We were continually embarrassed by not having any representatives from your society on I by not having any representatives from your society on I want to refer you to that note in the minutes, which makes it necessary for your three representatives to concur in it necessary for your three representatives to concur in various actions before they become binding. I enclose here with three copies of the minutes of this informal conference, with three copies of the minutes of this informal conference, one for each of your three trustees. I also enclose a copy of the proposed constitution and of the minutes of the first regular meeting of the Board of Managers. If you have already received these pamphlets, please return those I am enclosing to me. We have a very limited number.

You will note in the minutes that we found it necessary to lay the matter of incorporation before the attorneys. Does your Society have an attorney in New York attorneys. Does your Society have an attorney in New York with whom I could consult with reference to this matter? If not, do you have any one whom you could nominate for this juryose. I am expecting to consult the regular attorneys of the Methodist and Presbyterian Boards.

My dear Dr. McLean,

In order to secure the incorporation of the Found of Trustees of the new University of Nanking, it may be necessary to present some legal document showing the willingness and the grounds on which the three co-creating Missiens have agreed to anter into this union project. As it now stands there is nothing to indicate this agreement other than the minutes on the books of three different missionary societies.

It may be necessary to draw up one single locument and have it signed by the officers of the three Reards: To this end will so please send to me an exact copy of the minute with reference to the co-operation of your Foard in this union project? I will then lay the matter before the attorneys here in New York and some decument will a drawn up which can be sent to the three co-operating Boards and criticised or amonded and later signed.

You have neglected to give us any information as to what person or boly of persons hold the title of property of the Foreign Christian Mission which has been placed at the disposal of the University of Nanking. I have received in a letter from Mr. Frank Garrett the foldowing certificate: "This is to certify that the property of the Foreign Christian Mission which is placed at the disposal of the University of Nanking, is held on perpetual lease and the deeds and titles are in proper order, and re without incumbrances." This certificate is duly executed and signed before the ViceConsul in Manking.

My dear Dr. McLean:

At the last meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Wanking, it was voted to express to you the Board's grateful appreciation of the invaluable help which you have given to the University. The Trustees have been greatly encouraged in going forward with the trust which has been laid upon them by the generous response which you and other friends have made to the unique call which has come to the home churches from the present wonderful opportunity in China. Nowhere is this opportunity larger or more inviting than in Manking, and the cordial attitude of the Chinese and the unanimity of mind among the missionaries with regard to the University have been matched by the unprecedented spirit of cooperation among the Home Boards and Societies. Everyone whose interests touch at all the field of work of the University has taken up at attitude of complete cordiality and good-will toward it, so that we have now in the University and its affiliated schools the completest illustration of cooperation and unity in missionary work of which we know. This is one of many assurances to us that the blessing of God is upon the work.

We are anxious that the full equipment needed by the University and the endowment required for its present work may be secured, so as to enable Mr. Williams to return to take up the equally important work of developing the interest and the support of the Chinese.

The Board of Missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

The American Baptist Foreign Missionary Society.

These Boards have all agreed to meet the conditions imposed by the Board of Trustees upon those Boards entering the Medical Department, and have appointed representatives to the Board of Trustees. On receipt of favorable action by the three cooperating Boards, these persons will be admitted to the Board of Trustees.

On the present cooperating basis of the different Mission Boards in the University of Nanking, those Boards having entered into the full relationship have agreed to the support of four missionaries each in the University of Nanking. Those Boards participating in the Medical School have agreed to furnish one doctor each for the work of the Medical School in Nanking.

At the last meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University held July 18 in New York City, the Board discussed the possible procedure in case any Board failed to have in Nanking the full quota of missionaries according to the above agreements.

After full consideration of the whole matter, it was voted that the following resolution should be sent to all of the participating Boards. In passing this resolution, the Board of Trustees felt it would be a more equitable division of responsibility and more likely to produce a more stable administration of the work of the University if those Boards not having a full quota of missionaries on the field should pay to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees the amount of money thus represented.

The following is the resolution:

IT WAS VOTED that each Board should be asked to recognise the duty of providing the salaries of missionaries (\$1500. Gold each) whenever a Board does not have its full quota on the field.

Will you kindly lay this matter before your Board and report to me such action or consideration as they may see fit to take regarding it?

Dear Dr. McLean:

Dr. Huntington, of the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society, has sent to me the action of their Board of Managers, under date of November 12, with reference to the University of Nanking. The first item is as follows:

VOTED: That in pursuance of earlier action by the Board approval be given to the plans of Rev. C. S. Keen for special study in New York City during his furlough with a view to preparation for his work in the Union Language School in Nanking on his return to the field and that sanction be given for an expenditure of \$307.75 including the sum of \$100. already advanced to Mr. Keen with the understanding that correspondence will be had with the Trustees of Nanking University regarding an adjustment of this expenditure.

Regarding this item, I quote the following from Dr. Hunt-ington's letter:

"Fegarding the expense of Mr. Kean's study, I would say just this; we have no desire whatever to shift to the Board of Trustees any expenditure that properly belongs to our Board. The question simply arose in our minds as to whether such expense as that contemplated by Mr. Keen was regarded by the Trustees as a proper charge against the University funds. I do not know what your practice has been. If it is the proper thing for the Trustees to provide for special study of members of the faculty, then we would be glad to have this matter considered by you. On the other hand, if any such expense is regarded as properly belonging to the Board whose representative is involved, then we would be very glad to care for the matter ourselves. If you can give me the necessary information without bringing the matter formally to the Board, I would appreciate it."

What have you to say on this matter? Shall we put it on the docket for the next Board meeting? I am referring it also to President Bowen, Dr. Speer, and Dr. North.
