mr. Lin Ta En ('34), Assistant in the Treasurer's Office; Mr. Cheng Chung Fu ('34), Assistant in the Botany Laboratory; Miss Liu Tung Yeh ('36), Assistant in the Entomology Lab.

Rev. Chou Ting Chieh ('31) who returned from England last fall after three years of theological training at Cambridge University and spent last year assisting in the work of the Chinese Community Church at Kulangsu, Amoy, has recently gone to Chang Ting to take up his new work. Chang Ting is in the western part of Fukien, about 260 miles from the coast. Mr. Chou has long cherished the hope of going to this out-of-the-way place to render service to his fellow-countrymen.

The Chinese staff met several days ago to discuss the matter of subscribing to the Liberty Bonds now on sale by the government. It was voted that each member would subscribe for bonds up to the amount of a half month's salary, payment to be made in three monthly installments. A committee was appointed to do follow-up work, as well as to secure contributions of gold and silver articles. The committee consists of Dr. T. H. Cheng, Chairman, Mrs. Hui Ching Yen Lin, Doan Li Gwan Fang, Mrs. Chu Hsiung, and Mr. Lin I.

The cooperative for goat culture at Nieu Tien will have its first meeting this afternoon at the Nieu Tien School, to discuss methods and plans for cooperating with the university in the improvement of local stock, with Mr. Lin Ching ('35) in charge. Ten members from Nieu Tien and neighboring villages have joined the cooperative.

Up to the present time 23 loads of seed wheat have been bought for distribution to the farmers in the Wu-Li-Tang area. The plan is to buy a total of 40 loads but it is difficult to secure good seed wheat.

The students of the Rural Home Economics Research Class, under Dean Li Gwan Fang, took for their project last year Ar Gio Village, near the F.C.U. campus. They made a number of detailed surveys with a view to making various improvements in the village. The work is being continued this year. Last Sunday Dean Li invited the members of the class, Professors Kellogg, Edwin Chen, Chu Hsiung, and Mr. Huang Yu Shu of the Departments of Agriculture and Rural Economics, and twelve of the Village Elders from Ar Gio for lunch, to discuss methods and plans for further improvements of the economic and educational conditions in the village. Waste land of more than 100 mou will be reclaimed for growing wheat, fruit and tung oil trees. A cooperative for the raising of goats and rabbits will be organized, and the whole village will be taught Mandarin and civic knowledge.

Faculty and staff members have subscribed to the Government National Salvation Bonds up to the amount of \$4,000. In addition, practically all of the Chinese ladies on the campus have contributed gold and silver rings, as well as other gold and silver articles.

Mrs. Y. C. Lin and children returned from Hongkong by the "Hai Tan" last Thursday.

The Student Christian Association, through its Service Department, is again this year rendering valuable service to the workmen on the campus, with Mr. Wang Jen Yu ('38) in charge. The program is divided into four parts: (1) Workmen's night school, Mr. Wang Jen Yu ('38), Principal; Mr. Lin Chia Chin ('38), Dean; 10 teachers. (2) Workmen's Self-government Association, 3 student advisors; (3) Workmen's Study Club; 6 students take turns in assisting the workers how to make the best use of the workers library each evening after the classes are over. (4) Workmen's religious service; 4 students responsible for making plans for the Foochow Dialect Service held each Sunday morning for the workmen and their families. A total of 25 students, members of the S.C.A., are assisting in this work.

As a part of the extension work in Animal Husbandry, a pair of pure bred milk goats from the university herd was sent last Thursday to the Forestry Experiment Station conducted by the Bureau of Education at Han-Su (just above Hieu Tien). In exchange, the university will receive plants or trees as desired from the Forestry Station.

Prof. C. R. Kellogg and Mr. Lin Ching visited A-Sie Village Thursday afternoon and discussed with the villagers the possibility of carrying on extension work in poultry culture and goat rearing. The villagers were greatly pleased at the prospects of getting some pure bred chickens and will work out a plan of exchange so that next week the exchange of eggs from the University Experiment Station for the village eggs can be started. It is interesting to note that whereas four or five years ago such an offer excited little interest among the farmers, today in every village visited the people are eager to secure improved stock and to learn better methods of caring for their stock.

