UNIVERSITY LECTURE

Dr. Dutcher has made a first-hand study of the problems of internationalism in many parts of the world and speaks with authority on such questions.

VISIT OF PROFESSOR DUTCHER

On Tuesday April 22. an opportunity will be given to all in the University to hear the Professor of History and Government at Wesleyan University, sent to us as a Visiting Professor by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace. He will speak on: "The World Outlook since the World War". This will be the University Lecture for the week, in McBrier 103 as usual, but on Tuesday 4:30 instead of Thursday 4:30.

Dr. Dutcher will give his second open lecture on Thursday the 24th, at 4:30 in McBrier 126. All will be welcome.

The Forum for faculty members and advanced students on "Bases of International Order" will have its first meeting on Wednesday, April 23,4:30 p.m. at the President's House. The participants shall arrange the number and time of subsequent meetings, but it is suggested that there be altogether three or four meetings and the second meeting be held Friday April 25 4:30 at the President's House.

NOTES FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF SCCIOLOGY

Research Library. The department is attempting to establish a research library, the object of which is to affort students of sociology opportunities for research and advanced professional study; and to make this library the best place for the students and faculty members of this department; for the study of practical social problems; and it is also intended to make this library to be of service as a laboratory for students of sociology and social work, who wish to analyze and study methods of ameliorating

social conditions. By 1926 the library had already gathered 200 exes of pamphlets of sociological interest. The growth of the epartment has increased the demand upon the library. At the resent it contains about 200 bound volumes and perhaps 2000 pamphlets. It represents the careful gathering of data relating to the work which the department has undertaken. Recently the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics has sent to us a complete set of their publications, which can be rarely found in other places. China. In the future the library will be well equipped to keep abreast of really valuable material published in its partiular field, especially the materials concerning China. NOTES FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF GEOLOGY AND GEOGRAPHY

Departmental Publications. Two further scientific contributions from the Department of Geclogy and Geography (Nos. 25 and 28) have recently appeared in print, both from the pen of Mr. Barbour. The first entitled the "Structural Evolution of Asia" forms a section of a book edited by Dr. J.W. Gregory of Glasgow and is one of series presented at a Symposium of the British Association by authorities on "The Structure of Asia", under which title the book has recently been published. The second is a paper giving "Further Data regarding Deep Wells in the Peking Area" which was printed in the February issue of the journal of the Association of Chinese and American Engineers. tion of Chinese and American Engineers.

NOTES FROM THE DEPARTMENT ECOPOMICS

Visit of Messrs. Tayler and Ch'en to Shanghai. Mr. J. B. Tayler and Mr. Gideon Ch'en arrived back from Shanghai last week-end. While in Shanghai they took up with the Committee on Christianising Industrial Relations problems of re-organization and the programme of work for the next four years, and the question of the burset for this work. The recommendations which were finally arrived at were approved by the N.C.C.'s administrative committee. In connection with the carrying out of this programme the Council is asking for Mr. Tayler's services for a period of from one to three years.

YENTA NORTHWEST FAMILIE RELIEF DRIVE.

April 4, 1930.

The Yenta Famine Relief Drive has just been completed with the greatest success. The original goal was set between \$1000.00-\$2000.00, but with the kind co-operation of the entire Yenching community and other friends, we have been able to raise \$3120.98. This entire amount was turned over to the China International Famine Relief Commission on Saturday, April 5th by a specially elected Committee composed of Miss Yeh Kung Shao, Messrs. Chang Hung Chun, Charles Parr. Liang Chin Yueh and Chou Ching Fu. Mr. Y. S. Djang, the executive secretary of the China International Famine Relief Commission, promised the Committee to use this entire amount for the immediate relief of the famine sufferers in the central part of Shensi, near Sianfu, which according to Mr. Y. S. Djang, is at present the most urgently needy area in the entire Northwest Famine region.

The Executive Committee of the Yenta Northwest Famine Relief Derve wish to take this opportunity of thanking all the friends who have helped to make this great undertaking a success.

Word from President Stuart. President Stuart, writing from New York on March 14th stated that with regard to financial results in general, there was very little of a definite nature to report. He remarks upon the way Yenching is becoming more widely, and always favorably, known.

On the Princeton-in-Peking project he says; "The Princeton-developments are extremely encouraging in so far as the changed attitude of the principals in Princeton is concerned, and the favorable re-action of the alumni everywhere." He reports that there has been organized at Princeton the Princeton School of Public Affairs, and the suggestion is made that this new organization at Princeton may form a more natural coordinating bond between the Princeton project in Yenching and Princeton Universit.

