PROPOSED COMPLETION OF WEST WING OF EDUCATION BUILDING

On January 19, 1948 the following radiogram from West China was received in the office of the United Board:-

OFFERED GIFT TO COMPLETE WEST WING EDUCATION BUILDING IF ERECTED

IMMEDIATELY PLEASE CABLE PERMISSION PROCEED. FONG, LINDSAY.

After a consultation by telephone with Dr. Arnup, Chairman of the West China Union University Committee, the members of the Committee were informed by letter about the radiogram asking permission to complete the education building and were asked to vote by ballot on the proposition. In due course signed ballots were returned to the office of the United Board, and the persons whose names are starred above constituting a clear majority, favored the following resolution

WC-57 VOTED to approve the erection of the West Wing of the Education Building at West China Union University providing sufficient funds are available from special sources to complete the addition.

No negative ballots were received but in the comments written on the ballots there were several expressions of the opinion that no debt must be incurred, and that the offered gift must be sufficient to cover the total costs however much they may rise before the building is completed.

OPENING PRAYER

The Chairman called the meeting to order. Mr. Sargent led in prayer.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was reported that minutes of previous meetings had been circulated and it was WC-58 VOTED to approve the following minutes as circulated:

Minutes of Annual Meeting, May 13, 1947 Minutes of November 10, 1947 Minutes of Circulation Vote, February 25, 1948

Acting on the suggestion of the Chairman it was

WC-59 VOTED that the Reverend David H. Gallagher be made a corresponding member for this meeting.

REPORTS AND COMMUNICATIONS FROM CHINA

Enrollment

The Committee gave serious consideration to the very large enrollment at the University and especially to the receiving of 104 auditors. Great concern was expressed at the opening of departments without Christian teachers being available and with few if any Christian students registering in it. After full discussion it was unanimously

WC-60 VOTED to recommend to the United Board that action be taken protesting most vigorously against the admission of "auditors" at West China Union University, and urging immediate discontinuance of this practice.

It was also

WC-61 VOTED to recommend to the United Board that action be taken again protesting the continued swollen enrollment of West China Union University, that we believe such an enrollment makes very difficult the achievement of the purposes for which the University was founded, both in the quality of the work done and in the Christian influence for character building. It is our conviction that no department should be carried on for which there is not a majority of Christian faculty members available and in which there are very few if any Christian students. It is also our conviction that in a Christian University a majority of the faculty and especially the deans and heads of departments should be Christian both in name and influence.

Enlargement of the Education Building

The Committee noted the progress in the enlargement of the Education Building, with a gift of \$1,000,000,000 from Governor Liu Wen-huei of Sikang Province, a project to which the Committee had agreed in a circulation vote last February, "providing sufficient funds are available from special sources to complete the addition." It was pointed out that the Trustees of the United Board when they ratified the action of the West China Committee added the following stipulation:

"to make clear to the administration at West China that such approval does not authorize the expansion of the University beyond the scheme outlined in the Planning Committee's report."

The question was raised as to whether the University should go on accepting such gifts if the donors would thereby be placed in a position to try to dominate the curriculum and the admission of students. It was felt that it was the duty of the Board of Directors to see that local gifts do not jeopardize Christian control.

Proposed University Church Building

Attention was called to two actions taken by the Board of Directors in regard to the University Church, as follows:

- (1) "to sponsor an appeal on behalf of the University Church and to request the Church Board to prepare a careful statement for presentation to the West China Committee urging the raising of funds for the early erection of the University Church."
- (2) "to recommend to the West China Committee that the University Church be located on the land at present occupied by faculty tennis courts and the Baptist play-

ing fields; and the launching of a financial campaign to raise additional money to assure the complete erection of the Church, probably around US\$40,000; further to request the Church Board to secure revised building plans and an estimate of the cost of erecting the main building in such a way that part of it might be used while raising money to complete the building; to present plans and estimates to the West China Committee requesting early permission to put down the foundations before the summer.

"Any money raised in China should be invested in materials immediately."

It was reported that the University has US\$23,500 in hand and the Board of Directors has approved the use of this fund for the purchase of materials before the price goes higher. They hope to erect the Church in sections. They want us to assist in the drive they are undertaking to raise the additional \$40,000, outside of our United Board campaign for funds.

Mr. Sargent reported that the original scheme was to have a University Community Church, not merely for the university but for the community. Most of the money received was received before 1943 and was exchanged while the exchange rate was still good. The original plan was to build the church, not on the University property but on Methodist property right behind the Women's College. Putting it on the University property does alter the situation. He suggested that approval be given. They desperately need a church. It will form the center of our religious life there.

Mr. Gallagher reported that services at the present time are held in the Assembly room in Hart building and in the evening in the little chapel and it would give visibility to our Christian life if it were on the University property.

Mr. Smith reported on the following action of the Board of Directors in connection with the property of the American Beptist Foreign Mission Society:

- (1) Voted: to recommend to the Board of the ABFMS that the Baptist College property in the rectangle north of the main east-west University road, west of the site on which Van Deman Hall now stands, south of the Baptist Row of missionary residences, and east of the road in front of the former Baptist Middle School dormitory (e. g., the Baptist College Playing Field, and the property occupied by the Faculty Tennis Courts) be allocated for the exclusive use of the new University Church.
- (2) VOTED: that this action be contingent upon receiving official assurance from competent administrative authorities of the University that adequate athletic facilities shall be made available for Baptist students.
- (3) VOTED: that if this Baptist property now allocated for the purposes of the University Church be not so used, it shall revert to the Baptist Mission.
- (4) VOTED: that the recommendation for the allocation of this property be contingent upon official action by the Board of the University Church indicating a willingness to make provision for facilities and requirements of membership as commonly practiced by Baptists or other cooperating Christian groups for those who so desire it.
- (5) VOTED: that we urge the Board of the ABFMS and the WABFMS, and the WCUU Sub-Committee of the Associated Boards for Christian Colleges in China, to render all possible help and cooperation in the financial campaign for the building and equipment of the University Church.

In a letter to Dr. Fridell in connection with the foregoing actions, it was stated:

"This choice has been unanimously approved by: i) the Church Board; ii) the President's Council; iii) the University Board of Directors; iv) the Baptist Station; v) the Baptist Mission Reference Committee. There remains, I believe, only the approval of the Board of the ABFMS and cirmation by the WCUU Sub-Committee of the Associated Boards for Christian Colleges in China."

A letter from Dr. Dryden Phelps stated:

"To bring this to realization, we are counting on your hearty cooperation, counsel and help. But may we assure you that, just as the initial one—third of our total financial requirements was given by a Chinese donor in China, so we shall work with might and main that a large portion of the remaining US\$40,000 shall be raised in China from Chinese Christians and from missionaries."

After further discussion it was

WC-62 VOTED to recommend to the United Board approval of the erection of the West China Union University Church on the Baptist College playing field provided (1) that this site is donated for this purpose and (2) provided further that the main unit can be constructed with church building funds in hand.

It was also

WC-63 VOTED to recommend to the United Board that consideration of the other items of the Church building program be deferred until the United Board has received plans of the building with a careful estimate of costs and details of plan proposed for financing this program.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

Status of Current Budget 1947-48

The Associate Treasurer reported that it now appears that it will be able to close the budget for the current year without a deficit but this is all contingent upon the financial charges which are to be entered against the Governors' Budget, now known as the Field Staff Salary Account.

Report of the Treasurer, 1946-47

The report of the Treasurer for the year ending June 30, 1947 was present by the Associate Treasurer and was considered item by item. (See Appendix A.)

It was noted that the Treasurer reported that the deficit of \$6,965.31 resulted from unpredictable sources, and that he had suggested as follows:

- (a) Charge half of the deficit to the Endowment Income Stabilization Account
- (b) Request the field to absorb the balance in any one of two or three credit balances held for the field on the New York books.

The Committee considered these suggestions and on motion made by Mr. Smith, it was

WC-64 VOTED to receive the report of the Treasurer for the year ending June 30, 1947.

It was also

WC-65 VOTED to recommend to the United Board that the entire deficit of \$6,965.31 be charges to the Endowment Income Stabilization Account.

Budget for 1948-49

The Committee studied the budget for the year ending June 30, 1949 and it was WC-66 VOTED to recommend to the United Board that the Budget for 1948-49 be approved. (See Appendix B)

Report of the Auditors, 1946-47

The Associate Treasurer presented the report of the auditors, Messrs. Chambellan, Berger and Welti for the year ending June 30, 1947. It was

WC-67 VOTED to receive the report of the auditors for the year ending June 30, 1947 and refer it to the United Board.

Transfer of West China Funds to Wesleyan

The campus fund at Wesleyan University for years has been contributing to the work of Dr. Beech at West China Union University. During the war, this fund accumulated until there was \$3,673.48 (on March 1, 1948). For the past year, Dr. Beech has been negotiating with the trustees of Wesleyan in the hope that they would establish a West China trust fund toward which other funds would be paid, but the money on the West China books would be turned over to the Wesleyan Trustees. The purpose of this has been to establish a memorial to Wesleyan men who gave their lives in China or the China area, the income to go for:

(1) Scholarships

(2) Charry Bed in the University Hospital.

It was thought that Wesleyan was ready to proceed with the setting up of the fund on its books and that suitable action should be taken. The Committee therefore

WC-68 VOTED to recommend to the United Board this this fund be transferred to Wesleyan.

(Subsequent to the meeting it was learned that the Wesleyan Trustees were unwilling to accept the responsibility for such a Trust Fund but would cooperate in building it up to the amount of \$5,000, the sum to be held by the United Board for Christian Colleges in China and the income from it be used to the benefit of West China Union University).

MATTERS REFERRED TO THE UNITED BOARD BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

On July 24, 1947 various actions taken by the Board of Directors were referred to the United Board.

Action E.291 referring to Retrenchment, was as follows:

RESOLVED to forward to the United Board for Christian Colleges in China the report of the President's Council as presented, pointing out that the total retrenchment in personnel and budget for 1947-48 as compared with 1946-47 is 15%, and that it is not possible to make further reduction without cutting out Departments or instituting other drastic changes.

In view of the action taken by the Committee (WG-61) it was

WC-69 VOTED to authorize the secretary to write to the Board on the field in line with action WC-61.

The Committee also considered Action E-292 regarding the granting of an allowance to Dr. Lincoln Dsang on his regirement from the Presidency. After conisderable discussion, it was

WC-70 VOTED that it is the opinion of this Committee that the matter of an allowance to President-emeritus Dsang upon his retirement from the Presidency is the responsibility of the Board of Directors: that it is solely for the decision and for financing by the Board of Directors. But if at some future time they wish to discuss the possibility of setting up a regular pension fund this Committee will be glad to discuss this matter with them.

The next action of the Board of Directors considered by the Committee was Action E.324. Natural History, as follows:

RESOLVED to adopt this plan as presented (the "Five-Year Paln for the development of the University's Natural History Museum") and forward it to the West China Committee for its information and endorsement.

It was reported that the Five Year Plan had been mimeographed and sent to all members of the Committee for study. After discussion, it was

WC-71 VOTED that this Committee express its interest in the plan of West China Union
University in regard to the Five Year Plan for the Natural History Museum,
with the hope that they can implement it through their own financing locally. The United Board for Christian Colleges in China does not have sufficient funds in its budget to finance this project.