The Annual Meeting of the Fukien Christian Educational Association will be held at the Y.M.C.A. in Foochow today, beginning at 8:00 a.m. and lasting until 4:30 p.m., with President C. J. Lin presiding. The general theme is "Education in the Time of Defensive War". Prof. Edwin Chen will give the main address of the day. Prof. E. M. Stowe will conduct one of the four group discussions - Religious Education.

Mr. Cheng Teh Chao ('31) who spent the last two years doing graduate work in the School of Religion, Yenching University, has recently taken up work in the Chinese Y.M.C.A. at Hongkong.

The Student Christian Association held a general meeting last evening, with Mr. Yu Ming Liang, Chairman, presiding. The program was divided into three parts: group singing, led by Mr. Chang Hsien Cheng; Report of the work of the five departments reported in last week's bulletin; devotional service, with Mr. Wen Yao in charge and Dean Li speaking - "Work While it is Day."

A son was born to Prof. and Mrs. Li Chao Ming, in Huchow, several weeks ago.

Prof. C. R. Kellogg and Mr. Lin Ching of the College of Rural Reconstruction took a trip to Futsing about two weeks ago in the interest of agricultural improvements. They found that the people in that district are greatly interested in better farming. After a general meeting in the church attended by the teachers and students of the Christian schools of the city, a smaller group of about thirty preachers and farmer laymen met to discuss the inauguration of a definite plan for agricultural improvement. At this meeting the different problems were discussed and a committee was formed to carry out some of the needed improvements. This committee is fortunate to have as one of its members and as its advisor, Mr. Long, a returned student from the University of Nanking, who can give practical aid to the farmers.

Later another meeting was held in a nearby village where some 50 or 60 farmers and villagers met for a free discussion of their problems. The villagers decided to form a cooperative society through which work in improvement of village conditions can be carried out. Three dozen eggs from the university flock were left with them for hatching, and more will be sent as they are ready for them. Wheat smut was reported to be very bad every year, so the university has sent down some copper sulphate for them to use in disinfecting their seed wheat before planting. In some fields rice was being heavily damaged by the rice stem fly, but unfortunately no control has been worked out for this pest, although it is well-known in India and other parts of the Orient where rice is grown.

The F.C.U. News (in Chinese), Vol. VI, No. 1, is just off the press. It gives a report of the opening of school and the general prevailing conditions up to date. It also carries an article by President C. J. Lin - "National Resistance and our Responsibility." Copies of the News will be sent to all alumni and to the parents of students.

The Education Club will undertake to supply A-Gio and Hui-Gio Villages with war and general news. The work has been divided into three sections: (1) Oral reports, (2) Cartoons and posters, (3) Dramatic and musical performances.

Work was started on a playground in A-Gio Village yesterday afternoon, under the supervision of the members of the class in Rural Home Economics and the F.C.U. Rural Reconstruction Society. The land is contributed by the elders of the village and the labor is enthusiastically given by the school children in the village. A good time was had by all as the work progressed yesterday!

Prof. Edwin Chen spoke over the Foochow Broadcasting Station last night, 7:30, on behalf of the Foochow Cultural Association, appealing to friends of China and lovers of justice and peace to support China in her defensive war.

New students will be admitted to F.C.U. at the beginning of the spring term, 1938, by recent faculty action. This is contrary to the policy followed during the last few years. The change is made to accommodate the large number of students who were unable to reach F.C.U. at the beginning of the present term. The curriculum of the new entrants will be so arranged that they can fit into the regular schedule the following year. Entrance examinations for new students will be held Friday and Saturday, January 21 and 22, 1938.

The Sunday School Teacher Training Class of the Student Christian Association met at the home of Dean E. M. Stowe last week. Mr. Lu Chuan Ho spoke on his Experience in Teaching Sunday School. Dean Stowe and Dean Li spoke on the New Methods and New Materials for Sunday School Work.

The S.C.A. Department of Service to Soldiers is planning to collect medicines, pictures, and old magazines to send to the soldiers at the front.

