TEMPORARY BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

SELECTION OF MINUTES.

1908

Oct 30. The committee on Purchase of Property state that there still remain small portions of land which are necessary in order to rectify the boundary of the Central plot, and we recommend that these be purchased when obtainable.

Dec 16 Resdaved: -

That at the request of those in charge of the Middle Schools it is decided the Temporary Board of Management have control of the federation of the Chentu Missions Middle Schools.

That the Missions uniting in Middle School work shall jointly provide temporary accommodation for teaching purposes, and that these premises we at the disposal of the University.

Further that each Mission arrange for the boarding of its own students.

We were informed of the possibility of a College for Woman being established by one or more Missionary Societies, in the neighbourhood of the University, and of the prospect of its being in some way connected with the same.

H.L.Canright and R.J.Davidson were appointed a Committee to make enquiries on the subject and report to a later meeting.

Dec 18 R.J.Davidson and H.T.Hodgkin brought in the following statement and resolution, which were adopted;-

In response to the suggestion of the Board of Education held in November last, that the three Middle Schools in the Chentu should federate, this to take effect immediately

after next chinese New Year, the c.M.M. and M.E.M. have decided to unite their Middle Schools, for teaching purposes. It is expected that the F.F.M.A. will also join in this arrangement.

In order to carry out this decision, it is proposed that the three Middle Schools referred to, be removed to the University site; - that temporary teaching accommodation be provided on the Central Section; - and that each Mission shall made arrangements elsewhere, for the accommodation of the students and teachers.

The principle of conducting educational work of a lower grade than that of a University, on the University site, whether in Middle Scholls as proposed, or temporarily in the Colleges, has been carefully considered by us, and we are decidedly of opinion that some educational work of this character is essential, during at least the initial stages of the University.

Resolved therefore ; -

That we make arrangements for the location of the proposed Temporary buildings required for the Middle Schools.

Resolved that the Secretary, when sending these Minutes to the A.B.M.U. urge them to unite in this Middle School work.

6.

Whereas the Canadian Methodist Mission have asked to purchase property Section D, we appoint H.L.Canright, E.J.Carson, O.L.Kilborn and R.J.Davidson a Committee to proceed at once to try and purchase a piece of land east of "C", for the University, similar in size to that of one of the original plots, and that in the event of our succeeding in doing so, we sell either that plot or plot "D" to the C.M.M.

April In reply to questions, Dr. Burton made a statement, outlining the history and purpose of his present visit to West China.

Resolved: -

That we proceed with the consideration or the Constitution for one hour.

That paragraphs 2 & 3 under Section 8 b, the words be revised, substituting for them, "All members of the Faculty having the rank of (Professor?)

The method and period of appointment, and the duties of the President were considered, and it was suggested a new paragraph be substituted for 8 c, embodying the idea that the President shall be appointed by the concurrent action of the Joint Commission and the Senate.

The proposal to have a Vice-president was also considered.

Attention was directed to the 2nd paragraph of Section 11, and to Section 5.

No definite decision was arrived at on these points.

The following report of the Buildings and Grounds Committee was presented:-

referred to the Joint commission, this committee recommends the postponement of the erection of permanent buildings other than residences.

Resolved : -

That the Report be adopted.

That in view of the postponement of the erection of our permanent College buildings, we proceed to the erection of Temporary buildings for Teaching purposes, and that we ask the Buildings and Grounds Committee to draw up Plans and Estimates for the same.

In view of the fact that the accommodation in our present Middle School is inadequate, resolved that we ask the Committee on Buildings and Grounds to prepare estimates and plans for additional teaching rooms.

That we ask the Joint Commission to secure an interview with Dr Burton on his return to America, and discuss with him the entire scheme of the West China Union University, with special reference to Constitution and Plans for Grounds and Buildings, both Temporary and permanent.

1909.

April. Resolved: -

9th. That we discuss the nature and requirements of the buildings to be erected on the University site.

That until such time as we can form some definite idea of their size and nature, we should make provision temporarily for the teaching of the Sciences in the several College buildings.

And we would further suggest, that the Boards, in making our their plans for College buildings, keep in view this fact, viz. that the Laboratory accommodation in each building is only temporary, and these rooms may ultimately be required for other purposes.

That we recommend that each KREXMER College provide only one laboratory, and that the four laboratories be approximately of the same size; each being planned to accommodate a class of forty students at a time.

We recommend that there be no less than rour class rooms in each College.

It is suggested that in building the colleges the cross or partition walls be not structural.

