



We received on March 29th your telegram as follows: FOLLOWING CABLE RECEIVED FROM OUR CHINA REPRESENTATIVE WILLIAM FENN. QUOTE HANGCHOW CURRENT UNRECEIVED NEED THIRTEEN AMERICAN THOUSAND. GROWING SEPARATION FUKIEN. ADVISING MINIMUM PROGRAM URGING DIRECTORS MEET CHUNGKING UNQUOTE. RULAND WRITING YOU.

We have waiting until this time to write you because Dr. Ruland's letter has not been received.

We did receive a letter from Dr. Ruland dated March 9, 1943, but we gather that he is writing another letter since receiving the above cable. In response to Dr. Ruland's letter of March 9th we cabled to our Dr. Frank W. Price in Chengtu as follows: REMITTING FIVE THOUSAND ADVANCE ON SUSTAINING FUND THIRTEEN THOUSAND FOR HANGCHOW AND FOUR THOUSAND FOR MIDDLE SCHOOL (STOP) CABLE AS YOU NEED ADDITIONAL.

On March 23rd we wrote Dr. Price as follows with reference to this matter:

"I thought it would be well to give you some more information regarding the recent remittance of \$5000.00 and the cable which I sent you on March 15th.

The Committee was delighted to make the appropriation of \$4000.00 for the Middle School and I now have received something over \$10,000.00 from the Board of Christian Colleges in New York for Hangehow College and I am expecting to receive about \$3000.00 more. There will be a small charge as our pro rata of the expense of this campaign but I should have something like \$13,000.00 available for Hangehow which I am now placing at your disposal. This is agreeable to the Secretaries of the U. S. A. Board in New York. I thought it would be best to send you \$5000.00 as an advance on these two items and let you cable as you need additional funds.

Dr. Ruland of the U. S. A. Board was perfectly agreeable to send this Hangchow money through you but he thought it would be well to suggest the advisability of having some definite person in West China act as the

receiving treasurer of Hangchow College Funds so that in the future we may know to whom to send our regular appropriations. He further advises that Mr. Glenn 7. Fuller of the Associated Mission Treasurers office now in Chungking is acting as treasurer of all their work in Free China and has given most satisfactory service. Dr. Ruland thinks we should consider the advisability of having him act as receiving agent for our Hangchow College funds.

I simply give you Dr. Ruland's suggestion for whatever it may be worth as certainly for the present we want you to handle the Hangehow funds in any way that seems best to you."

The above will indicate to you that we have already cabled Hangchow College Funds to our Dr. Price in West China and that the matter of a definite person to act as receiving treasurer of Hangchow College Funds in West China is before him, and under consideration by us. When we hear further from Dr. Ruland, if there are other matters for discussion, we will be glad to communicate with him.

I received your wire today and am answering it by letter because I could not give you the complete information in a wire.

In June we cabled \$10,000.00 to Hangchow Christian College and just the other day we cabled an additional \$5,000.00. Of the \$15,000.00, \$3,500.00 was our Committee's regular appropriation for Hangchow Christian College and the balance \$11,500.00 was from the Sustaining Fund. We do have our books \$5,000.00 but some of this money is to be refunded to you for Hangchow's prorata part of the Sustaining campaign and we have been waiting to have a statement from you before sending you this money.

Evidently Hanghcow is in need of every available dollar at time time so suppose you let us know how much is to be paid into your office and we shall send the balance of the \$5,000.00 immediately.



Dear Mr. Hearn: I am amazed to find from your letter of October 5th that you have not received notice from our office regarding the balance due from Hangehow. The 1941-42 allotment was \$587.38 and in 1942-43 it was \$920.61, making a total of \$1,507.99. The actual computation for both of these years is as follows: Appropriation 1941-42 \$609.00 Less share 1940-41 Surplus 21.62 Balance 1941-42 \$587.38 Appropriation 1942-43 1153.86 Less share 1941-42 Surplus 233,25 Balance 1942-43 920.61 \$1507.99 In addition to the regular appropriation for the current year the United China Relief granted us \$65,000 additional for faculty relief, of which, according to recommendations from China, \$2,000 was allocated to Hangchow. As our Executive Committee instructed the Treasurer to send this to the field immediately, this money was sent to Glenn Fuller at Chungking with instructions to distribute it for the purpose designated. Thank you for your letter of November 20, advising the amount you have sent to China for Hangchow College. It is difficult for us here to understand why United China Relief insisted upon sending their funds direct to China, rather than having them go through the books here as in former years.

I am sure you can understand my position here as Secretary Treasurer of the Hangchow Board. All my instructions come from the Hangchow Board and I have never forwarded funds to China except on their instructions. In addition to that it would seem that all receipts and expenditures should be made from this office, otherwise, my records would never be complete.

You understand, of course, that my personal feelings do not enter into this, but it is just a question of meeting my responsibility to the Hangchow Board as their Secretary Treasurer.

Are you in position to give me some idea of how much money Hangchow may expect this year from the Sustaining Fund Campaign? I have been asked that question a number of times, but find no intimation in my office regarding the probable amount you expect to send.

I have read your letter of November 23rd with great interest.