The F.C.U. faculty and students have contributed 544 sleeveless jackets padded with cotton () for the soldiers at the front: Faculty 206, men students, 257; women students, 81 jackets, respectively. The jackets have already been sent to a Foochow Government Bureau to be forwarded.

The Wu Li Ting Rural Experiment Station has now completed the purchase of seed wheat, 6,000 pounds, for distribution to the village farmers. 1,000 families are availing themselves of this opportunity. Each family will receive 6 pounds of the seed (enough for one Chinese mou), and at the time of harvest in April each must repay an equal amount to the Station. Simple instructions for the best methods of culture have been mimeographed and distributed with the seed wheat.

At Nieu Tien a Cooperative Society for milk-goat rearing has been organized, and two members have already purchased lumber for use in building a new goat house.

The University Poultry Husbandry Station has just purchased three pure bred Peking ducks and will start to rear these valuable fowls. More will be purchased when available.

The Athletic Department of the Student Self-Government Association has worked out a plan for athletic contests for the term: (1) Individual contests, (2) group contests, by classes, dormitories, table seating in the dining room, (3) organized school teams, and (4) long distance running contest.

The Editorial Staff of the F.C.U. Year Book started last spring has decided to suspend publication, due to more pressing matters calling for attention at this time. The material which has been collected will be left with the Faculty Publication Committee.

The F.C.U. Alumni Association has recently appointed two committees for carrying on publicity and promotional work for the association: Publicity Committee: Messrs. Chin Yun Min ('28), Chairman, Lin Chao Wen ('30), Yu Jen Hui ('29), and Chen Chuan ('29); Promotional Committee - Mr. Wu Chao Lien ('24), Chairman, Miss Wang Ya Tze ('34), Messrs. Chiu Tao Keng ('30), Huang Chung Hsin ('35), Li Tung ('35), and George Wu.

As was announced in last week's Bulletin Friday and Saturday of this week are holidays. Thus the Bulletin is issued on Thursday as the administrative offices will be closed for the holidays.

Various student groups and clubs will take advantage of the holidays for outings and village work, as they did last Tuesday, Provincial Day. The Senior Class and a few other students, accompanied by Dean Li Gwan Fang, left early this morning for Ingtai. They will visit a number of the villages between here and Ingtai as well as Ingtai itself to tell the people about what is going on in the war zones in China. They expect to return on Saturday.

On Tuesday, Provincial Day, the student body, under the auspices of the Student Self-Government Association, was divided into six groups with two faculty members to a group, to go to the nearby villages to make friendly contact with the village people and to tell them something of what is going on in China at the present time. A group went to Kwei-Chi village in the evening.

The Student Christian Association will have charge of the chapel services next week in observing the World Students Christian Federation Week of Universal Prayer.

The S.C.A. Department of Service to Soldiers asks that faculty members and students contribute old clothing for the war refugees. Students will go to faculty homes and to the dormitories next week to collect same.

Miss Frances Sparks Fulton of Hwa Nan College, soprano, and Mr. Albert Faurot of Foochow College, pianist, will give a music recital in the university chapel next Thursday evening, November 18, at 8:00 o'clock, by special request from the university.

Prof. C. R. Kellogg received word recently that he is a grandfather; a son was born to his daughter, Mrs. Edward Hoadley of Bloomington, Indiana, on September 25 - John Stephen Hoadley.

Professor Kellogg reports that at the end of the third year of selection the fall crop of rice on the F.C.U. Experiment plot has been harvested, showing some interesting figures. Out of thirteen varieties tested, the poorest variety produced the same weight of seed as the poorest local control variety; the best F.C.U. variety produced 71% more weight of seed than the best local variety; and the average of all F.C.U. varieties produced 39% more weight of seed than the average of local varieties - all in the same field.

A son was born to Mr. and Mrs. Cheng Ching Tuan on November 11.

The Fall Training Conference of the Student Christian Union will be held Sunday afternoon, November 21, at Hwa Nan College, beginning at 1:30 and ending at 8:00. The central theme of this conference concerns the work of the Christian Associations in war-time, specifically with the possibilities of carrying on in Foochow under more difficult conditions than now exist. The main speaker of the day is Dean Li Gwan Fang. About 20 students from F.C.U. will go as delegates. Mr. Wen Shao Erh ('40) is Chairman of the Union.

