My dear Dr. Frankling +-

The services which the Department of Missionary Training, of the University of Nanking, more commonly known as the "Nanking Language School," has been rendering to more than twenty-eight of the missionary societies in giving indispensible instruction and assistance to their missionaries in their first year of service are well known. In the last ten years more than 720 have received training, the enrolment at the beginning of the current year being 133.

It has been the fact, however, that during this entire period there has been no charge for rent, the fees paid covering only board and tuition. Furthermore, the housing of the students has been hitherto almost entirely in the homes which the missionary community have generously opened to the students. (One dormitory now provides for twenty-two students.) Conditionshhave now become so congested that it is imperative that these students no longer be housed in missionary homes in such large numbers. Your attention is directed to the attached statement by Mr. C.S. Which has long been recognized by missionaries and board Secretaries cognizent of the facts.

It has become distressingly urgent that none dormitories be erected and that increased facilities for the school be provided. The University has already set apart the site now used by the school. Plans are ready for two additional dormitories which, with the one now in use (a gift to the University) will provide for 100 students. These dormitories will cost approximately \$120,000 Local Currency.

The Trustees of the University believe that the boards whose missionaries are trained in the school will recognize the propriety of a request for assistance in building these dormitories. The school is a service school for the boards only. It is the care of their missionaries that is at stake. For missionaries in stations it is the custom of the board to provide accommodations or rent. Surely the same should be done for these new missionaries.

The Trustees accordingly desire to suggest that your board provide \$15,000 Docal Currency for the erection of these dormitories. This sum is calculated as follows: The annual average number of all students for the last five years for all the boards having an average of one or more

call upon dormitory facilities.

In order to accumulate further sums for the administration and recitation building, only less necessary than the Cormitories, the Trustees have voted a charge (1) a fixed rent for each student and (2) a property charge "or each student. These charges will operate as follows:

- (1) Rent of \$100 Local Currency for the academic residential year to be paid by all students to the School. Where such students are resident in missionery homes the School will transfer to the mission providing housing the exact sum of the rent. Rents from students in School Dormitories will be accumulated in a building fund. There will be no remission of this charge.
- (2) A Property Fund Charge of \$200 Local Currency a year will be made to each board for each student it has in the School. When a board has put up capital for the buildings, its annual Property Fund Charge will be reduced by ten per cent of the capital paid in by the beginning of each term. Thus a board having in one year ten st deats will be charged \$2000 Local Currency. If it shall have padi in \$10,000 Local Currency for the building the charge will be rejuced by \$1000. The receipts from these Property Fudn Charges will be accumulated in a fund for the building needed.

It should be noted further that the action of the Trustees provides for the elimination of the charges for property fund as soon as the funds for completing the buildings needed are in hand.

The effect of those cetions is simply to condense the payments of rent, which would otherwise be spread over a very long period into a few years in order that you students may now have the use of proper facilities at the earliest cossible moment. A financial statement of the project is attached herewith showing its working in detail.

For purpos soff explanation of this matter and the answering of inpairies a conference upon it will be called during the Foreign Missions Conference at Atlantic City. I trust, however, that, if possible, you will present the matter to your board and will be able to bring to Atlantic City a favorable reply to the suggestion of the Trustees looking to the immediate build not of dormitories.

I have made inquiry here about Dr. Gibbs' status with reference to any possible special provision for his salary. There has been some negotiation with Amherst Agginto take over his salary, but the matter has dragged on so long that the prospect does not seem very good. But since the negotiations have not been definitely salled off it will not be possible for you and Reisner to make more than a tentative suggestion that your young men or Church take over his salary. If there seems liklihood that New Rochelle would undertake this piece of work, Miss Hodges, of the Home Dept. of the Society, should be informed so that she can find out definitely what Amherst is thinking about. If you pass the word to me I can tell her, or you could get here directly on the phone or by letter.

As to the other contribution of this Society to the Univ. of Nanking, there is a readjustment in prospect by which we shall merely be making a contribution to cover the medical attention to our missionaries resident there, including language school students. This is hardly a thing which your men would be interested to allocate their money to, so his salary is the only item within the regular budget which Reisner's boost might particularly affect.

My dear Mr. Scott:

I write in reply to your letter of March 13 in which you inquire whether the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society intends to reimburse the School of Agriculture and Forestry in Manking University for the amount of \$1800, this claim being due on account of the year and one half which elapsed between January 1,1920 and the date on which this Society provided a teacher on the staff of that School.

This claim presented by the University raises a question which probably we would not have brought up under other circumstances. As you know, the participation of this Board in Nanking University is limited to those departments which do not duplicate the work of Shanghai College. Several years ago we sent Mr.L.B.Moss as a teacher for service in the Normal School of Manking University. After a short time in that school he appears to have been transferred to work in the University proper. As far as we can recall nothing was ever said to us about this transfer, although it involved us in participation in the University proper which was not in harmony with our intent and desire. Mr. Moss was in this work for about three years. We have never raised the question because we had not been advised officially of the change, for one thing, and because we did not wish to be stickling for an over-scrupulous observance of the letter of our agreement. Even when the question about which I am now writing was first brought to our attention we hesitated to raise the issue. We feel, however, that it is only fair to do so, if we are to be called to account for a delay in finding and placing a man in the School of Agriculture. This delay was not due to a lack of interest on our part, nor to a failure to prosecute the search for a suitable worker. It is by no means easy to find men who are specialists in such lines and have the missionary spirit.

