

My dear Miss Eggleston:

You may remember the correspondence we had in the autumn of 1928 relative to the item of loss in exchange on the China Medical Board's appropriation to Shantung Christian University, No. CM 2693. I understand that the appropriation set aside G\$30,000 to provide for a possible loss in exchange.

As a result of our correspondence with you on this subject we communicated with the office of the Field Treasurer of the University to obtain their record of the amount of this loss in exchange. Through a combination of circumstances this information has been long delayed in reaching us. I am now able, however, to quote the following statement prepared by Dr. H. P. Lair, Field Treasurer of the University, after a careful study of the University accounts:-

"The facts are as follows:- Of the amount paid by the Rockefeller Foundation in April, 1925, G\$38,750 was drawn on the field in different amounts, the whole sum realizing Mex. \$69,664.19. This means a loss in exchange of Mex. \$7,835.81, the amount realized being that sum less than what would have been realized at 2 to 1. It seems to me, therefore, that this Mex. \$7,835.81 is a clear claim on the appropriation for loss in exchange as the money was drawn then."

I sincerely hope that on the basis of this information the Foundation will find it possible to make payment to the University in the amount of Mex. \$7,835.81. If such a payment is found to be in order it could be handled most conveniently for the University by sending us a draft for L.C. \$7,835.81 drawn on some banking institution in Shanghai, payable to the order of Shantung Christian University.

We are very sorry indeed that this matter has been so long delayed because I know you are anxious to close out these long standing items.

My dear Mr. Evans:

Miss Eggleston as Secretary of the Trustees of the Peking Union Medical College, which is now administered separately from the Foundation, no longer has an official connection with the Foundation, and has referred your letter of June 23 to me.

We have looked up the full minute covering this appropriation, C.M. 2693, and according to our interpretation, the grant was to apply against remittances on the whole construction program made subsequent to November, 1924. The appropriations for buildings and equipment, C.M. 2692, and for loss in exchange, C.M. 2693, were based on a statement giving the total estimated cost of the construction program, funds remitted, funds pledged, and additional funds needed, made up by Mr. R. S. Greene from figures furnished him at the time, which appeared in the minutes of the China Medical Board of November 5, 1924. You will note from the copy of this statement which I enclose that a sum of \$145,593.63 is shown as available, to which the appropriations C.M. 2692 of \$50,000, plus \$10,000 from sources other than the China Medical Board, and C.M. 2693 of \$30,000 for loss in exchange, were additional. Therefore, according to our interpretation of the resolution, a copy of which is included with

It might be that later remittances would show an advantage in exchange which would balance earlier losses.

It is our understanding that the political conditions for the past few years have made it impossible or inadvisable for you to proceed with the construction planned and that comparatively little has been done on the items numbered 1 to 8 in the statement enclosed. If the building program were moving forward rapidly with prospect of completion within a short time, and you were suffering from an adverse rate of exchange we should be glad to make payments on account of our appropriation, but under the circumstances, we should prefer to delay payment until we have further information.

We should appreciate it if you could give us a statement of what has been accomplished on the building program so far, and a statement of remittances since November, 1924, indicating losses or gains in exchange.

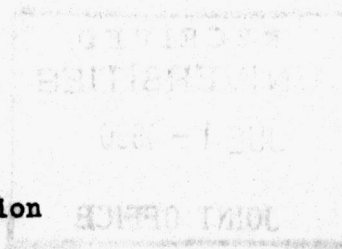

We enclose herewith a report showing the income of the School of Medicine and Hospital at Shantung Christian University for the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1930.

You will note that the income from the various sources exclusive of the Women's Committee and the Rockefeller Foundation was L.C. \$156,715.51, as compared with L.C. \$122,325.00 prior to the year 1923-24. The income from the Women's Committee was L.C. \$37,405.32, as compared with the required minimum of L.C. \$28,000.00.

The report contains the actual items of receipt for the year 1929-30 as shown in the report of the field treasurer of the University, with the exception of the figures given for salaries and allowances of staff members supported by the various cooperating Mission Boards. Since these salaries and allowances are paid direct by the Mission Boards to their missionaries they do not appear on the University's records and it would be an extremely tedious task to obtain accurate figures of actual disbursements by the dozen or more Boards concerned. We have therefore adopted the basis of L.C. \$6,000.00 as the salary and allowances of a married member of staff, and L.C. \$3,000.00 for single members of staff. I believe that in view of the fact that most of these salaries and allowances were paid in gold and that the average rate of exchange last year was around three to one these figures are quite conservative, and that actual disbursements were probably in excess of these amounts.

We trust that you will find this report acceptable as showing that the University during 1929-30 fully met the conditions under which the Foundation appropriated L.C. \$40,000.00 toward the support of this medical work.

If and when you are satisfied that the conditions of the Foundation's appropriation for last year have been fully met, we would request that you authorize the Comptroller of the Foundation to advance, on substantially the same basis as was used last year, the Foundation's appropriation of L.C. \$40,000.00 toward the medical work at Shantung Christian University for 1930-31. I would propose that these advances be made as follows:— L.C. \$20,000.00 covering the first two quarters of the present fiscal year (which began July 1, 1930),

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to be remitted immediately; L.C. \$10,000.00 covering the quarter ending March 31, 1932, to be remitted about February 15th; L.C. \$10,000.00 covering the quarter ending June 30, 1931, to be remitted about May 15th. Dear Doctor Shields:

In connection with your request of September 23 for a renewal of the annual grant, we reviewed with care the relationships between the Foundation and the Shantung Christian University since the grant of March 7, 1916. It was interesting to see that excluding the last grant of March 17, 1955 the amount of money spent from these grants is recorded as \$534,754.15.

At the time of my visit last year the amount of work done on the support provided by the various missionary organizations showed that extremely effective use has been made of the support received. I want you to know of this feeling on our part since in essence the action taken by the Trustees at this annual meeting on December 13 might be open to misinterpretation. The copy of the official notification from the Foundation's Secretary to Mr. Garside which is enclosed, indicates the action taken.

The clause indicating that this grant will mark the termination of support derives from the decision to narrow down the Foundation's interest more specifically to research projects in limited fields and to discontinue programs of general support to medical education. It is not a singling out of any one institution but a matter of general policy. I greatly regret the disappointment and difficulty that will be caused.