Messrs. Lin I ('32) and Ting Ping-Hsin ('38) of the Chemistry Department have recently made a study of the use of oil and sawdust as absorbents for poisonous gases. The preliminary results have proved the use of such materials to be very promising as they are available to all Chinese people. Messrs Lin and Ting have designed an effective gas mask which can be made by every family. A simple filter box using Chinese raw materials for use as a means of ventilation in refugee houses has also been worked out by Mr. Lin.

A formal ceremony of the enlistment for military service of the first detachment of citizens of Foochow was held in the city yesterday. A team of ten F.C.U. students led by Mr. Fu Tze Chen attended the meeting. A short speech of encouragement to the young soldiers was given by Mr. Fu.

Recent foreign mails have brought news of the F.C.U. people in America: Both Dean and Mrs. T.H.E. Chen are studying in the University of Southern California. The two children are attending a nursery and kindergarten school where they are taken care of from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. daily. The Chens report that they have met many former Foochow missionaries who are now making their home in Southern California.

Prof. M. F. Farley left New York for Europe on November 3. He will spend some time in study in Paris and later visit some of the outstanding museums of Europe. His address is: American University Union in Europe, c/o Horatio S. Krans, Director, 173 Boulevard Saint-Germain, Paris (VIe), France. Mrs. Farley and the children are in Churchs Ferry, North Dakota.

Prof. and Mrs. W. J. Sutton and family are in Alfred, N. Y. Prof. Sutton is doing some work in Ceramics and Physical Chemistry at Alfred University.

Mr. Tan Jon Mei ('34) continues his study at Crozer Theological Seminary with part-time study at the University of Pennsylvania.

Mr. Cheng Tien Hsi ('33) who completed his work at Dickinson College last June with first honors and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa, is beginning his graduate study at the Ohio State University this fall, his chief field of interest being Economic Entomology and Forestry.

Mr. Lin Kung Hsiang ('34) who finished his work at Allegheny College in June is now at Cornell University where is doing graduate work in Plant Pathology. Mr. Lin reports that Mr. Lin Chuan Kuang, formerly on our staff, is also at Cornell.

Our community was shocked by the sudden death during the week of two of its members: Mr. Huang Chin Yuan ('39), who died after a few hours' illness from cerebral hemorrhage on Monday morning, November 22; and Professor F. P. Beach, who died, after a week in the hospital, of cancer of the liver, on Thursday morning, November 25.

Frederick Paul Beach was born in the year 1876 in Lexington, Michigan. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1898 with the degree of B.S. (E.E.). After mining experience in California, four years with the General Electric Company, and further work in the Edison Company, he decided to become a foreign missionary and entered Oberlin Theological Seminary, where he studied for two years. He then took his B.D. from Union Theological Seminary together with an M.A. in Education from Columbia University, both in 1910. In the same year he came to China and started language study in Foochow. He was appointed to work in Dionglch; and in 1921 he joined the staff of Fukien Christian University as Professor of Education and Psychology. In 1911 he was married to Ruth Porter Ward. His three children survive him, Frances Beach Bingham, Ethel, and Elizabeth.

Mr. and Mrs. Brewster Bingham have issued the following statement concerning Mr. Beach:

"We believe that it is particularly fitting that Mr. Beach should leave us on Thanksgiving Day. We are thankful that he has been spared the pain of a more prolonged illness; we are thankful that he is now with his Heavenly Father, in whose happy service he came to China; we are thankful for our common Christian faith in the life everlasting, believing as we do that he whom we love is not dead but more alive than before and that he has but passed from one room to another in our Father's mansion."

Twenty-seven bound volumes of "Fortune" have been loaned to the university library by Mr. Paul P. Wiant. They have been placed on the general reference shelf in the library.

