The theory was that a combination of scientific knowledge and religious indoctrination at the mass level, with a maximum of personal application and a minimum of social application, would do the most to propagate Christian belief to the greatest number of souls, coupled with the theory that any man could teach himself anything by assiduous work especially at studies that inherently developed thinking capacity.

The opposing theory (e.g. Luce) that grew into SCU aimed to attract the intellectual, social, and cultural elite by qualitative education imbued with Christian ideals whose prestige would carry Christian belief to the greatest number. This theory came to be coupled with the theory that ~~main~~ professional training is the other half of education of productive and influential individuals, a theory already recognized in the medical school, less so in the theo school, but not till later in professional courses in the arts school, for other vocations. Both theories aimed at quantity in numbers and quality in Christian living, but one was from the bottom out, the other from the top down, the one stressed the individual gospel, the other the social gospel.

JDH continued Oxford to BA honors & MA work (degree in 1928) 1914, theo sem at Edinburgh 1914-1916, with YMCA with BEF France 1914-15, asst minister St. George's 1916, and marriage to Barbara Kelman 1916. While at Oxford: American Club, Fabian Society, Oxford University Union, Leander Rowing Club, Oxford Univ Boat Club, Merton crew, pres Merton College Debating Society, summers in Germany. The CWI who was WWH's senior missionary, mentor, and model was an inflexible Calvinist with a tender heart, an untaught master mechanic, an incessant worker without vacs, who believed he could teach himself anything by books and working at it. He didn't risk ~~tender~~ open tenderness except with others' children and his own students.

He was raised by his strong-minded mother (as WWH) who was strong for the Church and formal education, a frugal and unsophisticated farmer's boy (as WWH) who shared top honors at college graduation with a brainy and well-heeled man by work not brains, and who chose the evangelization of the heathen as a life work where he could do more though acquire less prosperity than in the US.

In later years CWI described his ideal candidate for a missionary as one with a zeal for souls, balanced, practical, vivacious, with pleasing address and ready wit and ready utterance. And so he was in Chinese, but not in English (as WWH).

Science, math, and mechanics for which he had natural talent and in which he developed unequalled skills on the mission field, he looked on as tools to overcome Chinese superstitions to prepare them to receive understanding of Christian truths, to which he devoted his major effort at first by itineration and later, after unequalled mastery of the language, by a revised translation of the Bible.

He was said to be humble in his convictions assured that they must convince others. He was said to forgive and tolerate a man, whether missionary or heathen, whose opinions he did not share, if assured that the man was devoted to God's interest; light would come. He was said to stay to the finish of whatever he started.

He was convinced that Chinese hate all foreigners, are faithless in duty, whimsical and corrupt in law, prejudiced by superstitions, slow to convince and reckless to consummate, yet, ready or not, he expected an independent Chinese Church by 1921, and felt that the missionaries had all too little time to prepare Chinese Christians for that day.

## THIRTY-SIX YEARS IN CHEELOO

I was born in 1890 in a humble family in An-chiu, a small county in Shangtung. When I was eight years old, I got scarlet fever and lost much of my hearing because of improper treatment. I spent a few years in a primary school of the Presbyterian Church where I met Rev. Frank E. Field. Later, he took me to Tsinan and helped me to study in the middle school of his Church. Then, he was the Principal.

In 1911, my ear trouble recurred. Rev. Field provided the necessary expenses and sent me to Tsinan to the "Union Medical College" for treatment which became the School of Medicine of Cheeloo University later. I was taken care of by Dr. William M Schultz who was very kind to me. It took two months for my ear to heal and I went back to Tsinan to continue my schooling.

A few months later, Rev. Field got a letter from Dr. Schultz saying that it was better for me to learn laboratory technics when I have graduated because impaired hearing would not be a great handicap in that kind of work. Rev. Field then kindly let me have my own choice for he first intended that I should continue my education in Kuang Wen University so that I could be of some help in his missionary work afterwards. After weighing over the matter carefully, I made up my mind to come to Tsinan. That was the turning point of my life and I must say that I owe it to Rev. Field who gave me the opportunities.

I came to Tsinan in February 1912 and on March first I started my work in Cheeloo - then the Union Medical School. There were less than thirty students and the only building was the present "South Building" without the two wings. Dr. James B. Neal was <sup>Dean</sup> President and Drs. Schultz Johnson and Wu Chao Hsiang were teachers. Dr. Watson from Ching-chou also lent a helping hand sometimes. The "hospital" was just a small clinic with about ten rooms.

At first, I was not at all interested in my work and I rather regretted my coming. Fortunately, Dr. Schultz was as kind as he was inspiring and gradually I realized the importance of this branch of work in medicine and began to work hard. And the more I worked, the more interesting it seemed to me. I also attended the students' classes on bacteriology, physiology, histology and anatomy etc.