Attention was then given to Action E.325 University Hospital, as follows:

RESOLVED to recommend to the West China Committee, in view of the fact that the University Hospital is an integral part of the College of Medicine and Dentistry, that a special appeal be made for financial assistance, to enable the Hospital to increase salaries in line with those now paid to staff receiving University contracts.

It was felt that their salaries are low so far as university status is concerned. If they take the university status it is higher then the mission status. It was

WC-72 VOTED to refer to the United Board the matter of a special appeal for financial assistance to enable the Hospital to increase salaries in line with those now paid to staff receiving University contracts.

WEST CHINA UNION UNIVERSITY COMMITTEE

It was reported that the Committee on Nominations and Administration had recommended to the United Board the appointment of the same membership of the West China Committee as before with the exception of the inclusion of Dr. E. A. Fridell who had also been recommended as a member of the Interim Committee. The Committee was told that it had the right to appoint members of the Interim Committee.

WC-73 VOTED that the following members of the West China Committee be appointed members of the Interim Committee:

REPORT OF THE TREASURER

FOR

WEST CHINA UNION UNIVERSITY COMMITTEE

JUNE 30, 1947

Released from the requirements of being host to other Christian Universities during the war (excepting the Cheeloo contingent) West China started a new era of development at Chengtu. Greatly increased enrollment of students and an enlarged staff called for more astute management, some changes were made and time can only reveal their efficacy.

Here in U.S.A. efforts were made to keep abreast of orders for supplies and equipment while through the United Board and United Service to China funds were secured to supplement the budget but in U.S. dollar decessing amounts because of the increased rate of exchange.

This report has been reviewed by our auditors, Messrs. Chambellan, Berger and Welti and is accompanied by the following documents:

(a) Balance Sheet June 30, 1947 (Page 5)
(b) Budget Analysis June 30, 1947 (Page 6)

Special remarks follow in the different sections on the operation of the accounting procedure.

ENDOWMENT

The larger part of the West China Investments was turned over to the United Board for Christian Colleges in China in July 1, 1946. The market value as of June 28th was used for this purpose and resulted in a increase of \$9,426.61 in capital funds. The total amount of securities and cash transferred was \$258,982.29 and represented 7.2973% of the United Board holdings as of the date of transfer.

Including the appreciation mentioned above the total increase in the endow-ment section was \$14,756.96 as follows:

The Assets side of the ledger showed changes as follows:

There was an increase of \$529,60 in endowment income during 1946-47 representing 3.26% on total investments and cash turned over to the United Board on July 1, 1946.

PLANT

There was a decrease of \$16,384.67 in the Plant Section, due largely to disbursements to the field from funds held under instructions from the treasurer in Changtu. The details follow:

CURRENT SECTION

Income and disburements within the current budget are shown in the estimates. and receipts in the Budget Analysis (Page 6) as a result of the year's operations -- a deficit of \$6,965.31 resulted. This was caused by nearly four thousand excess charges on both the field budget and costs of work in the New York Office. At the same time there was a shrinkage of income from Miscellaneous current and designated gifts.

Specifically the excess charges and shrinkage of income are shown in the following schedule:

Report of the Treasurer West China Union University Committee

Sustaining funds as distributed in China are not included this year as the definite allocation to the colleges had not been received as of June 30, 1947, and thus the exact amount for West China was not known.

CURRENT SECTION

The over charge in the "Governor's budget" is because of unexpected travel costs to China and increase in cost of living.

The Administration expense resulted from proportionate charge for extra work done in the New York Office.

The shrinkage of \$1,336.31 represents the let down in receipts in U. S. A. due to conditions in China. Elsewhere in this report suggestions are made as to the possible ways of meeting the current deficit.

There are some accounts in this section calling for special mention:

At the close of the year, a considerable number of orders were in process to be charged against some of the above balances.

Specially Designated Gifts The balance of \$3,673.48 in this account represented the accumulation of gifts from Wesleyan University Student body for the work of West China Union University. Plans were in process on June 30, to use this balance as a basis for a larger Wesleyan University endowment fund.

Rehabilitation Fund A balance of \$29,943.79 resulted from the following transaction:

THE DEFICIT

As previously referred to in this report the deficit of \$6,965.31 resulted from unpredictable sources. Nevertheless it must be met, as carrying this amount forward into the next year only defers ultimate action as it cannot be absorbed in the normal appropriation. Several suggestions are made herewith:

- (a) Charge our half of the deficit to the endowment Income stabilization
- (b) Request the field to absorb the balance in any one of two or three credit balances held for the field on the New York books.

The question of providing an allowance for Dr. Wallace Wang for a fellowship to study at Union Theological Seminary was discussed. b. A letter was read from President S. H. Fong, his year of office as President having come to an end; requesting careful consideration of the election of a University President. Mr. Fong's letter was referred to the Nominating Committee.



- c. A letter was read from the Student Association urging that tuition fees be not increased in the fall term.

Following up Minute E. 321 of January 16 it was reported that further sums had been received for the Finance Campaign bringing the total receipts in national currency to \$1,338,875,250; this sum added to other sums in United States and Canadian dollars gives a total of approximately US\$4,000 in general purposes and earmarked funds for the University and Hospital.

The amount allocated to our University from the Central Universities Campaign Fund was only \$27,685,000 more than the percentage of the total allotted to WCUU to raise; that is WCUU did not benefit greatly from the Central Campaign Fund.

D. 320 Request for Government Rice

President Fong reported on negotiations with the Provincial Government covering the University's request for allocation of 20,000 tan of unhulled rice. There is some hope of receiving this grant.

Bursar W. W. Small attended to present an income and expenditure statement for the period July 1, 1947 to May 31, 1948, showing a balance of only CN\$500,000,000 plus US\$5,321.14, to meet expenditure for the month of June.

The audited financial statement for the year July 1, 1946 to June 30, 1947

was received. Mr. Small pointed out that grants from Chinese Government represented 3% of the total income; from tuition fees 10% from other sources in China 3%, from British and Canadian sources 33%; from USC and UCR 36% and from other sources 12%.

D. 323 Disposition of Farm Land Following up Executive Minutes Nos. E. 302, 304, 305, 312 and 328.

RESOLVED to authorise the Executive Committee of the Board to proceed with the sale of the Kao Family Farm of 306 Chinese acres and of the 14 acre farm in the neighbourhood of Wu Ho si, the proceeds to be put into United States currency.

Exchange of Property

RESOLVED to agree to the exchange of the triangle of University property
on part of which the Women's College temporary dormitories and residences are now
located for an equal area of Women's College property along the main road between the
old and new South Gates (opposite Goucher School); further to request the Women's
College Committee to sell to the University 10 additional feet to the south of the
property in question to obviate the necessity of tearing down the present staff residences, a suitable sale adjustment being arranged between the two parties.

Pouth Corps Building

RESOLVED to request the Executive Committee to proceed with negotiations for securing control of the Youth Corps Building for the use of the University next academic year; further to request the West China Committee and United Board to provide the necessary purchase money if it is not possible to secure the building as a gift.

D. 326 Ku Kien-wu Property

Report being made concerning Mr. Fu Kien-wu's proposal that the income from a farm be used to maintain a school in Kien Yang Hsien as a practice school of the WCUU Department of Rural Reconstruction, it was

RESOLVED not to assume the responsibilities attendant upon the acceptance of the proposed plan.

D. 327 University Church
Following up Executive Minute E. 327, Dr. McMullen's letter of May 13th reporting the approval of the West China Committee and United Board of the erection of the WCUU Church on the Baptist College playing field provided that the site is donated for the purpose and that the main unit can be constructed with Church building funds in hand; and word from the ABFMS sanctioning the allocation of the property for this purpose.

RESOLVED to receive the tentative plans submitted for forwarding to West China Committee and United Board with the request for immediate permission to put down the foundations of the main building in the fall and for assistance in raising funds for the completion of the Church.

D. 328 Housing
After discussion it was

RESOLVED to support the Administration in its policy of not accepting responsibility for housing all members of the staff; in its belief that Mission houses on the campus temporarily unoccupied by missionaries should not be rented to outsiders; that from now on any houses erected on the campus by Missions should come under University control; further agreed to request the West China Committee and United Board to set aside special funds for the erection of staff residences.



RESOLVED to repeat the latter section of Executive Minute 235 to the Missions which have not cooperated fully in the matter of housing; the minute reads:
"That a letter be written to all Missions requesting them to consult with the University authorities re the use of Mission houses on the campus whenever a house falls vacant or accommodation becomes available due to furlough or other causes."

RESOLVED that no staff member giving less than twelve service hours shall qualify for University housing; that staff living in University residences shall pay rent according to the present scale as set forth in the University's Housing Regulations; that members of staff with families and who qualify to apply for housing but for whom housing cannot be allocated shall receive a monthly rent allowance—for Professors up to 5 teo rice, Associate Professors 4 teo, Instructors 3 teo, Assistants 2 teo.

D. 329 Rehabilitation and Flood Relief
Reported that funds donated by the United Board for rehabilitation and flood relief have been put to good use in rebuilding the riverside bunding, roads, walls etc., repairing buildings damaged in the floods of July 1947.

Reported that in response to Executive Minute E. 322 a cable and letter had been received from Dr. McMullen permitting the University to accept Governor Liu wen-hwei's gift for the erection of the West Wing of the Education Building provided sufficient funds are available from special sources to complete the wing and that it be clearly understood that such approval does not authorise the expansion of the University beyond the scheme outlined in the Planning Committee's report.

Reported that Mr. and Mrs. Edward C dbury have donated \$400 for the furnishing of the West Wing; further that the wing is to be known as the "Wen Hwei Loh".

- D. 331 Baptist Middle School Dormitory
 Following Directors Minute D. 303, reported that the substitute Baptist
 Middle School Dormitory, erected with funds secured by the College of Medicine and
 Dentistry, is nearing completion and will be ready for occupation in the fall term of
 1948.
- D. 332 North Boundary, University Hospital

 Agreed to record the signing of an agreement between the National

 Szechwan University and the West China Union University defining the northern boundary between the Chi Chwan School and the Hospital property.
- D. 333 Retrenchment Policy

 Consideration was given to the minute of the West China Committee and
 United Board and comments thereon contained in Dr. McMullen's letter of May 13, 1948,
 urging drastic reduction in the student body, curtailment of departments, the immediate
 discontinuance of auditors; and serious attention to be given to the securing of a
 higher percentage of Christian members of the faculty.

RESOLVED to endeavour to keep student enrollment within the limits of 1,500 and 1,600; to limit this year's freshman class to 300; that in future the maximum enrollment for each College shall be 500; that women students shall not exceed one-third of the total enrollment; further that this year common courses be offered for freshman in Arts, Science, Medicine and Dentistry; that they be not allocated to Departments until they are ready to enter Sophmore Year.

D. 334 Philosophy and History RESOLVED that the Department of Philosophy and History become an effect-

bively combined Department, teaching 128 credits.

D. 338 Education and Rural Reconstruction
Following up Executive Minute 286 calling for the combination of
Education and Rural Reconstruction in one Department with one quota of Freshman.

