To the Faculty:

At the meeting last evening it was voted by the students present to approve the action for a two day strike (Nov. 25-26) as passed by the Peiping Student Union in protest against certain recent arrests in Shanghai. A reply has been sent from this office to the Student Association refusing permission tenave classes discontinued and explaining our reasons. This is also posted as notice on our official bulletin board. You are all expected therefore to conduct classes as usual during tomorrow and the day following and to make due record of students not in attendance.

#### TO THE MEMBERS OF OUR COMMUNITY

This is to urge that all of us during these anxious days cultivate the intellectual virtue not giving credence to unconfirmed reports. At such a time as this, people generally tend to believe news that gratifies unrealistic hopes, and are even more susceptible to accept rumors which feed our fears. At such a time rumors are fife, partly due to deliberate fabrication by interested parties, partly to inaccurate sources of information, or carelessly-formed immreasions which grow as they spread. Let us, as a university group, resolve to accept no items of news that do not carry evidence of being reliably confirmed, and what is more, let us guard against passing on to others anything that comes to us merely by hearsay. Let us be skeptical and critical about current happenings, just as we would be in our academic study and research. Such a discipline will help us not to expect more from others who are responsible for the national welfare than factual conditions would make possible, and at the same time keep us from being too despondent over the only partially understood present situation. This office will undertake to secure reliable information and disseminate this, and will be ready to receive suggestions, or cooperate in every other way, in the effort to strengthen the spirit we have tried to express under more normal conditions.

To the Members of the Faculty now in residence:

The Administrative Committee has determined that the dormitories be opened for students on September 1, and that classes begin on September 13, according to schedule; also that a second examination be given in Peiping on September 6-7.

We shall probably have difficulty in securing the necessary supplies for or in maintaining such services as electricity, water and heat. We shall therefore have occasion later to advocate rigid economy in the use of these utilities. It may not be amiss therefore for those of us who are now here to begin a special effort in the practise of such habits and thus prepare for more general application later.

Cables or letters have been received indicating that Mr. and Mrs. Band, Prof. Sapir (Sociology), Messrs. Barnes (Princeton, Political Science), Lindsay and Taylor (Oxford Modern Greats), Dr. and Mrs. Hubbard (Geology), may be expected. We are awaiting developments regarding a number of our teachers or staff members who are now detained in the South.

"Wilsons and Miss Boring proceeding Poining Via Hongkong September 6".

Presumably Miss Burtt and Mr. & Mrs. Hsu Peng-chieng are with them.

An apparently authentic report that Japanese soldiers had been quartered in the New South Compound of Tsing Hua proves new to be unfounded. It had been proposed but was not put into effect.

To Members of the Faculty and there ......

It is of the utmost importance that all members of our community avoid public discussion of current political issues. Word has reached me of two persons who talked together at length on this subject during a trip to the city in voices easily audible to other passengers with a Japanese sitting directly behind them. We ought all to be aware, however, that spies and informers are not limited to nationals of any one country, and we should be extremely circumspect in remarks made that may be everheard and reported on unfavorably to those in authority. Not to observe this caution may unwittingly do serious harm to the University, or to individuals among us.

In this connection it may not be amiss to call your attention to the censcrahip of letters and to urge that the same care be exercised in making references to the present situation. This applies even to material thrown in waste paper baskets, to our behavior when inspection is required at the gates or elsewhere, and to all such apparently trivial relationships with these new in power.

To the Members of the Faculty and Staff Yenching University

Dear Friends:

Last week, in view of the widespread destitution among the village people near the University, President Stuart appointed a Committee on Relief Work, consisting of the undersigned.

The Committee has held three meetings and discussed the need, the form of organization, and the method of raising funds.

The authorities concerned agreed that for this year the responsibility for the "Community Chest" should rest with the present Committee, but that in view of the unusual need, steps should be taken to secure a larger sum than usual, and by a procedure which would be most convenient for all concerned.

The present committee voted unanimously, and with the approval of the University Administrative Committee, to propose the following plan to all members of the Faculty and staff:-

That all persons be invited to contribute to this year's special Community Chest, to be used chiefly for relief work, as fellows:

- A. Those whose salaries are per month \$150 or more to contribute 10% of one month's salary.
- B. These whose salaries are per month from \$75 to \$149 to contribute 5% of one month's salary.
- C. Those whose salaries are less per month than \$75 are requested to contribute such sums as they themselves designate.

The Committee suggests further that, in so far as the plan above mentioned is approved, the Bursar's office be authorized to deduct the sums specified from the October salary payments.

Kindly fill out and return direct to the Bursar's office the blank below before September 30th. May we have it understood that "silence gives consent", and that persons who do not reply before September 30th consent to the application of the plan. If the funds received by this plan, and from other possible sources, are sufficient for relief work in the community for the whole season, the Committee will not seek further contributions. But, should all available funds be exhausted before the severe needs of the winter season are met, the Committee wishes to reserve the privilege of making further request.

## Facts Concerning the Incident at No. 1 Tien Ho Ch'ang

Tuesday evening at about 8 o'clock Mr. Lu K'an-ju was visited at his house, No. 1 Tien Ho Ch ang, by what seemed to be bandits. Three men entored his premises by his own gate, tied up the hands of the servant who opened the door, and demanded an interview with Mr. Lu, who was forced to give them two hundred dollars and two watches. The incident was reported to the police the next merning and investigations made. Meanwhile the police station in Haitien reported to the University authorities that three robbers had been taken that night about 10 o'clock, and were being detained. Mr. Lu identified the things in their possession as belonging to his household. The robbers were taken to the Ping Tas Men Police Station. Later Mesers. Lu and Shih went to P'ing Tze Men Police Station, where it was discovered that one of the three men arrested was the son of a former amah of Mrs. Learmonth and himself a former employee in one of the departments. He has been a notoriously unprincipled man and a norcotic addict. This incident need not be regarded as an instance of possible danger to our community except in so far as the general disturbed conditions prompted the attempt of a disroputable local group to benefit themselves while giving vent to a personal grievance. Incidentally, the leader was armed with what proved to be a child's toy pistol.