Then Dr. Harold Balme came who was a man of high abilities and resources. He did a radical operation on my ear and freed me from relapses ever since. He started the Nursing School and built the hospital - the "Old Hospital" now - which was finished in 1915 and was the only modernized hospital in China at that time. In 1916, four missionary medical schools in Peiking, Hankow and Nanking amalgamated in Tsinan. In 1917, the Kuang Wen University in Wei-hsian and a Theological School in Ching-chou moved to Tsinan to form the Shangtung Christian University (Cheeloo University) with three colleges, namely, College of Arts and Science, College of Theology and School of Medicine.

The School of Medicine was growing up rapidly. Students increased from thirty to about a hundred. The faculty included Drs. Niel, Balme, Samuel Cochran, R. T. Shield, E.R. Wheeler, William McClure, T. Stearns P.S. Evans, and Rev. W.B. Pailing. All of them are earnest Christians as well as good teachers. They are not only good in their respective special fields but they themselves are of such fine characters that they are an inspiration to the students and to those who work with them. I consider myself fortunate indeed to have worked with these people. Being influenced by them, I did my duty to the best of my abilities and in addition, I used to go to the laboratory in the evenings and worked until late at night.

In 1918, epidemic of plague broke out in Tsinan. The government asked our school to help fighting the plague and I was one of the workers. In less than two months the epidemic was extinguished. Afterwards, the faculty meeting felt that I had been doing my work quite well and so promoted me to be assistant in laboratory diagnosis and increased my salary from seventeen dollars to forty dollars a month which put me among the best paid of the school.

In 1923, Dr. Cochran and I discovered the Ring Test for the diagnosis of syphilis. (Tsinan Med. Rev. Vol. 3 No. 4. 1923) This is a much simplified test than Kahn Test and is less sensitive than Kahn Test, therefore it almost never gives a false positive reaction and very few false negatives. In 1930, I made an analysis of a few thousands of Kahn Tests, Wasserman Reactions and Ring Tests and established the value of the Ring Test. (National Med. J. of China, Vol. 16 No. 4 1930)

In 1924, the Peking Woman's Union Medical College amalgamated with Cheeloo and Drs. A.V. Scott, J. Morgan, and S.S. Waddell came to Tsinan. From that time on, there were also many new arrivals such as Drs. F.H. Mosse, H.G. Smyly, P.B. Price, E.B. Struthers, A.S. Gault, L.F. Heimbürger, L.M. Ingle, H.W. Wright, M.P. Gell, G. King, P. McAll, T.C. Greene, G.F. Winfield, and Witham. With them, Cheeloo was beginning to shine. Many of them worked heart and soul for Cheeloo especially Drs. Gault, Moose, Scott, Smyly and Morgan.

In 1928, I was sent to P.U.M.C. in Peiping to study protozoology under Dr. J.F. Kessel. Coming back from Peiping, I worked in the Depts. of Serology and Protozoology. Since I have always been careful in my work and my reports have always been found reliable, my words regarding laboratory diagnosis of a case are usually accepted as final. The interns' reports in laboratory work were accepted only with my checked signature.

In 1929, I compiled the Laboratory Diagnosis in collaboration with Mr. Yen Pin and others. (Mr. Yen came to Cheeloo in 1917. He soon distinguished himself by careful and hard work. Unfortunately he died of leukaemia in 1933.) Dr. Gault, Mr. Yen and I also arranged an one year course for training laboratory technicians. Later, it was changed to two years. I was in charge of it until it was interrupted by the war.



Because of the increasing number of patients and students, a very well-designed and well-equipped New Hospital was built which was finished in 1935. It was the east wing of the original plan. It is a great pity that this hospital was in use for only two years and then the War broke out. The school was forced to close and the students and part of the teachers went to Szechuan. Up to then, there were about four hundred graduated doctors and around thirty trained technicians. Many of them went to "Free China" during the War and many stayed in the occupied areas but all made substantial contributions to our country.

The hospital managed to function until it was seized by the Japanese in 1941. Our Western friends were either repatriated or sent to the Intern Camp except Drs. Scott, Gault, Gell, and MacTavish. They and Drs. C.L. Chao, C.C. Yew, M.L. Sun, J.T. Teng and I started the Municipal Hospital. All the staffs and servants were formerly in Cheeloo, so it was really a Cheeloo Hospital under a different name. But conditions became worse and worse daily and before long, Drs. Scott and MacTavish had to be repatriated and Drs. Gault and Gell were sent to the Internment Camp in Weihsian. However, the rest of us managed to keep the Municipal Hospital going. Up to date, about three patients were seen daily in the O.P.D. and there were always more patients than available beds. That shows those who work there are worthy of their training and have done credits to their Alma Mater.

