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

Crellin 1550 San Pasqual Street Pasadena, California Dear Mrs. Crellin: Your memorandum posted July 6th from Pasadena rasises questions regarding the use of \$10,000 donated by your family for Ginling College. May I say that our records of the conditions surrounding gifts for buildings stated that a memorial building would be named in honor of the donor, provided \$30,000 would be given. In the case of lesser sums of sizable proportion, a memorial tablet would be placed in a particular building designated. Something like ten years ago such a tablet commemorating the gift to your mother was put up in the Arts Building on the Ginling campus at Nanking and all who used that building were aware of the fact that such a donation had been made. Cinling never had a president by the name of Inex Seymore. Mrs. Lawrence Thurston was its first and only foreign President -Dr. Wu yl-fang having succeeded her in 1928 and is still the President. Fortunately, the Chinese Government sent Dr. Wu on a special mission to the United States and our office is now her headquarters. Consequently, we are in a position to check very definitely and we have also been able to verify the statement through gifts received by the various boards associated with Ginling. I trust you will correct any impressions which may have been given regarding the use of funds in the erection of Cinling as there was no other project in China which costs so little for the raising of funds. Chester 5914 Locust Avenue Philadelphia, Pennsylvania April 1939 Miss Dzun-mei Hwang Ginling College Chengtu, Szechwan, China Dear Miss Hwang: I take pleasure in giving this notification of your appointment as a Barbour Scholar for the academic year 1939-40 with a stipend of \$650.00 and University fees. Please send a letter of acceptance at your early convenience. This letter is notice solely of your appointment as a Barbour scholar on the condition that you shall be accepted as a student by the proper Dean, and shall be admitted to the United States of America under the student section of the United States Immigration Act. The proper credentials showing your acceptance by the University and right to a vise as a student by the American consul will presumably be issued, however, and if so will come to you in another communication from Mr. Shirley W. Smith, Vice-president of the University of Michigan. My letter is not to be taken as admission to the University or as giving you authority for the Consular vise. The Barbour Scholarship Committee desires to cooperate with the University Health Service to decrease the danger of tuberculosis among our foreign students. Your former medical certificate appears satisfactory, but Dr. Forsythe of the Health Service requires an additional certificate including a reliable x-ray examination. We trust that you will take all necessary precautions before leaving for Ann Arbor. All Barbour scholars will be required to live in University residences for women and you will receive a letter from Miss Alice C. Lloyd, Dean of Women, concerning room reservations and other matters pertaining to life in Ann Arbor. I thust that you will plan to reach Ann Arbor in time to register September 21, 1939, before beginning work at the opening of the fall semester. Please send a preliminary letter to me and follow it later by giving full details concerning your trip to America, including the name of the steamship and steamship schedule, date of sailing and expected date of arrival. To be met in Ann Arbor, a letter should be sent to the office of the Dean of Women, Barbour Gymnasium, Ann Arbor, Michigan, giving the name of the railroad and the number of the train by which you are arriving and the time due in this city.