RESOLVED on the basis of present information to permit the continuance of the present arrangement until the students now registered in Rural Reconstruction have graduated.

- D. 336 Agricultural Extension School

 RESOLVED to follow out the original order of the Ministry of Education closing the Agricultural Extension School at the end of this term, June 1948.
- D. 337 Agronomy RESOLVED that no Agronomy Freshman may be accepted for the coming year; that the University provide a maximum of four teachers for the Department.
- D. 338 Home Economics

 RESOLVED to point out to the West China Committee and the United Board the great importance of continuing to operate a Department of Home Economics in West China.
- D. 339 Fine Arts

 RESOLVED in the light of action taken in minute D. 298, that we urge the West China Committee and United Board to permit the University to open a Department of Music. It is to be understood that the opening of the Department will not burden the University budget any more than at present.
- D. 340 Nursing Course Following up Minute D. 299, reported that it has not been found practicable to register Nursing students in the College of Medicine and Dentistry.

RESOLVED to accept the suggested five-year curriculum for students working for the BNS degree in Nursing; and to refer to the Executive Committee all other matters relating to the operation of the course.

D. 341 Office of Student Activities

RESOLVED that the Office of Discipline be closed and in its place there be instituted an Office of Student Activities to include Discipline, Religious and other extra-curricular student welfare activities; that there be Deans of Men and Women, with Assistants when necessary.

D. 342 Business and Operations

RESOLVED that the Offices of Business and Secretaries and Writers be coordinated under a General Business Superintendent; that the Comptroller's Committee be replaced by a Vice-Chancellor's Committee of Business and Operations.

- D. 343 Presidency
 RESOLVED to express our confidence in Mr. S. H. Fong and our appreciation of his ability to guide our University during these difficult years, and to appoint him to the Presidency for the ensuing year, 1948-1949.
- D. 344 Coopted Members
 RESOLVED to appoint as Coopted Members for the ensuing year Messrs.
 Lincoln Dsang, Ho Beh-heng and Ren Tin-chang.



- Honorary Members D. 345 RESOLVED to elect as Honorary Members Messrs. Chang Chuin, Hwang Chi-lu and Wu Chin-beh.

- Institute of Biochemistry RESOLVED to recommend to the West China Committee and United Board that the University establish an Institute of Biochemistry of the College of Medicine and Dentistry; with the proviso that it be self-supporting. (It is understood that funds donated for the support of the Birmingham Chair, apart from selary and sabbatical leave may be reserved for the use of the Institute).
- Experimental Nursery School D. 352 RESOLVED to concur in the continuance of the present arrangement whereby the Experimental Nursery School is largely cared for the budget of the Child Welfare Project.
- Dormitory Accommodation D. 353 Reported that there is no reply from either the ABFMS nor the Women's College Committee in regard to the request of the Executive Committee in Minute 315 for the erection of additional dormitory accommodation.

RESCLVED to reitterate the request that Cooperating Missions appoint half-time resident Principals to their Dormitories.

Retiring Allowance for Dr. Lincoln Dsang D. 354 Following up Executive Minutes E. 292 and 293, word having been received from the West China Committee and United Board that in their opinion the sole responsibility for determining and financing an additional retirement allowance for President

Emeritus Lincoln Dsang rests with the Board of Directors.

RESOLVED to grant to President Emeritus Lincoln Dsang a retirement allowance equivalent to the past year's salary, reckoned as of June 1948.

- D. 355 Pension Scheme

 Reported that the West China Committee and the United Board would be willing to study the whole question of a pension fund for faculty and staff when the financial situation was such as to give hope that it could be implemented.
- D. 356 Finances of Hospital and Natural History Museum

 It was reported that in commenting on Executive Minutes E. 324 and 325,

 Dr. McMullen gave warning that these units should be prepared for no approval of an expanded budget.
- D. 357 Sabbatical Leave

 RESOLVED that if the situation warrants it, the University may this coming year grant sabbatical leave to one member of the Administration, and of the College of Arts, Science, Medicine and Dentistry; the allocation of such sabbatical leave to be referred to the Executive Committee.
- D. 358 Goucher School

 Reported that it had been necessary for the Executive to make an emergency grant of \$14,000,000 to Goucher School for this academic year.
- D. 359 Tuition Fees

 RESOLVED to refer to the Executive Committee and the Administration the matter of determining Tuition and other fees for the fall term.

The meeting closed with prayer, led by Dr. Sparling.

WEST CHINA UNION UNIVERSITY

Meeting of the Executive Committee of the BOARD OF DIRECTORS held on July 10, 1948

Present: Lo Pin-san (in the chair), Lincoln Dsang, Whang T'ien-ch'i, ex officio S. H. Fong, A. W. Lindsay, and by invitation Li Hen

E. 337 Rural Reconstruction

A letter was received from Dr. Paul Fugh requesting a reconsideration of the minute of the Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors D-325, and suggesting that the Department be permitted to retain its own identity provided it remedy its present weaknesses and raise sufficient funds for its maintenance.

Dr. Lindsay suggested that an appeal be made for a grant for the Department from large sums of American money donated for mass education and rural reconstruction in China.

After discussion it was agreed that it is not possible to change minute No. D. 325 of the Annual Meeting; but that the Rural Reconstruction Division be requested to carry on under the present arrangement for this year. It is understood that there can be do departmental Freshmen apart from those entering the Common Courses in Arts.

E. 338 Salaries

Agreed with the University's aim to pay more adequate salaries on a true cost-of-living index calculated on basic commodities in stated proportions: Rice 26%, meat 30%, Wood 22%, oil 4%, salt 1%, sugar 22%, cloth 15%, that the method of calculation be: for Professors the first \$60 of their basic salary to be reckoned at the full index and the remainder at one-tenth of the index; for Associate Professors the first \$50; for Senior Instructors the first \$40; for Instructors the first \$35 and for Assistants, Clerks, etc. we continue to reckon the first \$30 on the full index.

Further suggested that at the beginning of the term when tuition fees are collected the Administration may advance salaries to key personnel according to the amount of national currency available. It was recognised that such a scheme would need to be considered carefully in relation to exchange rate tendencies and other factors.

E. 339 Retrenchment

A progress report was made by the Administrative Officers showing that thus far it has not been possible to make a sufficiently large cut.

Agreed to point out to the University staff that unless there is a willingness to make an adequate cut it will not be possible for the University to pay living salaries; in other words that the salaries paid are entirely dependent upon the size of the staff and the income available.

- E. 340 Tuition Fee

 After consideration of the Council's recommendation that the tuition few be at least one double shih tan of rice, it was agreed to leave the final with the Administrative Council.
- Agreed that provided arrangements can be made to carry the work of staff members on sabbatical leave without any addition to the Department or College concerned, the following be given the privilege of sebbatical leave during the year 1948-49; B. C. T'ang (Administration) Paul Fugh (Arts) Li Hen (Science) and Eugene Chan (Medicine & Dentistry); further agreed to draw attention to the condition that the recipients of this privilege are expected to return to the University after their year's leave of absence.
- E. 342 Retirement Allowance, Mr. S. D. Hwa

 Agreed to request the Administration to consider making a retiring allowance to Mr. S. D. Hwa, who for health reasons is unable to fulfil the duties of his office.
- A progress report was made regarding negotiations now in progress looking to the purchase of the Youth Corps Building. Agreed that if a satisfactory purchase price can be fixed, taking into consideration the fact that the University raised one-sixth of the funds for the building, and also that the Building has depreciated in value since its erection in 1941, the Administration be authorised to purchase the building immediately, in anticipation that the West China Committee will refund the amount at an early date.
- E. 344 Leave of Absence, President Fong
 President Fong reported that he plans to attend the Council of Higher
 Education Summer Meeting in Taiwan, July 30 to August 5, and if possible to visit
 Friends in Japan; the whole trip taking about 6 weeks. During his absence Dr. Li Hen
 will act as President.



WEST CHINA UNION UNIVERSITY

Meeting of the Executive Committee of the BOARD OF DIRECTORS held on Saturday, September 4, 1948.

Present: G. W. Sparling in the Chair; L. G. Dsang, Lo Pin-san, F. O. Stockwell, H. J. Veals, Yoh Bao-chi, S. H. Fong and A. W. Lindsay ex officio; by invitation W. W. Small

Minutes of the last meeting, held on July 10, 1948 were approved as circulated.

E. 345 Salaries

Recommendations were presented from the Council concerning methods of paying salaries this year, (1) varying according to ranking the proportion of the basic salary to be multiplied by the full cost of living index; (2) proposing that the University follow the Government plan for the payment of junior staff with the above mention scale for senior staff.

Mr. William Small presented figures for consideration, based first, on the Government plan, and secondly on the Council's recommendation, with 25% added to bonafide full-service staff.

Discussion followed in which it was strongly felt that bonafide full service staff without outside contracts or other income should receive recognition of their loyalty to the University; it was suggested that such staff receive a bonus of 15% for Assistants and Instructors, 25% for Associate Professors and Professors.

Agreed to refer the matter back to the Council with this opinion for further consideration with power.

E. 346 Tuition Fees

Consideration was given to the Council's recommendations for tuition and other fees and after discussion it was agreed to adopt the following scale of fees for the autumn term:

Touth Corps Building

It was reported that the University has completed the purchase of the Youth Corps Building for the net sum of fourteen billion national currency dollars. (US\$2,545.50) The Council has agreed to assign the building to the Dept. of Home Economics and to provide CN\$500,000,000 for the remodelling and refurnishing of the building.

E. 348 Student Affairs

A letter was received from Prof. W. G. Sewell enquiring what the

University planned to do to ensure that the students now being called up for question-

ing regarding alleged Communist activity shall be given a fair trial. Agreed to inform Prof. Sewell that the University is watching the situation very closely and is in close touch with the Government in the interests of the students, insisting that they be given a just trial and requesting that University representatives be present at the trial.

E. 349 West Wing, Education Building
Reported that the completed West Wing of the Education Building has
teen received by President Fong from General Liu Wen-huei. Agreed to send a letter
thanks to General Liu for the gift of this wing.

Reported that United Service to China has given werning that its grants will be severely curtailed during the remainer of 1948, and may even cease. Agreed that in view of the inadequacy of the USC grant for the Child Welfare Training Project the Experimental Nursery School and the Hsiao Tien Chu Kindergerten Nursery School be suspended temporarily until funds are forthcoming to make possible the continuation of these projects.

E. 351 $\frac{Mr. S. D. Hwa}{Agreed to accept the recommendation of the Council that <math>Mr. S. D. Hwa$ be granted one year's sick leave.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER

FOR WEST CHINA UNION UNIVERSITY COMMITTEE

JUNE 30, 1948

Reports from China indicate that the University carried on its regular work during 1947-48 with but slight interference from student disturbances. This was achieved although a mumber of staff numbers in key positions were on sabbatical leave in foreign countries, and in spite of the effects of wild inflation. During the year negotiations were started to purchase the "Youth Center Building", erected on this campus several years ago but the transaction was not consummated until after the close of the year.

Here in America efforts were continued, under the auspices of the United Board for Christian Colleges in China, to secure funds to supplement the decreasing gifts from United Service to China. In this category \$18,000 was allocated to the University during the year while sustaining funds and designated gifts added \$11,290.02 more.

