

Dear Mr. Ament:

We are acknowledging receipt of your letter of September 21st informing us that you have been given a grant of \$1,000 from the Porter Foundation as Visiting Lecturer at Yenching University. Undoubtedly there is a communication enroute from Dr. Porter, but meanwhile we are acknowledging your letter in answering questions as best we can.

Primarily we are sending catalogs and literature under separate cover.

Several steamship lines run freighters to Yokohoma - the O. S. K. Line taking sixteen days, and the K. K. K. Line being Japanese operating companies. We have not been using these lines since the invasion of China, although their use is not prohibited. The Blue Funnel Line has a boat leaving Vancouver and arriving in Kobe January 28, - the price being \$130.00.

The second semester opens the first week in February and the above boat may be a bit late. I take it that you are paying your own travel and are anxious to get the lowest price possible. If you desire us to actually make the reservation for you, we should be glad to do so. It usually happens, however, that sailings of this character must be taken care of immediately as there are many very anxious to travel on this type of boat.

There are no discounts on travel, except our agency discount on either the Dollar Line or the Canadian Pacific Line. All other bookings of necessity would have to be through a regular authorized agency.

We have no definite information regarding the fare from Yokohoma, practically all transhipping at Kobe. The last we knew of those figures, the price was around US\$55.00 by way of Shanghai, the probable cost being around \$70.00 by way of Korea. Of course, you will

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have to have passports secured from the United States Government which must be applied for in person to the nearest custom house, which information you can secure from your local post office. A statement is also necessary covering the routes of travel you are to take, and the purpose for traveling, and it might be helpful if a letter from our office accompanied your application.

We shall be very glad to cooperate with you in any way possible, and trust to have definite word from Dr. Porter at an early date.

Although I have not yet heard direct from President Stuart, I am counting on the arrangements made by Lucius Porter before he left, and am making reservations accordingly.



Ament Department of English Scripps College Claremont, California Dear Mr. Ament: I am very glad to have your letter of October 18th which clears up the item of expense for your trip. Mr. Henry Porter also gave a fund to Yenching University which is now being used for a study grant, and the question was raised as to how we would manipulate any payments which might be authorized against this fund. Apparently we have nothing to do with this situation.

It will be necessary for you to have a Japanese visa if you intend to disembark at Japan, and, of course, absolutely essential for you to have a Chinese visa to visit China. You will have no difficulty whatever in securing these for visiting Yenching, if conditions do not change for the worse in North China. Under the present circumstances, the United States Government is not withholding our faculty from that area.

If you have your passports, it might be advisable to get your visa rather early. In some cases, the Department has refused to allow embarkation without a letter authorizing the holder to visit China under certain limitations.

We shall be very glad to cooperate with you in writing to the Department, if it is necessary.
