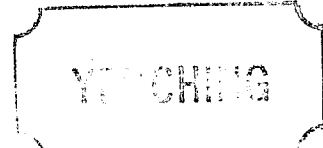

University Lecture Series

The first of the series of University Lectures held on Thursday afternoons at 4.30 p.m. in MacBrier 103 will be delivered next week, September 24th by Mr. CHENG SHE-WO, President of the Peiping "World" and of the "Min Sheng Pao",

He recently returned from a trip round the world, made at the request of the Government to study newspaper work in Europe, Asia and America and will speak on his experiences. Flood Relief

VOTED: Dr. Galt, chairman on the committee for Flood Relief reported the following recommendations of his committee:

- 1) that this committee recommends that Yenching University follow the precedent set by the government in deducting a percentage of the salaries of all civil servants, i.e. 5% to be deducted from all salaries between \$100-200 per month, and 10% from all those between \$200-400;
- 2) that all those members who may desire exemption should, in the case of Chinese members consult Chancellor Wu, and foreign members President Stuart; who after approval will report such cases to the treasurer's office;
- 3) that staff members under mission boards be asked to send in similar contributions to the treasurer;
- 4) to solicit contributions from those whose salaries are below \$100, through a special committee of three members from the clerical staff of the office of Director of Studies, the office of the Treasurer and the office of the Comptroller respectively; the individuals to be appointed by the heads of these offices;
- 5) that the Chancellor, President and Treasurer form a small committee to decide on the most suitable way to transmit the money and the agency through which it should be sent.

It was understood that contributions from the student body would be solicited through the Student Association and that these funds would be included in the general university contribution.

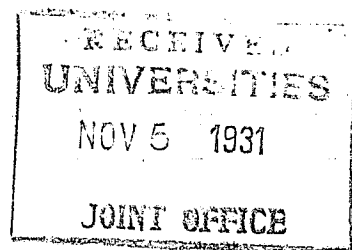

The number of applicants is already greater than can be accommodated, at once, and it has been suggested that parents who are interested might give us the names of their babies ahead of time, for a waiting list, so that as openings occur, and the children reach the right age, they may be admitted. Even with this precaution, it is not certain that all can be taken in; and in such cases, the choice is made, as impartially as possible, according to certain qualifications as to age, etc. We prefer, for instance, that a child be near the lower age limit when he first enters the school, and an attempt is made to keep a fairly balance between the

Chinese and foreign children. We are eager to take all who apply, and very much regret the limitations that make this impossible. A nominal fee of \$3.00 per semester is charged to cover expenses. WINTER QUARTERS FOR PLANTS.

As a convenience to Faculty members, the Landscape Department will be prepared next week to give winter accommodation to a limited number of large palms, oleanders etc. in the new plant house north of the Faculty Tennis Courts. All plant owners wishing to avail themselves of this service should communicate with Dr. C.W.Parr. There are a few simple rules to be complied with, such as labelling each pot with the owners name, only plants free from disease and insect pests to be deposited etc. While all reasonable care will be taken of the plants the Landscape Committee cannot accept responsibility for replacement in case of loss from any cause. Plants can only be accepted as far as space allows. The scale of charges is approximately \$1.00 for large palms etc in tubs or pots, .80, .60, and .50 cents for smaller and this includes transport to and from the nurseries. The depositors will sign an agreement as to the rules and a receipt will be given for the plants accepted.

The Faculty Conference on Teaching next Tuesday evening will consider again general methods of classroom work, and a number of investigations presenting students' points of view will be reported.

NOTICE—FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME

Attention of all Fellowship members is invited to the special programme for Sunday, October 25. At the morning service there will be an impressive ceremony for receiving new members into the Fellowship. All who have signed the membership pledge this year are expected to be present. The importance of the purpose of the meeting makes it unnecessary to urge any member to attend.

AFTERNOON SCHEDULE FOR WINTER SEASON

The Present & the Proposed Schedule: At present the afternoon schedule begins at 1.30 and ends with few exceptions at 4:30 and supper is served in the Student Dining Halls at 6.00. The proposed schedule will begin at 3:30 and end at 6:30 with supper at 6:30. 3:00-6:00, however, is not entirely out of the question and may be regarded as a second choice.

Reasons for Proposal: The chief reason for the proposal is the general health of the University Community, students, faculty, and every one else. The sun sets at around 5:00 p.m. during the winter. Most of us have to spend the warm and sunny part of the afternoon indoors in sedentary work and get out of our offices and laboratories only to watch the dusk gather around us. When it is cold and dark outside, few are the brave that conscientiously take some form of exercise in the open air while the rest of us just keep to our houses and get out of humor. And the last thing that we heard was that 4 out of our 7 premed, students who took the P.U.M.C. exams last summer were discovered to have T.B. and 2 out of the 4 had to be sent to the sanitarium. Incidentally, over 200 men students are enrolled for military training. Altho exercise may be partly provided for those who want it in the gyms, military drill has to be conducted in the open field.