Here I must say a few words for the late Dr. A.S. Gault, a true Christian indeed. She well knew that her health was failing. Yet she put service for others above her own interest and continued working during the most trying time until she was interned. Personally, she had been teacher, co-worker and friend all in one to me. In her death the school suffered an irretrievable loss and I may say that none of her friends feels the pain more acutely than I do. May God rest her soul.

After V-J Day, Dr. Struthers was the first to come back in 1946 and took back the buildings. I said buildings because all the equipments, furnitures, books and most important of all, the specimens and records were gone. Then Dr. Laube came from Chengtu and Dr. Scott from America who took great pains to bring a considerable amount of supplies, books, journals etc with her. The Canadian Red Cross ~~gave~~ and UNRRA gave generous helps in hospital supplies. A group of young Chinese doctors came from Chengtu. And the hospital was re-opened under rather difficult conditions. The school faculties moved back from Chengtu in 1946 and began to take in new students although most of the students are still in Chengtu because of transportation difficulties.

After eight years of suppressed life under the Japs, I cannot express how glad I am to see the school and Hospital re-opened and to resume my work in my old laboratory. But it takes a great deal of hard work, co-operation, good will and money to bring our school back to what she used to be. China needs her to train persons for national reconstruction. I, for one, are willing to give my best for that cause and goal and I take pleasure to review my thirty-six years up to present to witness her growing up and bearing fruits.

Dear Dr. Struthers:

I thank you for your letter recently received. Cheeloo at Tsinan holds the place of "home" for me so it is nice to have the Chengtu group, most of whom do not know me personally, invite me to return to Tsinan.

Just before the end of the war I promised to remain in my present position for another school year. I could, of course, have managed to get out of the contract but there is no one available to take my place so I shall feel obligated to remain through May. It will take a few weeks following that to complete my preparations for sailing and final visits with the various members of my family. I shall expect to arrive in China in July or early August.

Under separate cover and by regular mail I am sending you tentative plans for the College of Nursing and a curriculum outline for the first three years of the course leading to a Bachelor of Science degree with a Major in Nursing as I have prepared and would like to see put into effect at Cheeloo University in Tsinan. For the present we shall be primarily interested in the curriculum for the first year only in order to take care of student nurses entering the School of Nursing this fall.

The nurse students will, as was the case in our last years in Tsinan, be admitted to the campus and dormitories of Cheeloo University and take classes along with the other Arts and Science, and Pre-professional students. The School or College of Nursing shall be a school on a level with other schools in the University on the campus. Under no circumstances shall the School of Nursing be a school under another professional college. That arrangement has proved a most unhappy one in almost all instances in which it has occurred in this and other countries. Our School of Nursing must not be placed at such a distinct disadvantage. I would not wish to remain at Cheeloo in such a situation.

Since securing my Bachelor of Arts degree I have spent six years as a student in various colleges and universities in further study. I have the degree of Master of Science in Nursing from Western Reserve University at Cleveland Ohio. I have had experience, either as a student, educator, or administrator in six collegiate schools of nursing. I am at present assistant to the director of a collegiate school of nursing and have turned down any number of opportunities to be director of such programs because I did not wish to be tied to a position in this country. I consider myself an authority on collegiate schools of nursing. There are one hundred and forty such schools in the U.S.A. and the number is increasing for the trend in nursing education is toward the collegiate school. This is a great opportunity for Cheeloo University to make a vital contribution to a most worthy profession and to the needs of China. I am sure we will unanimously choose to have a collegiate school of nursing of the highest grade.

I assume I am being invited to return to the position I formerly held as Director of the Cheeloo University School of Nursing. I do trust we shall soon be able to find a Chinese woman qualified in preparation, experience, and personality to take this title and the major responsibility. I shall much prefer to serve in an advisory capacity, assist in coordinating the academic and clinical instruction and experience, and just filling in wherever I shall be most needed and can best serve.

If, when making plans for the fall classes, you will just



see that the laboratories and teaching personnel are provided for the pre-clinical year of instruction on the campus I will see that books and teaching guides for the science courses for nurses arrive in time for the use of the instructors. I am sending by regular mail to you, both to Chengtu and to Tsinan, as I do not know which place you might be when they arrive, a full curriculum outline for the entire course of instruction and further plans for the school. But for fear you may have curriculum planning meetings before this reaches you I shall just outline here the suggested curriculum, hours of class, and credit to be allowed toward the Degree of Bachelor of Science with a Major in Nursing as I have set it up, and which is in general practice in this country. These courses will be taught in the college classrooms and laboratories by college faculty members.

The second and third years will be devoted to clinical instruction and experience in the hospital and community.

My preference is that the student nurse continue to live on the campus throughout her suggested 176 weeks (exclusive of vacation of 4 weeks yearly) of instruction and experience which includes the pre-clinical, clinical, and post-clinical program which makes up the entire nursing course. The campus is a convenient distance from the hospital. Residence there would eliminate a duplication of student life and residence supervision in the student residence in the hospital compound and would enrich the cultural, religious,

and social life of the student nurse by providing daily participation in campus activities and fellowship with other students of the college.

