YENCHING'S 1934 HOME-COMING SHOWS PROMISING SPIRIT

From N. Giot Gee V. Rm., yeaching University, 150 Fight day. New york lefy

An estimated crowd of between two and three thousand people saw Yenching put her best foot forward on the Annual Home-coming Day, April 28. Every department, college, and special enterprise had some exhibit or feature of entertainment ready for the visitors, who were present in larger numbers than at any time since the founding of the University, and it is the general opinion that they saw a more impressive Yenching than ever.

The Department of Biology had an interesting exhibit of the work being carried on toward the advancement of that science in China. Sociology's exhibit of the products of their Ching Ho Experiment Station impressed everyone with the new and improved goods which the villagers are turning out under Yenching's direction. In conjunction with this exhibit there was a striking display of native-made goods which illustrated the progress China is making toward the time when she will supply her own manufactured goods.

It was open-house day for both the Men's and Women's Colleges, and as the visitors trouped through the immaculate corridors of the dormitories and dropped in on their sons and daughters they realized that probably nowhere else in China do college students have such uniformly clean and modern living quarters. Out on the campus were the ice-cream wagons and other concessions of several student "teams" who are raising their share of the million dollars required for the endowment campaign. Pedestrians everywhere were buttonholed and urged to buy an ice-cream cone, a nosegay, or a lei of almond blossoms to help Yenching along.

The Department of Journalism was in the final day of its Fourth Annual Journalism Week, and at noon entertained at tiffin for approximately 100 guests, some of whom hailed from such far-flung countries as Sweden, Russia, Germany, Australia, and America.

Dr. J. Leighton Stuart gave a welcoming reception at his home at 10:00 A.M., and at noon addressed the alumni who had gathered for their annual reunion luncheon.

An all-day athletic program provided plenty of fun for the thousands of people who were wandering over the campus, looking at the exhibits, visiting their children or friends, or climbing up into the lofty water-pagoda which was opened for the day. Beginning in the morning with the customary bicycle races for both men and women, the program was enhanced by a spectacular tug-of-war across a narrow neck of the lake. Virtually all of the population of Chengfu village turned out to see their heroes, the University workmen, easily drag a bespectacled faculty team into the lake and through its chilly waters.

After the tug-of-war economist Harry Price successfully defended his tennis championship in a hard-fought match, and the girl's varsity volleyball team defeated a crack alumnae aggregation which now constitutes most of the best players in China.

In the afternoon an interclass track and field meet provided more diversion, and was followed by a baby parade, the traditional donkey polo match between the school and the alumni, and a parade of the Animal Kingdom - ducks, Mongolian hounds, camels, goats, rabbits, flat-tailed sheep, etc., -- which had come from all parts of China to witness Yenching's big day.

TELEGRAPH ADDRESS

Dear Miss Van Sciver:

I have 4 letters dated July 8, and one dated July 16, from you, which came two or three weeks ago when I was away from Yenching. I have just returned to the office, so am trying to pick up the threads.

Pictures for the moment I shall not try to order or have sent, as we are not sure they would ever reach their destination. If, as time goes on, we can find a safe way to send them, we will. Meanwhile we have 60 or more slides, and also several rolls of movie film to be sent. The film is black and white, and I hope as soon as we get more normal, the Movie Committee can get together, write the scenario, and put it together into a connected story. This will take time, but we will not forget it if we can get back to a semblance of normal. At present we are just holding our breath from day to day to see if we can survive at all! I wonder if the rolls of colored films ever reached your office, via Miss Veghte and Dr. Elisseeff. If so, they may at least give you a little something to work on. If we ever take any more film, I will suggest 6 duplicates of colored where it seems advisable.

Pictures of the heads of departments I will bear in mind, but there will be so many changes and makeshifts that it may not have the same value as in ordinary times.

As for the booklet about the kindergarten department, I doubt if we will have anykindergarten this year. Mrs. H. B. Price, however, who is on furlough this year might be able to give you much information, as she was actively interested in the kindergarten here for several years. You no doubt will be seeing her in the office.

I am enclosing a list of our faculty who have left for America, or on furlough in America. We are also sending a list of students who finally got off for America. In some cases certain names may be on both lists, graduates who have later joined the faculty. The Chinese Embassy in Washington should also be able to furnish you with a complete list, not only of the new arrivals this year, but also those who are staying on from previous years.