Some Pertinent Considerations: The chief inconvenience of the new schedule will be felt by some of the part-time lecturers and people engaged in microscopic research. Some Biology professors have already indicated their willingness to cooperate for the general good of the University. The bus schedule may be adjusted to suit the part-time lecturers and others affected. Committee Meetings will of course have to be held either early in the afternoon or in the evenings. The Comptroller does not feel the new plan will add much expense to the power house plant, at least the present schedule does not save the plant anything.

Canvassing Opinions: The idea has thus far only been informally brought up at certain committee meetings. It has been felt that there is enough in the proposal to secure opinions from all quarters of the University Community. No formal action will be taken unless there is clear indication that the majority of the community wants the change. The next Council Meeting will be November 2. Send in your reaction in writing either for or against the change to Mr. Y. P. Mei on or before Saturday, October 31.

NOTICE FROM THE OFFICE OF THE DIRECTORS

The University provision for admitting students from North-eastern University as auditors limited the number of such students to the dormitory capacity and only 20 places for men students were available. A few girls have made inquiries and have had to be turned away. On Oct. 28, however, the Director of Studies received the information from the Women's College that the student body is willing to give up the dormitory guest rooms for 8 girls from the Eastern Provinces as part of their sacrifice for the present national crisis and as an expression of their sympathy for

their less fortunate sisters. The information came with the approval of the Women's College authorities. The girls also apologized for reaching this decision at such a late date, not without embarrassment to the University administration.

On the strength of the desire of the University to help the unfortunate students of Northeastern University and as an encouragement to the very fine spirit expressed by such a resolution on the part of our own girl students, the Office of the Director of Studies will gladly consider applications from girls for auditor privileges. Members of the University are asked to help spread this belated news. Otherwise we suggest that you send the collector to her next time he solicits a subscription from you.

POSTAL NOTIFICATION.

Members of the public are again reminded that, as China does not participate in the "small packet" system of the Congress of London, the inclusion of dutiable articles in ordinary or registered letters or sample packets is not admitted.

Such articles are frequently accepted in error by offices in other countries, but, on arrival in China, have to be returned to sender, causing loss of time and of the amount paid for postage.

In order to avoid such inconvenience, and in view of the approach of Christmas, it would be advisable for Peiping residents to notify their friends at home of this rule.

Mr. Frank L. Martin, Associate Dean of the School of Journalism of the University of Missouri who is to be with us while Mr. Vernon Nash is in Missouri, is scheduled to sail with his family about December 20 from San Francisco, arriving at Yenching before February 1st.

Anti-Rabies Inoculation—This should be given to all dogs once in 12 months to prevent them from becoming mad and no endangering the lives of any one near them especially children.

Last year about this time Dr. Tolstikoff inoculated a number of dogs here. He charged \$2.00 each for the vaccine (cost price) and \$1.00 per head for inoculating including his fare to and from Peiping, provided the number of dogs was over 15.

Who ever wishes to have their dog or dogs inoculated should inform the Business Office and pay in the charges as soon as possible in order that arrangements may be made with Dr. Tolstikoff and a suitable time fixed for him to come out to inoculate. Steps will be taken to destroy all dogs which are not inoculated.

New Rates P.U.M.C.—Beginning January 1, 1932, several new regulations will become effective with regard to the admission and

care of patients in this hospital. Our new bulletin of information will not be off the press for several weeks, and in the meantime I am writing to you in order your college physician and the members of the university may be aware of the situation that will exist after that date.

It is found necessary to discontinue the "preferred rates" which it has been customary for us to grant to missionaries and members of the Yenching University staff. It has seemed to us that if these rates were continued we should be required to extend them to a larger number of persons engaged in work of a similar nature, and it would be impossible for the hospital to do this. Also, through the establishing of private, semi private and public ward services the hospital has endeavored to meet the various financial circumstances of patients, as is done by numerous hospitals abroad. A few beds in double rooms on the private ward service, and a limited number of single rooms on the semi-private ward service, with the privileges of the respective service, are provided are provided to afford accommodation at reasonable rates on the service desired. The charges for rooms after January 1, will be as follows:

Private ward service	—single rooms	\$10-\$14 per day
	—bed in double room	\$ 7 per day
Semi-private ward service	—single room	\$ 7 per day
	—bed in double room	\$ 4 per day

A blanket laboratory charge will also be made for patients on the

Private ward service—	\$25
Semi-private ward service—	\$15

In general the charges for professional and other services, such as x-ray examinations and physiotherapy treatments will be lower than those made on the private ward service.

It will still be possible for members of Yenching University to enter the hospital at practically the same rates they have heretofore enjoyed, but on the semi-private service.

I should also like to call your attention to a regulation which will appear in the new issue of the bulletin, and which will effect the foreign members of the Yenching University staff.

"BASIS OF ADMISSION"

"All patients are accepted for treatment in the hospital with the understanding that they will, within reason, be available for teaching purposes. Patients must be willing to co-operate in all examinations, since thorough examination is essential to proper treatment. It is desirable in the interest of the public and of the improvement of medical science that post-mortem examinations be made on all cases ending fatally in order to make more complete the knowledge of the cause of death. It is expected that relatives will co-operate with the hospital in this matter and permission for autopsy will be sought in each instance.