The greater part of this session was occupied in listening to most helpful suggestions from Dr. Burton and Professor Chamber-



lain, relating to the constitution and the Curriculum of the University.

1909.

May 9. A letter from Bishop Cassels to the Serretary, asking for information regarding the conditions of entrance into the Union University, was read.

Resolved: -

That the Secretary be instructed to send to Bishop Cassels a copy of the Constitution, so far as at present revised, together with other information respecting the progress of the plans for the establishment of the University.

Also to express to Bishop Cassels our pleasure at the presepect of another body entering the Union.

And to state that we would welcome the Anglican church on the same basis as the other Missions now in the Union.

Resolved: -

That instruction in the following subjects be offered next year, for the First year University Course.

May.13. Resolved: -

That we recommend the Missions interested in the University to take steps to make the present Union Middle School a permanent institution.

May 20. Resolved: -

That the Constitution and Byelaws as now amended be adopted.

That we instruct the secretary to print 500 copies of the Constitution as now revised, with By-laws appended.

June 10. A Report, as follows, was brought in by the committee appointed to consult with the Women's Missions in the city, in degard to the establishment of an institution of a College grade for women.

Some suggestions relative to Women's Educational Work in the city of Chengtu.

A. CO-EDUCATION .

The time does not seem to be ripe for the starting of such work.

B. A NORMAL SCHOOL.

The first step to be taken at the present time in the advancement of Women's Educational work seems to be the establishment of a Normal School. The time is fully ripe for this. It should be a Union institution.

C. SITE OF THE ABOVE.

To rent premises in the city might be possible as a temporary experiment, but does not seem to us at all advisable. The right plan we think would rather be to purchase a site, about a mile from the University site, and build temporary premises.



D. OBJECTIVE.

The object clearly before us in this scheme is the development of higher education for women on broader lines, and such a Normal School might lead to: -

- (1) The development of that school into a College for Women affiliated to the University; or
- (2) The establishment of a Union College for Women in immediate proximity to the University site, and working closely in connection with the University.

June 17. The Report relative to Women's Educational work, recorded at the last meeting of the Board has now been adopted.

Resolved: -

That in view of the report from the committee appointed to meet with representatives of the Women's Boards, this Board advises the said Missions to purchase property about a mile from the University site, and to defer the question of property in the immediate vicinity.

Resplved: -

That this Board, having at various times given much attention to the provision of an adequate staff of teachers for the University, and being more particuparly convinced of the need of a larger staff than is at present in prospect, and of more men who can give their whole time to University teaching, for a period of years, without the interruption thereto caused by the appointment to other work, by the Mission which they serve, or the uncertainty caused by their possible appointment thereto,

hereby calls the attention of the Joint Commission to the problem referred to, and to the importance, for on the carrying of am marking thoroughly efficient University of a large permanent element of the starf.



Moreover that we ask the Joint Commission to consider, at as early a date as possible, the raising of funds for the purpose of sending out men direct for University work, who need not be attached to any one Mission, but who shall come out as missionaries, no less than those who are already in the field.

We also ask the Joint Commission to represent to the participating missions the importance of making their appointments to the University, of a more permanent nature than is usually the case with ordinary mission appointments.

1909.

June 17. This Board appreciating the extreme difficulty of the problems with which it, in common with other educational bodies in China, is faced at the present time, has heard with peculiar satisfaction of the possibility of Professor Sadler paying a visit to China, and more particularly Sz Chwan, with the idea of studying these problems and contributing towards their solution.

It is the earnest hope of the Board that such a visit may be possible within the next few years, and they would assure Professor Sadler of the warm welcome which would be given to him here, in the event of his being able to carry out this plan. The Board is convinced that such a visit would be far-reaching service, both to our own school and University work, and to the cause of education throughout China.

That, whereas there is a possibility of Professor Sadler of Manchester University paying a visit to West China, in the interests of education, and whereas it is evident that such a visit would be most helpful, and opportune at the present time:-

Resolved that we request the Joint Commission to do all in their power to further this end, and also to consider possibility of associating some American educationalist with Professor Sadler in the work, in the event of his being able to undertake the journey.

The right plan we think would rather be to purchase a site,
about a mile from the University site, and build temporary
premises.

D. OBJECTIVE.

The objective clearly before us in this scheme is the development of higher education for women on broader lines, and such a Normal School might lead to :-

- (1) The development of that school into a College for women affiliated to the University; or
- (2) The establishment of that a Union College for Women in immediate proximity to the University site, and working closely in connection with the University.