Miss Burtt has not yet returned, having been greatly delayed by travelling conditions, but I will try to enclose a list of Americans who have studied at Yenching; if not now, at a later date. (will pand later.)

I doubt if the Yenching News will function this year - at least there is none such at the moment. Democracy also, I hear, has been suspended, perhaps permanently.

We are in the midst of alarms and terross, with nightly fighting in this immediate vicinity - the Japanese trying to rout out the "irregulars"; and also distant heavy bombing. Students are appearing on the campus, but the registration is not quite final as yet. The weather is simply perfect, but we can no longer enjoy walks outside the campus gates, let alone our usual hill trips!

Dear Fellow Alumnus:

From various reliable sources we are glad to inform you that Yenching University has made very good progress during this school year despite the present conflict in China: and attendance for the following year bids to restore a very busy and active life in our Alma Mater.

The New York Chapter of the Yenching Alumni Association in the U. S. held a meeting on April 16th and watched with pleasure three reels of films of Yenching school life taken during the past few years. The movie reminded us of happy memories which still linger in our minds, of our own college years and we all felt, that as loyal alumni in the U. S. we should do something to further the development of our beloved school. Recently, the New York Office of Yenching University received a request from the Yenching Nursery School appealing for a contribution of US\$30.00 with which they could build a long needed playground for the neighborhood children. To show our appreciation for what Yenching did for us, the alumni of the New York Chapter moved that the alumni in the U. S. make some contribution by bearing the responsibility of that particular sum for the Nursery School's playground in the near future.

An immediate problem arose, "How can we get the money?" As the traditional alumni association fee is \$2.00 per person per annum, the Treasurer of the National Yenching Alumni Association suggested that if every member in the U. S. could send his or her dues to the Treasurer immediately, the required \$30.00 could be withdrawn from the fees collected and sent back to Dr. Stuart to fulfill that purpose. To simplify the problem of sending money, the Treasurer further suggested that every local chapter should elect a temporary treasurer to collect the dues from each local alumnus and send the dues directly on one check before May 31st to the National Treasurer. Thereupon a receipt will be sent to him.

We need your full support and cooperation in this matter which we feel confident is a deserving project. As Dr. and Mrs. Sailer are soon sailing for China and Yenching University this summer, we earnestly hope that all money can be collected by May 31st. Then our association can request the Sailers to carry back this small "gift of loyalty and symbol of faith" to Dr. Stuart for the development of a new playground for the future generation of China.

Dear Mrs. Macmillan:

We are trying to collect for you all the information we have about Yenching graduates who are going to America this summer. Dr. Lin, our Director of Studies, is writing to you about our men students. I would like to tell you what I cam about some of the women. It is quite hard to keep track of all the alumnae who go to America, for often they change their plans after they have communicated with us. However, here is some data on six women who will probably be in America this fall.

Nancy Chou (Chou Nien-tze) has gone to Wellesley on a scholarship for graduate work in English Literature. She is a most vivacious and active girl, a granddaughter of Liang Ch(i-ch'ao. She will make a good ambassadress of China wherever she goes and should be an excellent person to meet student groups in and around Boston.

Dr. Kung Lan-chen (Mrs. Hall P'eng-ch'eng) has gone to Detroit on a research grant from the Children's Fund of Michigan. She will be doing work in children's nutrition. Her husband has gone to Cornell for work in chemistry. Dr. Kung did some of her undergraduate work in Yenching and then went to America for study at Oregon and Columbia. For about six years she has been on our faculty, teaching home economics and chemistry. She is a first-rate scientist but sometimes a little prickly in social relationships.

Mabel Ch'en (Mrs. Wang Jun-ch'uan) has gone with her husband to the University of Minnesota. Unlike Dr. Kung, she uses her married name, but I am not sure whether her husband will be known in America as Wang Jun-ch'uan or as Teddy Wang. Noth of them came from Honolulu to Yenching for undergraduate work. Last year Teddy was an instructor in our Department of Physics. Mabel is a protege of Miss Elizabeth Matthews of Cincinnati, who is on our prospect list.

