

The great union Christian College at the heart of Manking has been a conspicuous target for government agents during the last year, although it is a registered school. The University has complied with one order which divided its College of arts and Science into two Colleges. Anoter order led to the disbandonment of the Department of Religion, but a compromise was affected by which all the courses in the Department are now offered under other existing Departments. Due to radical pressure within and without the University, the Student Christian Association has been discontinued. However, a small and carnest Christian group continues active within the Colleges, taking part in the two week-day religious chapel services, in the Sunday morning church service, and in the University Thursday evening prayer meeting. Prominent members of the faculty including several Deans are outspokenly Christian and one-fifth of the student body is recorded as in fellowship with the Christian Church. Under the influence of President Chen, faculty discussion groups in religious subjects are being held, and a fine sense of religious subjects are being of responsibility for maintaining a Christian atmosphere is falt on the part of these faculty members. The enrollment continues large, 575 in the colleges, and 496 in the Middle School. Our Methodist responsibility in this important institution is represented by Dr. A.J. Bowen, now on furlough, Dr. J.T. Illick in zoology, Dr. A.K.Steward in botany, Prof. F.P.Jones and Miss Adelaide Wixon in Inglish. With eager anticipation we await the word that Dr. and Mrs. A.J. Bowen are on their way back to the University.

Dear Mr. Garside:-

At the meeting of the Board of Foreign Missions' Executive Committee held yesterday, formal approval was given to the recently received Constitutions for the Board of Directors and the Board of Governors of the West China Union University. This matter was presented at the December meeting but in order to carry out the policy of the Board, it was submitted to a sub-committee of which Dr. Frank Mason North was Chairman. Its report was of course favorable and the action taken was unanimous, registering approval of these Constitutions.

Our action carried with it the notation to inform the Board of Governors of said action by our Board, therefore I am informing the Board of Governors direct.

In answer to your letter of October 30th to Dr. Edwards, relative to the payments of our Board for the University Hospital in Nanking, let me state that this has been under consideration also in our Staff, and yesterday was presented to the Executive Committee for formal action. The following resolution was passed:-

> "That the Treasurer of the Board of Foreign Missions be authorized to pay the annual appropriation of the Board to the University Hospital, Nanking, in gold, thru the treasurer of the Board of Founders of the University of Nanking, in New York, rather than in Chinese silver currency in China."



At the Executive Committee meeting of our Board of Foreign Missions the following action was taken:

"In re: the Board's agreement with the Yenching and Nanking Universities (one) to furnish a certain amount of missionary teachers and (two) whenever this is impossible, to contribute a specified sum of money to the current expenses of the universities in lieu of the missionary teachers.

"Owing to the cut for 1931, it seems necessary to change our commitments in Yenching University from six to five missionaries and in the University of Nanking from five to four.

"IT WAS VOTED that authorization be given to the Secretaries to notify the Yenching University that we can for the present assume obligations for only five missionary teachers, and in the University of Nanking assume responsibility for providing only four; it being understood that the Secretaries will consult with the groups with whom we are associated in these Universities before taking such action, and with the further understanding that if strong representations are made by the other Boards opposing such action, the case will be again presented to the Executive Committee."

We have followed the action of the Executive Committee, have written to the other Boards concerned and received replies from some of these including one with headquarters in London. Therefore it is felt that the conditions laid down by the Executive Committee have been met. The other Boards have been gracious in recognizing the condition in which we find ourselves and do not raise objection to our taking this action.

It is with regret that we recognize the necessity laid upon us and with an expression of personal hope that our financial condition will so improve in the near future that we can once again meet our obligations.

Let me acknowledge receipt of your letter of January 23.

In this letter you first report the action of the Executive Committee of the Methodist Board of Foreign Missions in approving the revised Constitutions for the Board of Directors and the Board of Governors of West China Union University. I will communicate this approval to Dr. Frank Anderson, the Secretary of the West China Board.