I sympathize with you in your position one hundred per cent and in two other instances I have been compelled to soothe the hard feelings of trustee treasurers who face your same predicament. One thing I failed to do was to notify you immediately of the procedure which would be followed, but there was some hope that we could modify it. However, I am afraid that hope has vanished.

The situation is this:- The United China Relief includes two agencies which are ever pressing for increased appropriations. At the same time they have not made a report on funds supplied by U. C. R. and used in China. It was also true that some of our Colleges did not make reports to the United China Relief in Chungking. We agreed to insist that reports be made in the hope that we would be permitted to still handle our own funds as received from U. C. R. The other agencies failed to make this promise and as a consequence the U. C. R. finally voted that all funds appropriated for any agency must be sent to China through the U. C. R. comptroller.

The picture is further complicated by the new exchange rate and the fact that the field budgets are based on local currency. I am told by Mr. Dwight Edwards, China Representative of U. C. R. who is now in U. S. A., that the college budgets were based upon anticipated inflation amounting to 44%. Thus 56% of the total for all of the Colleges, amounting to \$77,000, represented the actual present needs. However, provision would be made for inflation on the basis of actual rise of price indices which was estimated to be about 10% per month and that this extra inflation appropriation would be added to the local currency monthly appropriation until the full inflationary budget would be paid if it was needed, or if the exchange rate did not rapidly accelerate to keep pace with the inflation.

It is also necessary to deposit the money received from U. C. R. with the United Clearing Board in the National City Bank before the fifth of each month. There is very little time to make any investigation or give much thought to the picture as our check from U. C. R. usually comes to hand on the fourth

Frankly, I should have talked with you about this problem, but Dr. Ruland is across the street and upon his suggestion I let the Hangchow money to to China.

You ask about the amount of money which Hangehow may expect and the only answer I can give is that we have allocated \$1,288,040 local currency for Hangehow, but we do not know what that will be equal to in U. S. currency. The best I can do at the present time is to promise that we will not let it slide another month without notifying each of the Colleges our interpretation of the situation when the funds are sent to the field. It must be borne in mind, however, that this is not final as the distribution will be made upon the actual needs in China at the time the money is distributed.

This is all very unsatisfactory and requires a tremendous amount of work here and a constant exchange of cables with the field. There is one redeeming aspect in that we feel that the United China Relief will see the Colleges through this terribly unsettled condition.

My dear Mr. Evans:

I appreciate your letter of November 27, but it is not quite clear to me and I would therefore, appreciate it very much if you would answer certain questions I have in mind.

Is it true that all of the funds from the Sustaining Fund Campaign come from the United China Relief? I have never seen a complete statement of the Treasurer of the Associated Boards but your Annual Report of June 30, 1944, seems to indicate that you do get in the neighborhood of \$200,000.00 from other sources. It was always my understanding that the Sustaining Fund Campaign came into being before the United China Relief began extending aid to the c-lleges and that the Sustaining Fund Campaign was quite an organized effort on the part of the Associated Boards to raise funds for the colleges from different individuals and organizations throughout the country. Your letter would seem to indicate that United China Relief has taken over the support of the colleges. Of course, if they are putting up all of the money I guess they have a right to say how and when it is to be sent to China.

Maybe my lack of information is due to the fact that I have not received a copy of your Treasurer's Report, the one that Dr. North called for at the last meeting of the Associated Boards. It seems that this statement is submitted to the Executive Committee and the rest of us don't get a true picture of the set-up at all. I have never understood about the Sustaining Fund Campaign expense. Does all of this expense go to United China Relief for the expense of securing their donations?

Another question, who makes the allotment for funds to the different colleges? Is that done by United China Relief also?

Your letter of December 2nd is just about worn out. It is frazzled around the edges and has on it a lot of finger marks all of which are my own or my Secretary's. It is all because that it has been in my current file and also because you said 'when I found a convenient time you would appreciate the answer to a few questions.'

First of all I wasn't very diplomatic, was I when I brought up the subject of Treasurer. I am one myself and I know just how it comes home so you will have to charge this against tactlessness.

Another reason for not writing was that I had hoped that before this time the Special Committee from the Associated Boards on Emergency Askings would have met and taken some responsibility for the present uncertainty which is existing. However, I can answer several of the questions which you have raised.

Not all of the funds which are going to China and called Sustaining Funds are derived from the United China Relief. Last year's Annual Report showed that we raised a total of \$996,123.08 for what was called Sustaining Funds, out of which \$157,196.48 was raised by the Associated Boards, and the balance coming through United China Relief. We could have raised a much larger sum ourselves but we never could have reached the total of nearly a million dollars. To put it otherwise, United China Relief permits us to carry on an educational program which brings us in a considerable amount of money outside of the gifts from United China Relief.