Since there is such urgent need for nurses I have set up our plan to provide that the student shall be eligible for a diploma in nursing at the end of three years. She can enter at once the field of professional nursing if she chooses and serve for several years before returning to complete her requirements for the B.S. Degree with a Major in Nursing. Some will not return but they will be well prepared nurses who will make a real contribution to the nursing and health needs of their country. Many will return and with the further preparation will be better fitted for positions of greater responsibility in the communities to which they later go. China is desperately in need of professional women who will have completed either<sup>one</sup> or both of these levels of professional training.

The plan I am forwarding to you also carries this paragraph regarding provision for meeting the immediate need for trained personnel in the hospital plan for providing nursing service for the patients:

"To meet the immediate need for trained, intelligent, safe care of the patient in the hospital it will be necessary to start training classes at once for the preparation of practical nurses or nurses' aides who can do much of the simpler care for the patients under graduate nurse supervision, thus leaving the few graduate nurses available free to carry out the nursing care that requires professional training and experience. Applicants for these classes and this service in the hospital should be chosen carefully for their intelligence, cooperativeness, clean physical and social habits, kindly and understanding nature, and ability and willingness to learn and to fit into the ward routine. This type of trained personnel will be needed in large numbers and for many years to come even though there may be many student nurses connected with the hospital."

This program too we should start this fall. I shall be happy to assist in it and am collecting suggestions and materials on the subject.

I spent Christmas at my brother's in Jersey City. When I called on Mr. Evans in our offices in New York he put me to work assisting with some estimates of our needs as there appeared to be a chance we might get a sizable donation if we presented a convincing picture. I added to the estimate \$12,000 to establish and properly equip a good sized Nursing Arts Laboratory, Nutrition Laboratory, and Nursing School offices in one of the present college buildings. I've never heard whether our estimates won any material results. Where I am now working this amount covered the establishment of the Nursing department in the Arts and Science college hence my naming that figure. When I asked Jerry Winfield if he thought we had space to spare in the college buildings for all the room we would need for the nursing school he replied that if not we could just get busy and build a new building on the campus for the nursing school. We wont need that department fully established-- the laboratories, I mean-- until the summer classes but there must be some provision for properly conducting the nutrition classes in the second semester. I'll bring along plans and suggestions.

In putting out publicity material to increase student recruiting don't leave the nursing program out of the picture. I'm awfully sorry not to be there in time to assist with the first plannings but believe this letter and materials I am sending will be helpful. Miss Danner is already in China and can speak for the nursing group until the rest of us arrive.

Dear Mr. Slater:

Thank you for your letter of 5th. November. You will be surprised to know that the cable arrived the day after the letter. On receipt of the letter I at once asked Dr. Lair, Dr. Struthers and Miss Mackinnon to meet me to discuss the contents of a reply cable and we have met again to discuss this letter. The cable was sent to you yesterday reading as follows:

The question of our staffing needs is so complicated and the list of vacancies to be filled so long that we decided after a good deal of discussion to send you a short cable stating only our most urgent needs and to follow it by a letter in which we try to give you the whole picture. I am very glad indeed to know that you will get the representatives of the supporting societies in England to consider the situation together. From the point of view both of the societies and of Cheeloo that seems the most satisfactory procedure.

I am sending you with this a list of all the positions at present vacant and those which will be created by the development of the College of Rural Economy. These are all positions for which we should like to have Western members of staff either from Britain or North America (including Canada). It is a long list but it is only bringing our staff up to the strength which it has had at some periods in the past, except for the addition of some new posts which are essential for the development of the College of Rural Economy and, as you know, that development has been asked for by the Planning Committee of the Associated Boards of Christian Colleges.

The rest of this letter is by way of comment on the cable and the list of vacancies. With regard to the cable there are certain names of people who were formerly on the staff whose return was asked for by letter early this year but whom we did not mention in the cable because we understand that for various reasons there is no chance of their coming. These are Drs. Ingle and King, Messrs. Pailing and Prescott and Miss Nunn. Neither did we mention Mr. Clayton because we believe he has left England and we hope that this is his destination. We did not mention Dr. Gale's name because Dr. Struthers received a letter from him stating that he is not likely to be able to return for some time for health reasons though we hope that he will rejoin us someday. Miss Morton Smith's name was not included in the cable either because we are taking for granted that she will come as soon as practicable.

With regard to the list of positions to be filled by Western staff from Britain and North America we wish to underline some of the most urgent needs and to make some explanations.

1. The Medical School:

A Bacteriologist is one of the first priorities.