Your letter also reports that at this same meeting the Executive Committee of the Methodist Board approved the request of the University of Nanking that your Board pay its annual appropriation to the University Hospital in Nanking in gold through the Treasurer of the Board of Founders in New York, rather than in Chinese silver currency in China. This action of the Methodist Board will be of real assistance to Nanking University Hospital in grappling with the serious problem caused by the large deficit the Hospital is now facing.



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

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

With mail from the University of Nanking today we have received the original of your letter of March 14, which was sent to Nanking by mistake.





My dear Mr. Cartwright:

I am attaching hereto for your informal consideration and advice a sheaf of correspondence I have just received from Miss Priest in regard to the payment of the Methodist Board appropriation toward the support of the University Hospital for the first five months of 1931.

You will note that Miss Priest's position in the matter is that, since this appropriation was defined in gold from January 1, 1931, the University is entitled to GDELE. SO or its actual equivalent for this period. Mr. Hale, on the other hand, while recognizing that the remittance he has made to cover the first five menths is not equivalent to G\$312.50, takes the attitude that the University is "mighty lucky, and should be grateful" to get anything at all on the appropriation.

The difference involved is only a little more than Giloo and naturally the University does not wish to press the claim for such a small amount even thoughtit appears that its case is quite a clear one, if insistence on securing the full amount of this appropriation would have any unfavorable effect on other appropriations, present or future, from Methodist sources.

I would appreciate it if you would give us your own informal judgment as to whether it would be wiser for us to drop the matter entirely, rather than bring it particularly to the attention of the Methodist Board.

Dear Mr. Garside: -

Treasurer Ehnes sent to me the following memorandum:

Recently we have been obliged to purchase guaranteed mortgages at 5% whereas heretofore we were able to buy at  $5\frac{1}{2}\%$ . Railroad bonds are now yielding only about 4%. This makes it necessary for us to reduce the income on our Permanent Funds to 41%.

The Finance Committee voted at its last meeting to reduce the income on various funds from 5% to 4\frac{1}{2}%. On the funds listed below we have paid 5% heretofore but in making the appropriations for 1932 we shall only be able to pay  $4\frac{1}{2}\%$ .

Inasmuch as our appropriations have been made for the current calendar year, I assume that the effect will not be felt until the appropriations for 1932 are made. Being interested in Nanking University, which is one of the institutions which will suffer by such action, I am trusting that before 1932 there will be a change in business conditions.



You will recollect that you are members of the Special Committee appointed by the Nanking Founders to deal with matters of Salary, Status and Retirement of the University Western members of Staff.

During recent months we have been inconsultation with the field with regard to the revision of the schedule of salaries and allowances for University Western Staff. The last schedule drawn by the Board of Founders was adopted in 1925-1926, and has now become unsatisfactory at a number of points.



There is a debit against our Methodist account in Nanking University, the amount being the proceeds of \$1300Gold at rates current in 1929. This was our appropriation to the University in lieu of a missionary on the staff. The sum of \$2600. was appropriated, but the University records show that only \$1700 was paid over. Our books show that the other \$1700 went to the field.

Please investigate this. If you find that the university's records and ours agree (that only half of that year's appropriation was paid) you are authorized to pay to the University of Nanking \$1300.Gold at exchange rates used in 1929, charging this amount against Appropriation Balances (Classes I, II and III) of the Central China Conference.

Please let us know at your early convenience what amount in Medican you have paid to the University and what the remaining balance, if any, is to the credit of Central China Conference.



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

We now have a letter from our general treasurer in Shanghai, concerning this matter, which reads as follows:-


"On checking up this item, we find that the Board paid the first two quarters of the \$2600.G. appropriated, but did not pay the third and fourth quarters. As this was carried forward into appropriation balances at the end of the year on our books, we are now paying it out of this account. The average rate of exchange for the second half year 1929 was \$2.4528 and at this rate the G.\$1300. due amounts to Mex.\$3118.64 for which amount we have sent our check to the Treasurer of Nanking University."