Consul-General Wilkinson, the latter considered that as a School Institution we were not liable for taxes save probably in so far as we kept land under cultivation, and advised that we through him make representations to the Vicercy to that end, stating (a) The number of Chinese acres under cultivation this year(b) The number probably under cultivation next year, and asking as an institution doing school work to be freed from all taxes on land not under cultivation, at the same time signifying our willingness to pay a police tax if necessary for more adequate police protection.

This report was adopted.

A communication from the Friends' Foreign Mission Association Committee of Management was read, containing a copy of a minute passed by them re the removal next year of H.T. Silcook from University work to Chungking, and asking our attitude to the proposal.

The following resolution was passed: "In view of the facts presented by the representatives of the Friends' Foreign Mission Association, resolved that we take no action in this matter, further than to express our hope that it may be possible for the F. F. M. A., in the interests of our work here, to make such arrangements as will permit H. T. Silcock to return to us earlier than the beginning of 1916".

JOINT COMMISSION

London, June 27th, 1910. -- The Committee appointed to prepare a statement for presentation to the China Emergency Committee, presented the following report which adopted.

Educational Secretary and Normal Training Department in connection with the West China Union University.

One of the most important problems before the Missionary Societies in West China at the present time is, how can our Christian Educational work be carried on most efficiently? All the societies working there have committed themselves to union effort in this regard, and have inaugurated the West China Educational Union, the purpose of which is to promote the unification and centralization of Primary and Secondary Institutions for boys and girls by means of a uniform course of study, similar text books, and common examinations, and also to promote a Christian University. The Union has been operating now for four years, and has been of incalculable value to the educational work of our Missions. We confidently hope that it will be increasingly beneficial.

This last year has made more and more evident two great needs of our union:-

- 1. The personal link between the many individual schools and between the University and the lower grade work.
- 2. The training of Christian teachers to take their part in the educational work of our Missions.

In order to me et these needs we propose the appointment of an Educational Secretary who would be a member of the University staff, and who would take a large share in the Educational Department of the University.

We propose that this man should visit the schools, examine the work done, and consult with the different teachers on the best method of teaching and school management.

We propose also that he should undertake the work of Registrar and Secretary of the Union.

Those who are closely engaged in this Union work are strongly persuaded of the need of such a worker.

In order to provide for the needs of this Secretary it is proposed that a fund be raised by special subscription, and the Joint Commission of the West China Union University is prepared to act as trustees for this fund, and to undertake the control of the work of the Educational Secretary. Such a fund should be sufficient

to provide a home, pay the yearly saary, and meet the current expenses incident to carrying on the Secretary's work.

Herewith a Budget of the probable cost of providing for an Educational Secretary such as we propose, for a period extending over nine years:-

Your Committee would suggest that this statement of the need of an Educational Secretary be submitted to the China Emergency Committee, and they be asked to make a contribution either to

- 1. Support of this man in connection with the University, or
- 2. The equipment of the educational department of the University.

Resolved that each representative on this Executive Committee make inquiries for available and suitable men for this position, it being understood that the presentation of any name should be accompanied with comprehensive recommendations and after a personal interview by a member of this Committee. It was suggested that among the qualifications desired should be:-

(a) A first class University education and some pedagogical training.



- (b) Experience in school management.
- (c) More touch with educational affairs in general if possible on both sides of the Atlantic.

It was agreed that it was desirable that the appointee should spend one year studying the educational methods on the opposite side of the Atlantic to that in which he has had his principle training, and that, if necessary, the expenses for this special preparation should be borne by the Board of Governors.

A letter received by the Secretary from Dr. H.T. Hodgkin reports that the China Emergency Appeal Committee in England passed the following resolution on November 30th, 1910.

"That a grant of \$\mathbb{Z}\$ 500 be made to the proposed Union Normal Training College for men in Chengtu, and of \$\mathbb{Z}\$ 500 to the proposed Union College Training School for Women, when the schemes are matured: this offer to hold good for twelve months. It is suggested that the Chinese Government should be asked to contribute toward the cause and also the gentry of the neighborhood."

Report of Committee to draw up a statement of the present position and of the Policy of the Temporary Board with regard to the Training of Teachers.

The present situation wx is here considered in the light of (1) the need, (2) past attempts (3) present efforts, and (4) our policy.