For every foreign patient entering the hospital it is expected that a written undertaking will be given by the nearest relative

to consent to an autopsy in case of fatal termination of the illness. In case the patient has on relatives who are accessible this requirement may be waived at the discretion of the Superintendent."

I mention this that there may be no misunderstandings when persons apply for admission to the hospital.

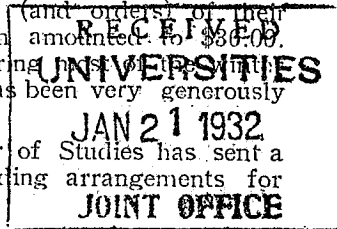
Harvard-Yenching Teaparty

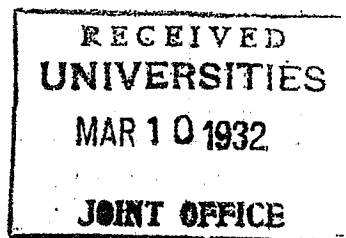

ENGLISH VESPER SERVICE: Dr. Merrill, who will preach at this service is Pastor of the Brick Presbyterian Church of New York.

THE UNIVERSITY CONFERENCE ON TEACHING, at its session Tuesday evening, will consider the topic: "The advantages and disadvantages of the Comprehensive Examination as the goal and the test of the process of Higher Education." Many of the present reforms in higher education involve a new place of fundamental importance for the comprehensive examination. Is this change justified? All members of the University Staff are welcome at the meetings of the Conference.

GUIDEBOOK FOR STUDENTS: The office of the Director of Studies is making preparations for a re-issue of the Guidebook for Students for 1932-1933. This time it is to be brought out in English. All members of the faculty are requested to inform that office of any omissions, inconveniences, or errors that they have discovered in the present issue. Suggestions for improvement are especially welcome.

SCARLET FEVER is an infectious disease, the germs are passed from one person to another by the breath or by things passed from mouth to mouth. After a person has become infected the disease does not show itself until from 2 to 8 days. Then the onset is sudden. Sore throat, red palate, headache, vomiting are commonly present. After 24 hours a red rash begins on face, head and neck gradually passing down the body to the feet and back. The tongue has thick white fur but later becomes red. In severe cases, the throat pain is intense, the fever high from the beginning, and later there may be suppuration of the ears and inflammation of the kidneys causing swelling of face, legs and body. It is important to begin treatment as soon as possible.

PREVENTION:—Inoculation is not now considered advisable by the best authorities. To avoid catching the disease, one must keep away from any scarlet-fever patient. Any one who has to nurse a patient must wear a mask and wash their hands carefully before eating or drinking. They should wear a cotton gown, which should be taken off on leaving the patient's room.

New members of the Executive Committee of the Alumni Association which were chosen include Mr. James Chuan as chairman, Dr. Liu Chih-ming, secretary, Miss Huang Ch'eng-chiu, treasurer, Messrs. Tsao Ching-pan, Chang Hsiung-ta, Tung Ta-wei, Miss Hou Mei-yü, Mrs. Huang Shieh-ju and Mrs. Wu Wen-tsaao.

Since there are no headquarters in Peiping for the Alumni Association, all the graduates felt that it is necessary to buy or to rent a suitable house for this purpose. A committee including Messrs. James Chuan, Liu Chih-ming and Miss Huang Ch'eng-chiu, was elected to plan and begin to work for the erection of a headquarters.

NEWS ITEMS & PERSONAL NOTES

It is interesting to note that the campus has been used this summer for different meetings. We quote from a letter to Dr. Stuart from Mr. Eugene E. Barnett, of the Y M C A in regard to their Conference held here. "The Employed Officers Conference—passed an enthusiastic resolution of thanks to you and to Yenching University for the wonderful hospitality which you extended us during the eight days that we were with you. I want to express again my personal gratitude for your gracious care of the conference and of me personally while with you.—I heard nothing but praise, almost extravagant in nature, of the loveliness of the Yenching campus, and the perfection of the arrangements placed at our disposal. I am sure that the bringing of so large and representative a group of our men together on the campus will be of distinct advantage as we seek to increase the number of secretaries taking advantage of your special courses for social and religious workers."

Y W C A Conference During the month of July the Y W C A held a Secretarial Training Conference, which was conducted by Y W C A leaders and which was attended by about twenty Chinese secretaries. Miss Haass was very appreciative for the YWCA of the hospitality Yenching afforded.

China Sociological Society—The Chinese Sociological Society held its second national convention at Yenching University from September 1 to 4. Four sessions were devoted to the reading of sociological papers and to reports of research projects that are going on at various

institutions. The main theme of the conference was "family"; among the speakers were Dr. L. K. Yao, Dr. Chen Ta, Dr. Young Kun, Dr. T. H. Yun and others. There were two round-table conferences, one devoted to the merits and demerits of the small family system; and the other devoted to members of teaching the first course in sociology. The Executive Committee of the Society consists of nine members with one-third returning every year. Dr. Leonard Hsü was re-elected member of the Executive Committee; Mr. Chang Hung-chun of Yenching and Dr. Chen Ta of Tsing Hua were the new members this year.

