Dear Mr. Parker:

I recently received the minutes of the meeting of the committee on Faculty Scholarships.

I do not know the correct procedure to make for a request; therefore, I am asking if it would be possible to consider a young woman who is in this country studying at Princeton University at Westminster Choir.

Betty Ling is a graduate of Hwa Nan College and has, through the interest of Dr. Felton, entered Westminster Choir School. She has been there two years and feels that she will have need of one more year. Her plan is to return, if possible, by August of 1943. Financial aid has been coming through two sources: one, a personal family who have had to cut down their giving this past year; and I have personally sponsored interest in \$300 toward this scholarship. She will go back to Hwa Nan to be on the faculty.

If there is any way in which we can secure some aid from the scholarship fund of the Associate Boards, I shall be most grateful. Whenever it is necessary to have details before you, I shall be glad to do all I can to assemble the necessary data.

Dear Mrs. Peel:

I have your letter of February 4 in which you ask about the possibility of scholarship help for Betty Ling of Hwa Nan College. From what you say about her, I should think that her case is one which could be considered by the Committee. I, of course, cannot judge as to the merits of the case until we have the details, but if she is definitely expected to return to Hwa Nan as a faculty member, her case would properly come under the consideration of our Faculty Scholarship Committee. Ordinarily we require that candidates have the application made through the president of the college, but, of course, under present conditions, this would be very difficult to do.

If you will get together all the details which you can find, giving Miss Ling's educational background as far as possible both in China and here in America, together with an indication of the minimum amount of money needed for finishing up her work, I will be glad to take it up with the Committee at the earliest possible opportunity. We would also need to know whether she has to have anything additional for the present school year or whether her request is only for the 1942-43 school year.





Dear Mr. Evans:

First of all, in behalf of the Hwa Nan Board of Trustees, we wish to thank you and Mrs. Mills for your presence and your deep interest in the work of Hwa Nan College. We were very sorry indeed that no recent report had come, but since this seemed the rule rather than the exception this year, it was not quite as impressing as it might otherwise have been.

I hope that through Associated Boards' office, you will endeavor to make direct contact with President Wang herself.

I discussed the matter, as you will recall, concerning Mei Yu Kuo of Carleton College. She is an exchange student on the Frank B. Kellog Fellowship at Carleton College and will this year complete her academic work. She came here as an undergraduate, having taken entrance examinations for Yencheng, but because of war conditions, it was decided best for her to come to the United States rather than have her curriculum disturbed. This scholarship which she receives is one which originated from the generous contribution of Mr. Kellog and is for Chinese students in America and American students in China. Mei Yu Kuo has been on the honor roll. President of the institution recently said she was doing a very splendid piece of work. Her hope is to continue in post-graduate work in an institution which will give her a good training along the line of medical social service work. She can get a scholarship at the University of Chicago; however, she will need sufficient funds to take care of her room and board in addition. She indicated to me that she would be most happy if some plan could be made for her to go to Columbia University. I understood from her that there is an Elizabeth Gamble Fellowship which is awarded to foreign students. This Fellowship amounts to \$1,200 for the school year, but there are hundreds of Oriental women applying for it. Since she is youngain this field. I believe she feels that ther opportunities are not great along this line; however, I believe she would make good if such an opportunity came her way. This is a long letter of explanation, but I want to be sure that Mei Yu Kuo is considered in the line of the 950 Chinese students who are on the hearts of all of us. I shall leave this with you for consideration.

I know she will appreciate hearing from you on the action of the Committee for this grant.


May I express to you my personal appreciation for your interest and helpfulness in obtaining this scholarship fund.

We have tried in every way to get some word regarding the situation at Yenping but without success. I have conferred with Miss Robinson and she has had no word.


The only total budgets we have on hand in our office cover the Chengtu group and Fukien Christian University. Others are estimates based upon such information as we found available or upon previous expense. In the case of Hwa Man, there was nothing and being put to it to make an estimate, we submitted a figure of \$12,500.00 as the requirements for 1942-43.

It is unfair to unduly criticise the field for not getting information through, as it is quite possible they have made the effort and failed. On the other hand, if anything is to be done for them, certainly they should keep us informed, as in every case in Free China, we have been able to get information through some source.