- I. THE NEED OF TEACHERS. The Teacher is undoubtedly the crux of the educational situation in West China. The government sorely needs teachers who can teach Western subjects properly and who can maintain discipline. Students of Mission Schools very readily find positions as Teachers with good pay. It is said, on the authority of Chinese, that a majority of the graduates of Mission Colleges in China are Teachers, either in Government or Mission Schools. Turning to Mission schools, the need for teachers is still acute. The West China Christian Educational Union includes 102 schools and recent inquiries show that in very many cases only gaza aged Chinese teachers of the old school are available—men who are utterly incompetent judged by all modern standards. Lastly, this lack of teachers is vital even to our University, for without a strong system of Primary and Middle Schools on which to base the work, we can have no reliable supply of students. Regarded therefore from the point of view from this institution, or of missionary schools in general, or from the still broader aim of giving timely Christian aid to the education of the Empire, a steady supply of efficient teachers is a prime necessity.
- II. PAST ATTEMPTS. In the past some attempts have been made to meet this need, The first place is due to the Methodist Episcopal Chungking High School, and in a less degree to other middle schools, which have for years turning out students who make good teachers and are in great demand, very largely in the Middle and Senior Primary Schools. An attempt to supply a brief course for older men to fit them as Junior Primary Teachers was first made a few years ago in Chengtu, and has been carried on during the past year on the University site by the Union Middle School. In addition at least two short-course summer Normal Schools have been held with the idea of giving some slight preparatory training to elementary grade Teachers.
- III: PRESENT EFFORTS. At the present time the Educational Union is fostering plans for more summer Normal Schools and the Union Middle School intends to continue its Normal Department and has lowered the fees in the hope of making it more available for the different Missions. The students take arithmetic and other subjects which they have afterwards to teach, substituting classes in Pedagogy and practice for English.

IV. OUR POLICY.

(1) Minutes. The policy of the Temporary Board as indicated by its minutes is to open, as soon as possible, a Pedagogical Department

in the University for regular matriculated students, the course as outlined covering four years. A recent minute (20 Oct.1910, see also 15 Sept.1910), recommendskiwn the erection of a Science Building on the Central Plot, in which several rooms should be

(2) Informal. The idea has also been gaining ground, from the logic of the facts, that the present Middle School normal department is the only feasible source from which a University Pedagogical Department can later be evolved. At present no students for such a department are in sight and they are only likely to come as the elementary grade Mission Schools are supplied with more and more efficient Teachers. Then College-trained men will be indispensable as Middle School Teachers and also as local educational organizers or school inspectors in the various Missions.

Present Location of Normal School on University Grounds.
This Middle School Normal Department is at present situate on the University Grounds, though inadequately housed in the temporary school buildings, and having to take some classes in one of the dormitories and others in a practising school about half an hour away.

UNIVERSITY To Take Control. The Temporary Board is of the opinion, and it has been somewhat aided in reaching this conclusion by the kind offer of the China Emergency Appeal Committee, that at no distant date it would be well for the University to not only provide a location but to take over from the Middle School the charge of the present normal department or normal school. It is presumed that the middle school will not be moved to a great distance from the present site, and that not for some time at least, so that students would continue as at present to take work partly in the middle school and partly in the Normal School. The Board is prepared to outline a suitable course for Senior Primary Teachers in addition to the existing course for the lowest grade and in time to develop from the school a full University Department.

In its judgment no lowering of the matriculation standard of the University should be made, and students in the University Normal School, as it would then be, should not be regarded as University students nor necessarily subject to or eligible for the same fees or length of course.

Revised plans for accommodation of the school. For the proper housing first of such a school and later of a Department of Pedagogy, after further consideration and consultation with educators, we are of the opinion that such an arrangement as that recommended in our Minute of 20 Oct. 1910, whereby certain rooms in a science building to be erected on the Central Plot would be set apart for this work, would not be satisfactory. A separate central building containing lecture room, practice-class and other class-rooms and offices would be necessary. In addition a system of schools from kindergarten to middle school would be required. Whether these latter would more properly be developed--

in the future -- on the grounds and under the control of the University, or within short distances and under separate managements, is a point on which the Board waits for further light; but whichever way the University should develop and whether or not it should be led to undertake the responsibility of organizing and maintaining in connection with its Pedagogical Department a complete system of schools through all grades, such a building as outlined above would be of direct benefit to the University, to the Missions and to West China from the moment of its erection. For the bur or five years it is more than likely that there will not be enough normal students fully to occupy the building continuously and the University would therefore be grateful if the China Emergency Appeal Committee would grant them the privilege of using one room for the temporary location of the University Library and also of using the large room from time to time as an Assembly Hall.