The Department of Internal Medicine is very low in personnel, having lost two members by death in recent years. Dr. Mosse (S.P.G.) and Dr. Arabella Gault (A.P.M.N.). Another member of this department, Dr. Julia Morgan (American

Methodist Mission) is on extended furlough on account of ill health and her return is uncertain. If, in addition, Dr. Smyly does not return that is another loss to the department. It should be mentioned that we expect the arrival shortly of Dr. Kenneth Cross whose services are being lent by the Friends' Ambulance Unit and he will help in this department but the duration of his stay is indefinite. None of the medical recruits at present suggested for our staff either from Britain or North America comes into this category so we feel we must put the need for help in this department as most urgent.

We select also the following from the list as deserving to be specially emphasized - a Bio-Chemist with special interest in nutrition, a teacher of Histology and Embryology and a Laboratory Technician.

With regard to the question of surgeons we should report that we have the possibility - though it is only a possibility - of having two surgeons appointed by the American Presbyterian Missions, (North and South respectively). As we have one American surgeon here already it is not so urgent to ask the British Missions to appoint men with surgical qualifications.

2. The Nursing School

The Nursing School had formerly 6 foreign nurses. At present there are only 3, none of whom is from Britain. Enclosed is a full list of the requirements. Attention is called particularly to the request for a midwife to come from England.

3. For the Arts and Science Colleges and for the setting up of the College of Rural Economy we feel that the following positions require to be filled: We require a teacher of Pharmacy to take the place of Mr. Pailing. We are very glad to have news of the possibility of a geography teacher being appointed by the Methodist Missionary Society. There has been a lack in our programme at this point and we shall be glad to have it filled. We also require a history teacher and at least one teacher of English.

In the Science College there is urgent need for a Professor of Physics.

For the development of the College of Rural Economy we look forward to having the help of Mr. Scott on his return. We also hope very much that Mr. Donald Faris (United Church of Canada) will return to help on the agricultural side. We have sent a request to the Board of the American Presbyterian Mission North for the appointment of a Professor of Rural Sociology. We do not know yet whether this request can be met from that source but the appointment is one of the essential needs of the College. We also require teachers of rural economics, education (specially related to the needs of rural areas) and rural industries. If Mr. Faris does not return we shall also require an agricultural extension teacher.

In regard to general administration the University urgently requires a Superintendent of buildings and grounds. The hospital requires a business manager. The work might be combined but there is really enough work for two men. We have made application to American Presbyterian Mission North for the services of Mr. Sam Dean, formerly of Yenching University but as yet do not know the result of this application. If we are unsuccessful in getting the help of Mr. Dean we shall be badly in need on this side and shall ask the British societies to consider whether someone can be allocated for this work.

We wish to mention that although the Theological School is administratively separate from the University we count on the return of Mr. Drake with great eagerness

and shall welcome the continued support of the British Societies and shall be glad of suggestions for appointment to the faculty.

We formerly had two full-time secretaries. At present we have part-time of one. Even if Miss Morton Smith returns there will be need for another trained secretary.

In making these needs known we should like to emphasize our hope that the British missionary societies will continue the policy of the past of making contributions in personnel to all departments of the work of the University. Cheeloo has always been outstanding for the international nature of its staff and there is great advantage in this. It will be good if in the future this cooperation can be carried into all departments of the work.

The question of staffing needs is so complicated and the list  
of vacancies to be filled so long that we decided after a good deal  
of discussion to send you a short cable stating only our most urgent  
needs and to follow it by a letter in which we try to give you the  
whole picture. I am very glad indeed to know that you will get the  
representatives of the supporting societies in England to consider  
the situation together. From the point of view both of the societies  
and of Cheelo that seems the most satisfactory procedure.

I am sending you with this a list of all the posi-  
tions at present vacant and those which will be created by the devel-  
opment of the College of Rural Economy. These are all positions for  
which we should like to have western members of staff either from  
Britain or North America (including Canada). It is a long list but it  
is only bringing our staff up to the strength which it has had at  
some periods in the past except for the addition of some new posts  
which are essential for the development of the College of Rural Eco-  
nomy and, as you know, that development has been asked for by  
the Planning Committee of the Associated Boards of Christian Colleges.

The rest of this letter is by way of comment on  
the cable and the list of vacancies. With regard to the cable there  
are certain names of people who were formerly on the staff whose re-  
turn was asked for by letter early this year but whom we did not men-  
tion in the cable because we understand that for various reasons  
there is no chance of their coming. These are Drs. Ingle and King,  
Messrs Pailing and Prescott and Miss Nunn. Neither did we mention Mr.  
Clayton because we believe he has left England and we hope that this

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is his destination. We did not mention Dr. Gale's name because Dr. Struthers received a letter from him stating that he is not likely to be able to return for some time for health reasons though we hope that he will rejoin us someday. Miss Morton Smith's name was not included in the cable either because we are taking for granted that she will come as soon as practicable.