We should be glad to have your response to this question which we raise, namely, whether in fairness, the University ought to make this claim for \$1800. upon our Society, in view of the statement presented above. Our

feeling is that we are hardly justified in acceding to the suggestion that we make reimbursement to the amount of \$1800. for the year and a half in which we were seeking to find a man for the position which we purposed to fill. Furthermore, when it comes to a question of services to the University, we have provided such already, in the case of L. B. Moss, beyond our expectation and beyond the term of one year and a half which is named.



My dear Dr. Cross:

You wrote to me under date of March 21st regarding the request of the Manking University Trustees for the financial equivalent of an agricultural teacher at the rate of \$1200. gold per year, beginning January 1st, 1920.

I understand that Dr. John E. Williams, Vice-President of the University, has recently conferred with you on this situation and has discussed with you a number of factors, some of which were apparently not known to you when you dictated the letter.

As regards Mr. Hoss, my understanding has been that he was doing constructive service in the preparation of Christian teachers, although the University had not set up a distinct and separate school of education.

In regard to the support of an agricultural man by each of the Cooperating Boards, this was voted by the University Trustees in the Summer of 1919. I understand that on the basis of this prospective increased support from the constituent Boards that the University expanded its College of Agriculture and Forestry and that it was put to large additional expense on account of the delay in arrival on the field of the agricultural representatives of the various Boards. Each of the Boards has now sent an agricultural man to the staff of the University, and each Board, with one exception, has also reimbursed the University at the rate of \$1200. gold a year from January 1st, 1920 until the date of arrival of its representative on the field.

I have no wish to press this question and especially as I understand Dr. Franklin is looking into the Manking University situation in connection with his present visit in China.

My dear Doctor Franklin:

I am directed by action of the Executive Committee of the Trustees of the University of Nanking to transmit to you the request of the Trustees that the cooperating Boards increase their appropriation by \$1000 gold annually, guaranteed at two for one beginning July 1, 1922, the effect of this being to increase the appropriation in the calendar year 1922 by \$500 and to increase it by \$1000 in 1923 over the appropriation of 1921.

As you will have already noted, the University is faced with a deficit which has arisen from unexpected increase in prices of scientific equipment and transportation costs. It is also feeling very strongly the pressure of increased salaries t members of its Chinese Staff whom it is having difficulty in retaining for the longer periods of service which it is desired they should render.

The report of the China Educational Commission has been entirely favorable to Nanking and has even ventured to suggest additional responsibilities to be put upon it.

most cordial in their cooperation and have made several advances in the number of members of the Staff for which they have assumed responsibility; but for some years there hasbeen no increase in the amount of the current appropriations made by the Boards and it is from such increase, and from increased income on the field, such as has been already secured, that the increased costs must be met. The request of the Trustees is less than the request forwarded to them by the Managers, not because they have felt that the request of the Managers was unjustified but because they felt that at the present time the Boards were not prepared to meet the request of the Board of Managers to the full extent.

It is the earnest hope of the Trustees that the American Baptist Foreign Missionary Society will be able to make the increased appropriation requested.



My dear Booter Franklin:

At the meeting of the Truste's of Nanhing University on July 7, 1922, the Secretary reported a resolution of the China Medical Board as follows:

"Resolved (C.M.-2573) that the Sum of nine thousand two hundred fifty dellars (\$9.250) a year for five years ending December 31, 1926, be, and it is hereby, appropriated to the NANKING UNION HOSPITAL FOR MAINTENANCE on the following conditions:

- That this appropriation shall be used for general maintenance expenses of the hospital, including foreign salaries
- That the missionary societies shall contribute annually \$11750 for the same purpose during the same period and shall continue its grants for expenses for foreign salaries and general maintenance of this hospital not shared by the China Medical Board at a rate not less than during the year 1921.
- "3. That payments shall be made in accordance with the following schedule:

"4. That if during any year as schedule in Item 3 the society does not conform to all conditions, the appropriation of the Board for that year will automatically lapse."

The Trustees took the following action:

"T-9: VOTED: That the Prestees of the University of Manking express their appreciation of the action of the China Medical Board (CM-2575) appropriating [9,250 a year to the Manking University Hospital for five years ending December 31, 1926, on conditions specified in the action and in the letter of Mr. Roger S. Greene, April 18, 1922, and that the Trustees will refer the action to the cooperating missionary boards for confirmation, anticipating favorable action in all response."

This, as I understand it, means the continuation of the appropriation which your Borr is at present making for the maintenance of Manking University Hospital.

In order that the understandings of the Boards and of the China Medical Bard upon this matter may be definite, may I ask for assurance that your Board intends to continue the appropriations made at present?

My dear Dr. North:-

I write in reply to your letter of July 27th with regard to the agreement between the China Medical Board and the Board of Trustees of the University of Nanking.

