Dear Admiral Yarnell:

So conscious have we been of the value of your appreciation of what the China Colleges are doing that you would have had frequent requests from us for your sponsorship of projects in our program, were it not that we are very much aware of the many demands which are being made upon you. The booklet entitled "An Impressive Service", of which a copy is being sent to you under separate cover, is deriving a good deal of its effectiveness from your words which accompany the pictures on the double-page spread at the center. We are finding this booklet of great help in all the communities where we are working and this is only one of the reasons why we think of you gratefully.

I am now facing a relatively small problem to which I know you will have an immediately sympathetic reaction. It is the providing for Miss Minnie Vautrin of the \$1000 necessary for her expenses in this country next year. Her own salary in United States currency would do practically nothing toward giving her what she needs in rest and refreshment of mind and body, including a suitable wardrobe and travel. I feel certain that it will be possible to secure this sum without very much effort and if you find yourself able to send me a brief note which I can quote as I approach donors, I should very much appreciate your help. You have already said many times that you honored Miss Vautrin for her superb service in Nanking and now that she has gone through three war years, and is to spend one ~~year~~ in this country in preparation for a return to that severe task of education and reconstruction centered in Ginling, I feel certain that you would approve of our putting at her disposal a minimum budget for the year.

To the list of Newport residents derived from our meeting there of last September we have so far confined ourselves to sending a bulletin without any appeal for gifts. Two or three gifts totalling \$305 came in without appeal last autumn. Mrs. Cushman now agrees that sufficient time has passed so that we can give these people an opportunity to contribute, and I should be glad to have you tell me whether or not you think this fund for Miss Vautrin's furlough year is a suitable one to present to the Newport group? If you do approve, of course we will take very special care to write up the work which Miss Vautrin has been doing briefly but in sufficient detail to show its significance.

There goes to you under separate cover a packet of latest Ginling news.