You will find these three the most useful propagandists for the China Colleges, but since you want to keep in touch with all Yenching students in America, I should give you the names of three more: Liu Ping-sheng, after a year as assistant in our Department of Physical Education, has gone to Louisiana State University. Chi Ya-chao says she is going to Harvard. That sounds to me impossible; perhaps it is Radcliffe. Nan Ying-chen, who has just finished her sophomore year here, has applied to both Oberlin and Willamette.m I think there is more chance of her being accepted by the latter. These three are not shining lights.

Dear Friends:

As one of the students in Yenching University who benefit by the scholarship fund from you, I am greatly obliged to you for your help, and am glad to write you something about myself. Three and a half years ago I was graduated from Bridgman Academy, Peking. And, having been recommended by the school to take the special entrance examination of Yenching, I was matriculated at the University in the summer of the same year, 1937. But then the University fees became a serious problem to me. My father, who is a long-retired government official and has neither deposit nor income now, cannot afford such expenses beside that of the large family which he has to support. To my great relief I was informed to be a recipient of a scholarship \$150 a year. I was, and shall ever be, deeply grateful for the aid of the scholarship by which I can complete my college education.

I em an English major of the Department of Western Languages, and have taken German as my correlated subject. I am interested in literature, and enjoy every kind of literary work, particularly drama and novel. Being a senior now, and having much more academic work besides my B. A. thesis, I can hardly spare my time to participate in many activities. But I am very much interested in the activities of the small groups of the Yenta Christian Fellowship, of which I was a member during the past three years. Also I enjoyed very much teaching the children in Sunday School and the working women in the Craft Factory nearby. But owing to the lack of leisure, I ceased to do both of these since this year.

Now it is time for me to decide the next step after graduating from college. At first I had in mind to take teaching as my future vocation, therefore I have taken many courses in education and practiced teaching in the Yenching Practice School. I have also the wish of going abroad to study if I have a chance. But now, realizing the more urgent demand of workers in many other fields than teaching, I have somewhat changed my mind. Most probably I shall go to the south and so some service for my country there. Yet I am afraid that both my knowledge and experience are so little that I shall be incompetent for any really useful work. On account of the rapidly changing situation, I cannot make a more definite statement about my future than that I will do my best.

Although Dr. Kung is not a Yenching graduate we claim her as one of our distinguished former students. Her excellent work in her freshman year at Yenching resulted in scholarship help for her to go to America for further work in home economics, a subject which Yenching was just beginning to develop. Miss Kung is now one of the best qualified women in China in a field of study which is recognized as of increasing importance all over the world and of extraordinary value for China. She is a tireless research worker and a stimulating teacher. The following statement in her own words gives a picture of the research program which she has been carrying on in Yenching with other members of the Yenching Departments of Home Economics and Chemistry. "Our research program here has aimed at the practical nutritrawal and dietetic problems peculiar to China. We have avoided scientific problems of general interest which may be studied in other countries. We have tried to study the adequacy of the Chinese diet in the light of modern developments of nutrition and find ways of overcoming some of its deficiencies. For instance, the calcium content of an average Chinese diet is apt to be low, especially when growth is taking place. It is possible to increase it by using more begebables and also more whole grain cereals. For the time being, we recommend the use of dried animal bones ground into a fine powder. Protein is another one of our problems. With the terrific rise in prices and the curtailment of animal foods, it is difficult to provide enough protein in the diet of even our students at Yenching, and such a situation is typical of the majority of our people. Soybeans may be used, but we have no ground for believing that they can take the place of animal foods. This problems is economic. We have no solution. The problem we would like to work on but which we have not been able to find ways and means of financing, is the effects of storage, age and method of preparation and other factors upon the vitamin content of foods. A few experiments have been carried out, but they were not too satisfactory, We have not got the proper equipment and assistance to carry out experiments on vitamins." April, 1941 0680





I am in receipt of two letters from Yenching in Chengtu-one by Dr. Y.P. Mei and km one by Mr. Wei Yung-ching dated respectively Sept. 11 and Sept. 23 in connection with the NC\$10,000,000 Kmxm Campaign Yenching is waging in Free China. Enclosed I am sending you xx excerpts of the two letters.

Upon receipt of the letters, I called a meeting last Saturday night of officers of the National Chapter and New York Chapter (Mr. and Mrs. Robert Chiang were elected local Secretary and Treasurer respectively for the 1944-45 term) to discuss the matter. It was decided that a Committee of Ten be formed in New York to take charge of the local campaign, and that committee chairman or chairmen be named for San Francisco, Los Angeles, Ann Arbor, Chicago, Washington, Boston, New Orleans, New Haven, Honolulu, Caleveland and Philadelphia to take charge of the campaign in their respective localities. I also enclose a copys of the letter I have sent out to these chairmen.