Regarding his return to Yenching President Stuart reports that the work in hand in America will almost certainly require his presence there at least during the first part of June. He suggests that he may be able to return to Yenching in July. President Stuart also mentions the eagerness with which he is awaiting the arrival of the proposed budget for Yenching for the coming year.

The Burgesses to locate in Pomona College. Mr. Galt has received a letter from Mr. Burgess, dated March 4th, in which he reports as follows: "The decision has just been made that the Burgesses will be going to Claremont, California. I am accepting a job as Associate Professor of Sociology in Pomona College for two years. In view of family health conditions, it seems impossible to return to China, and of three offers the Pomona College job seemed the most satisfactory."

Mr. H.T. Tien writing from the Harvard College Library, Cambridge, on February 28, mentions that he is expecting to see Dr. Stuart in a few days on the latter's return from California to attend the meeting of the Trustees of the Harvard-Yenching Institute. He had a very pleasant visit with Mrs. Porter (Miss Jean Dickinson) in Chicago and together with Mr. Li Chung-hui and Mr. Tsai Liusheng, was invited to her house just before China New Year to celebrate that festal season by making Chinese cakes and sweets. Mr. Tien expects next summer to visit the New York Public Library and the Congressional Library and other important libraries. Of his work at Harvard he writes: "I am not taking any course at Harvard as I am quite fully occupied every day. In the morning I am helping in the Chinese library and working together with. Mr. Chiu, the custodian of the Chinese and Japanese collections in Harvard, to devise a classification system for the Chinese books which should be used in libraries of Yenching and Harvard respectively. In the afternoon I am working in the Widner Library and studying their systems." He has already visited the libraries of Boston and Chicago. He concludes his letter as follows: "Please give my good wishes to all the friends in Yenching through the Weekly Bulletin as there is no time for ne to write to every one of them".

The Harvard Alumni Bulletin of March 13, 1930 announces under Faculty Appointments "Dr. Philip de Vargas, Professor of History in Yenching University, Peking, will be lecturer on Chinese at Harvard during the first half of the coming academic year". Dr. de Vargas is, however, expecting to be at Harvard for the second semester only, and his lectures might be more correctly described as belonging to the department of Chinese History.

PRINCETON-YENCHING SCHOOL OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The following extract from the Princeton Alumni Weekly of March 7, 1930, concerning our third college will be of interest to us:

On February 25 the Trustees of Princeton-in-Peking voted unanimously to change the name of that organization to the Princeton-Yenching Foundation, and voted further to change the name of the work of higher education in Peping, China, which is now the principal activity of this association, to the Princeton-Yenching School of Public Affairs.

International Relations Emphasized

This School in Yenching University includes the departments of political science, economics, and sociology. Its object is to train its students to participate intelligently in the political reconstruction, economic reorganization, and social transformation of the nation. There is in the school a strong emphasis on the international relations of China, as well as the internal problems related to the adaptation of this ancient people to the western culture pattern.

In the January meeting of the Board of Trustees of Princeton University it was voted to suggest to the Trustees of Princeton-in-Peking the following change of name, "The Princeton-Yenching School of Public Affairs." At the same meeting the possibilities of a profitable exchange of faculty and students between the newly amnounced School of Public and International Affairs at Princeton and the Princeton-Yenching School of Public Affairs was indicated.

Dr. R. M. Duncan '25, Ph.D. '28, is to sail in August to take up work for three years as professor of political science in the new Princeton-Yenching School; and within a few days an announcement will be made of the selection of a teaching fellow in economics from the Class of 1930 who will be sent out as the first of a series of one-year fellows. It is also expected that funds for a similar fellowship in politics will be secured within a few weeks.

NOTES FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF JOURNALISM

Exchange Professorship with Missouri University. The action of the Board of Curators of the University of Missouri establishing an exchange professorship with Yenching, noted recently in the Peking press, is simply the formal ratification by the authorative body in that university of arrangements which had been tentatively made in the negotiations by which the School of Journalism of the University of Missouri associated itself with Yenching in the development of education for journalism in China. It is the expectation at present that Mr. Frank L. Martin, Associate Dean of the School of Journalisms at Missouri will spend the academic year 1931-32 in Yenching. It is not yet certain whether he will come as a visiting professor or an exchange with one of the staff of our Department of Journalism. The latter arrangement is desired by the authorities of Missouri ment, will be in operation only on such years as is mutually desirable and possible.