On September 20, 1921, the Board of Managers of the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society took action with regard to the appropriations for the Hospital of the University of Nanking as follows:-

VOTED: That having completed the five-year term during which the Board agreed to make an appropriation in support of medical work at Nanking, China, the Trustees of Nanking University be advised that the renewal of such an agreement does not seem possible in view of other pressing obligations.

That conditional upon concurrent action of the Woman's American Baptist Foreign Mission Society, and as a remuneration for medical services to missionaries of either Board who may be located at Nanking, either as students at the Language School or in permanent service, an appropriation of such part of \$1000 Mex. as may be determined to upon in conference with the Woman's Board will be made annually for a period of five years to the Hospital of the University of Nanking.

Stosequent to this, the Board of the Woman's Society took action assuming responsibility for their share of this total of \$1000 Mex. We are therefore committed to this amount of \$1000 Mex. annually for a term of five years  $\frac{9}{3/2^2}$  beginning with the fiscal year 1922 of the University.

My dear Dr. Cross:

In response to your letter of February 1st regarding the question raised as to the financial relationship of the Baptist Foreign Mission Society to the University of Nanking, I called at your office today to talk this matter over with you, but found that you were engaged in another meeting. So that I shall try to set forth the situation as clearly as possible in this letter:

The Board of Managers of the University on October 9th included in their minutes a lengthy statement with regard to the relationship between the Baptist Board and the University. Probably you have a copy of these minutes in your files, as copies were sent to each member of the Board of Trustees. My understanding of the situation is that according to the statement which is worked out in the minutes, the Baptist Board is very nearly meeting its quota under the existing agreement. The request of the Board of Managers was that the mission boards increase their appropriations to the university by a total of \$16,000 Mexican. The various mission boards other than the Baptists have agreed to increase their appropriations by \$2,000 Mexican a piece per year. This makes only \$6.000 of the total asked for. I wish it might be possible for the Baptist Board to increase its appropriation proportionataly at least with the increase that the other boards have made. I think on the basis of the figures which they present that an increase of \$750 Mexican a year would represent such an amount as would be proportionate to the increase from the other boards.

The action of the managers in recognizing the amount of cooperation that the Baptist Board enters into in the university seems to steer clear very nicely of setting any definite amount for the Baptist Board to contribute. During the last ten years, since the Baptist Board joined the Union, a number of changes in the organization of the university have necessitated a rearrangement of the proportionate shares of the cost of conducting the work at the university. As you will recall, two years ago we came home on furlough. Since that time no one has taken our place at the university in the Department of Education, although the university has been under the necessity of providing for the work done. As a matter of fact, the work in the whole university has grown out of all proportion to the grants which the various boards are making for annual current expenses. We are now having to support seventeen foreigners on the

university staff in addition to the members who are supported directly by the mission boards. This constitutes a very much increased source of expenditure, and is no doubt one of the causes for the heavy deficit at this time.

I realize that the action of the Board of Managers was taken quite largely because of the insistence of people in China that a definite agreement be arrived at, and that perhaps that is as far as the board in this country will be willing to go. I wish, however, that it might be possible for the Baptist support of the university to be somewhat more closely in the proportion which the other boards are maintaining, both in the present appropriations and in the increases which they are making.

In response to your letter of February 3rd, raising the question as to how the deficit of the College of Agriculture came to be incurred, may I quote to you from the Board of Managers' Minutes of October 9, again:

I assume that the first item is practically entirely due to current expenses, very largely because of the necessity of meeting the increases in salary granted two years ago when the advancing prices made it necessary to give the Chinese a higher rate of salary. This is as much information as I have on the case, and so I fear I cannot be more explicit, but the action I should think would be clear enough so that the Baptist Board would be able to come to a decision on it. Here again, I very much hope that they will be able to give the university the needed assistance. There is no question in my mind that in the cooperative enterprise it will be most successful if the various boards can enter into it in the spirit of carrying the work forward. If the situation requires a firm adherence to what was adopted at the time the union was inaugurated it means very serious restrictions upon the progress of the work now, and the university has been laboring heavily under the difficulties imposed by the very limited finances for current expenses.





Dear Mr. Moss: Pursuant to our conversation, I am glad to give you herewith the three suggestions which were worked out by Mr. Williams and myself as possible applications of the income of the Sherwin Fund. Reference to the original correspondence and action of the Trustees in accepting this fund will indicate, I think, that there were two principal conditions; one, that it was given as an endowment for the Medical Department of Nanking University, and the other, that in the use of the income, students nominated by the South China Baptist Mission were to have preference. With these conditions in mind Mr. Williams and I worked out the following points regarding the order of which there may be some difference of opinion. 1. For the support of students nominated by the South China Baptist Mission who are attending Nanking University in the pre-medical department or in the nurses' training department. 2. For support of students nominated by the South China Baptist Mission who are attending medical schools elsewhere in China. 3. For the support of students at the discretion of the University who are studying in medical or pre-medical schools. It is my recollection that Mr. Williams was to take this matter up with the legal adviser of the Trustees and secure his opinion as to whether the suggested application of the income to all or any of these objects would be proper.