With regard to the list of positions to be filled by Western staff from Britain and North America we wish to underline some of the most urgent needs and to make some explanations.

1. The Medical School: The Department of Internal Medicine is very low in personnel, having lost two members by death in recent years, Dr. Mosse (S.P.G.) and Dr. Arabella Gault (A.P.M.N.). Another member of this department, Dr. Julia Morgan (American Methodist Mission) is on extended furlough on account of ill health and her return is uncertain. If, in addition, Dr. Smyly does not return that is another loss to the department. It should be mentioned that we expect the arrival shortly of Dr. Kenneth Cross whose services are being lent by the Friends' Ambulance Unit and he will help in this department but the duration of his stay is indefinite. None of the medical recruits at present suggested for our staff either from Britain or North America comes into this category so we feel we must put the need for help in this department as most urgent. We select also the following from the list as deserving to be specially emphasized - a Bio-Chemist with special interest in nutrition, a teacher of Histology and Embryology and a Laboratory Technician.

With regard to the question of surgeons we should report that we have the possibility - though it is only a possibility - of having two surgeons appointed by the American Presbyterian Missions, (North and South respectively). As we have one American surgeon here already it is not so urgent to ask the British missions to appoint men with surgical qualifications.

2. The Nursing School  
The Nursing School had formerly 6 foreign nurses. At present there are only 3, none of whom is from Britain. Enclosed is a full list of the requirements. Attention is called particularly to the request for a midwife to come from England.

3. For the Arts and Science Colleges and for the setting up of the College of Rural Economy we feel that the following positions require to be filled.  
We require a teacher of Pharmacy to take the place of Mr. Palling

We are very glad to have news of the possibility of a geography teacher being appointed by the Methodist Missionary Society. There been a lack in our programme at this point and we shall be glad to have it filled. We also require a history teacher and at least one teacher of English.

In the Science College there is urgent need for a Professor of Physics.

For the development of the College of Rural Economy we look forward to having the help of Mr. Scott on this return. We also hope very much that Mr. Donald Faris ( United Church of Canada ) will return to help on the agricultural side. We have sent a request to the Board of the American Presbyterian Mission North for the appointment of a Professor of Rural Sociology . We do not know yet whether this request can be met from that source but the appointment is one of the essential needs of the college. We also require teachers of rural economics , education ( specially related to the needs of rural areas ) and rural industries. If Mr. Faris does not return we shall also require an agricultural extension teacher.

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We wish to mention that although the Theological School is administratively separate from the University we count on the return of Mr. Drake with great eagerness and shall welcome the continued support of the British Societies and shall be glad to suggest for appointment to the faculty.

We formerly had two fulltime secretaries. At present we have part time of one. Even if Miss Morton Smith returns there will be need for another trained secretary.

In making these needs known we should like to emphasize our hope that the British missionary societies will continue the policy of the past of making contributions in-personnel to all departments of the work of the University . Cheeloo has always been outstanding for the international nature of its staff and there is great advantage in this. It will be good if in the future this cooperation can be carried into all departments of the work.

Dear Dr. McMullen:

Yesterday I received your cable reading as follows:

"PLEASE SEND IMMEDIATELY SINGLE COMPLETE AUTHORIZED PRIORITY LIST  
WESTERN PERSONNEL ENTIRE UNIVERSITY INCLUDING ALL THREE COLLEGES."

We had a similar request from Rev. N. Slater of C.C.U.A. in November and in response sent him a full list of our vacancies for Western personnel with a letter indicating relative urgency. We mailed copies of these documents to you on November 27th. I wonder whether by this time they have reached you. In case they have not I am sending you now the same lists in a revised and up-to-date form and hope they give you the information you require. I do not feel able to indicate relative priority as between different colleges but each list is arranged in order of urgency and our hope is that we shall receive some help for each of the Colleges. I might perhaps single out the nursing school as being specially in need of help. Not only is the Western staff half or less of what it used to be but there is also a serious shortage of Chinese nursing staff and this lack is affecting the whole work of the hospital and medical school.

I am enclosing also the blank for recording Western Personnel Needs which we received from you some time ago but these specially prepared lists are more inclusive. I send also one set of the information blanks which Dr. William Fenn asked us to complete.

I have to thank you for your letter of November 8th sent to the Presidents and for a copy of the letter to Dr. William Fenn, written November 29th and sent to me from Shanghai. I have read both these letters with deep interest and am trying to give as much consideration as I possibly can to the questions which they raise. I hope to be able to write again before long with regard to some of these matters. There is one matter which I should like to mention now. In the letter to Dr. Fenn you make a reference to "expansion at West China, Cheeloo and other places" and you suggest that the news of this expansion has been an embarrassment to you and others in negotiations with U.S.C. I am naturally extremely sorry if any action that we have taken has made your task more difficult but at the same time I do not understand what is meant by this expansion. I cannot think of any development here which can be so described except the preparations for the College of Rural Economy which we all understand to have been fully approved. I should be very grateful if you would let me know if there is any way in which we have misunderstood the plans suggested for our work in the immediate future.