Last Saturday night's meeting also discussed plans for the annual Yenching Christmas Party and nominated a slate of officers for the National Chapter for 1944-45.

As soon as we know of the time and place for the Christmas party, I will take the liberty of preparing a circular letter incorporating all the above information for Yenching alumni and faculty in this country and will appreciate your assistance in having the letter mimeographed and mailed for us. I will be happy to shoulder all expense.

A letter has been received from Dr. Y.F. Mei, Acting President of Yenching University, appealing to the Yenching Alumni Association in U.S.A. to raise NC\$500,000 in connection with Yenching's NC\$10,000,000 Campaign, now in full swing in Free China. Estimated at the missionary rate of exchange of 160:1 the quota alloted to Yenching alumni in America will be in the neighborhood of US\$2,000.

At a meeting of officers of the National Chapter and New York Chapter of the Yenching Alumni Association in U.S.A. on November 25, it was decided that the Scholarship Fund, originally sponsored by the Yenching Alumni Association in U.S.A. as outlined in a circular letter signed by me as National Secretary and by Mrs. C.H. Yung as National Treasurer on June 23, 1944, be merged with the NC\$10,000,000 Campaign Fund and that a fresh appeal be sent to all alumni and former faculty members for contributions to help meet the quota.

To date, the National Treasurer has received contributions amounting to \$259.00. This means that at least \$1,700.00 has yet to be raised.

To expedite fund-raising in this country, it was decided that the following be invited by the National Chapter to take charge of the campaign in their respective localities:

It is earnestly hoped that upon receiving this letter, you will proceed immediately to contact alumni and friends and get your campaign organized. For cities where more than one have been invited to head the campaign, please get in touch with each other at your earliest convenience. This applies to San Francisco, Washington and Boston.

A quota for each city has been temporarily set. New York. Washington, Boston and Honolulu are each asked to raise at least \$500; the other cities are asked to raise at least \$100 each.

It is hoped that the campaign can be closed before the end of the year so you will please report the results in your locality to Mrs. C.H. Yung before the deadline.

A circular letter to all alumni and faculty members, including excerpts of letters from Dr. Y.P. Mei and Mr. Wei Yung-ching (now with Yenching) and announcement about the forthcoming annual Yenching Christmas party as well as the slate of national officers for next year, will be sent out shortly through the Yenching Office.

This is the first day of class work for the new academic year, the University's third in Chengtu, and according to the usual practice in Peking the faculty held its Presessional Conference last Saturday. Your cable was read to the gathering. The faculty appreciated the kind greeting sent them by the Alumni Association in America, and would like to reciprocate by sending through you to the whole Alumni group their kindest regards.

The University is going quite well considering the circumstances we work under. Of course there have been difficulties and disappointments. But on the whole I think we may truthfully apply to Yenching in Chengtu the apt phrase that Churchill used in referring to the British Armed Forces, "They accomplished so much with so little." The \$10,000,000 Campaign has been coming very nicely. After 6 months' work and in spite of disturbances in several centers due to recent fighting, we have now in hand over \$8,000,000. It seems so possible and feels so tantalising to reach our gask final goal, that I have decided to spend the next 4 or 6 weeks on Campaign travel again.

Our aim is to be able to announce on the Anniversary Day, Dec. 8, that we have fully reached the goal of our \$10,000,000 Campaign. A similar letter has also been received from Mr. Wei Yung-ch'ing, former National Secretary of the Yenching Alumni Association in USA, and now on the faculty of Yenching in Chengtu.

At a meeting of officers of the National Chapter and New York Chapter of the Yenching Alumni Association in USA on November 25, it was decided, in the light of Dr. Mei's and Mr. Wei's letters, that the Scholarship Fund originally sponsored by the Yenching Alumni Association in USA be merged with the NC\$10,000,000 Campaign Fund—the original Scholarship Fund campaign was announced in a circular letter sent out by the Association on June 23, 1944. 