ENDOWMENT

There was a considerable increase in the Endowment funds of West China during 1947-48. The net amount was \$38,130.02 to bring this total of all funds to \$318,892.66.

Omar L. Kilborn and Retta G. Kilborn Memorial Library Fund

This permanent Endowment Fund was set up in April, 1948 by transferring a principal account of \$2,831.76 from Plant, plus \$168.24 from the income account to establish a total of \$3,000.00 in the Endowment Section. The income is designated for medical books and periodicals for the library of the College of Medicine and Dentistry.

Wesleyan Memorial Fund

Action T - 423 of the United Board Trustees approved the transfer of balance in "Special Designated Gifts" account to the Endowment Section such balances having accrued from Wesleyan University gifts. The purpose is to establish a memorial for Wesleyan men lost through war in the China area, income being divided between a scholarship and a hospital teaching bed. The amount totaled \$4,901.08 on June 30 and is to be built up to a total of \$5,000.00.

Edith J. Cass Memorial Fund

This fund of \$3,500.00 from Dr. Oliver W. Cass of Niagara Falls N.Y. was established in Memory of his wife and the income is to be used to support a teaching bed in the hospital.

Income on all funds for the year, totaled \$9,500.12 or 3.56% on \$266,609.75. This compared with \$8,514.82 or 3.26% the previous year on principal funds of \$260,982.29

WEST CHINA UNION UNIVERSITY

Minute of the Council, November 23rd, 1948

Extracts were read from letters from Mr. Slater concerning the situation in Tsinan, from Dr. Fenn re the situation in Shanghai and Nanking, and Dr. McMullen re the attitude of Christianity to Communism, etc.

Reference was made to the advice received by the American and Canadian communities concerning evacuation of unnecessary personnel.

Discussion took place concerning an emergency policy to be adopted by the University at this time. It was felt that the University should plan to remain in Chengtu and carry on so long as it is possible to maintain the Christian character of the University; in view of the difficulty of maintaining the loyalty of a large group, it was recommended that whenever a staff member leaves he be not replaced; that wherever possible the staff be reduced; that for the time being western staff be encouraged to remain in Chengtu, though no one can guarantee their safety or transportation facilities should it become necessary leter for them to leave; that investigation be made into the possibility of securing minimum stocks of essential commodities; that everything be done to maintain close cooperation between the staff and students; that students be kept busily occupied with study and suitable recreation; that each College consider carefully the best means possible for securing loyalty and a real interest in the students; that the Student Activities Committee consider ways of keeping the students healthily occupied.

Board of Management Meeting, August 30, 1948

Minutes of the 36th Meeting

A meeting of the Board of Management of the West China Union Theological College was held at the home of Dr. Sparling, August 30th, 1948.

In the absence of the chairman, Rev. Liu Peh Hsiang was appointed chairman and Rev. Fu P'ei Chih Chinese secretary, English Secretary H. J. Veals.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Chairman,

The committee appointed at the last meeting to consider the matter of the Presidency reported.

362 RESOLVED to receive the report of the committee.

363 RESOLVED that we invite Dr. Tseo Ping-I to be principal of the College, this appointment according to the rule of the Board to be for three years, and that we ask him to come as soon as possible.

364 RESOLVED that Dr. Tseo's salary be equal to that of the President of the university with special help for children, to be settled by the Finance committee but that it be at least equal to children's fees at school.

365 RESOLVED that the Executive committee be empowered to purchase furnishings for the homes of the new teachers.

366 RESOLVED that the Executive committee be composed of the Chairman, Secretaries, the Treasurer and Dr. Daniel Li and Bishop Maxwell.

367 RESOLVED that the following be the officers of the College, Principal Dr. Tseo Ping-I, Dean of College Life Mr. Pan Ching Kao, Dean of Studies Dr. Holth, Advisor to Men students Mr. Sun Han Shu, Treasurer Wm. Small, Assistant Treasurer Miss Foster, Registrar Mr. K'ang Shu Yao.

368 RESOLVED that the teachers be invited by the College only with the approval of the Board of Management, or its executive.

369 RESOLVED that Mr. Sun Han Shu be invited to the staff of the College.

370 RESOLVED that the School Fee for the Theological College be three quarters of the School Fee collected by the University, for the regular course, and one half of the university fee for the Junior Course, and that fees other than the school fee shall be the same as those charged by the University.

371 RESOLVED that the following basic salaries be adopted. These follow the university scale. Mr. P'an \$250, Miss Sung \$210, Mr. Sun \$150, Mr. K'ang \$150, Mr. Chang Ts'e Ming \$140.

372 RESOLVED that Mr. Wang's family receive for this school year a salary equal to that of a professor at the university.

373 WHEREAS it is possible that the Church of The Brethren may come to Szechwan for permanent work.

RESOOVED that a letter be sent to them welcoming them to work in the province and inviting them to cooperate in the work of the College. Also that we request the Church of the Brethren to appoint Miss Shaefer to work in the college.

RESOLVED that a letter be written to Mr. Wallace Wang thanking him for his past services in the college and wishing him a good journey and a good year of study in America.

375 RESOLVED that no new student be received into the college until he has a satisfactory certificate of health.

376 RESOLVED that the title given to the Head of the College be Principal rather than President.

Dear Dr. McMullen,

I wrote you on November 7th and in that letter stated that we had heard that those foreigners in East China who wished to move out in the face of the Communist threat should do so. A similar message reached American and Canadian missionaries in West China on the 18th and 19th. Since then several Missions have held meetings to consider the situation. No definite recommendations have been made to or from Mission Executives advising people to go, but those individuals who are fearful, who have children or are not in good health, will act on their own initiative. On Tuesday have children or are not in good health, will act on their own initiative on Tuesday hast the President's Council considered the situation and I enclose the gist of the discussion and action. Dr. Fenn in answer to my letter of a fortnight ago informed up that Ginling and the University of Nanking both planned to remain put. We have heard further word from Tsinan and the concensus of opinion is that we here should remain until it is clear that should not or cannot stay.

As far as we can gather our Chinese staff as a whole are anxious that we should stay, and certainly President Fong and some of the older staff have indicated clearly their hope that western staff will remain. It may interest you to have a quotation from President Fong's statement to the Council: "If our western friends leave it would be impossible for us Chinese to carry on: particularly is this true in the case of the College of Medicine and Dentistry. We hope that they will stay and face with their Chinese colleagues any situation which may develop. We recognise that the final decision must be left to individuals. Careful consideration must be given to the cases of some wives and children. The continuing of the western staff will have a very important bearing on the keeping alive of Christian influence. This will not only benefit the University but the Christian work of the whole Province. This was proved in the 1926-27 evacuation. It is important to have a strong centre in Chengtu in the WCUU because all Christian people of the Province look to us for help and guidance." As is so usual in China, what seemed to be an impasse has not eventuated, and the Government has been given a new lease of life. The monetary condition is again being stabilized and the military situation has turned in favour of the Government. Should success for the Government along these two lines continue it may be that the Government will outride the storms. Should the American Government be able to step in with relief and military supplies, and most of all with a psychological boost, there is every good reason to believe that the Government can hold the Communists and eventually ease them out of China, south of the Great Wall. It is clearly recognised here that the Government's mis-direction of its military campaign has been responsible for the Communists' advance rather than the strength of their armies. I have heard very few people in the last three years express the belief that any coalition Government could successfully carry on in China. It is generally believed that any attempt at such a Government would merely mean the turning of the Government over to the Communists, this in spite of the fact that you hear in the papers that certain individuals in Nanking proposing such a coalition. Such people are usually interested in a Communist Government rather than in a coalition. It is because of this belief that few people have any hope of compromise.

We are glad to learn of the new finance campaign which you are undertaking, and we are hopeful that you will be successful. Should the new currency regulations prove successful we perhaps can carry on as we did last year with approximately the same budget, but we have been going through a time when we feared the worst. Our payroll for October was a way out of line with exchange. Should we have had to continue to pay on as poor an exchange we could hardly have been able to carry on for even half a year. Fortunately the exchange is rising, and we hope we shall find ourselves in about the same position as we were last year, although this morning's paper informs us that we should pay for this month five times what we paid in the previous month. Should this prove to be the case we shall be in trouble again, and the payroll combined with the high costs of transportation may sink us. I was awakened at 2 o'clock in the night a couple of nights ago to receive a telegram from Shanghai asking whether we were willing to pay the sum of GY65,000 for shipping to Chungking approximately 50 cases of supplies. We figure that having to pay this will mean doubling the cost of the purchase price of the goods plus transportation from New York to Shanghai! We hope that transportation prices will not remain so out of line, but we have been informed that the Ming Sung Company's ships are booked until next March - you can see that there is little competition and high prices will be inevitable.

Mr. Fong has just written a letter in which he has given you other information, and as the situation progresses I shall continue to provide you with side-lights.

Dear Dr. McMullen,

Thank you very much for your letter of October 27th, also for the printed sermon; both are very helpful to us in our present situation. We have been watching its derelopment closely and are grateful to friends in Shanghai and Nanking for supplying us with information regarding conditions in their areas as well as in occupied areas in which our associated institutions are situated. Yesterday, in our regular meeting of the Council, this very problem of the political situation was formally brought up for discussion. It was unanimously felt that we Chinese and Westerners should stay on here in the University no matter how the situation develops, with the understanding however that the final decision will have to be left to the individual concerned, and that wives and children of our western staff may leave, taking advantage of the present available facilities if they wish to do so. We have at present a few western members who are either in poor health or due for furlough. They may leave soon. It is still too early to say how many of our western staff can stay on, but our feeling and hope is that a good number of them will do so. So far as I know all of our Chinese staff will stay on. I must say that we are very grateful for your letter and also for one from Dr. Fenn assuring us of your assistance.

The general condition here is still quite quiet, although any serious change in the situation down river may affect us here. The prices of commodities are rising every day, but not on such a scale as we experienced a short time ago. There is certainly no panic in the minds of people. We were told that many in Shanghai and Nanking are planning to come to Szechwan. The Ming Sung steamers have been booked up until March. Seats on the two Air Lines - CNAC and CATC - are booked till April. We have had letters from Yenching and St. John's asking if we would help them by taking some of their students at Loan Students. Szechwan at present seems as safe as it can be in any part of China, but as I have just mentioned, if the war situation deteriorates further, we shall be affected, but just to what extent nobody knows. You will be interested to know that we have today received a telegram from Nanking asking if we can accept two American advanced students and one Professor under the USEFC. Of course we shall do our best to accommodate them. You probably know in addition to these two American students who may come soon, we have among our students one German and three Swedes, though two of the latter have just left for field study in Sichang.

Everything is going on quite well in our University. The Religious Life Committee headed by Mr. Stinson and Mrs. Meuser is pushing on a vigorous programme. We are also considering laying the foundations of the University Church regardless of the present disturbed conditions, because, as some say, this is the time for agressive Christianity to take the initiative. They quote the following inscription in an English Church erected in 1653: "When every holy thing was threatened, the land being destroyed or profaned, this Church was built to the glory of God by -- whose singular praise was to have done the best things in the worst times and hoped-for in the most calamitous."