The Chinese Association for Tests and Measurements held its First Annual Conference at Yenching from July 17-20, with an attendance of about twenty-five.

We have also received news from some of our members who are now abroad.

Mr. George B. Barbour writes to Dr. Stuart: "I finally decided to accept the Cincinnati position for next winter; teaching for the head of the department who is taking a sabbatical, but will be within call if I get on the rocks. It is a source of pride to all Yenchingians to see the Gazette arrive with the morning's mail along with the New York Times and the Pasadena Star-News.—The mere presence of a casual copy of the Yenching Gazette, is enough to make our guests' opinion of us rise visibly seven or eight hundred per cent."

From Dr. T. Chao: T. S. S. "Sarpidon" en route to Singapore "The voyage so far has been very pleasant and restful. It gives me time to read quite a bit and to sleep as much as I need. I have read five books already. This evening we shall be in Singapore."

Miss Kuan Jui Wu: As for promising young students in America, what could be more enthusiastic than this account from Miss Katharine P. Crane, formerly of Peking, of Miss Kuan Jui-wu, who has a fellowship at the University of Chicago and hopes to complete her master's thesis in September. "I remember very well how very bright Jui-wu was, and what fine character she showed even as a fourteen-year-old. Now she seems to me to be fulfilling all the promise of those early days. She has a beautiful poise and charm, is dignified yet very vivacious. She is majoring in sociology and is especially interested in child welfare. Lately she been spend-

ing much time at the office of the Associated Charities in the stockyards district. She has done special research in Chinatown in connection with her courses.—She seems to me thoroughly Christian in spirit.—All her schooling has been in our Christian schools, and now her one desire seems to be for service."

NOTICE FROM THE OFFICE OF THE DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

Very often a member of the faculty has to take much time and trouble to take up a detail concerning the Office of the Director of Studies. It may therefore be advisable to announce again the organization and scheme of division of labour of that Office, for information of the new members of the faculty and as a reminder to the old. On the whole, you will get better service by approaching the person directly in charge of the matter you have on hand, he will of course refer it to Mr. Mei if he can not deal with it himself, while you may have to waste a lot of time in trying to see Mr. Mei only to find that he has to consult the person in charge after all. Messrs. Ti, Han, Tsao, Liu and Lin all speak English. This remark applies to correspondence too.

The responsibilities of the Office are as follows:

Office of the Director of Studies, Y. P. Mei, in charge.

To carry out all actions pertaining to studies taken by the University Council, the General Faculty Executive Committee, and Dean's Committee, and to be responsible thru the three Bureaus for the different items as follows:

- I. Registration Bureau, H. T. Ti in charge:
 1. To edit the University Calender.
 2. To correlate programs of study and to assign the schedule and classrooms for courses.
 3. To be responsible for registration, election of courses, change of courses, etc.
 4. To record and announce leave of absence granted to faculty and students.
 5. To arrange for semester, mid-semester, and make-up examinations.
 6. To keep and study students, records.
 7. To report students' records and classification to the Deans and the Ministry of Education.

8. To prepare graduation diplomas and other certificates for students.
9. To make transcripts of records for students transferring or entering another institution.
10. To carry out all other responsibilities pertaining to registration.

II. Admission Bureau, Han Ch'ing Lien in charge:

1. To edit and publish entrance information bulletins and application blanks.
2. To visit and investigate the conditions of middle schools, especially the accredited middle schools.
3. To secure representatives for admissions in other cities.
4. To conduct entrance examinations.
5. To examine and keep application documents.
6. To study the records of new students made in their former schools or colleges, at the entrance examinations, and in our University.
7. To publish the entrance examination questions used each year.
8. To carry out all other responsibilities pertaining to admissions.

III. Alumni Bureau, Tsao I in charge:

1. To visit and keep in touch with the alumni.
2. To make preparations for the Alumni Home-coming Day.
3. To place alumni in suitable vocations and positions.
4. To publish the Alumni Directory.
5. To carry out any other responsibility concerning Alumni.

The staff of the Office of the Director of Studies consists of further, a Secretary to the Director of Studies, Mr. C. Liu, a statistician, Mr. Lin Chia T'ung, and a certain number of assistants and clerks.

We are very sorry to lose Mr. Wan who has done such good work in building up the Ching Ho station.

Mr. Chang Che-kuei, who graduated from the Sociology Department in 1930, has returned as assistant in charge of the Research Division in Ching Ho. Since his graduation Mr. Chang has served for two years in the Research Department of the Mass Education Association in Ting Hsien.

A gift of \$1,200 from Dr. Yamei Kim has made it possible to engage Miss Tsui Jen-sheng as a midwife in Ching Ho. Miss Tsui is a graduate of the First Midwifery School in Peiping. Within the first two months twenty-five cases are already receiving advice from the clinic. Dr. Marian Yang is advisor, and takes an active part in the work.

Dr. J. B. Grant and Dr. Li Ting-an of the P. U. M. C. have secured funds to start a country hospital in Ching Ho which will contain ten beds, five of which are to be reserved for maternity cases. A resident doctor will be stationed at Ching Ho. A house of 16 *chien* has been loaned by the local people for a hospital building, and already a sum of \$99.25 has been raised locally for its repair. Plans are on foot for a campaign in the villages.