Hsü Ti-shan (B.A., Yenching, 1920; B.D., Yenching, 1922; M.A., Columbia, 1924; B.Litt., Oxford, 1926)

Mr. Hst is well-known in connection with the new literature movement and has done a considerable amount of writing under a pen name. An additional interest has been comparative religions with special attention to Buddhism. In connection with this study he spent some time in India and learned Sanskrit.

After teaching for some years at Yenching, he went to the University of Hongkong as chairman of the Department of Chinese in that institution. He is a prominent member of literary and academic circles in that city.

Hsiung Fu-hsi (B.A., Yenching, 1923)

Mr. Hsiung is an important figure in the field of modern Chinese drama. After doing advanced study in America he returned to Peking to serve as head of the Drama Department in the National College of Fine Arts where he both wrote and directed modern drama. He later taught at Yenching and then joined the Mass Education Movement in Ting Hsien where he experimented with drama for the farmers and their families. This proved quite successful but was stopped by the present hostilities. He is now in Chungking, writing and directing patriotic plays.

Yen Ching-yüch (M.S., Yenching, 1929; New York School of Social Work, 1930-31; Ph.D., Chicago, 1934)

A specialist in criminology and penology, Mr. Yen served as assistant research fellow of the Academia Sinica and later of the Social Science Research Council at the University of Chicago. He did special research in the field of criminology and culture in the U.S.S.R., later teaching at Yenching for one year.

He is now Assistant Governor of the Municipal Gaol in Shanghai.

Ch'ü Shih-ying (B.A., Yenching, 1921; M.A., Yenching, Ph.D., Harvard)

Mr. Ch'ü's particular interests have been philosophy and education. After teaching experience in several Chinese universities he became connected with the Mass

Education Movement in Ting Hsien, Hopeh, where he helped develop the Mass Education Program. He is now Director of the Institute of Rural Training and Research in Chungking. The Institute, under the National Council for Rural Reconstruction, is partially supported by the Rockefeller Foundation as part of its China program.

Information on some prominent graduates of the Department of Journalism

David Lu: Born in U.S. Graduated from the department of Western language at Yenching in 1929. Served as department assistant in the department of journalism, 1929-30. Went to Missouri in 1930 as the first Yenching exchange fellow and stay there for two years, returing in the summer of 1932 to rejoin the department of journalism, this time as an instructor. Resigned a year later to join The Peiping Chronicle as an assistant news editor, which position he resigned at the beginning of 1934 to join the business department of the China Press in Shanghai. In 1935, he resigned from the China Press to enter the employ of Reuters Ltd., Shanghai as a head of their translation service. Resigned this position at the end of 1936 to join the English Service of the Central News Agency in Shanghai. Before the outbreak of the Sino-Japanese hostilities he was appointed manager of the Central News Agency in Hongkong, which position he held until two months ago when he left for the United States.

Norman Soong: Born in Honolulu. Graduated from the department of journalism in 1934. Spent one year at Missouri. Returned in 1935 to join the Peiping Chronicle as assistant editor of the Weekly Chronicle. Stayed one year on the Chronicle and then went to Shanghai to join the China Press, later going to Naking as assistant correspondent, eventually becoming its chief Nanking correspondent. Was

on board the U.S. gunboat Panay when she was sunk by Japanese bombing. Later went to American as a delegate of the Nanking Rotary Club to convention of the Rotary International. After the convention he lectured in many cities in America on the Panay Incident.

Returned to China about a year ago and is now on the staff of the Central News Agency at Chungking. After the outcreak of the Sinc-Japanese hostilities in Thanghai in 1937 he acted as camera man for the New York Times in Nanking.

T'ang Te-ch'en, a native of Hsinhuei, Kwangtung, graduated in 1931, went to University of Missouri as an exchange fellow; returing from American he worked the Associated Press as its correspondent of Nanking, Later took up the post of head of the English section of the Central News Agency.

Hsiao Ch'ien, a native of Tunghsien, Hopei, graduated in 1905; the editor of the Literary Pages of Ta Kung Pao; author of many stories; now lecturing on Oxford(?).

Hsieh Shan-tsai, a native of Lunghsi Fukien, graduated in 1928; connected with the China Press in Shanghai for some time; and press photographer for an American magazine; now woring in the International Publicity Bureau in Chungking.

