

Since you were present at the October meeting of the North American Joint Board of the Shantung Christian University, no special communication was addressed to your Mission Board expressing the hope of the University that the Church of the Erethren would see its way clear to become a participating unit in the University, presumably in the School of Theology, through supplying Mr. Cassady to the staff.

I think I explained to you that the consideration of supplying a member of the staff with residence or rent plus an annual grant of Mex. \$1000.00 qualified the contributing Mission Board to representation on the North American Joint Board and on the Field Board of Managers of the University in China. It has occurred to me that, if the Church of the Brethren wish to undertake the obligation and become a participating unit in the University, they might wish to be represented on the Board of Governors, which, under the new charter, will have its initial and organizing meeting sometime in the not distant future, probably about the time of the Washington Convention or in April, 1925.

If your Board were to certify to its desire to accept the basis of cooperation, I am sure arrangements could be made for its official representation at the initial meeting of the Board of Governors.

Thank you for your letter of November 26th just received. It is fine to know of the probability that your Board will place Mr. Cassady on the staff of Shantung Christian University.





I want to acknowledge with many thinks the receipt of your letter and the copies of the Minutes and By-Laws received a few days ago. I am sure we appreciate the generous invitation to join you in the work in the Shantung Christian University and we trust in due time that this will work out most satisfactorily.

Mr. Cassady, who has been appointed by our Board for that work, like every good man, contemplates marriage, and his intended wife tho of excellent health, has recently discovered a difficulty that will require an operation, and the doctor thinks it will be very much better for her not to go to China this year since she is teaching, and this operation can not take place before late summer. This looks very much as tho their going this year would be delayed. While this is a great disappointment both to us and Mr. Cassady, we are wondering if it will have any material effect on the plans for the university itself, tho we presume they are in a position to meet such conditions as these when they come. If you should have any counsel to give, we would appreciate.it.

I think Mr. Cassady would go alone rather than have the matter interfere too seriously, but this obviously would have some disadvantages in both of them meeting the Chinese situation and learning the language together in the preparation for their further work.

My dear Dr. North:

My desk today on my return from the east, in which you make inquiry about the situation concerning Mr. Cassady's going out to China this fall.

I regret to say that this matter has caused us no little concern and disappointment, first because we were anxious to enter into this cooperation with Shan Tung, and second, we believe Mr. Cassady would have made a good man in his chosen field. He is even yet thinking some of going out but I am in receipt of a letter today in which he asks for the possibility of another year here since as Y. M. C. A. secretary at the college of William and Mary, in Virginia, they are very desirous of having him remain another year. As you can see, this is a delicate matter for us to urge his going out under the circumstances, and yet we feel that it should not be delayed any longer.

Our Board will have a meeting on June 9th at which time the matter will be finally settled one way or another. Meanwhile we would be glad to hear from you, your judgment as to what affect a year's delay might have. We are inclined to feel, personally, that perhaps he should go out this year or we should abandon the idea of cooperation and leave the field open for some one else. However, we have always been anxious that this cooperative work at Shan Tung would work out. We have always been most appreciative of its leaders and the spirit of the institution as well as the good work they have done.

At our Board meeting at our General Conference in Lincoln, Nebraska, last week the question of our cooperation with the Shan Tung Christian University was considered. In view of the fact that our students raised \$1000.00 this year for the purpose of our cooperation, the Board decided that this money should be turned over for this purpose in due time. In the light of Mr. Cassady's being detained in this country, however, they deferred further consideration of cooperation with the University until we had something more definite. The Board, as well as myself, has been disappointed in the repeated delays of Mr. Cassady's getting to the field. Yet it is a matter over which no one has had any control.

Developments in our mission in China have caused them to ask us to defer cooperation until after a deputation visits the field which we are expecting to do this winter. A member of our Board and myself hope to visit China during the coming fall and winter. Personally, I have always been anxious to cooperate with Shan Tung, especially thru its theological department, and I am hoping yet that this can be worked out, the for the present it will be deferred until we visit the field, and study more carefully the tendencies and probable developments of our work there.

My dear Mr. Garside: Your letter was received yesterday referring to Mr. Floyd Denlinger who has made application for appointment to the staff of Shan Tung University. Mr. Denlinger wrote us concerning this matter after he had written you. I am not intimately acquainted with this young man but know that he comes from a very good family, is a young man of earnest purpose and clear thinking, and no doubt he is qualified to do good work on the mission field. I hope to meet him personally before long when I shall know more about his qualifications. Three years ago we made an appropriation to Shantung Christian University with the hope of placing a man on its faculty. Our China mission for some reason was not enthusiastic about this and later the difficulties arose in the country and the matter has been abandoned. With our present deficit in mission funds I doubt if our Board would consider at the present time supporting a man in Shantung. I think the mission, however, has become more sympathetic with this plan and some time in the future it might be considered, but I think it could not at the present time. Meanwhile we shall get in touch with Mr. Denlinger, and if he shows the strong possibilities that we believe he has we shall try to keep him interested and perhaps ultimately get him located in the work of his choice. However, this should not interfere with you if you have some way of placing him in this work meanwhile. We are very glad to hear the good word from Tsinan. They have had more than their share of uncertainty during the conflict of the past couple of years and we trust that it will only add to their usefulness in the years ahead. State Street Elgin, Illinois My dear Dr. Bonsack: During the last few weeks I have been in correspondence with Mr. Floyd Denlinger, who is seeking an appointment to the staff of Shantung Christian University. I have not as yet been able to make a detailed study of Mr. Denlinger's qualifications but my first impression of him is, on the whole, favorable. Of course, if any appointment were made, it would only be done after consultation with the field and at their request. I find that Mr. Denlinger is a member of the Church of the Brethren and would, naturally, like to go out to China under your Board. Since the Church of the Brethren has been cooperating in Shantung Christian University, I hope there may be a possibility that your Board would be able to provide his support if it should prove that he is needed and qualified for work in the University. I do not know whether you are well acquainted with 4. Denlinger, personally, but if you do know him, I should very much appreciate your judgment as to whether he is qualified in training, ability and Christian spirit for work at the University. I would also be glad to have you form a judgment as to the likelihood whether the Church of the Brethren would be able to provide Mr. Denlinger's support at the University. From what I know of the financial situation at Teinan, I am quite sure that they would not be able to appoint Mr. Denlinger, no matter how well qualified he may be unless some new source of income for providing his support can be secured. Our latest word from Tsinan indicates that the University is going ahead surprisingly well this year in spite of the Sine-Japanese trouble of last summer, the continued occupation of the province by Japanese troops, and all the other problems of military disturbances and economic depression. The University is earrying on its program with a fairly satisfactory enrolment and with an excellent spirit pervading the faculty and student body. BAG/RH

My dear Dr. Bonsack:

We thank you for your letter of March 5th in reply to my inquiry of February 28th concerning Mr.Floyd Denlinger and the possibility that your Board might be able to support him on the staff of Shantung Christian University.

We are very glad to have your favorable comments concerning Mr.Denlinger. We regret, however, that the present financial situation of your Board is such as to make it impossible for you to favorably consider supporting him at Shantung Christian University. I know that everyone at Shantung warmly hopes the General Mission Board of the Church of the Brethren may soon be able to appoint a man for the University staff. Whether Mr.Denlinger is the man you would naturally choose, I do not know.

Just at this time general funds for the support of additional members of the staff at Shantung are so scarce that there is practically no possibility of appointing Mr.Denlinger or, for that matter, anyone else unless support can be provided by some of the cooperating Boards. We will, however, continue to keep in touch with Mr.Denlinger in the hope that some satisfactory arrangement may be made in the future.