We have had visits from several prominent people this autumn - Canadian Ambassador Davis; Mrs. Lapham and others of ERC, and a couple of weeks ago Mr. Slater of CCUA who stayed with us about a week. It so happened that it was raining all the time he was here - I told him that he had brought English weather with him! He had a very busy time seeing our buildings and talking with our administrative heads. He gave a very good address to our faculty one afternoon, making suggestions from his observations. We are looking forward to the visit of Dr. Fenn in December and hope he can carry out his programme as planned.

As the Christmas Season draws near, may I take this opportunity to send you and other friends of the United Board our warmest Christmas Greetings. Living in the midst of the present world of chaos and disorder, we are faced with immense difficulties in every direction, yet if we are true to the teaching of our Saviour Jesus Christ and to the faith we all profess, we shall be able to exercise our active force in making the happy tidings of the Christmas Angels "on earth peace and good will toward men" a reality.

Excerpts from a Letter from Dr. Leslie G. Kilborn, College of Medicine and Dentistry, West China Union University September 29, 1948.

One of the things that newspapers and magazines abroad seldom mention is the really considerable degree of development in Nationalist China. For example in this Province alone, and in spite of the selfish efforts of some of our old warlords, real advance has been made in recent years in education, health and in These achievements have been fostered by the Government both National The reactionaries in this Province are very largely men who are and Provincial. working against the Government; men of wealth and power due to the possession of private armies in the old warlord tradition. To mention in more detail some of the advances, schools and the number of children in schools have increased enormously. I am enclosing a copy of some notes I made on a talk given by the Commissioner of Education before the Chengtu Rotary Club last February. Since primary schools do not come under the Provincial Government but under Local Governments, he does not deal with them in this talk, but the number of primary schools has increased enor-It is now unusual to find an illiterate young adult in the cities. I first came out here it was very difficult to find servants who could read or write; now most of them are able to read newspapers. It is true that the quality of the schools still leaves much to be desired but at least most of the people are very rapidly becoming literate.

In regard to health, a Provincial Health Department was created in this Until that time almost the only hospitals Province about the beginning of the War. of any account were those belonging to the Missionary Societies, but now over half of the 145 Counties of Szechwan have County Health Stations and some of these are very well run and are doing excellent work. Again it is true that many of them are very primitive and with exceedingly poor equipment and poorly trained people in charge; but, the start has been made and as soon as better qualified personnel becomes available it is inevitable that further advances will be made. When I came to Chengtu the three Mission Hospitals in this city had at the most 200 active beds. Very seldom were these filled except in times of fighting. Today the group of hospitals under the control of the WCUU contains over 500 beds and the bed occupancy In addition there is a Provincial is over 80% all the time; sometimes almost 100%. Hospital of about 200 beds which is very well run. It has an excellent staff and there is close cooperation between it and our College. It's Superintendent is one There are also several of our graduates and many of the staff are graduates of WCUU. other hospitals in the city most of which are well filled and which claim to be using scientific methods. Probably almost 100 beds are available to patients seeking modern medical methods. This is a very considerable increase over the 200 of twenty some years ago and the demand is steadily increasing.

In regard to industrial development of course the war gave a great boost to West Chima. Many factories moved here from the East and a considerable number of them have left branch factories in this Province. These are mostly located along the Yangtze River. Aside from this imported industrial development, there is steady progress under local auspices. The Provincial Commissioner of Reconstruction, Mr. B. H. Ho (Vice-Chairman of the Board of Directors of WCUU), exceedingly efficient, is pushing irrigation and the development of the fertilizer industry. Not only has there been considerable extension to the already famous system of stream irrigation but under Mr. Ho's guidance considerable quantity of high level land has been brought under irrigation. Locally built iron turbines have been installed in many places and these raise the water to higher levels. By this means large areas which previously depended entirely upon rain-fall and hence could not be counted on for rice production, have been brought into production.

In spite of the fact that the Chinese are famous for the use of every possible source of fertilizer, investigation has shown that much of the land, particularly that lying at a distance from large centres of population, where insufficient "night soil" is available, is in real need of fertilizer. To supply this need the production of bone fertilizer is now going ahead in several centres and is greatly increasing the fertility of the soil.

The development of electric power is another thing in which the Bureau of Reconstruction is vitally interested. A long time program has been drawn up for the installation of several hydro-electric plants, the largest of these about 45 miles from Chengtu. Canadian engineers have surveyed the site and made estimates for the construction of this large plant and the Provincial Government is trying to negotiate a loan from Canada to finance it. In the meantime smaller steam plants are being installed in many centers. Recently one was built near Kwanhsien practically at the mouth of the coal mines and some power from that installation is now reaching Chengtu. A second and much larger generator is now on the way from Chung-Another large steam plant is being erected at Wutungchiao about king to Kwanhsien. 120 miles South of Chengtu and where a large chemical industry is being developed. This is one of the centres for the salt industry and from the salt are obtained a great many by-products. What is perhaps of even greater significance, oil has been struck at Wutungchiao and according to the American engineer in charge, this find is We hope that before too long it may begin distribution. a very promising one.

These are merely a few of the lines of development in this Province. Cement factories are being built, cotton spinning mills are being increased in number and an effort is being made to encourage farmers here to increase their production of cotton. At the present time most of our raw cotton comes from the North. Agriculturally this Province has always been one of the richest areas in the World. It not only supports a teeming population but exports a considerable quantity of food stuff to Eastern China. In the past such exports have been confined largely to rice but there is no reason why sugar and fruit, especially oranges, should not become major export products. Hides, goat-skins, hogs bristles, tung oil, lacquer, salt and various metals have also been exported from this Province from very ancient times and with modern means of production the quantities can be increased enormously. This Province remains one of the few areas in China which does not need to import lumber. In spite of the fact that 80 or 90% of the people burn wood rather than coal up to the present at least we have been self-sufficient in lumber requirements.

You will see from this that the possibilities of agriculture and industrial development in West China are almost limitless and if we have any sort of stability in the Government, such development should be rapid. Szechwan has always been only loosely connected with the Central Government of China. This was true even in the old imperial days. It has been noted as the Province where nearly all rebellions began and the last to be pacified. It is perhaps significant that in the present civil war Szechwan remains on the side of the Central Government in spite of the present reactionaries and of a good deal of pro-communist propaganda.

Now a few words as to the University itself. This year 5,500 students wrote our entrance examinations. The University was determined to cut down its enrollment to the 1500 ordered by the UBCCC. By taking in only about 200 of the 5,500 and by dropping scores of students it looks as if we are going to succeed in keeping our numbers down. This process has been exceedingly painful and has caused quite a bit of resentment in many quarters. The demand for higher education in this province is enormous. From the enclosed report you will see that there are 759 Province is enormous. From the enclosed report you will see that there are 759 secondary schools and there are only four Universities; three in Chengtu and one in

Chungking. To these we might add The Oberlin in China College, temporarily located here. About 25,000 students graduate from senior middle yearly so you can imagine the pressure that is put on these few institutions of higher education. In addition we still have many who apply to us from areas near the Coast. This year students tried get into the College of Medicine and Dentistry from Shanghai, Nanking, Peiping, Soochow, Hangchow, Foochow, Canton, Hankow and many other centres in the East. Quite a few are accepted and our Freshman Class includes students whose homes are in at least a dozen provinces although the great majority are Szechwanese. The fact that this is one of the few universities in all China that did not have to move during war years and hence has continued in the same place for thirty-eight years now has given a stability to the WCUU that is lacking in many other centres. Such stability is particularly necessary in such an institution as a medical college.

I had a personal interview with every student in the freshmen Class coming into medicine or dentistry and was very much impressed with the quality of the young people who had been accepted this year. Not only did they have a higher academic standing than for some years past but in personality and general appearance I felt they were superior. Many have come from very fine families; I would say that they they were superior. Many have come from very fine families; I would say that they they were superior of China's youth. We are in duty bound as a Christian institution represent the cream of China's youth. We are in duty bound as a Christian institution represent the everything it is in our power to give regardless of what the future may to give them everything it is in our power to give regardless of what the future may bring forth. Or, one might say because the future to a great extent lies in their hands. We are now in the second week of classes. I have lectures every day in the week and have faced the students of four different years of medicine and dentistry and again I have felt this year a greater degree of responsibility, an increased intensity in their search for knowledge. It is something intengible but which I seem to have felt in the classroom and also in the personal interviews with those coming in for the first time.

I hope you have not found this letter too long. If I can give information on any specific question you wish to mention please let me know and I'll do my best.

OPENING OF MEETING

The meeting was called to order by the Reverend Jesse H. Arnup. who read from the nineteenth chapter of II Kings, after which Dr. Cartwright led in prayer. The minutes of the meeting of May 11, 1948 were approved as circulated.

MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Committee studied with care the minutes of the Board of Directors for June 18-19, 1948, and of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors of July 10 and September 4, 1948 as well as minute passed by the Council on November 23, 1948, these documents having been circulated in advance of the meeting. The Committee gave special attention to matters that were specifically directed to the United Board. In this connection the following actions were taken:-

In response to D. 283 and 317 it was

WC-74 VOTED to approve of the proposal of the Board of Directors that Article IV,
Section C of the Constitution of the Board of Directors be amended to read:
"Three representatives of the Alumni elected by ballot from the whole body of Alumni, the election to be carried out by the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors."

(Note: The Trustees of the United Board in their stated meeting on October 15, 1948 had already approved of this change "subject to consultation with representative members of the West China Union University Committee." The change is therefore now fully approved by the United Board).

In connection with D. 327 which is a request for permission to lay foundations for the Church Building and for assistance in raising funds for its completion, it was

WC-75 VOTED to reaffirm previous action in regard to the Church Building (WC-62 and WC-63) and to send a letter to the administration of the West China Union University expressing the judgment of the Committee that this is not a favorable time to build in view of the unsettled conditions in China.

In reply to D. 328 requesting that the West China Committee and the United Board set aside special funds for the erection of staff residences, it was

WC-76 VOTED to express the judgment of the Committee that this is not the time to erect additional residences.

In response to D. 333 reporting on endeavors to keep enrollments within limits it was

WC-77 VOTED that the West China Union University Committee, having noted with gratification the substantial progress that has been made in keeping the enrollment of the University within limits, express to the President of the University commendation and encouragement.

In response to D. 339 urging the West China Committee of the United Board to establish a Department of Music it was

WC-78 VOTED to defer action on the matter of establishing a Department of Music pending further information as to what is involved administratively and whether the music courses now given meet the requirements of the Ministry of Education for the registry of a Department of Music.

In response to D_{\bullet} 351 recommending the establishment of an Institute of Bio-Chemistry it was

WC- 79 VOTED to defer action on the matter of establishing an Institute of Biochemistry pending further information as to what such an Institute would involve beyond the present Department of Biochemistry, e.g., whether the granting of advanced degrees is contemplated, and if so, whether this would require a larger staff; and pending correspondence with the Reverend Noel B. Slater of London in regard to the permanency of the Birmingham Chair, it having been suggested that funds from this source might finance part of the expenses of the Institute.

The Committee took note of the fact that Mr. S. H. Fong had been reappointed President for 1948 - 1949 and directed that a message of confidence be sent to him.