My dear Mr. Cartwright:

We are enclosing herewith a copy of the Minutes of the meeting of Manking Board of Founders held on January 19th.

May I call your attention in particular to Action BF-607 relative to the reduction in the Methodist Board appropriation for 1932.

\*BF-607 VOTED that the Board of Founders express to the Methodist Board its sincere sympathy for the considerations which have led the Methodist Board to reduce its annual appropriation to the University of Manking; and that inquiries be made of the Methodist Board in regard to their apparent reduction by 15% of the annual income they had been paying to the University on the 0 \$100,000 funds held by the Methodist Board in trust for the University of Manking.

Everyone present was quite sympathetic toward the financial problems which necessitated the 15% reduction and the Methodist Board appropriation from the G \$7,000 contributed in 1981, to G \$5,950 for 1982.

The Board, was, however, somewhat uncertain as to the way in which the Methodist Board plans to reckon its income from the \$100,000 funds you are holding in trust for the University in making this appropriation for the coming year. Unfortunately we did not have any Methodist representatives present at the meeting to give any further details.

It is the understanding of the Board of Founders that the \$100,000 held by the Methodist Board is a distinct fund, coming, I believe, from a surplus of China Famine Funds collected about ten years ago, which the Methodist Board is holding in trust for the University of Manking.

With the reduction of income on the \$100,000 trust fund from \$5,000 to \$4,500 as reported in your letter of July 27, 1981; and with the current income reduced by 15%, from \$2,000 to \$1,700, it would appear that the total of your revised appropriation would be G \$6,200.00 rather than G \$5,950.

There is no thought of asking the Methodist Board for any larger appropriation than your finances will permit, but the Manking Founders are

anxious that, in spite of the exigencies of the present economic situation, we shall not lose sight of the distinctive character of the \$100,000 permanent fund held in trust for Manking by the Methodist Board.

If our understanding as to these matters is incorrect at any point, I hope you will call the error to eur attention.







My dear Dr. Scott and Mr. Cartwrights

In a letter which has just come from Miss Elsie M. Priest, she empresses her general satisfaction of the revisions in the Schedule of Salaries and Allowances of Western staff at Hanking, which was approved by the Hanking Founders on Movember 27th, 1931. However, she goes on to make the following additional comments-

"The final decision for medical care was a little more generous than I had anticipated, as I felt each one should pay a portion of their living expenses personally."

The section of the schedule relative to medical provisions, as adopted by the Foundars reads as follows:-

"Medical care shall be provided by the University. However, the University is not responsible for medical expenses incurred without the advance approval of the University medical officer, except in emergencies which do not permit prior consultation. Even in such emergency cases, it is expected that the University medical officer will give his approval before reimbursement is made from University funds.

Where extra-ordinary items are needed, each such item shall be considered on its marits. Medical care shall be interpreted to cover the following:

- (1) Medical fees(including those of outside physicians where there is no University physician) prescribed medicines and hospital treatment.
  - (2) Surgical fees, treatment and dressings.
  - (5) Obstatrical fees, treatment and nursing for two weeks.
  - (4) Travel to and from hospital when required.
  - (5) Travel to and from hospital of attendant in case of necessity.

The above section is in exact accordance with the proposed draft of this schedule which Miss Priest sent us from the field. However, in commenting on the schedule, Miss Priest added as a postscript on her letter of September 1,1951 the following paragraphs—

There is another point that I neglected to mention. It is the rule with some institutions and it seems to me a-very fair one to deduct the cost of ordinary living expenses during the time a person is in the hospital. For instance, it costs \$5,00 a day to live in Manking at present, so if a person is ill a week in the hospital they would be required to stand part of the charge daily themselves. Inasmuch as some of the living expenses continue whether a person is in the hospital or not, I think it is fair to have the regulation cover 2/5 of the prevailing cost of living in Banking at the time of illness. That is legitimate certainly and covers what seems to me to be the equivalent of ordinary living expenses. I do not think the University should be expected to pay salary in full and all expenses unless some such allowance was made, but this is more or less established by various missions and would take care of the matter. Please do not use any amount of money as living costs are changing hourly just now and while it costs \$5.00 today we expect it will be \$4.00 tomorrow."