Two local men and one girl have been sent to Peking to be trained in the Public Health Demonstration Station on fellowships granted by the P.U.M.C.

Through the help of Mr. J. B. Tayler two local men are already receiving training in the North China School of Engineering Practice under Mr. Sam Dean. They will be trained for wool weaving, and on the completion of their training will return to Ching Ho to start wool weaving as a home industry.

College of Public Affairs.

Mr. Hou Shu-tung, of the Department of Economics, sailed from Shanghai on September 4th for Liverpool, England. Mr. Hou is the new holder of the Holt Fellowship at Liverpool University, where he will stay two years studying statistics and theories of money.

Cheng Lin-chuang. A letter has been received from Mr. Cheng who graduated from the Department of Economics in 1931. Mr. Cheng has completed the requirements for M. A. degree at Columbia University, and is now engaged on writing his thesis on Experiments in Economic Planning.

A Solemn Memorial Service will be held on Sunday, September 18th, at 10:30 a.m. in Ninde Hall Chapel. It is expected that all those who love China and share in her present day deep sorrow will show her their sympathy in attending the service. The service will be conducted in Chinese, but an English version of the entire service has been prepared and printed so that all foreign friends of China who attend the service can follow it without difficulty.

Monday Evening Worship Service in Sage Chapel: This year we shall continue the special Monday evening services for meditation and prayer. This service of twenty minutes is open to all in the community.

Mr. K. Y. Ma wishes to announce that he is no longer serving as Acting Comptroller. He has been appointed as Executive Secretary of the Student Welfare Committee, beginning September 1. We are all interested to know that Mr. Ma's family, wife and six children, have come to join him from the south, and are living at A 8 Tung Fu. We welcome them to our campus. Two of the children are studying in Peking, three in the Yenching middle and primary school, and one is still at home.

Mr. Ch'ien Chieh, with his wife and daughter, has arrived at Yen-ching, and is living at 14 Lang Jun Yuan. Mr. Ch'ien has come to assist Mr. K. Y. Ma with the Loans, Scholarship, and Selfhelp Committee and also the Student Welfare Committee. He comes from Chekiang University, Hangchow, Chekiang, where he has taught English for several years, and comes to us with a broad experience for his new work at Yenching.

Friends from Peking. Dr. Stuart is taking advantage of the fine weather to invite a number of American friends in Peking who do not belong to any special group and who have not had the opportunity of becoming acquainted with our campus to come out for tea on Thursday afternoon.

The Faculty German class hopes to get under way at once. The first lesson will be on Thursday evening, Sept. 29 from 7.30 to 9.30 and will continue each Thursday evening at the same time in McBrier

205. The first part of the period will be devoted to reading with grammar exercises, ending with a period of conversational practice, which those not interested will not be obliged to attend. Any who wish may still enter the class. The majority of the members are beginners, or are modest enough to call themselves beginners.

The body of Liu Ch'ing Hua, the student who was accidentally drowned at the Summer Palace last week, is lying for the present in the Kang Ping Temple, pending the further wishes of his parents who are now in China.

Mr. Feng Jih Ch'ang—Friends of Mr. Feng Jih Ch'ang will be grieved to learn of his death on July 12 in Tientsin. He graduated from Yenching in the class of 1926 and took his master's degree in 1928. Later he served as the Chancellor's secretary. Recently he has been teaching Chinese in Nankai University, and was also Chairman of the Department of Chinese in the Girls Middle School. Members of his class are now raising a fund for his unfortunate widow and little children thus carrying out the motto of the University, "Service Through Truth," and the class motto of 1926, "Independence with Mutual Help."

Wang Jen-ch'uan, we are glad to report, is recovering from the severe strain and exposure of last Saturday, and is now spending a few days at the Wiant's home while recuperating.

HARVARD-YENCHING INSTITUTE

Return of our Executive Secretary. We welcome Mr. and Mrs. Porter and Wolcott back to the Institute. During his furlough in the U.S.A., 1931-22, Mr. Porter was visiting lecturer in Chinese philosophy at Harvard University. During the autumn he taught three classes, namely:

A Survey of Chinese Thinking: for graduates and undergraduates.

Mencius on the Mind: for graduate students only.

The Intellectual History of China and Japan since 1600 A.D.: a tutorial course for two Ph.D. candidates.

Mr. Porter spent the spring semester in visiting his supporting churches in New York City, seeing his relatives, and speaking on China. He gave a series of five lectures at Pomona College, Claremont, Cal. on "Some of China's Great Humanists," and a series of four lectures at Beloit College, speaking on Chinese Humanism and on the Sino-Japanese Crisis. Mr. Porter also gave many addresses

in Boston, California, and Wisconsin on the Japanese invasion of Manchuria, and on the Christian enterprise in modern China. During the summer Mr. Porter returned to Cambridge, Mass. to share in a seminar on Far Eastern Studies held under the auspices of the Harvard-Yenching Institute, the Committee on the Promotion of Chinese Studies of the American Council of Learned Societies, the Committee on Japanese Studies of the American Council of Learned Societies, and the Society for the Promotion of Japanese Studies. The Seminar aimed, through its staff of trained scholars having intimate connection with Far Eastern Affairs, to improve the quality of the somewhat inadequate instruction at present available in a limited number of American universities, and to encourage in a modest way the beginning of Far Eastern studies in institutions in which such studies are not now attempted. Forty-three students attended the seminar, for the most part trained and mature scholars, whose major training had been in other fields, but who desired to more fully equip themselves for teaching some aspect of Far Eastern affairs in universities or for service in the Far Eastern Division of some Museum.