Temporary Board's Requests. In view of these considerations the Temporary Board asks permission of the Board of Governors to undertake the control and care of such a Normal School as has been outlined. It also recommends that the Trustees accept the offer of the China Emergency Appeal Committee with a view to erecting on the Central Plot and possibly near the present middle school and University entrance, a two-storyed building containing the following accommodations at an estimated

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The Board also proposes to carry out the suggestion of the China Emergency Appeal Committee and to approach the Chinese officials; - through H. M. Consul General -- and the literati with a view to obtaining further funds. It also suggests the institution of a regular "visitors" day" in the hope of maintaining friendly touch with such subscribers and other Chinese educationalists.

"After an investigation covering some months your Committee has failed to find any foreigner both free and fully qualified to describe work take entire charge of this department. Men qualified to desuch work are few and naturally greatly in demand by their Missions and other organizations. There is the alternative of selecting some younger man of aptitude for the work and giving him the opportunity and assurance needed to make such his life work, and this year Committee are not without hope may yet be done.

"In the meantime your Committee would recommend that the department be under the direction of the most competent Chinese instructors we can secure; that the Subject of Chinese language for obvious reasons be wholly under their direction: that in the subject of Chinese history consultation be had with the department of Foreign History, and that the course be supplemented by a course of lectures by the latter department on a study of Chinese history from a general standpoint; that the subject of Chinese literature be similarly directed in a consultation with the department of Philosophy and Ethics and that the Course be supplemented by a series of lectures by that Department on a critical study of Chinese Philosophy and Ethics as presented in the Classics."

- 2. That members of the staff of the University, approved by the Board of Governors as members of the Senate, shall hold office so long as they are under the appointment of the Senate.

We recommend that a By-law regarding the term of service of members of the Senate appointed by the Convocation be drawn up when the Senate determines the time of admission of such members."

CHRISTIAN INFLUENCE OF UNIVERSITY.

AGENDA 20 (8)

Joint Commission: London, June 27th, 1910.

Resolved that in view of the fact that the object of the University, as stated in the Constitution, is the advancement of the Kingdom of God by means of higher education in West China under Christian auspices, we requested the Senate to consider what steps should be taken to assure a strong Christian atmosphere in the University, both in the teaching force and in the student body.

To maintain the four Courses in the general Arts department, at least four teen men will be needed, as shown below. To provide for furloughs and other exigencies, this number of men are necessary for the maintenance of the work in any efficiency. Of these, four men are urgently needed at once, that is by the Spring of 1911: One man is needed for Chemistry, (we would advise that we have a special knowledge of Geology), one for English, with a knowledge of modern languages, one for the department of Political economy and History, and one for the department of Education (normal work); --- this latter man might also act as Educational Secretary and Registrar for the West China Missions' Board of Education.

It is hoped that in the near future the specialized Courses in the General Arts Department, may themselves be developed into Departments, and that before long, new Courses may be commenced in modern Languages, Medicine, Applied Science, and Law. The four men now asked for form the lowest estimate we can make for this present year's needs. (For Schedule of men needed see separate sheet).

The Committee to revise the report of the Committee on the number of men required for the years 1911-14, which report was adopted June 23, 1910, made a report which was amended and adopted as follows:

We would again call the attention of the Board of Governors to our minute of June 23rd, 1910, which refers to four men being urgently required at once, that is by the Spring of 1911. As those men have not arrived, the Courses outlined can be taught only with great difficulty. Although in 1913 there will be four classes in the Institution, according to the present schedule there will be fewer men available for the Faculty than at present when there are but two classes. We would therefore urge that the Board of Governors take steps to secure these men and that they be sent to the Field as early aspossible in 1912.

In addition to these a man is required to carry on the work of the Biological Department during P.M.Bayne's absence on furlough 1913-14 (not 1915-16, as stated in the schedule). t is suggested that this man be secured on the field from one of the participating organizations. To further correct the schedule (see our minutes of June 23d, 191 It should be noted that J.Taylor and C.R.Carscallen are expected to have returned from furlough in 1914 and presumably will be available for work in their Departments.

On accordance with the recommendation of the Board of Governors it is planned to open a Medical School in 1912. The minimum needs of men should be two for the first year of work, and an addition of two for each new year, making eight men when the fourth year's Course is offered.

This does not provide for such subjects as Botony, Zoology, Physics and Chemistry, which it is assumed will be otherwise provided for.

It is expected that the Chinese language shall be the medium of instruction in teaching the Course in Medicine.

Other things being equal the man under thirty years of age will acquire the Chinese language more easily and

more accurately than the man over thirty.