As I remember the discussions of our Committee on Salary in the Board of Founders, our attention was directed chiefly to the draft as proposed by Miss Priest, and not to the additional comment I have quoted above.

Do you consider that we should give these medical provisions further studying with a view to the possibility of recommending to the Founders that an amendment be made in line with Miss Priest's suggestion? I believe that some, if not all, of the Mission Board cooperating in Manking have a somewhat similar provision that missionaries while confined to a hospital will be expected to assume a fair share of the expense for daily care.

If you think this matter of sufficient importance to justify further studying, we could probably arrange a brief and informal session of the Committee to phrase some recommendation to be presented at the next meeting of our Hanking Board of Founders which will probably be held during the second week in April.

I have received betters both from Dr. A. J. Bowen, and from his son Philip, telling of Philip's strong interest in going out to China for a teaching position in English or History.



My dear Dr. Ehnes:

Let me acknowledge receipt of your letter of July 28th telling of the action of a meeting of the Methodist Board's Executive Committee in February, requesting that one-half the gain in exchange in all countries on account of regular appropriations should be returned to your office.

You request that our China universities receiving support from the Methodist Board return accordingly gain on exchange accruing from April 1st to August 31st. Your Accountant calculates that one-half the gain in exchange is G\$1,051.00. I have gone over our accounts of the various universities to ascertain what amounts we have received from the Methodist Board since April 1, 1932, and I give below what we have received, together with what one-half the gain on exchange would be on the basis you suggest.

The total on this basis, of one-half the gain on exchange would be \$499.24. This would be somewhat increased by any remittances we may receive from the Methodist Board before August 51st, but such increases would certainly not bring the total anywhere near the figure of \$1,061.00.

Moreover, this method of estimating gain on exchange does not give at all a true picture of the situation in our various universities, where varying amounts of the money received from Mission Boards is expended in gold for the purchase of supplies, equipments, and payments of certain classes of salary. Funds thus expended never profit in any way from gain on exchange.

In checking up the individual institutions we find the situation to be about as follows:-

Fukien. As far as we can estimate about 50% of this \$850.00 was transmitted to the field, and was presumably converted into local currency.

Manking.

A little less than one-half of the \$362.50 of General Funds was transmitted to Manking for conversion into local currency. However, all of the Hospital appropriation of \$185.92 was expended in gold for hospital equipment and supplies and payments of certain gold salaries.

Yenching. All this money has been transmitted to the University in gold, in accordance with the policy of the Yenching Board of Trustees, and no gain whatever has accrued to the Trustees. Since all matters of gain on exchange on budget appropriations rest in the hands of the Board of Directors on the field, we have no exact information as to what proportion of this amount may have been spent in local currency. I would estimate that about 50% was so spent.

West China. Perhaps the two-thirds of this G\$1,260.00 was converted into

local currency, and derived some gain on exchange. It might be
pointed out, however, that our West China Governors have already
credited the Methodist Board with G\$980.00 on your regular appropriation of G\$6,000.00 for the 1932 budget, and that a further credit
of our West China Board.

In the figures contained in your letter of July 28th, you apparently included as a part of your current appropriation to the University of Manking income on the capital fund of \$100,000. which you are holding in trust for the University. I think you will agree that no organisation has any right to treat the income from a capital fund it is holding in trust for an institution in the same way as it does its annual appropriations from current funds. Due to the present situation in the security market, the Methodist Board has this year reduced its income payments on this trust fund from 5% to 42%.

As soon as we can secure meetings of the governing Boards of these four universities, we will bring your request to their attention. In each case the Methodsit Board has representatives on our Boards of Trustees, and no doubt they will be able to give full information as to just what is involved in this action of the Methodist Board. I can assure you that all our universities appreciate the seriousness of the financial situation that confronts all our cooperating Mission Boards, and are not only willingto assume their full share of the cut which may be made, but also to cooperate in any other way.