H-Y Fellows and Yenching Students at Cambridge—Friends of Mr. and Mrs. Knight Biggerstaff will be interested in knowing that they are located in Cambridge and that Mr. Biggerstaff is successfully carrying on his postgraduate studies. He has already completed the necessary class work for a doctorate and is to take his preliminary examinations within a very short time. Following that he expects to remain at Cambridge until he has completed his doctoral dissertation.

Mr. James R. Ware, who spent a year in Peiping, and was frequently at Yenching University during 1930-31, is now an instructor in the Chinese Department at Harvard. He is giving the courses in the Chinese language usually given by Professor K.T. Mei who is now on sabbatical leave revisiting China. In addition, Mr. Ware is giving an introductory course on the History of Chinese Culture. In June 1932 Mr. Ware completed all requirements for a Ph. D. degree in Chinese. His dissertation entitled "Wei Shou on Buddhism" is a carefully annotated translation of a part of the famous essay on Buddhism and Taoism which appears in the Book of History of the Wei Dynasty of which Wei Shou was the author. Mr. Ware is expecting to continue his work on the Taoist part of the essay in

which the problems of translation are more complicated than those in the section of the essay dealing with Buddhism. Mr. Ware's translation and notes will be shortly published in the T'oung Pao.

The Yen-ching Group at Cambridge. There were many plant reunions at Cambridge during last winter and this summer. In addition to the Biggerstaffs and Porters, Miss Nancy Cochran and Miss Grace Boynton were in the Harvard and Radcliffe yards. Miss Boynton is continuing her second year of study in the English Department and expects to clear off all residential conditions for a doctorate in that department.

Harvard-Yen-ching Scholars 1932-33. At the conclusion of the last academic year eight scholarships were awarded to the following successful candidates, for graduate study at Yen-ching during the present academic year:

- 1) *Mr. Chang Wei-hua*, B.A. Cheeloo University is working under the direction of the History Department on a Commentary on three books of Ming Dynasty which have to do with relations between China and Europe.
- 2) *Mr. Cheng Te-k'un*, M.A., Yen-ching University, is working under the direction of the Chinese Department on a Gazetteer and historical maps for the Shui Ching Chu. Mr. Cheng was granted a continuation of last year's scholarship.
- 3) *Mr. Feng Chia-shen*, B.A. Yen-ching University, is working under the direction of the Department of History on an Index to the Liao Dynasty history, and a complete bibliography of Liao Dynasty literature. Mr. Feng also held a H-Y scholarship last year.
- 4) *Mr. Ku T'ing-lung*, B.A. Ch'ih Chih University, M.A. Yen-ching University, is working under the direction of the Chinese Department on the deciphering of bronze inscriptions as recorded in Sung Dynasty archaeological literature. Mr. Feng, who studied under the Institute last year has not yet returned to the campus. He was taken ill at his home in Soochow during the summer.
- 5) *Mr. Li Ching-hua*, B. A. Chung Shan University, is working under the direction of the Department of Chinese on Literary Societies under the Ming Dynasty.

- 6) *Mr. Lo Hsiang-lin*, B. A. Tsing Hua University, is working under the History Department on A Study of the Hakka Migrations. During last summer Mr. Lo accompanied Dr. Stevenson of the P.U.M.C. to south China in the interests of this investigation. Mr. Lo is also a second year scholar.
- 7) *Mr. Weng Tu-chien*, B.A. Yen-ching University, is working under the History Department on A Study of Mongol History.
- 8) *Mr. Wu Shih-ch'ang*, B.A. Yen-ching University, is working under the Department of Chinese on a critically annotated bibliography of Chinese translations of western literature.

Proposed Visitation Trip of the Director of Studies—The student body in our University has become more and more interprovincial and even to some extent international. The middle schools from which our freshmen come are located, besides the Peiping-Tientsin region, mainly in the lower Yangtze district, Foochow, and Hongkong-Canton. And a considerable number of our Accredited Schools are also to be found in these districts along the coast. Because of the desire on the part of the University to get better acquainted with the schools from which our students come and with the candidates before they are admitted, and because of the expressed desire on the part of certain schools to establish a more intimate relationship with Yenching, the University authorities have decided to ask Dr. Y.P. Mei, the Director of Studies, to take a school visitation trip. He is planning to leave the University on Thursday October 13 stopping a few days each in Tsinan, in and around Shanghai, Foochow, and Hongkong-Canton, and expects to be back in the University around the middle of November. He hopes to be able to cover the following agenda in most of the schools within these districts, and he heartily welcomes any suggestion either concerning dealing with the schools or arrangements for the trip:

1. To visit the school.
2. To interview the school authorities, the principle teachers of the graduating class, and our alumni on the school staff.
3. To study with the school authorities the entrance examination records of their students this last summer.
4. To study with the school authorities the scholastic records of their students in Yenching.