The Student Self-Government Association, following acceptance by the faculty of their plan to educate near-by communities as to the meaning and progress of the war, initiated their activity on Friday, December 4. The plan calls for these things: Classes to be suspended one day per week for the remainder of the term, these days in rotation. The student body is divided into two main groups, namely (1) Mobile Units, (2) Training Units. The mobile units specialize on some activity to be demonstrated later in the various centers, such activities as gas defense, dramatic presentations, communication, mass singing. The training units deal with purposes to be realized in weekly visits to community centers and include, first aid, food production, current events, military knowledge, etc. There are seven training units. The seventeen groups that visit nearby communities will have in them one representative from each of the seven training units, and a faculty advisor. These groups will thus be prepared to present a well-rounded leadership for the essentials of national defense. The day for this special work is used for training in the forenoon and going to the country in the afternoon for the actual work.

The Student Christian Association holds three regular meetings weekly:
(1) Sunday at 6:00 a.m. - Fellowship meeting
(2) Thursday at 6:15 a.m. - prayer meeting
(3) Friday at 6:45 p.m. - Discussion group for students interested in learning about Christianity.

The S.C.A. has collected from faculty and students 300 pieces of clothing which will be sent to the Hankow Y.M.C.A. for distribution to the refugees.

Professor R. Scott wrote the leading editorials in The Chinese Recorder for September and October. He has also a review article, "A Theology for Christian Missions", in the September issue. The September editorial is entitled "The Bridge Builder" and discusses the influence of Dr. Frank Rawlinson. The October editorial concerns "The Church and the National Crisis".

Last spring one of the progressive farmers in the Cooperative Society of the Puo A Church agreed to plant a small experimental plot of rice and start rice selection work under the direction of the extension service of the university. The summer rice experiment turned out very nicely. The farmer recognized the difference between the individual plants and put away the best ones for seed next year. The story of the fall rice is different: As the harvest approached the farmer noticed that his individual plants were producing heavily, due, of course, to the fact that one plant was given the same space and the same amount of fertilizer as the farmers usually give to four or five plants, and in his enthusiasm he harvested all the plants together and mixed their seeds so it is now impossible to carry on individual selection with those plants. However, the experiment served as an object lesson to the farmers of the village and they agree that there may be something after all in "book learning" and scientific methods.

Please note that the convocation period on Monday, December 13, will be used for a memorial service for Prof. F. P. Beach and Mr. Huang Chin Yuan, with the Student Self-Government Association in charge.

Students and faculty members have entered into the village work, as announced in last week's Bulletin, with great enthusiasm. Classes were suspended on Thursday this week for that purpose. The entire morning was spent in preparation, and all of the groups went out in the afternoon. The area covered includes villages as far down the river as Mill Valley and as far up the river as the outskirts of Foochow, as well as some villages across the river from the university. Both students and faculty report a very fine response on the part of the village people everywhere.

The students and faculty are launching a One-Cent-A-Day Movement, beginning next Monday. The object of the movement is to get everybody on the campus to give at least a cent a day for relief work. Collectors have been appointed for each dormitory to receive money from the donors every Tuesday evening. The receipts will be reported at the flag-raising ceremony Wednesday morning. Bamboo tubes are being prepared for each dormitory and all public buildings on the campus for contributions over and above the cent a day. Funds from this source will also be collected once a week and reported on Wednesday. The money will be held in the university treasury and sent once a month to the National Christian Council for relief work throughout China.

As a result of reports of insect damage to vegetables at Ling-Puo, a village across the river from the university, two members of the Entomology Section of the Department of Agriculture went two days ago to investigate. They found many fields practically ruined and all fields severely injured by flea beetles. Although too late to save the large plants, they were sprayed in several demonstration plots to check the spread of the insects, and the fields of seedlings were also carefully sprayed in order to save the young plants for the winter crop. It is very encouraging to note how fully the spirit of enlightenment and cooperation has replaced the quite recent attitude of suspicion and ignorance among the villagers.

The F.C.U. Alumni in Foochow will meet at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lin Ching ('33) tomorrow morning, for the fourth discussion meeting. Mr. Yu Wen Hui ('29) will speak, followed by a fellowship lunch.

The annual meeting of the F.C.U. Board of Managers will be held this afternoon at the home of Bishop and Mrs. John Gowdy, Foochow.