Lee, Pao-ch'en, Oberlin College, Oberlin, Ohio

Preparatory work at Truth Hall, Presbyterian Mission, Peiping. Yenching graduate; research student of music. Very able speaker in English. Has had a grant-in-aid, Rockefeller funds, for preparation of thesis on the training of teachers in instrumental and choral music and for research on other musical fields. Grant ends October 1, 1937.

Li, An-che, Department of Sociology, Yenching University

Graduate of Yenching; Student of Anthropology, Rockefeller Scholarship; 1935-36. Travelling Fellow in Cultural Anthropology, University of California, Yale, Southwestern State and Mexico.

Librarian and Orientalist; several years at Harvard-Yenching Institute, Cambridge, Mass.

Hsieh Wan-ying first achieved a national literary reputation when she was still a young girl in middle school and her first poems and sketches were published under the pen name of Ping Hsin or"Icy Heart". Her work had a prominent place in the Chinese Literary Renaissance, that important movement of young writers who urged the use of the Chinese vernacular, or Pai Hua, as a literary medium instead of Wen Li, the old literary language. Miss Hsieh continued to write Chinese sketches when she was in America; where her work for her master's degree was interrupted by a severe illness and a long period of recuperation from tuberculosis. After her marriage to Professor Wu she continued to be a source of inspiration to many of the younger generation through teaching her many contacts with students both in her home and on the Yenching campus. In 1936 she accompanied her husband to Europe for his sabbatical leave, returning to Peking less than a week before the new famous incident of the Marco Polo Bridge. In the summer of 1938 Dr. and Mrs. Wu and their children made the long trip from Peking to Kunming, feeling that, although their many ties with Yenching would never be completely severed, they wanted to throw in their lot with the people of unoccupied China. Dr. Wu joined the Department of Sociology of Yunnan University and continued his sociological studies of some of the border tribes of the Southwest. The Wus lived in the city of Kunming until continued airraids made it seem best to move the children to a small village some distance from the town. In November, 1940, the family moved again to Changking where both Dr. and Mrs. Wu are now working with the National Gevernment. Mrs. Wu's gifts of literary skill, rare personal charm, and capacity for friendship, make her one of Yenching's most distinguished alumnae.

WOMAN AGRICULTURIST DIES

The death of Mrs. Shen Tsung-han, (nee Shen Li-ying), 44, wife of the assistant director of the National Agricultural Research Bureau, is a great loss to the development of scientific agriculture in China.

Mrs. Shen died of cerebral hemorrhage on October 7 in the midst of an experiment in the laboratory of her office at Jung-chang, Szechwan, where she was in charge of the Jung-chang branch of the National Agricultural Research Bureau. The late Mrs. Shen was a graduate of Yenching University and Wellesley College.

Outstanding among her achievements during her connection with the bureau was the development of a new variety of wheat known as Chung Nung (National Agricultural) 28 as the result of a 7-year experiment on more than 1,700 varieties of wheat collected from all parts of the world. The new variety has been widely propagated in the provinces of Szechwan and Kweichow. Its established merits are a higher yield and stronger resistance against diseases.

Following up this success, she was able to develop more improved strains of wheat through hybridization between the Chung Nung 28 and those native varieties of wheat capable of earlier harvests. Such hybrids possess the combined merits of greater yield and resistance to insect pests as well as earlier ripening. The Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry appropriated \$120,000 this autumn for their propagation.

China Builds A Railway Through Her Backyard

SOUTHWESTERN Yunnan land-locked region which was accurately described as China's backyard. Its outward relationships were local and regional, limited to intercourse with western Yunnan and Burma's Northern Shan States. Even then, the amount of trade passing through the region was insignificant in the past. The customs revenue of its principal trading center Tengyueh, about 115 miles eastsoutheast of Burma's northernmost rail terminus at Myitkyna, always ranked last in list of all China's customs offices.

Then came the war. Surveyors, highway engineers and laborers appeared in the region. From Kunming, westward over the high plateau through Tsuyung and Hsiakwan, and winding

around the mountains from there through Paoshan, Lungling and Chefang to Wanting on the China-Burma border, they carved a road. Caravans of motor trucks appeared from Burma carrying strange, heavy cargoes over this new highway. Not long afterward, the same trucks returned carrying equally strange cargo back down the road. Businessmen followed. Now industrial projects stud the countryside of southwestern Yunnan, Tengyueh no longer trails at the end of China's list of customs offices, and the whole area has become alive with trade and communications activity—all because of the highway through the region to Burma, which is now China's most important strategic and trade connection with the outside world.