5. To introduce Yen-ching to the student body.
6. To give personal interviews to prospective candidates for Yen-ching entrance among students of the graduating class.
7. To organize an interschool committee to conduct the Accredited School examination for the district.

HARVARD-YENCHING INSTITUTE

An Appeal and an Offer—There is at least one small field in which the progressive regularization and improvement in Yen-ching ways has not had much effect; namely, that of the *romanization of Chinese characters*. It would seem to be fitting in view of the standing and reputation of our University that a dignified and unified procedure in this matter should be adopted by all members of the University, and for every sort of publication that involves the use of both English letters and Chinese characters, whether such publications are official or private and personal. Many members of the University do not seem to realize that there is an established practice in the romanization of Chinese sounds in English, namely the Wade system. Whatever objections may be raised against it—and there are many that can be urged with considerable force—it remains true that this system is the recognized and accepted system used by scientific, sinological scholars and recognized throughout the world. This system is most easily available to members of the University in *Goodrich's Pocket Dictionary* and *Pekinese Syllabary*, or *Williams Syllabic Dictionary* of the Chinese Language in the 1909 edition. In an effort to be of help in securing uniformity for all University publications in this matter of romanization, the Harvard-Yen-ching Institute will be glad to undertake the task of correcting romanization for any individual or organization within the University wishing to take advantage of this offer.

Of course, in the matter of personal names of members of our staff, complete individual liberty should be allowed, since if "a man's home is his castle" his name ought to be something even more private and inviolate. With the exception of personal names for which a special and, from the point of view of the Wade system, irregular romanization has already been adopted, let us strive by cooperative effort to establish for Yen-ching University the official use of the accepted Wade system of romanization in English.

PERSONAL NOTES

From Tom Barker comes the following to Dr. Stuart:— "We just managed to miss you in New York. You had left for the Coast when I called up the office. Our time at home was rather spoiled by illness. At one time it looked very much as if we could not go back to China at all. The doctors however compromised on allowing us to come to Moukden where we are located for a year on a sort of trial. Before the events of last autumn there would have been no question of an extra evangelistic worker in this district, and some people think there is no question still. But we shall know more about it in a few months time. I had hoped very much that we could have some of the third year theological men up to stay with us to let them see something of Church work here, and if any of them want to come we shall be delighted to have them, but nobody from inside the border appears very anxious to come to Manchuria just now. Our furniture is still in Kwangning and we are living in the empty house, but we have hopes of getting it before the end of this month."

John Todd wrote just before sailing for America, some of his impressions of China. "I have certainly had a profitable and enjoyable year in this country. It has broadened my mind immensely and I have learned much just through contact with the students and servants—much more than I have learned through my academic work.

— I leave China in ten days, and I can definitely say that I am not happy at the thought. China has been so kind, so interesting, and so friendly that I surely regret that I can't stay here longer. — China is, in itself, interesting. But what I enjoy most is the higher class of Chinese. I have several close friendships both with boys and girls and the only feeling I have for them is a strong feeling of admiration. Their diligence, earnestness, and their frankness are all to be envied. And the thing that I admire most is the way in which they have adapted themselves to the rapidly changing environment of the last twenty years."

From T'ang Teh-ch'en who is studying Journalism at the University of Missouri: "I arrived safely at Columbia on September 11; school work began in Missouri on September 15. The total enrollment this year is 3101, being ten percent less than last year. — Maybe it is affected by the world-wide depression. The convocation exercise is somewhat like that of Yenching except that Yenta has to perform the Kuomintang rites instead of religious as the case here! —"

I have signed up for 16 credits this term, including 5 for my master's thesis. — The School of Journalism is no doubt well-equipped and excellently managed. Students get plenty of chances to practice. — Columbia is a pretty quiet town, and the cost of living is comparatively low. — I have met President Williams several times. He asked me to have a picture taken with him the very first I morning saw him. It is certainly a high honor to Yenching and myself to receive personal greetings from the President. I have also met Mr. Nash and Mr. Morelock, Acting Associate Dean of the School of Journalism in the absence of Mr. Martin. The Nashes invited me over to their house for lunch the other day. It was nice to have rice and sweet-potatoes again with Mrs. Nash doing the cooking herself. I am getting tired of bread now. Chinese prefer rice, after all!

From Chang Shih-wen, a graduate who has recently been married and is now working at Tingsien — "I am quite interested in the Mass Education work in Tingsien and it is quite hopeful. It is just what we need in China today, and what is more, it is for the world reformation and world peace. I am doing here the social inspection work, studying thoroughly the rural economics such as agriculture, handicraft industry, cost of living, and guilds. I have gained much

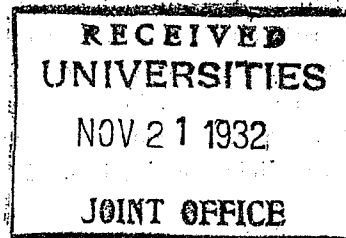
knowledge of the rural life and psychology of the peasants in Ting-hsien during the recent three or four years. If I can study further theoretically, I will be more helpful to the Society."