The choirs of Hwa Nan College and Fukien Christian University will again this year join in giving a Christmas Carol Candle Light Service, which will be given at Tien An Tang Sunday evening, December 19, and at F.C.U. Wednesday, Dec. 22.

The work of the fall term will be wound up in about two weeks time, in order to give our students the opportunity to participate in the provincial movement of working among the people for the next three months. The Government of Fukien has planned to educate and train all the citizens in this province in citizenship, sanitation, production, and general defense measures. This requires a large number of "Instructors". The students above the second year of Senior High School grade are best prepared to undertake this work. Travel and living expenses will be provided by the government. The students themselves will receive two weeks of training before going out. F.C.U. students will join in this important program. Besides helping the village people the students will be greatly benefitted by rendering this practical service; they will learn many lessons from the thrifty and industrious villagers. The teachers for the most part will go with the students so as to guide them in this practical education. Students who fail in this work will not be promoted to higher classes or be allowed to graduate. The spring semester will begin when this period of service ends and will continue through the summer.

Students and faculty went out Wednesday of this week to do village work. The Mass Singing Group consisting of fifteen members, with Miss Lin Ching Hua as Group Leader and Professor Edwin Chen in charge, went by invitation to the Peace Preservation Corps headquarters in Foochow to teach the 200 officers patriotic songs.

A night school has been established for the members of the Co-operative Societies in the vicinity of our Wu Li Ting Rural Experiment Station. About 60 adults meet every evening from 6:40 - 9:00 p.m. for lessons, and from 6:00 - 8:00 a.m. for military training. The staff members of the Experiment Station are the teachers of this school.

Professor Kellogg reports that "A trip through the Wu Li Ting region is a joy to any one who is interested in seeing things grow. On both sides of the road and extending back to distant villages are extensive fields of winter wheat, - not only serving to cover the usually bare and ugly winter fields with a cloak of living green, but also giving promise of an added food supply to a people facing a food shortage, if not actual starvation, due to the blockade of an enemy power. Thus cooperating with the government at Wu Li Ting is one of the ways in which F.C.U. is doing her bit in this time of national crisis."

We are happy to again greet the friends and students of the university through the medium of the Weekly Bulletin after a long silence. We announced in the last Bulletin that our students would participate in a province-wide program of mass education and defense extending over a period of three months. A group of men students and a group of women students have been in various places in South Fukien, and a group of men in North Fukien. The women students returned last Thursday, and the men from South Fukien last evening. The North Fukien group is expected any time. Registration yesterday and today for new students, and Monday and Tuesday next week for old students, with classes for the spring semester beginning on Wednesday, May 4.

For the benefit of friends abroad we report briefly on conditions in Fukien. There have been waves of tenseness from time to time, and plenty of rumors most of the time, but Fukien has not yet been invaded. The airport in Foochow has been bombed eight times since February 24, the last time being April 27. During the first raid there were a few casualties among the people who lived just back of the airport. The government immediately arranged for the people to move away from that village and there have been no further casualties. The total damage done is negligible. We do not expect serious trouble in Fukien in the near future, although the Japanese air and naval forces will probably continue to operate in South China.

A new plan was adopted for the academic work of the spring term by faculty vote of April 28. The semester is divided into two sections. All courses taken in each section will be completed within that period. The first period is from May 4 to June 25, and the second, from June 27 to August 20. In adopting this plan it becomes necessary to reduce by half the number of courses offered at one time and to double the times of meeting. Thus a semester course of three credits will meet six times per week, for which three full semester credits will be given.

We are happy to welcome to F.C.U. the following new faculty members:

Miss Ni Hsueh-wei, Acting Dean of women. Miss Ni, whose home is in Shaoshing, Chekiang, holds a B.A. degree from Ginling College; M.A. from Iowa State University. She has served as Dean of Studies in the Bridgman Girls School, Shanghai, Principal of the Union Girls School, Hangchow, and for the last five years Dean of Women, the Institute of Political Science and Public Administration, Nanking. Miss Ni will also give some courses in Education.