I am also acknowledging your card of June 26th informing us of the receipt of \$10.00 from Mrs. Ralph Wood. I do not find that this remittance has reached us as yet.


We were very happy to receive your Hwa Nan budget. War time difficulties of transportation have played havor with our communications with the field. It was unavoidable, but nevertheless unfortunate, that it was necessary for us to make our annual application to United China Relief on behalf of all of the Colleges before receiving the Hwa Nan budget.

During the coming year United Chine Relief has agreed to underwrite the Sustaining Fund of the Christian Colleges in Chine. This fund was made up on the basis of the budgets on hand. In the case of live Nan we took an average of the per capita amount sought by the other institutions, and therefore assigned to Hwa Nan \$12,500. Thus the Hwa Nan emergency request of \$26,416 amounts to more than twice the per capita askings for the other colleges in China.

I em, of course, aware that the per capita method is very rough, but it seemed to be the most feasible. I am embarrassed concerning the best mathod of dealing with Hwa Nan's needs, partly because this request is far larger than that of Ginling College, which last year had more than three times as many students as Hwa Nan. I trust you realize we are eager to do everything in our power to help Hwa Nan College. Please tell me what you think should be done in this instance. United China Relief has already passed on the askings and at the moment I do not see how it would be possible for the Associated Boards to secure the difference between \$12,500 and \$26,416.

I hope you have had a delightful summer on the shores of lake Superior. We are looking forward to seeing you again when you visit New York.



Dear Mrs. Peel:

At the last meeting of the Committee on Allocations of the Associated Boards, I was delegated to write you regarding further requests from China for additional assistance toward Hua Nan.

You will recall that the budget which was submitted to us included certain items which quite rightly were conceded capital expenditures and some items were anticipated expenditures against the return to Foochow. With these deducted the total askings for 1942-43 approximated \$13,500 which the Associated Boards Allocations Committee was willing to accept as the proportion of funds for relief and rehabilitation to be received from the Associated Boards.

You are aware of the drastic increases in cost of commodities in China and of the adjustments which some Mission Boards have considered toward meeting these advances. However, Fukien Province suffered less than the West China area and the Boards operating in Fukien have made allowances of approximately 50% less than those required for Szechwan Province.

Lately, a cabled request came from China asking for the full \$25,000 originally included in the askings from the field. It is interesting to mote that the total U. S. funds anticipated from regular sounces included in the budget amounted to \$10,635.40; whereas, the Associated Boards is asked to supply more than twice that amount. This is aside from the estimated salaries for eight foreign missionaries.

But let us return to the requests for 1943-44. The first estimates sent us under date of December 16, 1942 asked for \$50,000. Yesterday a cable came to hand revising Hwa Nan's askings to \$72,700. Of course, these figures are impossible and the Board of Trustees of Hwa Nan must find some other means of support, if these requests are genuine. Unfortunately, our representative, Dr. Fenn, has been compelled to accept telegraphic figures in China as he has not been able to visit the institutions in Fukien in person. He has planned a trip to this area for the latter part of January and we will know more about the situation after that time.

"Mrs. Peel January 8th, 1943. Here in America, the situation is greatly complicated because the President's War Relief Control Board will limit China relief appeals next year to a short campaign in the Fall - the rest of the time being made available for the V. S. O. and Red Cross. At the present time there is every indication that United China Relief will have much less money to disburse this coming year than at the present time. We have been asked by United China Relief to present our figures for 1942-43 and all the Colleges are asking for more, none, however, in the same proportion as Hwa Nen. As you know, I have personally always subscribed to the idea that any properly constituted group in America could justifiably operate an additional institution in China if proper support was provided. It becomes another matter, however, when such an institution goes before the general public with an appeal to support the institution. As acting Executive Secretary of the Associated Boards. I am bearing the brunt of the criticisms which are leveled at us by individuals within the United China Relief and I must confess that my defense is greatly weakened by the fact that last year Hwa Man enrolled seventy-two students. We have requested figures for this year but none have been received and we do not know the present enrollment. If you can give us light upon this subject, it would be greatly appreciated. It goes without saying that the requests as presented either for \$50,000 or for \$72,000 cannot be considered and still maintain any ratio of fairness with the other institutions carrying on work in free China. I shall be most happy to receive any further light which you can give me and feel confident that you will accept the foregoing comments with due emphasis upon the seriousness of the occasion. 