But the Burma Highway has only begun the economic development of southwestern Yunnan. Full development of all economic resources in the region depend upon the completion of the projected Yunnan-Burma Railway, which is the key to the opening up of the whole of the economically promising region of western Yunnan. The region to be traversed by the railway lies in the innermost part of southwestern China on the vertex of the Indo-China peninsula. It is a region of mountains and valleys, plateaux and basins, averaging from 4,800 to 8,000 feet above sea level in the north, to 1,300 and 4,800 feet above sea level in the south.

Before the highway came into existence, 90 per

cent of the trade between Yunnan and Burma passed through Tengyueh along the caravan routes from Myitkyna and from Bhamo on the Irawaddy River. The remaining 10 per cent went along the Kunlong Ferry route. As soon as the highway was opened for traffic in 1938, trade was divided almost equally between the highway and the Tengyueh caravan routes. By early 1940, the highway was carrying 60 per cent of the total Yunnan-Burma trade, less than 40 per cent was left to the Tengyueh routes, and the Kunlung route was practically deserted, with less than 3 per cent of the total trade traffic moving over this southern path.

The amount of trade along the motor road has been increasing rapidly at the expense of the

caravan routes on both sides. Each is competitive to the other, the shift in traffic volume showing that the whole of western Yunnan is within one unit-region in trade transaction and transportation. This shift of trade traffic from caravan to the motor route is unavoidable because the difference in cost between the two types of transportation is so great that past tradition cannot hold its swing. Caravan transportation is three times as costly as motor transport.

Since railway transportation is much cheaper than motor truck transportation, there is no question that when the Yunnan-Burma Railway is completed, the bulk of trade between Yunnan and Burma will be tapped again to the railway—from both caravan and motor routes. Therefore, as the Bhamo and Myitkyna caravan routes to Tengyueh captured the commerce of the past and the Lashio-Wanting motor road holds the bulk of trade at present, the Yunnan-Burma Railway will monopolize trade traffic between Yunnan and Burma in the future.

Worthy of notice is the fact that southwestern Yunnan's development has been retarded because of its scant population, the area having been depopulated by malaria and massacres during the Panthay rebellions of 1855-73. Working in collaboration with the Yunnan-Burma Railway Administration today is the American Anti-Malaria Medical Mission, which will have as its main task the organization and

training of forces of doctors, entomologists, sanitary engineers and technical men to combat malaria in the area along the projected railway. Once these forces make an area safe for human habitation again, perhaps even before the railway is completed, refugees from other provinces and other colonists will make their appearance.

The construction of both motor and rail transportation lines through southwestern Yunnan are direct results of war expediency, but there is every indication that trade, industry and colonization will continue to develop and grow even after the war. The Tengyueh customs district will certainly not fall back to its previous insignificant position, and the whole region will remain important both in its original economic development and in China's trade relationship with the outside.

Yenching Reopens

On Dec. 7 Yenching University, near Peiping, was the biggest, richest and best-equipped Christian university in China. Then Jap soldiers seized its \$2,500,000 campus, one of the world's loveliest, put its President J. Leighton Stuart in "honorable confinement." Last week, as it has done each autumn since 1920, Yenching began a new semester—in Free China's Chengtu, 2,000 miles from its old campus. The new Yenching, though it had lost its President, had many of the same faculty and students, the same standards of untrammeled scholarship. Educated Chinese were as elated as Frenchmen would have been if the Sorbonne had reopened on the French island of St. Pierre.

With campus and equipment gone, Yenching makes shift in three middle and primary school buildings in Chengtu, limits its enrollment to about 250 (a quarter of its pre-war students). But 3,000 candidates, a record for a missionary college anywhere, anytime, took its entrance examinations.

U.S.-supported Yenching was one of only three universities that survived the Japanese invasion of North China. It flew the U.S. flag and kept its Chinese students right up to Pearl Harbor. When the Japs seized the college, students and faculty lit out for West China. One group of nine, trapped in a village surrounded by Japanese, were rescued by a timely guerrilla raid. Another party, penniless, found a roll of bedding on a train, turned it in to the Y.M.C.A. They were rewarded with \$2,000 by a merchant who had lost it—hidden in the roll was \$7.000.