It is the judgment of the Senate that young men, graduates in Medicine, should be sent to the field through the participating organizations to spend two years in the study of the language, followed so far as possible by an adequate term spent in active medical work before being appointed to teaching.

On the other hand it may be possible for the Board of Governors to supplement the work of the participating organizations by the appointment of young medical men direct to the Union University. Such action on the part of the Board of Governors we would both urge and welcome."

which was amended and adopted as follows:

"Resolved that, contingent upon the buying of the Hua Yang Hsien and the Liang Fu Kong Shoe land above included, the University seek to buy land from the Methodist Episcopal Mission, and the Friends' Foreign Mission Association, so that the University plot may be broadened, and that the public road may be moved northward to parallel the E. & W. road at a distance of 600 feet from centre of road to centre of road.

Resolved that the Purchase of Property Committee be asked to investigate the feasibility of the purchase of land to the East of the Canadian Methodist Mission Plot, and immediately to the South of the University plot, sufficient for the erection of a Medical College, and report.

SE NATE April 13, 1911.

The Purchase of property Committee presented the following report, which was adopted: "With the exception of two small fields, containing about five English acres owned by the Hua Yang School Endowment, all the land East of the Central Plot and Canadian Methodist Mission property to a line running North from the San Tai Knoll to meet the North East arm of the irrigation ditch is owned by two families. The Su family own about sixty Chinese mong. (10 English acres), and the Chu family about twelve Chinese mong. (3 English acres). As all this is continuous with our

present property, and would furnish site for Medical College, and other future extension, and as it is within the limit of 15 acres, English, which we were authorized by the Board of

The Temporary Board of Management of the West China Union University takes pleasure in presenting to the Board of Governors the following report for the year 1910. For the sake of greater clearness, the report is presented under the following headings:-

C. Control.

The control of the affairs of the University on the Field has during the year, as heretofore, been vested in the Temporary Board of Management. Though the new Constitution recently received calls for the formation of a Senate, it was felt that the Temporary Board of Management should continuountil the Constitution was finally adopted by the Missionary Organizations. During the year, save for the holidays and a few exceptions, meetings have been held regularly each Thursday afternoon. The officers and members for the year have been;—

The Faculty has also been organized and has taken over its duties. It has held frequent meetings arranging for Courses of Study, Time Tables, Examinations, Discipline, etc., and where necessary it has reported to the Eemporary Board of Management.

2. Buildings.

During the first part of this year, three temporary one-storey buildings, each 50 ft. x 20 ft., tilecovered, and of lath and plaster construction, were erected, and later a fourth was added, thus completing three sides of a quadrangle. These serve as Chemical Laboratory, Physical Laboratory, General Class-rooms, and Library and Reading Rooms, respectively. The ground about these buildings has been raised, temporary stone slab walks constructed and they will shortly be enclosed by a neat open brickwork well, which with an appropriate gateway, should add greatly to the general appearance of the institution. Much of this material, as stone, bricks and tile, together with some of the timbers, will be usable again for other purposes. These buildings, though far from ideal, answer our present needs. There can be no doubt, however, that many more students will be attracted, and much more effective work done, when the permanent buildings are erected. Permanent College buildings will also be a great boon, as in the present temporary buildings erected by the various Missions, despite our best efforts, much illness prevails, owing to extremes of cold, heat and dampness, and to the lack of proper ventilation.

3. Opening of the University.

On the eleventh of March, the University was formally opened. It was but a little group of members of the Temporary Board of Management, the Faculties of the University, and of the Middle School, and a few friends, who met in the temporary Physical Laboratory with four or five score of Chinese students from our Middle School, and the prospective first class for the University. But unflagging enthusiasm, high hopes, and an unwavering faith in the future, made up for all deficiencies. In this spirit we sang together, "All peoples that on earth do dwell", Rev. J. Beech led in prayer, and short speeches were made by Mr. Ich Deh Min and Rev. Egbert John Carson, Rev. J. T. Stewart, as Vice-President, in a brief address, declared the University opened. All again united in singing the Domology, and Rev. J. Taylor pronounced the Benediction. A feast, later, in one of the dormitories gave the occasion a characteristically Chinese auspicious inauguration tone.

It is with keenest sorrow we report that in less than a six month from that day of mutual rejoicing we were called to mourn the loss of both the chief speakers of the day. Mr. Carson, as a member of the Temporary Board of Management, and as first Acting Vice-President of the University, had been untiring in his labours and unswerving in his loyalty to the work he loved. His severence from us to serve his Mission elsewhere came as a great strain, and his death of typhus fever on June 14th, at Chungking little more than three months later, still casts its gloom upon us.