· CHING HO

The Sociology Department is about to make an experiment in community work. In the autumn of 1928 the Department decided to undertake an intensive survey of the market town of Ching Ho, about two miles from the Campus. This survey was completed. last year, and a short report was given at the Formal Opening. The complete report is now in the press, and will be out in a few weeks. Meanwhile the Department has given a great deal of thought to conditions which the report disclosed, and has decided to open a community centre in the town in co-operation with the townspeople. Incidentally this centre will serve as a laborator. for our students for rural work.

We have procured a building which is now being painted and put in order, and are busy working out a plan of campaign. What is this to be? First of all we must have a room large enough for people to come and hear what we are there for, and where we can get specialists to come and talk to them about such things as improved methods of farming, tested seeds, crop and

animal improvement, co-operative marketing, credit societies, health and hygiene, clean food, and many other things. Of course, the people must have chairs to sit on if they are to listen. Like all small towns Ching Ho is very deficient in cultural material, so we must have a reading room where thoses who can read can find out for themselves how to make the most of their job, and read what other people are doing. That means some library equipment. But what about those who can't read? The children are fairly well provided for now, but only half the men are able to read and only 4% of the women. Clearly we shall have to do something about it.

We have a Victrola and some records, and so far that is about all. Here is a list of some of the wants of which we can think at the moment. Can you help us?

Tea tables, chairs, shelves, cupboards, matting, curtains, kitchen utensils, pictures (we have a number of charts and illustrative material but could do with some pictures as well), furniture for the Director's room (he will live there altogether and want a bed, chest, shelves, table, chairs, matting and curtains). Illustrated bocks, and newspapers (Chinese). Play equipment for children, and such things as chess for the grown-ups.

If you think you can help us will you please tell Mr. Chang Hung-chun of the Sociology Department? Thank you!

Baker, Adviser to the Ministry of Communications, who has made a special study in China and elsewhere of the facts lying behind a successful organized system of transportation. Mr. Chang is a graduate of the Imperial University of Tokyo in philosophy, and is well versed in English, German and Japanese. During the second year of the Republic of China he was chief of the secretariat of the Lower House. He was also for about ten years chief editor of the Shanghai Times, and was the predecessor of Mr. Hu Shih as President of Chung Kueh Kung Hsueh in Shanghai, (a Chinese University in Shanghai) and later held a chair of philosophy in the University of Political Science. He comes to us from Kwang Hua University in Shanghai. Mr. Chang has translated the Hua University in Shanghai. Mr. Chang has translated the following works, Social Theory by G.D.H. Cole, Creative Evolution by Henry Bergson, Matter and Memory by Henry Bergson and Plato's Dialogues; and is the author of Science and Philosophy, Philosophy, Philosophy of Life, Analysis of the Spiritual Life, Essays on New Philosophy and An Outline of Ethics. The University is very fortunate in securing the services of such a distinguished and able professor.

UNIVERSITY LECTURE SERIES

In singing its swan-song, the Committee suggests that in future the hour 4:30 p.m: on Thursday be the customary time for the University Lecture. The Committee also feels that there is room for fuller cooperation on the part of other University organizations and groups who wish to invite speakers for extra-curriculum lectures on subjects likely to appeal to wider audiences. Such cooperation benefits the group, the speaker, the University as a whole and the Lecture Committee. Full credit is given to the group cooperating, - the speaker is assured of an audience worthy of his best effort, - the audience (we hope) is able to count on something worth making an effort to attend, despite a busy week's work, - and the work of the Committee is made easier. In addition such a policy reduces the feeling that there are so many outside lectures offered that life is a burden.

Of course, in such cooperation, it has to be kept in mind that for general audiences the topics announced may need to be somewhat less technical than when speaking to strictly specialist groups. It is hardly likely that "The Pre-Cambrian paragneisses of Patagonia", "Penultimate accents in French Prosody" or "Embryonic forms of the Australian lung-fish" will appeal to immense audiences; but the same subjects might be handled under the titles "Earthquakes in South America", "Funny habits of foreign poets", and "Are biologists descended from fishes?" without offence.

These suggestions seem to be the most practical form of blessing which the retiring Committee can bestow on its successor.

Mr. Chang arrived in Shanghai in March and will spend the remainder of this term on visiting the Geography Department of various Universities and in giving a series of lectures at the national Central University in Manking.