The Committee noted with satisfaction that the purchase of the Youth Corps Building had been consummated; also that the West Wing of the Education Building had been completed and presented to the University by General Liu Wen-huei.

FUTURE PROGRAM AND POLICY

The document drafted for presentation to the Board of Trustees in its meeting on program and policy to be held in the afternoon was distributed to members present and discussed by them. They approved of the preamble with the exception of one word, but felt that the statement of policy should be modified. It was finally agreed to ask Dr. Decker to present to the Trustees the following version preferred by the West China Union University Committee:

- a) As long as any of the Christian Colleges and universities are able to remain open and to conduct their educational work with substantial freedom and with definite maintenance of their Christian character and teaching, the United Board will be eager to continue their support.
- b) If any institution is prevented from carrying on a sound educational program on a definitely Christian basis by requirements or pressures of one kind or enother, the United Board would feel that it would have to reconsider the question in the light of the situation faced in China and its own responsibility in the trust imposed on it.
- c) We shall wish the best advice of our colleagues in China on any situation that may arise but we must reiterate that a trust has been laid upon us by the founders and supporters of the colleges which we must make every endeaver or to discharge.
- d) The United Board considers the Chinese faculties the most valuable of the assets of the China Colleges to be conserved.

PROGRESS OF FINANCIAL CAMPAIGN

Dr. Winfield reported on the progress of the financial campaign which was launched on November 4, 1948 with a goal of \$500,000. He said that in spite of the unsettled situation in China there had been a very gratifying response, with \$265,000 received or pledged to date. Many previous donors were hesitating, however, to renew their gifts because of uncertainty as to the future, and that was why it was imperative to have a clear declaration of policy as soon as possible.

The Committee directed that their gratification at the progress of the financial campaign, in spite of the difficulties inherent in the situation, be recorded in the minutes.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

The report of the Treasurer for the year ending June 30, 1948 was presented and explained by the Associate Treasurer, Mr. C. A. Evans. (See appendix A). It was

WC-80 VOTED to receive the report of the Treasurer, for the year ending June 30, 1948 with gratification over the soundness of the financial situation, and to transmit the report to the Board of Trustees.

The report of the Auditors, Messrs. Chambellan, Berger and Welti was presented by Mr. Evans and examined by the members of the Committee. They noted that it contained no criticisms or suggestions. It was then

WC-81 VOTED to receive the Auditors' report for the year ending June 30, 1948 and to transmit it to the Board of Trustees.



EXPRESSION OF SYMPATHY

It was

WC-82 VOTED to express sympathy to Dr. Robert J. McMullen on his illness and to express hope for his speedy recovery.

The meeting adjourned at noon after a closing prayer by Dr. Fridell.

UNIVERSITY COMMUNITY CHURCH

THIRTY-EIGHT YEARS OF RELIGIOUS LIFE AT THE WEST CHINA UNION UNIVERSITY

1910-1948

Four men sat down around a tea-table. They were four missionaries who knew each other well, for Distance (from the home base) and Difficulty (of mountains and river) had thrown them upon each other's resources. They represented three countries, and four great denominations: the Canadian Methodists (later to become the tries, and four great denominations: the Canadian Methodists, the American United Church of Canada), the English Friends, the American Methodists, the American Baptists.

"The Christian Church in West China must have college-trained Chinese leadership," they agreed; "but why should each of our Missions try to run a separate college? Let's unite from the start!" Thus was born the West China Union University, the West China Union Middle School, and the West China Christian Educational Union.

Those were the days just before the Chinese Revolution. The ferment of change was blowing on every Chinese breeze. "Why should not the Christian Church also initiate revolutionary progress?" So the first class of the West China Union University opened on March 15, 1910. On October 10, 1911 came the Chinese Revolution.

Those Founders convinced their home Boards. And other Boards; for the English Church Missionary Society joined the Union. And the American Friends sent missionary teachers. The Women's Societies of the American Methodists, and Baptists, and the Canadian United Church, entered this organic union.

Through the years many a country gave its quota to the faculty: Australia, New Zealand, Ireland, Scotland, England, France, Canada, Germany, the United States and I know not how many more; and, of course, always China in growing strength.

The initial purpose was to provide Chinese college-trained Christian pastors and teachers for the West Chine churches. But soon the horizon widened, as it does over plain and sea when voyageurs are exploring. Women entered the University. Christian Higher Education caught the vision of these missionary educators. The needs of Chinese society, the needs of the nation, began to reach into the classrooms, demanding realistic courses in Religion, Science, Education, Medicine, Dentistry. Then came Pharmacy, Rural Reconstruction, Chinese Research, Agriculture.

But in this growing complexity, the original flame burned brightly, steadily: to maintain an institution of higher learning for the creation of Chinese men and women of Christian character and purpose. This was "The Transmission of the Lamp," as the Chinese phrase it.

All the resources of imagination, initiative, adaptability, have been called upon through the years, that the religious life of the campus should not only keep place with the advances in the Colleges of Science, Arts, and Medicine, but should give leadership and direction to Faculty and Student Body. It was taken for granted that teachers and students would attend the city churches, crossing the old South that teachers and students would attend the city churches, crossing the old South Bridge through the city walls. And this worked fairly well as long as a large proportion of faculty and students were recruited from the Missions. For in those days, almost half of the student body were Christians, from Mission Schools. Each of the five Colleges had its own Morning Chapel. There was a small Sunday Morning Service, five Colleges had its own Morning Service, with a gowned Faculty Processional. The a larger University Sunday Evening Service, with a gowned Faculty Processional. The Student Christian Movement, aided by the City YMCA and YWCA, held Winter and Summer Conferences which stimulated religious thinking and campus activity. There was a



Department of Religion in which students preparing for the full-time ministry might major. Pastor Fu Chin-pei, now for many years pastor of the Chengtu Baptist Church and Secretary of the West China Baptist Convention, was the first to graduate from this Department. An excerpt from his own story tells of his decision to become a minister, and incidentally, gives a picture how many a student at the University was led to make a similar decision:

"The small group, of which I was a member, went for a three day retreat in a temple near the University. There each one of us would go into a room by himself for prayer and meditation. Then we would all meet together. During this retreat, under a great banyan tree by the river, in the atmosphere of peace and meditation, I asked myself: 'Shall I be a doctor, a minister, or a teacher?" In my first year at the University, Dr. Morse had tried to persuade me to be a doctor; but I could make no decision. During the three days of that retreat, I listened to the songs of the birds and the blowing of the wind through the trees, just as if the voices of the birds and of the wind were speaking to my heart, and saying, 'You must be a minister.'"

Wallace Wang, now President of the West China Union Theological College at the University, and one of our outstanding Baptist leaders, was for many years responsible for the development of the campus religious activities. George Dsang, now studying in America, followed him.

Then came a series of events which were profoundly to change the whole situation. The University had to register with the Government Ministry of Education. All required chapels and classes in religion ceased as compulsory parts of the University life and curriculum. They became elective. The Sino-Japanese War began, and there came to the campus five refugee universities. Our faculty leaped from 70 to 700, our student body from 300 to 4000. We had on the campus 10-13 different denominations; 8-10 nationalities: English, Canadians, New Zealanders, Australians, Chinese, French, German, Polish, Austrian, American... We had High Church, Low Church and No Church; Oxford Group, Little Flock, sheep and goats. The campus constituency suddenly broadened to include many students all the way from Singapore to Harbin, Ta chien-lu on the Tibetan Border to Philadelphia (Dr. Cora Lenox got her M.D. in the College of Medicine). Only 20-25% of our students were now Christians from Mission Schools. The training of students exclusively for the ministry became a separate institution, near, but apart from the University.

Well, how was this multiple situation met? The Ministry of Education permitted "Required Electives" in "Ethics" to include Chinese Ethics, Psychology, Anthropology, Sociology... We enquired: "May not Christian Ethics be given, as well as Chinese Ethics?" "Yes," was the reply; so a course in Christian Ethics was offered as one of the Required Electives. Do not the Social Sciences include the "Certainly," came the answer from the Minister of Educahistory of institutions? So we offered a course in the History of the Christian Church and Social Move-"But it is impossible to teach a balanced course in Christian Ethics apart from Jesus and the Prophets," we continued, in negotiations which lasted many months. Permission was finally given that courses in the Life and Teaching of Jesus were to be recognized by the Ministry of Education as a formal part of the Required Electives in "Ethics" under the Division of Religious Studies in the College of Arts. It was now necessary to make the classes in the Life and Teaching of Jesus more intellectually stimulating, more attractive, than any of the other competing Electives. Fortunately, we had on our faculty several College Deans who believed in these classes. One of them, Dr. Leslie Kilborn, Director of the College of Medicine and Dentistry, himself led such a class which contained five future Christian leaders, one of them Wallace Wang. At the end of the year they presented Dr. Kilborn with a silver placque bearing the Chinese inscription: HSIEN-TSAI MING-PEI LIAO: Now we Understand.

Word got around that these classes in the Life and Teaching of Jesus surpassed all other Ethics classes in interest, vitality, and permanent value. From that day to this, three times as many students freely choose the course in Jesus than we have teachers to provide.

Then we bought and built on three mountain-tops adjacent to the Chengtu Plain and the campus Lodges for the Study of Jesus, where, in summer three-week seminars, students and faculty might be trained to head classes in the Life and Teaching of Jesus. One summer during the war years at Mount Omei we had teachers and students from 14 universities; another summer, YMCA and YWCA Secretaries from all over China. The religious devotees on Mount Omei presented the Lodge with a black lacquer panel bearing the inscription in carved, gold characters: CHEN LI CHIH FENG: PEAK OF THE TRUTH.

During the war years, the International Student Christian Federation built on this campus a Student Center. After the refugee universities departed, after the war, the University Religious Life Committee took over the Ginling Gymnasium, transforming it into the Religious Center. This, and the Student Center also operating under the Religious Life Committee, form gathering places for the Church and University Student Christian Movement groups; these, and other related groups meeting weekly on the campus, number 55, with a membership or more than 1000 students.

The Sunday Morning Service of Worship has become a steady, large, strong congregation. The University Sunday Evening Service continues. The Sunday Afternoon English Service has doubled in size. Each of these three Services has its own choir; but on special occasions, such as Easter and Christmas, the combined choirs join in large festivals of Music, Drama, and Worship. Handel's Messiah is annually given as well as other cratorios. Two Sunday Schools for the children of Faculty and University Servants are well attended.

As the Faculty and student body grew in numbers and the suburban community around the campus became, outside the city walls, a large population in itself, the need for a University Community Church became urgent. The congregation of the Morning Service elected a Church Board, to be composed of one-third students, two-thirds faculty and community members. Church Committees were chosen calling on new members begun (each year at Christmas and Easter, some 250 faculty and students were baptized). A spacious rectangle bordered by tall lanmu trees in the heart of the campus, has been chosen for the church site. It will face the south - as all Chinese religious buildings do - and be on the main east-west University Road. The architecture will be of pure Chinese with red lacquer columns, carved window lattices, green tiled upcurving roofs, with the rear chancel lattice doors opening out, on occasion, to an outdoor amphitheatre for special religious services of music and drama. The church, with its courts and covered walks, will be surrounded by the femous flora of Szechuan perhaps the richest in variety in the world - arranged in lovely Chinese Gardens, Thus the Church and its Gardens where Faculty and Student Retreats will be held. will symbolize the finest Chinest religious tradition, giving it expression through the Christian Church. This should become a kind of Chinese Westminster Abbey, the Christian "T'ai Miao" (Holy Temple) of West China, where faculty, students, and community, shall unite in Christian fellowship and service, and gain practical church experience to take to other churches in the towns and cities to which they go.