Dear Mr. Earhart,

I wonder if you have received the message I sent to you last November when one of our friends went back to America. Now we know for sure that air-mail letters can go through. We have had such nice letters from Ruth Chou lately. We are very grateful to learn through her of your continuted interest in Hwa Nan. During these difficult days I often recall Mrs. Earhart's words to me when I was there in 1934 working for the College. She said, "Hold on, Lucy", and the memory of her encouragement often inspires me still. She was right, the only way to overcome is to "hold on". You will be glad to hear that during this past year several financial crises have been averted by unexpected gifts which came just in time. I know that Mrs. Peel and our Board of Trustees have approached you in behalf of the College. How splendid it would be if after the war you would help us to re-build Hwa Nan Main Hall or to erect a chapel or a music hall as an Earhart Memorial. I mention a chapel because I know that Mrs. Earhart was such a devoted Christian. I mention a music hall because of her interest in helping to train a music teacher for Hwa Nan, - Phoebe Wei who is now with us. Of course this is merely a suggestion, and you may have some other ideas. As we look at the war situation we feel it is not too early to begin planning for moving back to our own campus and making further improvements.

I am sorry that I have not been able to write you sconer and oftener. With limited working staff to meet all kinds of demands which we do not have at normal times it makes it very difficult to keep up my personal correspondence. For instance, the heads of schools are spending much time and energy to secure rice, our main food, for the institutions to say nothing about many other demands. This would sound quite ridiculous in normal times but I am sure you who are in America will understand better now as you are also in the war and the extra-ordinary things are happening to you too.

At the moment our greatest problem is our lights. We can only see the red lines in the electric light bulbs. We have tried to supplement these poor lights by Kerosene lamps and now the securing of kerosene has become almost impossible. I am sure either Mrs. Feel or Ruth Chou must have sent you a copy of my report for the past year which may be of interest to you. We are thankful for what we can do now even under the circumstances. In closing let me thank you again for your deep interest and your timely support.



I have been trying to write you for the past two weeks particularly about two things. The first is the time which you desire to have announced for a meeting of the Hwa Nan Board during the week of May 3rd when our annual meetings are in session.

We have presented a request to The Rockefeller Foundation for a generous donation toward our budget, and in view of the excessive askings, we were compelled to make a complete restudy of each individual budget. I am glad that this occurred, although it was my task to do the work, as I was able to review all of the budgets for the various colleges. My impression is that Hwa Nan should be able to get through this year with the \$20,000, which we are asking the United China Relief to approve. I believe everyone on the Hwa Nan Board will agree that the setting up of large reserves for the work at Foochow and the rehabilitation of the campus are out of the question at the present time.

Confidentially, between the two of us, I have had something of a task in trying to reconcile what appears to be excessive askings from all of the colleges with the Program Committee of United China Relief.

I do not think it will be necessary for you to come to New York especially for a meeting regarding the budgets as they are being presented to a special committee of the Associated Boards, and Hwa Nan has good representation in Dr. Cartwright. However, if you are in this vicinity, I certainly hope you will make an appointment so that we can talk over some of the various aspects of the situation.

Incidentally, Mrs. New of Ginling College, of which you are a board member, is spending a week at Macalester College. Possibly you might be interested in seeing her.

Dr. Wuts time next week is at a premium, although she is trying to fit her program into the meetings of the Associated Boards and the individual colleges.



It is rather different from anything that Hwa Nan has issued so far, and I hope that you will find it useful. I submitted the copy to Mr. Cartwright for his approval, and it is our opinion in this office that Hwa Man should profit considerably by the circulation of the pamphlet we have designed. You will be interested to know that the material we are using is a composite of the article which was written by Mr. Wiant, together material we received through Mrs. Lenore Porter. I took the liberty of contributing some original observations of my own based on my life-long acquaintance with Hwa Nan-The pamphlet is in the form of an eight page booklet, of the same size we have been using for our other colleges. The back of the booklet has been left blank in the expectation that you may desire to print something of your own in this space. We have ordered 3,000 copies. and can provide you with a maximum of 2,500. I will ask that the type be kept intact for a short time so that in the event you desire reprints for wider circulation, you will be able to get them quickly and cheaply. My dear Mr. Barbarts

Thank you for your letter of May 25th. It arrived during my visit to my daughter in Connecticut, and I am returning there today.