In regard to the financial situation I am grateful to you for taking us so frankly into your confidence. I think some of us fully realize the seriousness of the position and we are trying to let it be generally understood. We have made the decision to double the amount for tuition for next semester, making \$190,000 the sum asked for all fees except food.

I think you will be interested to know that we held a meeting on Christmas Day to celebrate the return of the University to Tsinan. The speakers were



Governor Wang, Dr. Li the Commissioner of Education, Mayor Wang, the Vice-President of the Provincial Assembly and several of the alumni. The purpose of the meeting was to make known the work of the University in preparation for the financial campaign. All the officials made very friendly speeches emphasizing the value of Christian higher education and expressing their willingness to help the University.

I have been intending for some time to write you with regard to our relations with the Harvard-Yenching Institute, a matter about which you probably already know something. In April last Dr. Elisseeff wrote asking us to discontinue the work of research and to concentrate on building up a strong department of Chinese language and history of the undergraduate level. I at once acted according to his suggestion and wrote to him on June 4th assuring him of this fact. Unfortunately that letter seems to have been lost and Dr. Elisseeff got the impression that we were still continuing the research work. The result of this is a letter from him written December 10th. I enclose a copy of this letter and of my reply. I can certainly say that we have not intentionally done anything contrary to the suggestions made by Dr. Elisseeff and that if we have done so it has been due to misunderstanding but I am sure there is some misunderstanding on his side too. I hope this matter can now be straightened out and that we can continue to build up our work in the Chinese Department. I shall be very grateful for any help you can give in explaining matters to the Harvard-Yenching Trustees and in letting me know if any further change is required on our side. Probably a visit from the new Assistant Directors in China and an opportunity of discussion with them will do much to clear up the matter.

Now that practically all of the Chinese staff who were expected here have returned work is going on normally. There is a good spirit among the students. Some of them have been waiting long for this opportunity of study and they show their appreciation of it in their attitude. Our Christmas celebrations were very happy and meaningful.

I should like to express my thanks again for all that you are doing for us. We realize that your task at this time is very heavy and full of difficulties and we do appreciate your work for us.

In the year 1938, I attended the Graduate School of Yenching University, and I was also appointed as the Director of a Rural Reconstruction Experimental Station. In 1941, I was invited to Kwei-chen girls' School as principal. After the Pearl Harbor event I joined an anti-Japanese party, and was arrested by the Japanese.

37. PLEASE TELL BRIEFLY ABOUT ANY UNUSUAL EXPERIENCES YOU HAVE HAD. FOR EXAMPLE, WERE YOU INTERNED, CAPTURED, BOMBED, ETC? In 1941 the international relations between the United States and Japan became worse. Miss Griffin, the principal of Kwei-chen Girls' School intended to go back to America, and anxiously asked me take her position. I accepted this responsibility and continued with this educational work until the Pearl Harbor event, when the school was compelled to close.

After my arrival at Peiping in the summer of 1942, I joined an anti-Japanese party, and was sent to Tsinan to get members. We worked secretly. Even my wife did not know what we were doing. However, the Japanese found some clue and arrested me on July 4th., 1944. They beat me into stupefaction for several times, they treated me cruelly, they did not give me an insufficient amount of food and water. Other prisoners sobbed bitterly for distress, and I taught them pray, then we got peace. The Japanese tried me for many times, but I did not disclose anything of our party, they gave me many temptations, but I did not utter a word. After all, they put me into a dismal dungeon for three months. After I was set free, Canaan Pharmaceutical College, a private institution in Tsinan, invited me to be the director of general affairs for that institution's business administration.

I do intend to make a scientific investigation of the hepatic remedies described in old Chinese medicine and relation of liver to peptic ulcer. But, because of limitation of funds and shortage of equipments, none of these projects is carried on at present.

During she was in it was not injured but saw the tragedy of bombing. Refugee were not properly cared by the Government. War is hateful.

The standard of the middle school graduates were definitely lowered as the war went on. It was certainly will hold back the progress of China for many years. It might be more damage to China than the destruction materially.

Both teachers & students were living in a very humble life. Physical weakness was definite. No books or references for either teachers or students. That was our handicap in the school during the war.

Behavior of G.I. personnel left wrong impression to the general population of China.

Up to date we are remarkably short of equipments and especially for teaching personnel. Many of the old professors or teachers left the teaching jobs or shift one school to another where he is better paid. I am afraid that if the inflation continued and wages could not raise along with the rate of inflation that there would be more teaching staffs leave their job sooner or later. The reason is simply because they have to work for at exist of their family & make their children to be able to go to school. No one will be able to stand <sup>that</sup> work while their families starved & teaching while their own children have no chance to be taught etc.