Yenching's alumni and trustees reopened their university not only to continue its own life but to forestall the opening by the Japanese of a bogus Yenching on the old campus. Though the university lost its campus, it did not lose its \$2,800,000 endowment: that was safely in the hands of its board of trustees in Manhattan. At Chengtu (nickname: "Little Peiping"), where it is a neighbor of West China Union University and three other Christian universities (Ginling, Nanking, Cheeloo), Yenching is likely to remain one of the world's great universities: to its already distinguished faculty it plans to add several eminent foreign scholars

Dear Fellow Alumnia

It has already been about a year since we last wrote to you. There are so many things we want to tell you that, because of the limited space, it is necessary to confine this letter to a few points which we think are particularly significant to our Association.

The Reopening Fund Campaign.

Probably you have already heard about the reopening of our Alma Mater in Chengtu, this September. According to the latest report, a part of the old faculty and students have already arrived from Peiping and entrance examinations with a record number of candidates have been held. There were, as we were told, about 3,000 applicants for admission, but the limited facilities have forced our school authorities to admit only one out of every thirty applicants. Responses to the appeal for funds to help the faculty members and students coming out from Peiping and to cover expenses of preparations for the reopening, were instantaneous. Dr. H. H. Kung was the first donor, giving \$10,000 Chinese for preparation expenses; the Board of Trustees in New York remitted \$10,000 U.S.; the Ta Kung Pao contributed \$100,000 N.C. for reestablishing the Department of Journalism; the Christian universities in Chengtu promised us to share with them their laboratory and library facilities; the local authorities have been making every possible effort to seek accomodations for our fellow students. Now should we, the alumni now residing in the United States, do something to help this newly revived mother-school of ours?

After careful consideration, we, the officers of the National Committee, in cooperation with the New York chapter of the Alumni Association, decided to sponsor a drive to raise from the alumni and their friends a fund of not less than \$5,000 N.C. to be remitted, if possible, to Chengtu before December 25th, the anniversary of our university. In order to avoid unnecessary inconvenience, Dr. Y.P. Mei, now a responsible officer of Yenching, should be allowed to use the money at his discretion. Of course, we are not hoping that a sum of this size will be any appreciable help to the school; it is merely a gesture - a gesture of our love of our Alma Mater.

At the present rate of exchange, \$5.000 N.C. means about U.S. \$275.00. In view of the large number of our alumni in this country, our expected goal can easily be attained if we have - as undoubtedly we shall have - the support of every member of our Association. This campaign is a good chance for you to express your love and admiration for your Alma Mater. We are sure that you will not miss it.

September 23, 1944

....I found life here is very hard for our students. Housing situation is really the worst. Office spaces are more than inadequate. Yet the boys' dormitory, which is a Confucius Temple, is even more crowded. About 200 or more are sleeping in one room of 20 by 30 feet. The food is very inadequate from nutrition point of view. There are about one tenth T. B. students. Each is paying 1,400 dollars per month for board. It would cost a student at least 15,000 dollars a semester, if he or she is lucky enough to get the money and to continue his schooling. How can anybody pay such a sum unless his father is a billionaire! Many students just don't have any money.

The above picture may be depressing. Nevertheless, our students work harder than before, and are more practical. Fellowship groups, academic clubs, wall papers and other student extra-curricular activities are shared and shouldered by most of them. Our University has a better fame among the five here, and our students usually rank top in joint classes among the five universities. This is something cheerful and something valuable about which the professors and officers in our university feel happy.

Now I am writing particularly for one thing. That is to ask for your leader-ship and help for our TEN MILLION ENDOWMENT CAMPAIGN. I know that a share from our alumni in America will be greatly appreciated. Two years ago while I was there we initiated a collection from our alumni there for Yenching's re-opening. Chou Shun-hein, Hsia Yun, Miss Teng Shu-yuan, and I helped that campaign and we cabled back Yenching through C. A. Evans 500 dollars. What a small amount it was. However, it was appreciated by both faculty and students. This year since the beginning of the 10,000,000 dollars Campaign, there has been a great deal of hope put upon our alumni in America. People here count on your help. I am sure a share from America will be a thrilling stimulation to people here. It shows the keen interest, love, and loyal-ty to our Alma Mater....