In Mr. Ich Deh Min Many hopes were centred. He was a mathematician of rare qualifications, a teacher of many years' experience and a Christian of ripe character. We looked confidently to him as a coming leader of his people, and his sudden death of pneumonia, at the M.E.M. Hospital here, in September, has left a vacancy hard to fill, and a memory which will long be held in high esteem by students, fellow-teachers and friends.

EMCLISH

In presenting this Report of the year's work in the study of English, it may be well to remind the Board that the students who entered this first calss of the University did so upon the recommendation of the Principals of their Schools. Because of this fact we received students who had not reached the required standard in English. Some of them had to take supplementary work in the Union Middle School. Even with this help they would have been unable to keep up with the better prepared students. It was therefore deemed wise to suit the Course to the students, with the result that work of a lower grade has been done than was at first planned.

Stand what has been read, to speak clearly and to write distinctly. Lectures on the study of English, the meaning of Language in its broader sense, and on Description and Marration have been given. The students have been required to do original work in their theme writing. A simple edition of "Robinson Crusoe", and part of "Gulliver's Travels" have been read.

The year's work has shown that the students are weak when they are put upon their own initiative. They can work up any tent-book given to them, but are at a loss when a pointed to work which calls for original thinking and planning.

Perhaps at would be well if more time could be put upon the work of sentence analysis and the mastering of the English verb in the preparatory schools. This would allow the Course in the University to begin at a much more advanced point than it did this year.

In willinghess to work, in eagerness to learn, and in deportment and good character, the class has been all that could be desired.

CHEMI TRY

There has been a very marked change in the attitude of the students in the Chemistry class during the last half-year. The Course offered was intended to consist almost entirely of laboratory work in general elementary Chemistry. This was for the reason that most of the class had previously studied a tent-book, but had very little experience of a practical nature. We found, however, that class work was necessary and that it must accompany the laboratory work. The students took the Course very lightly at first, but have come to realize that their old-time attitude of approximate accuracy must be put aside in the students was such that their progress has been himlered materially.

The laboratory work has been conducted in the building erected for that purpose. The equipment, appar-

atus and chemicals have been due to the good graces of the Union Middle School. The University supplies were ordered more than a year ago. They have been wrecked twice since leaving Chunghing, and at present are piled on the bank of the river about thirty miles above Suifu. Fortunately the things are insured, but that cannot compensate us for the loss of time and lack of materials during the last year and for an indefinite time in the future.

We expect to offer a Course in Qualitative Analysis ment year and hope to draw out an even greater interest than was shown this year.

FOREIGN HISTORY

The lectures of the Spring term dealt with Europe as it was at the time of the Fall of the Roman Empire, and traced the beginnings and rise of the Holy Roman Empire up to the 10th. Century A. D. No text-book was used in class, the lectures being copied by the students and time given for discussion at the end of each hour. On the final examination each student wrote a very acceptable paper.

During the Fall term we have read in class a translation of Green's Shorter History of the English People, as far as the reign of Henry 111. Once a week time was taken to examine the students orally on the previous work, as well as to answer questions asked by the students. A mid-term essay was given and splendid work was done on the following subjects:

- (1) Frace the beginnings and development of the Christian Church in Empland to the end of the reign of Henry 11.
- (2) Relate in detail the struggle of the English people against the invasions of the Danes and Normans and carefully summarize the results of these invasions.

Each student wrote on one subject only, and the instructor was much gratified at their first attempt in this particular department of the work in History.

At the final examination questions were chosen which very fully covered the work of the term and the marks obtained indicate the good work done.

of the seven students, six have been in attendance at practically every lecture, and the work in class has been of such a nature as to suggest the value of this study apart from the book-learning involved. From the instructor's point of view the work done by these seven students has been eminently satisfactory.

CHIMESE LITTRATURE

The study of the Spring and Summer Annals has been made the basis of class work. With these have gone the Commertaries of the Tse Chuen and others.

CHINESE HISTORY

In Chinese Ristory the period covered has been from the times of earliest traditions to the early Han Dynasty.