We have recently learned of the resignation of Mr. Maxwell Stewart from the Department of Sociology and would express our very deep regrets that Mr. and Mrs. Stewart will be leaving the University this summer. We should all be very glad to have the Chous among the faculty again.

Though somewhat late we offer our most hearty congratulations to Mr. and Mrs. Wee and look forward eagerly to the return of Mrs. Wee and her small son from the P.U.M.C.

Mr. Barbour and Mr. Tayler expect to leave on Friday of this week for Sarachi in company with Mr. Y. S. Djang of the Famine Relief Commission to make investigations along other lines in the district around Paotou. They both expect to be absent about a week.

Mr. Hsu Pao-chien will leave Peping on June 13 and the following details of his movements while abroad may be of interest. After the reorganization of Yenching University in 1929, its undergraduate division was divided into three colleges, the College of Arts and Letters, the College of Natural Sciences and the College of Applied Social Sciences. At this time Dr. C.W. Luh, Dr. S.D. Wilson and Dr. Shuhsi Hsu were elected respectively to the deanships of the three colleges. The term of office according to the outline of organization of the university was for two years.

It was agreed last year that the first term after the reorganiza-.. tion into colleges should terminate July 1930. The chancellor following the procedure in the outline of organization of the rollowing the procedure in the outline of organization of the university called meetings of the faculties of the three colleges on three consecutive days, May 28, 29 and 30 with the following results. The College of Applied Social Sciences meeting on May 28 renominated Dr. Shuhsi Hsu, the present dean, for a second term of office. The College of Natural Sciences meeting on May 29 renominated Dr. S. D. Wilson, the present dean, for a second term of office, and nominated Dr. Alice Boring of the Department of Biology to be the acting dean during Dr. Wilson's absence on furlough during the academic year 1930-1931. lough during the academic year 1930-1931.

The College of Arts and Letters, meeting on May 30, nominates. Mr. William Hung as its dean for the next two years. The present dean, Dr. C. W. Luh, is head of the Department of Psychology. This department is about to be transferred to the College of Natural Sciences in accordance with recent government regulations. This transfer made Dr. Luh ineligible for renomination. The faculty of the College of Arts and Letters gave a hearty expression of appreciation for his service. The Chancellor has duly appointed the three deans.

ATHLETICS

Yenching made a very creditable showing in the Interscholastic Athletic Meet held in Peping a week from last Saturday, when for the second time in succession she won the collegiate champoinship. The meet was held on the sports field of the Fourth Middle School in the West City. Our athletis accredited themselves splendidly, winning nine first places, besides many second, third and fourth, piling up a total 71.5 points. Min Ta came second with 52 points. The first and second places for the Individual championship also went to our boys, Wang Yu-chen, Treshman, who won first places the high hurdles, 200 and 400 metres, and second in the low hurdles, making a total 18 points and Huang Chih-min, Sophomore, was second with 16 points. Verevain tied for the fourth place with 10 points. Both relay races were won by our teams. The honour of the 800 metres relay should be bestowed on Wang Ta-lung through whose brilliant dash, as he was about to be sandwiched between Shih Ta and Min Ta, regained us the leading position, lost by Davies, when he tripped, as he stepped into a starting hole at the 200 metres mark. The only events we did not get any points in were the shot put, pole vault and the distance races, 800, 1500, and 1000 metres, which were our weak point, Meiklejohn threw the discus furtherest of all, 37 metres. It is a pity that we did not know that he could put the shot so well, but after the Pei Ta man had won the first place for that event, Meiklejohn took up the shot and threw it about a metre further. Wang Yu-chen cleared the high hurdles in a very fast time, 16 4/5 secs. Although we were confident of victory, we had a very serious rival in Min Ta, who with their good long distance runners, were sure of getting a number of points. Min Ta however, was disappointed, when their champion, Fan Pao-en, was beaten in the 10000 metres by a Chung Ta runner. Yonching did not participate in the Triangular Sports Meet which was arranged at Tsing Hua and Jefferson Academy. Jefferson Academy carried off the honors.

Faculty Tennis Tournament. Only three events have so far been finished. Mrs. Parr won the Ladies Singles, Mrs. Parr and Mrs. Chou the Ladies Doubles. The Men's Singles have resulted in a draw between K.A. Wee and C.F. Chou. The finals of the Men's Doubles will be played as soon as Mr. C.F. Chou returns from Tientsin, Messrs. Mei and Nash vs. Messrs. Chou and Holm. The Mixed Doubles are progressing somewhat slowly and have not yet reached the semi-finals.