In Szechwan, I was working in the provincial biological supply station for the first two years. Then, I was in the employ of the China Fertilizer cooperation as a technician for one year. Lastly, I returned to Cheeloo University as an assistant.

In my experience nothing is so worth while to tell about. But once when I was in Shansi <sup>un-</sup>employed, I was living in a small village, which is situated near the bank of the Yellow River. One day I happened <sup>to see</sup> six Japanese bombers flying very low above my head, in that moment, one of the bombers diving still lower to my place, but immediately turned upward and escaped. Perhaps it was due to some countrymen who wore white dresses running toward my place. The other five bombers, flying to the south about half a mile away, dropped several bombs. Some were killed and wounded, I was injured later.

Another time when I was travelling on the Szechwan railway, which is running along the Yellow River, one of the passenger car was bombed by the Japanese cannon balls and the roof of the last car was wholly removed. That place is Tung Kwan, which is just on the south bank of the river. Japanese troops camped on the opposite side. Passenger car damaged by their machine guns were also reported.

in 1923 came under the new system of Middle Schools. In 1928 Industrial & Agricultural work was started, with 3 Depts. in Agriculture and 3 in Industry and 2 in Commerce.

My first position was as Dean of Studies, and I tried to raise the academic standard of Minghsien School. It became one of the three best middle schools in N. China. Later, I served as Dean of Discipline and endeavoured to build up the character of the students. During the war years, when the College moved to Honan, then to Shensi and finally to Szechuan, I was Associate President and travelled with the staff and students on this long journey.

As conditions in Shansi were unsettled, it was decided to move the school into unoccupied territory and the first move was into Honan, where we remained for 2 months. As conditions there became bad, we moved on into

Shensi, 10 months in Sian and 2 months in Mienhsien, and finally into

Szechuan, Chint'ang, where I remained until 1944. Following an illness

that year, I was given a year's leave, which I spent in Chungking. I was

appointed President of Cheeloo University, in Chengtu, in 1945 and

remained there until Sept. 1946, when I came to Tsinan, to reopen the

University there.

32. PLEASE TELL BRIEFLY ABOUT ANY UNUSUAL EXPERIENCES YOU HAVE HAD - FOR EXAMPLE: WERE YOU INTERNED, CAPTURED, BOMBED, ETC? THESE EXPERIENCES NEED NOT BE LIMITED TO MILITARY ACTIVITIES.

The journey made by the Mingsien group of staff and their families and students from Taiku, Shansi to Chint'ang, Szechuan, a distance of about 1500 miles, provided many interesting and unusual experiences. We were about 500 people altogether, and, as the number was so large, had to divide up into groups of students, each under the direction of some members of staff. Travelling was done at first by train, but as that became too dangerous, and as we got away from the railways a great deal of the journey had to be done on foot. Carts were hired for the transportation of the baggage, or motor trucks, where these were obtainable, and the women and small children travelled on these, with the baggage. We put up in whatever accommodation was available, - inns, schools, churches, public buildings, whenever these were placed at our disposal, but some-times, and even in the depth of winter, we had to sleep outside, on straw. In some places, the local residents and officials were very kind and did all they could for us and, in Sian, we were fortunate in being able to occupy some unoccupied school buildings belonging to the English Baptist Mission. Whenever we stayed for some time in a town, we carried on school work, often sharing the school buildings with the local schools, working in the afternoons, while they used the buildings in the mornings. Even during brief halts on the journey, classes were held, each student carrying a portable stool with him and the teachers blackboard cloth, which they hung up on a wall, so that, when we finally reached our destination, at Chint'ang, the spirit of the students was very good and their academic standards still high. At Chint'ang, we were able to procure a large country house, containing many courtyards and with good grounds, surrounded by a moat. This had been unoccupied for a long time, except for a few servants, and was badly neglected, but when we had repaired and cleaned up the place, we found it very comfortable and we were able to stay there until the end of the war, carrying on our work under much better conditions than we had had during most of the journey.

#### OBITUARY

Friends of Cheeloo learned with deep regret of the death of Dr. G. D. Wu, late dean of both Arts and Science. He had long been connected with the university and came onto the staff soon after his graduation. Later on he continued his research in Ts'ing-hua University, Peking. Later he spent some years in England reading for his Ph. D. at London University. It was here that he published his two volume work, "Pottery," which has been a standard ever since. He became a distinguished member of the Academia Sinica and made an extremely important contribution to Chinese archaeology in the discovery and study of the Neolithic Black Pottery Civilization of North China. We were fortunate to have him back on our staff from 1945-8. He died on Sept. 21 and was buried in a temporary grave near the Leprosarium, outside the campus fence. He was a man of outstanding Christian character, respected and loved by students and staff alike.