Miss Chen I-Chueh, Lecturer in Psychology, B.A. Syracuse University; M.A., Columbia University; Professor of Psychology in Amoy University for the last fourteen years. Miss Chen is a native of Tung-an, South Fukien.

Mr. Lin Cheng-Yao, Lecturer in Agronomy and Plant Breeding, B.S., College of Agriculture and Forestry, University of Nanking; M.A., Cornell University. Mr. Lin spent the last year doing additional graduate study and research work in rice breeding and sugar cane at the University of Louisiana. Mr. Lin is a native of Foochow.

Mr. Yang Shih-Fu, Research Assistant in Agriculture; B.S., School of Agriculture and Forestry, University of Nanking. Later served in agricultural service in Northwest China, and recently in Fukien as head of the Forestry Division of the Bureau of Reconstruction and Director of the Foochow Forestry Station. Native of Tung-an, South Fukien.

Mr. Li Yi-Ying ('29) and Miss Chen Nien-Hsuan ('35), Chemistry Department, both of whom have previously served on the F.C.U. staff.

Mr. Lin Kwan-te of Anglo-Chinese College (M.A., Northwestern University) is giving a course in Meteorology at F.C.U. during the first Section of the Spring Term. Mr. George Wu of the same school (M.A., University of Southern California) is giving a course in Sociology.

Dean T.H.E. Chen who is now doing graduate work at the University of Southern California, has accepted the invitation of the University to give a course in Comparative Education in the Summer School Session.

Professor Malcolm F. Farley who has been studying at the University of Paris since last fall went to London in February and lectured before the Oriental Ceramic Society of Great Britain at the invitation of Mr. Eumorfoupoulos. He was most cordially received by Mr. Eumorfoupoulos and a number of the other experts in the field of Oriental Ceramics, including Mr. Hobson of the British Museum. Professor Farley went to the Near East in March. He expects to leave Paris the latter part of June and to arrive in New York early in July.

Dr. W. Y. Chen of our Psychology and Religion Departments, now on leave of absence serving as the General Secretary of the National Christian Council, is spending a few weeks in Foochow.

Mrs. Li Chao Ming and her four children finally succeeded in getting through to Shanghai from Mokanshan where they had been for the last four or five months. They will come to Foochow as soon as they can secure transportation accommodation.

Mr. Li Lai-yung ('30), a member of the staff of Lingnan University, Canton, has been granted a teaching fellowship by the Pennsylvania State College for work in Agriculture during the coming year.

The group of 38 students who spent three months doing country work in North Fukien, near Chung-an the last six weeks, returned to Foochow on May 5. They were delayed a few days on account of transportation difficulties, but they made good use of their time working in Chung-an. The whole city turned out to bid them farewell when they left.

Mr. Tsai Chao Siu ('33) plans to visit Foochow soon. He will work among the Student Christian Associations of Foochow schools. Mr. Jack McMichal will come with him. Mr. McMichal is visiting student work in China this year with the expectation of spending next year traveling among the Student Christian Associations of America representing his experiences here.

A group of our Agricultural faculty consisting of Messrs. Chu Hsiung, Chou Chu Shen, H. Y. Hwang, Lin Ching, and Yang Shih-fu went to Shaowu a few weeks ago to make a detailed study of the best ways and means to meet the most outstanding rural needs of North Fukien, and to take practical steps to open an agricultural experiment station and extension service there. Mr. Chou and Mr. Yang remained in Shaowu to make a survey of the agricultural land and to carry on further negotiations with the Hsien authorities with a view to opening a school for farmers next fall.

The work of the Wu Li Ting Rural Experiment Station has been considerably expanded. The area covered has been extended to the Water Gate in the city and to Mamoi on the South. At the request of the government the Station will undertake to expand its poultry work to reach about 13 of the Hsiens (counties) of the province. The poultry station on the F.C.U. campus is also increasing its facilities so as to provide about 3000 pure bred eggs per month for distribution throughout the province. Pure bred eggs will be sent to the agriculturist in each Hsien and the eggs distributed to the members of the cooperative societies. Hybrid eggs will also be produced in these centers and distributed to farmers in the locality.