You are quite right in your conclusion that there was an organized effort on the part of the Associated Boards to raise funds for the colleges prior to the organization of United China Relief. When that came into existence our direct campaigning for funds ceased. The National War Fund now is still above the United China Relief and is more insistent

Mr. Curry B. Hearn - 2 -January 31, 1945 than ever that we do not broadcast our appeals for relief for the colleges. I am going to 'jump the gun' and let you have a copy of the Annual Report of the Treasurer of the Associated Boards, even though it has not been considered by the Executive Committee. There has not been a meeting of this Committee this year but it is hoped that one can be called the latter part of February. Possibly this report will answer some of the questions you have in mind. We do not receive any support for our office from United China Relief. All of their expenses, likewise, are paid from funds approved by the National War Fund. The allotement to the individual Colleges has been made solely upon the basis of budgets which we have received from the Colleges in China and then approved also by the Committee on Special Emergency Askings here in New York and the Finance Committee as well. We have never given all of the Colleges all that they have asked for but we have never changed the ratio of the gifts as related to the total amount.

I have been hoping that you would be here in the vicinity of New York one of these days and that I would have the opportunity of talking with you.



This Committee met on May 8th and its report subsequently was approved by the Associated Boards. From the attached schedules you will observe that Mangchow Christian College has received the following amounts covering the period from July 1st to December 30th, representing receipts from United China Relief.

Dear Mr. Hearn:

We have been able to secure action on the distribution of United China Relief Funds received through the Associated Boards and distributed in China through the United Clearing Board and the United China Relief Office in Chungking.

No funds were distributed to Hangehow on the last six months of the year (January 1st to June 30th). There was, however, an adjustment of funds received during the first half of the year and not distributed. For Hangehow this amounted to \$2,276 or 10\$282,224, which you may enter on your Hangehow books by journal entry as an additional amount distributed in China.

Taking into consideration the funds which we reported to you some time ago and this distribution of \$2,276, it will be seen that Hangehow has received US\$5,686.00 or IC\$703,321.40 through this channel during the past twelve months.

My dear Bob:

Enclosed I am sending you a copy of a letter just sent me from Lloyd Ruland's office in New York. It is from Baen E. Lee concerning the situation of Hangchow Christian College.

You will remember the paragraph on page 11 of the long letter from Frank Price, which paragraph was written on October 1. The paragraph was as follows:

"Conferences today with President Baen Lee of Hangchow Christian University and also with a group of HCU alumni. The alumni have been carrying on a college in Shanghai in cooperation with Soochow University but have recently separated to maintain their own life. Baen Lee wants to take back the property at Hangchow (which has been rather badly damaged in parts) and start a Middle School and Freshman Class there. The former property at Shaowu, Fukien, has been rented for 360,000 a year. The trees on the Hangchow campus are in better condition than he expected said President Lee. It is up to the Board of Managers on the field to decide and I am taking letters back to S. C. Leung, the Chairman in Chungking, and will have talks with friends in the Ministry of Education. The alumni want a new president. I wish McMullen were here to consult with the Board."

Do I gather that there is some dissatisfaction with Baen Lee? Of course there should be a cordial understanding with the Board before money is sent. I would appreciate it, and I know the Executive Committee will, if you will drop me a line giving me your advice on such matters. We must rely upon you for help here.

I am wondering if you got up to New York to the meeting of the Planning Committee? In today's mail comes a notice from Earle H. Ballou calling a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Associated Boards for December 10, 1945, at 2 p.m. in Room 900, 150 Fifth Avenue, New York.

Dr. R. J. McMullen - page 2. This meeting is called to consider two main items of business. First, the Planning Committee's report, and second, consideration of radiograms received from Dr. Fenn raising questions of general policy. If you did not get up to the Planning Committee and can make this Executive Committee meeting on December 10 in New York, I believe it would be well. Don't you? Please use your judgment. It is important in this gap for us all to keep in touch with the situation. Warm regards. Cordially your friend, Acting Executive Secretary. HKT/b

To the Members of the China Survey Committee

Dear Friends:

In the letter which was mimeographed and sent to you a few days ago I endeavored to open the way for recommendations and suggestions from any of you with regard to matters that the Executive Committee will be faced with here on December 11. In a special way today I wish to write to you members of the Survey Committee which has been set up by the Executive Committee.

You can readily see that just in this gap there are matters arising from time to time on which decision must be made even before the members of the Survey Committee can reach the field. Each day, too, brings additional reports as to just what the situation out there in China now is. In advance of the December 11 meeting of our Executive Committee I have just thought it well to write to you friends seeking any light and suggestions which you might have.

In particular I should like to speak of the fact that Revs. Richardson, Price (and Mrs. Price), and Hopkins are now in Shanghai, and that communications from them from time to time will be before the Executive Committee. We are endeavoring to share with all the missionaries anything germane in such communications.

The question at once arises as to what the Executive Committee's attitude should be toward suggestions and recommended judgment of these friends now on the field. Of course we are all greatly indebted to some of these communications already. I may say that Dr. and has. Price are expecting to come home on furlough in the spring of 1946. Dr. Richardson, as you know, is serving as Co-Director of UNRRA in Kiangsu Province, and should be of immense assistance to us in our work there. Dr. Hopkins is anxious to get back up to Tenghsien; latest reports were that travel on from Shanghai could not be had on the railroad beyond Manking.

Asking your cooperation and continued prayer with and for the Executive Committee in all of its service, and particularly for the December 11 meeting, I am, with warm regards.