But why build a church in these chaotic times? Because this is THE time for aggressive Christianity to take the initiative! In Leicester, England, stands a church erected in 1653, and bearing this inscription: "When every holy thing was throughout the land being destroyed or profaned, this church was built to the glory of God by Sir Robert Shirley, Baronet, whose singular praise was to have done the

best things in the worst times, and hoped for them in the most calamitous." Well, a Chinese donor has already given the West China Union University Community Church US \$23,500. \$40,000 more is needed, but we have every expectation that many, Chinese and Western Christians, in China and abroad, will joyously participate in the building of this great religious center: to the glory of God in China.

OPENING OF MEETING

In the absence of the Chairman, the Very Rev. Jesse H. Arnup, who was detained at home by illness, the meeting was called to order by Dr. William P. Fenn. The opening prayer was offered by Dr. Gerald S. Bell. Dr. E. A. Fridell was elected Acting Chairman. It was

WC-83 VOTED that the Committee send a note of affectionate regard to Dr. Jesse H. Arnup expressing a sense of loss at his absense and hope for his speedy recovery.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting of December 17, 1948 were approved as circulated.

REPORTS AND COMMUNICATIONS FROM CHINA

Dr. Fenn told about his visit to the campus in January 1949 and the impressions

received. The College of Modical Sciences has achieved marked material and academic development during recent years. Both the College of Arts and the College of Science suffer from lack of a clear sense of direction and the need for reduction of departments. He also reported on enrollment and pointed out that, while the University has made considerable progress in limiting its numbers to 1500, there is need for still further reduction in both enrollment and staff. He also gave statistics for enrollment for the second semester. Dr. Kilborn reported that the name of the College of Medicine and Dentistry, of which he is Director, had been changed to that of College of Medical Sciences as the curriculum now includes Nursing, Dentistry and Medicine. Only 50% of the enrollment of the College come from Szechwan; Cantonese students form the second largest group and Fukien students are third. Manchuria, Hopei and Shantung are well represented but not the central block of provinces. In medicine and dentistry 40% of the students are women, and in nursing 100%. Dr. Clifford Tsao is Dean of andicine. The six Mission hospitals in Chengtu have a total of 600 beds and are all under University administration. The expense of operating these hospitals is increase by the fact that they are teaching hospitals and have to support the School of Nursing, etc.

PERSONNEL MATTERS

Western Personnel

The western personnel needs as reported by the Administration in January 1949 were presented to the Committee. After a discussion of various items it was

WC-84 VOTED to ask the Secretarial Staff to bring this list and other similar lists formally to the attention of the Mission Boards concerned.

Chinese Personnel

Reports were made on the large numbers of Chinese faculty members from West China who have been studying abroad in England, Canada and the United States -- under various auspices. The reasons why Prof. Li Hen had decided to accept a position with Arcadia University in Nova Scotia for the coming year, rather than go back to Chengtu at this time, were explained to the Committee.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

The Associate Treasurer, Mr. C. A. Evans reported that the condition of the United Board's budget for West China Union University for the current year (1948-49) was in a favorable condition with prospect of a surplus of \$200.

The proposed budget for 1949-50 was then presented and explained by Mr. Evans. Dr. Kilborn pointed out to the Committee that the budget did not include any of the expenses of the University Hospitals which amount to about \$35,000 a year (including \$25,000 for supplies) to which the Mission Boards appropriate only a relatively small sum. Gifts had been received from various sources such as ECA, American Women's Hospital Association and the U. S. Army as an exchange for rental during the war, but these could not be expected to continue their contributions indefinitely. At the end of the discussion it was

WC-85 VOTED to approve the proposed budget for 1949-50 for West China Union University and to recommend it to the United Board Trustees for adoption. (A copy is attached to these minutes.)

It was also

WC-86 VOTED that the matter of the budget for the University Hospital at Chengtu be referred to the Committee on Medical Education.

MINUTES OF BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The minutes of the meetings of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors for December 6, 1948, January 19, 1949 and March 16, 1949 were considered and careful attention was given to a number of items.

The University Church

It was reported that the erection of the University Church was proceeding, the Trustees of the United Board having stated that though they agreed with the judgment of the West China Union University Committee that this is not a favorable time to build, they did not interpret this advice as requiring the suspension of the building operations.

The Institute of Biochemistry

The Committee noted that in response to its queries raised at its meeting on December 17, 1949 in regard to what was involved in establishing the proposed Institute of Biochemistry, Dr. T. H. Len, at the request of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors, had signed a statement "guaranteeing that the Institute will not make request for University regular budget funds, or funds provided for undergraduate work of the Department of Biochemistry for the support of the Institute: that the Institute will be sponsored by special finds, these to include the research grant associated with the Birmingham Chair."

Department of Music

The Committee noted that, in regard to the queries made on December 17, 1948 about the curriculum of the proposed Department of Music, the University had not been able to secure a copy of the music curriculum approved by the Ministry of Education, but had obtained a copy of the courses in music given by Ginling College, which has the Ministry's approval. As West China was already giving the equivalent of the Ginling Courses, the establishment of a Department of Music would not increase the cost of operations but would make it possible for students to elect music as a major. On this understanding it was

WC-87 VOTED in view of the receipt of evidence that the courses in music now offered by the Division of Fine Arts of west China Union University are roughly equivalent to those provided for music majors at Ginling College, we recommend to the United Board approval of the change of its name to that of Department of Music, provided that the requirements for maintaining such a department do not add to the present budget.

Invitation to Other Missions

Note was taken of the action of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors (E 365) passing on to the Directors the request of the council to invite the Church of the Brethren in the United States, the English Baptist Mission and the Canadian Anglican Church to participate in the University. It was reported that Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Bright of the Church of the Brethren and Mr. and Mrs. David Gunn of the English Baptist Mission are already on the campus.



WC-88 VOTED that, having heard with interest that a proposal to invite the Church of the Brethren in the United States, the English Baptist Mission and the Canadian Anglican Church to participate in the University has been approved by the Council and referred to the Board of Directors by its Executive Committee, the West China Union University Committee of the United Board takes this occasion of stating that if and when the Board of Directors makes a favorable recommendation on this subject, the Committee is prepared to transmit it to the Trustees of the United Board asking for favorable action.

Teachers College

The Committee considered the action of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors (E. 375) in agreeing "to permit the Administration to assist the special one-year Teachers' College in Chengtu to become registered with Ministry of Education," It was explained that some members of the West China faculty had been offering courses in this Teachers' College, which is not under University auspices. The Committee felt that it did not have sufficient information to act upon this matter and the Secretary was asked to find out what is involved.

Retrenchment Policy

Careful consideration was given to the retrenchment policy recommended to the University by the United Church of Canada Mission and discussed at the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors on March 16, 1949 (E.374). The West China Union University Committee expressed gratification that such a policy was being considered at Chengtu and endeavored to envisage what changes might be involved. The action taken was as follows:-

WC-89 VOTED to recommend that the United Board adopt the following resolution:

Noting that a proposal for reduction of the student body of West China Union University to 1200 and of staff by 30% has been approved by the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors and is now being considered by the Administration; we take this occasion to say that we believe this proposal a sound one. In this connection, we wish to point out that such reduction may well require the elimination of some departments, and would remind the Administration of the existence at Szechwan National University of a large and well-run College of Agriculture.

EVENTUALITIES

There was a discussion of what might happen in Szechwan in connection with the political changes taking place in China, and of how the University would be affected. At the end of the discussion it was

WC-90 VOTED to express the confidence of the West China Union University Committee in the Administration and Faculty, both western and Chinese, and the firm intention of the Committee to stand by them whatever the eventualities, to the limit of its ability, in line with the policies already announced by the Board of Trustees of the United Board.

OPENING OF MEETING

The meeting was opened by Dr. Arnup, the Chairman. Dr. Bell led in prayer.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting of May 10, 1949 were approved as circulated.

MEMBERSHIP ITEM

WC-94 VOTED to recommend to the United Board that Mr. H. L. Arnup of the United Church of Canada become a member of the West China Union University Committee.

REPORTS FROM WEST CHINA

Dr. Fenn read excerpts from several letters from the field as a means of briefly covering the situation. It was at the end of last year that Chengtu fell to the Communists. Adjustment was a more serious experience than for many of the other colleges as the process was a speeded up one in Chengtu. Representatives of the military government spent some time on the campus and supervised reorganization. Their presence prevented certain extremes though they apparently approved of the public trial of one Chinese professor. Students maintained a fair degree of order, though they demanded postponement of examinations. There has been a

West China

process of give and take between faculty and students with both profiting from the experience. The resignations of Dr. Lindsay and Dr. Fong have not been accepted. The second semester began on March 28th. Enrollment is about 1,100.

STUDY OF CONDITIONS ON CAMPUS

After consideration of such information as was available in regard to actual and potential developments on the campus, during which there were many expressions of appreciation of the training the University has been rendering and of the Christian witness of its staff, it was

WC-95 VOTED to adopt the following findings and refer them to the United Board:

Events in Chengtu are so recent that we feel that there is insufficient evidence to justify forecasts in regard to administrative organization and academic program at the University.

However, we have faith in the message and lives of our Chinese and Western colleagues on the campus and lay great weight on the Christian witness which they can render.

Whatever happens in the way of activities in which we cannot participate, we realize that continuance of West China Union University is our only chance in that part of the country of training the sort of leadership which we feel so essential for the future of China.

We therefore urge continued support of the University as evidence of our loyalty and confidence.

Mrs. Taylor was asked to represent the West China Union University Committee on the Findings Committee.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

Mr. Seaman presented the proposed budget for 1950-51, the Report of the Treasurer, and the Auditor's Report. The following actions were taken:

WC-96 VOTED to approve the Report of the Treasurer with the recommendation that in the future funds held for individuals and other organizations be separated from funds actually belonging to the University and that the Report be presented to the United Board.

WC-97 VOTED to receive and place the Auditor's Report on file.

WC-98 VOTED to adopt the proposed budget for 1950-51 and present it to the United Board.

Lr. Smith raised a question as to the percentage of United Board investments that are in common stock. It was pointed out that financial responsibility for investment is in the hands of the Investment and Banking Committee of the United Board, that this Committee is made up

of well-qualified and devoted people, and that they receive advice from expert fiduciary counsel. He asked to have his query recorded with the expectation that the matter would be brought to the attention of the Investment Committee.

Mr. Seaman explained that the budget was on a six-months basis in order to permit of changes for the second half year if adjustments appear to be needed.

UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL

The Secretary presented the critical financial situation now faced by the College of Medical Science and its teaching hospitals, reading a memorandum on the subject from Dr. Harry Liljestrand. He explained the dilemma in which the United Board finds itself, pointing out that, though the Board fully recognizes the importance of teaching hospitals, it has never accepted responsibility for their support and does not have additional funds for that purpose. He also pointed out that the problem of financing teaching hospitals when patients cannot pay is shared by several of lest China's sister institutions.

Dr. Arnup stated that the two Canadian mission boards are sending a total of \$10,000 as an emergency grant. Dr. Bell reported recent word (April 8th) to the effect that decision had been reached in Chengtu to close the Ssu Sheng Tz'u and Shensi Kai Hospitals if possible.

No action was taken, but there was general agreement that the College of Medical Science is of such great importance that every effort must be made to save it. It was felt that questions raised in the discussions should be pursued by the United Board.

OTHER BUSINESS

The Secretary reported briefly in regard to the Church now being erected on the campus. There were expressions of concern over the incomplete state of the building, but the Committees did not feel that it was in position to take any action regarding a request for aid in its completion. There were also expressions of regret that agreement had not yet been reached on the constitution of the Church.

WELCOME TO THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND IN CANADA

WC-99 VOTED to welcome participation of the Church of England in Canada into West China Union University and to express appreciation of its assumption of the support of two Church Missionary Society members on the staff.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and led in prayer,

Dr. Fenn introduced Dr. A. W. Lindsay, former Vice-Chancellor of the University and head of the College of Dentistry, to whom a warm welcome was extended.

REPORTS FROM THE FIELD

Dr. Lindsay gave a brief summary of the situation on the campus up to the time he left.

Dr. Fenn reviewed briefly the situation in regard to the freezing of money and of property. The order of the United States Government of December 17th makes it impossible for the United Board to send any funds to the field or to transfer any of the property to which it holds title. Property on the field has also been frozen by which it holds title. Property on the field has also been send the Chinese in the sense that it is not possible for those who are using it to transfer it.

Dr. Fenn also reported that at Yenching the faculty have given full consideration to the basic question, "Shall we remain private and independent or shall we seek nationalization?" There is a very good chance that without regard to the possibility of unfreezing funds, the decision may be in favor of nationalization. The same thing may happen at any time on other campuses. Dr. Fenn thought that, as they

discuss the matters before them, the Committee should bear that possibility in mind as well as the very great doubt about the possibility of sending any funds.

University Church

The Committee next considered the request for \$10,000 to complete the University Church.

Dr. Cartwright reported for the Committee on Christian Character, Staff and Curriculum. He said that there had been no concensus of opinion as to the rightness or wrongness of the project at this time but that the significance of the University Church as a symbol of religion on the campus had seemed to them to justify a request to the West China Committee that the matter be considered.

Dr. Lindsay reported on the present condition of the building and gave the background of the decision to make the church the University Church instead of the Community Church.

The Committee studied the present financial situation of the Church as presented by Dr. Kilborn in his letter dated October 9th, which indicated that a total of \$25,000 was needed to pay off a debt of \$9,000 and provide for additional expenditures of \$16,000. Of this amount \$5,000 had been given by a missionary, and it was hoped to raise \$10,000 from other sources. The \$10,000 requested from the United Board would complete the sum.

Dr. Fridell hoped that arrangements could be made to provide the \$10,000. He didn't like the idea of a partially finished building, - he would like Christianity to be a symbol of a complete message.

Dr. Decker felt that it was more important to repay to the University the \$9,000 borrowed from it to help complete the Church. He felt that this debt constitutes a threat to both the University and the Church. He suggested that if the \$10,000 were paid, \$9,000 be earmarked to repay the University.

After considerable discussion of the terms under which the grant should be made, it was

WC-103 VOTED to recommend to the United Board that \$10,000 be provided to complete the West China University Church; \$5,000 to be released as soon as permission is granted in order to match the gift already made, the balance when the remaining \$10,000 has been pledged.

It was felt that such an arrangement would make possible the immediate repayment of the debt if those on the field felt that to be a critical matter.

Dr. Lindsay explained that the title of the University Church is held in the name of the Board of Directors of the University.

OTHER BUSINESS

Dr. Fenn reported that the present policy of the Trustees is to send money to the field when it is possible to do so, within the limits of this academic year's budget appropriations. He asked whether the Committee doubted the wisdom of sending funds if a license to do so is granted. No objections were raised.

Mrs. Taylor asked whether the two Canadian Boards should send their contributions direct to China instead of through the United Board as has been done. It was agreed that they should do so for the present, reporting to the United Board the amounts so sent.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

Report of the Auditors

Mr. Seaman presented the report of the auditors, Messrs. Chambellan, Berger & Welti for the year ending June 30, 1950 and it was

Presented herewith, is the Report of the Treasurer of the United Board for Christian Colleges in China to the West China Union University Committee.

The books of West China Union University as maintained in the New York office have been examined by the Auditors, Messrs. Chambellan, Berger and Welti for the fiscal year 1950-51 and the figures in this report have been checked by them.

Attached hereto will be found the following schedules:

Schedule A - Budget Analysis as of June 30, 1951

B - Balance Sheet as of June 30, 1951

The year 1950-51 was a crucial one for West China Union University as it was for all the Colleges. It saw the Institutions being shut off more and more from their friends in America until, in December 1950 all direct communications were discontinued and it became illegal to send funds to Communist China.

From then on it was the aim of the United Board to conserve an adequate portion of the Colleges' surplus and reserves and current income for future use in China. Any portion of the College funds not required for a reserve of approximately two years normal operations was to be used, if determined to be available after review by legal counsel, for projects of the United Board related to higher education under Christian auspices for the youth of East Asia, especially Chinese.

ENDOWMENT SECTION

Funds in the Endowment Section decreased by \$126.95 to a new total of \$324.070.30 as follows:

Estimated income and approved expenditures within the current budget, along with actual receipts and disbursements are shown in the Budget Analysis attached herewith as Schedule A.

It will be noted that actual receipts for the year totalled \$48.904.31 whereas estimated receipts were \$71.239.54. This deficiency of \$22.335.23 was due principally to the fact that, when it became impossible to send funds to China, the United Board and some participating Agencies no longer paid over to the University the amounts appropriated to it.

Dear Friends:

Enclosed herewith, is a Balance Sheet for West China Union University as of June 30, 1952 together with a Statement of Receipts and Disbursements for the fiscal year July 1, 1951 to June 30, 1952, both of which have been checked by the Auditors, Messrs. Chambellan, Berger and Welti. These statements have been prepared as Exhibit K of the Report of the Treasurer to the United Board and are herewith presented in lieu of the usual Report of the Treasurer to the West China Union University Committee of the financial activities of the University for the year.

Since all contact with our beloved University in China has been discontinued and since no funds were sent to China during the fiscal year 1951-52 the activity in the University accounts was reduced to a minimum. The annual report of the Treasurer to the United Board will be presented in a form that will give a complete financial picture of the stewardship of the United Board including its administration of those funds it holds for the various Universities.

As you know, in June 1945 the Endowment Investments of West China Union University were consolidated with those of the other Universities in a "common trust" in the accounts of the United Board.

Similarly, in June 1950 all investments of special funds and reserves of West China Union University were consolidated in the United Board with the exception of the 1/19th share of Land Lease and Executors Deed from the J. Ackerman Coles Estate on property located at 15-19 West 39th Street, New York City. The value of this asset on the West China books is \$20,000.00.

In January, 1951, after the U. S. Treasury Department prohibited the sending of any funds to China, the West China Union University cash accounts were transferred to the United Board and consolidated in the Board's bank account.

At the present time therefore, all cash and investment assets with the exception of those referred to above, are held by the United Board for the benefit of this University and are included in the United Board Treasurer's Report.

Cash and investments held by the United Board for West China Union University on June 30, 1952 were as follows:

In addition to the investments with the United Board and the interest West China has in the Land Lease and Executors Deed, there is on the books of the University a savings bank account with a balance of \$2,617.86. This covers a suspense account balance in favor of Frontier Research Society which is held on the books as an accommodation to that Society.

Certain aspects of the enclosed statement of receipts and disbursements are of sufficient importance and interest to warrant special comments.

Of the \$16,593.04 shown in column 1 as "Investment Income" added to various accounts, \$12,617.27 represents income earned on endowment investments and \$3,975.77 represents income earned on investments of special funds, reserves, and surpluses.

In column 3 there is shown \$2,302.76 which was received from the Fidelity Union Trust Company as income on the West 39th Street property. In the same column there appears \$269.79 which is the amount received from the Mary A. Richards Trust for Friends Peace Scholarship.

Various Mission Boards continued their designated grants to West China Union University in a total amount of \$9,500.00 the detail of which is shown in column 4.

In column 5 "Suspense Credits" the receipt of \$2.630.86 represents an amount received by Dr. Ashley W. Lindsay from the firm of Ash Temple and Company, Toronto, Ontario, of a balance of funds deposited with them for the purchase of dental supplies during the previous year.

The disbursements on page 3 include the terminal salary and travelling expenses of Dr. Walter Small from Chengtu and the salary for the year of Mr. William Small, Bursur at the University.

Certain medical and technical journal subscriptions were continued during the year and the cost of these was \$579.01. These journals will be made available to West China Union University or some other Institution when shipment is again feasible. Storage charges on accumulated copies of these journals and on laboratory equipment which had been purchased previously for the University but not shipped amounted to \$41.85.

Prior to the U. S. Government "freeze" order in December 1950, checks totalling \$5,107.00 were drawn by the field for current operations. Since these checks did not come to our New York Bank until after the government "freeze" order, it was necessary to obtain a special license from the U.S. Treasury Department to make payments. This license was obtained and the checks were paid in March 1951.

The activity of the year which normally would fall within the University budget resulted in an excess of receipts over disbursements amounting to \$17,935.21. In previous years, this would have been considered an operating surplus and would have been set aside for the University to draw upon during a succeeding budget period. Accordingly, it is

RECOMMENDED that the surplus in the amount of \$17,935.21, which is the result of normal budgetary receipts in excess of disbursements for the year 1951-52, be transferred to Accounts Payable and held for disposition by the West China Union University Committee and the United Board Trustees.

Enclosed you will find a postcard with which it is asked that you record your approval of the above recommendation and also your approval of having the attached Schedules included as Exhibit K in the Treasurer's Report to the United Board.

Enclosed herewith is a Balance Sheet for West China Union University as of June 30, 1954 together with a Statement of Receipts and Disbursements for the fiscal year July 1, 1953 to June 30, 1954, which have been prepared by the Auditors, Messrs. Chambellan. Berger, and Welti. These statements have been prepared as Exhibit K of the Report of the Treasurer to the United Board.

Since all contact with our beloved University in China has been discontinued and since no funds were sent to China during the fiscal year 1953-54 the activity in the University accounts was reduced to a minimum. The annual report of the Treasurer to the United Board will be presented in a form that will give a complete financial picture of the stewardship of the United Board including its administration of those funds it holds for the various universities.

At the present time, all cash and investment assets with the exception of the 1/19th share of Land Lease and Executors Deed from J. Ackerman Coles Estate on property located at 15-19 West 39th Street, New York City valued at \$20,000., are held by the United Board for the benefit of West China Union University and are included in the United Board Treasurer's Report.