From the details I have given above I think you will see therefore, that the amount of actual gain on exchange on these funds is extremely small, In every case our university boards have already made some disposition of such gain on exchange as may be available for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1932, and any refunds to cooperating boards would require a reversal of appropriations which have already been made and for the most part have already been spent.

We recall that the \$502.08 on the University of Manking appropriation does not cover the quarterly appropriation but that there is to be an additional amount received to take care of the difference.

We cannot reconcile the payment for China Union Universities as the total for 1932-35 is \$707.40 and this payment does not reconcile with these figures.

Attention is called to the payment on the trust fund for the University of Manking. It was our understanding that this fund is held in trust for the University and that this is to be received during the current year. A 50% reduction for September has been included in this check. Is this not an eversight? Quite naturally, you would not include trust funds in the general reduction voted by the Board.



A. Garside Dear Mr. Garside: Your letter of August 5 relating to the action of the Board's Executive Committee retaining one-half of the Gain in Exchange from April 1 to August 31 was duly received. Our accountant informs me that theamounts you have indicated as received April 1 to July 31, a period of four months, are the quarterly payments received in your office during that period. However, the months from April to August inclusive referred to by us are the field months and not the dates you receive payments in New York. We are paying the Appropriation for the Union Institutions quarterly in the middle of each quarter and the amounts estimated by us to be the Gain in Exchange included the amounts which would be forwarded to the fields to cover the five months mentioned. We do not anticipate that the amount of exchange we have estimated will be absolutely correct. In our opinion it will be somewhat higher inasmuch as exchange in China is now nearer 4.90 than 4.60. We note what you say regarding the amounts that are actually transmitted to the field. We should have a statement from your office showing the amounts actually remitted to the field to be used on the field during the period of April 1 to August 31. We note what you say regarding the retaining of the Gain on Permanent Fund Income. However, the Committee action covers one-half of the Gain in Exchange on our regular Appropriation. The income from all Permanent Funds is a part of the Board's regular Appropriation. Due to the seriousness of our financial situation it is necessary that we make savings in our Disbursements wherever possible and it is felt by the Board Officers that with exchange being so favorable the China Appropriation will not suffer from the cuts as other fields. 

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My dear Mr. Cartwrights

I have not formally acknowledged your letter of October 28th informing us of the decision of our Board to withdraw the request made on July 28th for the return of one-half of the estimated Gain on Exchange from April 1st to August 51st.

We are very grateful indeed to the Methodist Board for its generosity in this matter. We all appreciate the gravity of the financial problems which are confronting your Board, in common with practically all our other missionary organisations. Our universities are seeking loyally to cooperate with the Mission Boards, through cutting down their budgets in every possible way. I am today writing Dr. Elmes to report that our West China Board has voted further refunds on account of Gain on Exchange, which will permit as to return a small amount to the Methodist Board on account of its 1932 appropriation, and will also reduce the amount-requested for 1988.

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I am writing to report the Appropriations of our Board of Foreign Missions, toward the China Union Universities, for 1933, as follows:-

Fukien Christian University
University of Nanking
West China Union University
Yenching University

\$1885.G. 5288. 53. 4 2717. 58.9 1606.

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We regret exceedingly that our grants can be no larger and are glad to state that we are hoping to maintain the present missionary co-operation in each of the universities mentioned.

We had hoped to get thru without cutting more than 25% to union universities, in addition to the cut at the beginning of 1932, but as we came into the closing days of our Annual Meeting, it was found necessary, in spite of our desires, to cut an additional sum. Even so, we are holding our appropriations to these institutions far above what we are able to do for the rest of the world.

These funds will be remitted to you, in the manner which has been followed during the past years, thru our Accounting Department here.

In addition, we were able to make an appropriation of \$708. for 1933, for the Central Office of the China Union Universities. This grant, too, will be remitted to you under the usual conditions, by understanding with our Accounting Department.