CHINESE LANGUAGE

In Chinese Language the basis has been Essays of the Worthiss. These have been read and examined as to their construction and characters used. Essays have also been required of the students weekly and those have been criticized individually and in class.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION

In this department we have endeavored to give the students a general idea of the rise, meaning and message of Prophemy, the History of the 8th Century as it effected Judah and Israel and gave form to the message of the Prophets, and we have studied in some detail the Books of Amos, Hosea, and Isaiah (1-29). The work has been of great interest to the instructor, and apparently of interest to the students also. There is so much in the local colour of the age of the Prophets that is familiar to the Chinese, and so much in the particulars sins of that age, - the covetousness of the rulers, the injustice toward the poor, the lack of honesty among the people, the running hither and thither in time of national calamity, grasping at this and now at that, the absence of the peace and confidence that come from faith in God, -so much that is peculiarly Chinese, that the study of these old Prophets comes to them with particular force. There is much also that is applicable to these times in China, when the old ideas and conceptions are being turned upside down, as were the old theological conceptions of the Hebrews of that day, and where the alternative seems to be a materialistic atheism or a deeper conviction of God.

In all my teaching Ihave tried to remember these things, and to find the woint of contact with the students, and thus make the Prophets real to them.

5. Students.

The first class has been a small one, but eleven in number, and during the year even those have been reduced to seven; one entered the Railroad School, two were dropped early in the term for mis-conduct, one left us for Peking Medical College, and one owing to ill health dropped out. The remaining students have pursued the prescribed Course with commendable diligence. The final examinations for the year have been satisfactory. All the class passed in all subjects, except two who have been conditioned in English, and this through no lack of application during the year, but rather through lack of fitness on entering. Four of the students have assisted in teaching in the Union Middle School, have thus paid in part their own way and have had excellent training for future needs. In conduct and religious life the year has been highly satisfactory. Not only has there been no case for severe discipline, but these University men have been most regular in attendance on religious services and leaders in the Christian Endeavor Society, thus exerting an excellent influence on the younger students of the Middle School. Six of the number are church members and the remaining one is strongly Christian in sympathy and active in service.

6. Developments.

The conditions are still far from ideal, but much progress has been made from the original two farms and small plots of rice fields. The University site, save for one small field in a remote part, has been completely cleared of tenants. Grading, as already mentioned, has been done about the temporary buildings and stone walks put down. The chief permanent improvements have been, however, in homes for the foreign instructors. Buildings which should prove adequate for fifty years to come are complete or nearing completion. There are now some seven of these, and though others will be needed soon, it should leave the time more free during the coming year for the other buildings and improvements which confront us.

7. Present Problems.

At present Committees are busy pushing forward such matters as the purchase of property, drainage and grading, fencing and gateways, roads, walks and avenues of trees, lighting and water supply, etc., and another year should show great improvement in these. Plans for our permanent buildings have not as yet reached us, but material has in many cases been long since contracted for, and some start should be made during the coming months.

As to the actual work of teaching, Courses have been made out, supplies for the Sciences have been ordered and advertising mater has been sent to various parts of the province. We therefore look forward somewhat sanguinely to teaching the first and second years of University work during the coming year. It is, however, not probable that we will enroll a large class of new students, as we are as yet not well enough known and are unrecognized by the official system. The results of the Educational Union in uniting the Missions in Primary and Secondary education have been very gratifying, the Registrar's Report showing a doubling of enrolled students this year, but it will 'take some years before it can bear fruit in largely increased University attendance. To converse the men we had it seemed best to begin a class this year and our judgment at the end of the time is that it was wisely done.

As outlined below, the Pass Course is continued, as we felt that it would be unwise to attempt Honour or Special Courses at present. The Course, with time and instructors is as follows:-

The recommendation of the Board of Governors for the strengthening of the Department of Chinese Language, Literature and History has met with our very hearty response, and we are taking steps to assure proper emphasis and efficiency as speedily as possible.

8. Future Needs.

We find ourselves handicapped in certain ways which we would again point out to the Board of Governors.

The first is in funds for unexpected small expenditures. This will be remedied when we are given the central of the \$1000.00 (gold) recommended by your Body. Another is the almost shattering of our work caused by the removal of some of our staff, after work has been all planned, by the action of the Angual Councils. This would also be in large measure remedied if some measure were taken by the Home Boards, as you suggest, for making University appointments more permanent. A third, and that a somewhat pressing one, is the providing of men for the furloughs which must soon fall due. As you will see from the list of teachers, and Courses for the next five years, submitted to you, we shall be in need of men for certain departments immediately and trust that this may have your immediate attention.

May we add in closing that we are most highly gratified at the way in which our many and varied requests have been responded to by your Body and the Missionary Organizations. Here on the field, through all the many complex questions that arise, the utmost harmony has prevailed, and we look forward with even brighter hope to the coming years, and the Mission of this Union University work in the ushering in of the Kingdom of Truth, Righteousness, Peace and Joy in this ancient Empire.