Let me say briefly that the picture in China is very much changed on account of the war. Both Hwa Nan Gollege and Fukien University are "in exile", but both are doing a splendid piece of work.

At the time of writing you a few years ago there was every expectation that the two would unite for their college work, but it did not work out satisfactbrily, and they have continued their educational work separately. Now they are located in different stations, and such a thing is impossible.

I have no doubt but that Hwa Man is doing a splendid piece of work. Just what the situation will be after the war is more than I can tell at present.

I consulted Rev. Frank Cartwright, our Missionary Secretary for China, in regard to the situation. He suggests that I see Mrs. Leon Feel of Minneapolis when she comes here for meetings next week. I shall be here next week, and will endeavor to see her. Mrs. Feel knows the situation very well indeed, and I will investigate further and will be glad to answer your letter after my interview with her. In the meantime may I be permitted to keep Miss Wang's letter, as I wish to refer to same when I see her?

I think there is no doubt but what such a gift as Miss Wang suggests, made at the time when Hwa Nan returns to its old campus, will do very much to bolster their courage and be a real contribution to the splendid work that this institution has always done in past years. Rev. Cartwright spoke in the highest terms of the graduates of Hwa Nan and the work that Miss Wang had been doing in the college, and said that their graduates are in many ways superior to those of any other Christian college in China.



Dear Mrs. Peel: Herewith the Annual Financial and Statistical Reports for the year ending June 30, 1943, as prepared for submission to the New York State Education Department. In going through the Financial Report line by line, Mrs. Day found several places which needed correction, because items had been entered in the wrong places or mistakes had been made in copying. For example, in Table 4 "Expenditures for Current Purposes" there is no figure given in the original report for line 46, but evidently the sum of \$337.94 should have been inserted because this amount is necessary to give the total of \$21,422.38. 

Dear Mrs. Peel:

I have received two letters from you, one of which I am holding for a discussion with Mr. McBrier when he comes into the office. We will write you later regarding this.

Another letter refers to a communication which you received from President Wang and of her report regarding the continuing work of Hwa Nan. We certainly are at a loss to know what has happened in China, particularly outside of Chengtu. Yesterday I had lunch with Dwight Edwards who is supposed to be leaving New York by airplane today and should arrive in Chungking within the week. I stressed the necessity of having complete reports on the distribution of funds which are being sent out and he is conscious of that need. I also have in hand reports on funds which have been distributed from July 1st to December 31st but I must confess that they need a tremendous amount of studying and adjusting. Up to the present time I have not had opportunity to do this. I promise each day that I will not sleep until I have definitely re-studied the whole picture, only to find myself in such a maze when I begin work that I am compelled to lay it aside after working myself to sleep.

At the beginning of this fiscal year we faced the necessity of cooperating with United China Relief in their desire to send the funds directly to the field. I objected strenuously, as I felt it prudent to do, and our representative on the Executive Committee did not feel it advisable to protest further. The use of the United Clearing Board in selling funds has also added to our difficulty, but we are hoping that when the system gets into full operation that we will be able to tell more definitely where we stand. I agree with you most thoroughly that money is not the determining factor in our educational program, definitely the goal is the character of the individual which we turn out. Unfortunately, we must use money to reach this end and consequently we must wis a great deal of thought to it.

Mrs. Leon Roy Peel April 10, 1945 I wonder how soon you wish to send out your letter? I would like to give you more data before that time and I have also been trying to see John Caldwell, who was written up in the Herald Tribune last Sunday. He spent some time in Namping and in the mountains of Fukien Province; he might be able to give us some inspiring news. If you are not on the new United Board you are on in spirit and as a Methodist you will be called on to help promote this thing which was so much a part of your Christian promotional plan.

I hope you will write to President Wang and let her know that you are thinking of her. She has faced such desperate odds and only recently has the cablegram come which told of more destruction to this beautiful campus. May we not count on you to tell the story of this college and perhaps help us to build up a greater college through prayer, through the Christian leadership who are represented in the faculty and by our contributions which will enable them to carry on. Hwa Nanhas never been adequately staffed nor securely financed. I plead with you to do what you can to help at this crucial moment. If you desire to help, you may send your contribution to Mrs. J. W.