Chinese Students Entering the States—The President's Office has been interested in the possibility of Chinese students desiring to study in the States travelling by one of the less expensive rates on Pacific steamers, and having no added difficulty or unpleasantness with the immigration officers. Disagreeable experiences in the past have made students feel that the only way to receive decent treatment is to travel first-class. Especially with the present rate of exchange this is a heavy and ought to be a needless addition to the cost of study abroad. One of our graduate students, who recently went to the States, was met by Mr. L. M. Bocker, formerly treasurer in our University, and now in business in Seattle. Mr. Bocker was asked to

confer with the immigration authorities and to assist this student personally in enabling him to enter with the treatment supposed to be given only to first-class passengers. A letter from Mr. Bocker just received reports that he was given every courtesy, and was through with both the immigration and customs officers within fifteen minutes after the boat docked at Seattle.

Mr. Bocker advises that this treatment will be accorded students with the proper papers whatever class they may travel hereafter in entering the port of Seattle. A letter from the American Mail Line gives the same assurance, and reports that other students travelling special and third class this autumn experienced no discrimination. Others who went to America entering by the port of Los Angeles had a similar experience, and there is reason to hope that the same treatment will in the near future be guaranteed at San Francisco.

Anyone who knows of students who are considering going to the States hereafter will now be able to encourage their use of more economical steamship rates without fear of difficulties from this source at the port of entry.

The Yenching Alumni Club House, at 71, Teng Shih Kou, Peiping, will be formally opened next Saturday, October 29th, at 3 P. M. Mr. Wu Lei Ch'uan, Dr. John Leighton Stuart, Chancellor and President of Yenching University respectively, Mr. Chou Ta Wen, the Major of Peiping, and Mr. Pao Yü Lin, the Director of the Public Safety Bureau, will be the speakers.

Besides serving as a dormitory for the alumni, the Club House will have a big reception room, a dining hall, a score of bath rooms, and a library.

Composite Faculty Team Victorious—The opening game in interclass cageball was won by the faculty. The Sophomores who were the strong opponents had youth, strength, and skill, but were not able to cope with the composite and unruly opposing members. Each team had 20 persons. The membership of the faculty team was remarkable. Ph. D., M. A., M. S., B. A., workmen of the power house, and physical education department and a theologian, made up the team. What an array!

The game was played in two halves of 20 minutes each. But an extra period of 10 minutes was necessary before a score was made. Wu Ti, Field Marshal of the department of physical education, Gee

Gee, an Aide to William Woo of the Power House, Sailer, Price, and Tex were the shining stars of the game. They particularly showed their starlike qualities during the extra period when it was dark. Tex when nearing the opponents' goal picked the ball 7 feet and 9 inches in conference and looking like Atlas chucked the globe to Price who made a quick snappy end run to the goal and pitched it over for a score and victory. What fun! 50 minutes and the score was only 1-0.

The Sophomores insisted that victory would have been theirs had their classmates from the Women's College been present to spur them on.

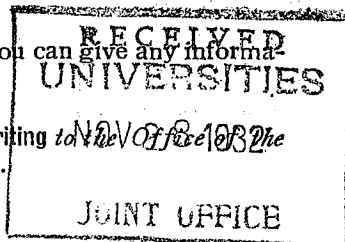

The Formal Opening Ceremony of the Yenching Alumni House took place on Oct. 29th at 2:30 P.M. The house is located on Teng Shih K'ou very near the Church of American Board. About two hundred guests and friends were present including the representatives of the local Public Safety Bureau and Yenching University, alumni and faculty, some of whom made speeches. More than one hundred gifts have been received from different sources.

After the Kuomintang ceremony, three bows to the National flag and late Dr. Sun Yet-sen, reading his will, and three minutes silence, Mr. Chuan Shao-wen, graduate of Yenching, Chairman of the Alumni Association, as well as the former Comptroller, opened the ceremony with a short address about the preparation for establishing the new house. He emphasized the point that all alumni of the University should be connected with each other by using the new house as a centre of mutual intercourse.

Following Mr. Chuan's speech, Mr. Jao Feng Huang of the Public Safety Bureau, gave a short but splendid speech in appreciation of the prosperity of the University which she has gained in only about ten years. He expressed the hope that she will be even more prosperous and flourishing in the future.

Dr. Stuart, President of Yenching University, next addressed the gathering. He said that in seeing the new house which the Alumni Association has established is somewhat like a mother seeing her boy organize a good family. "As our graduates have done so much good to the reputation of their Alma Mater as well as social service work to society we are spiritually given more strength in working for Her prosperity."

In addition to these speeches, Mr. Yang I Hsiang of the Yenching Student Body, added one in greeting to the birth of the Alumni House. A picture was taken after his speech. After that a business meeting of the members of the Alumni Association was held in which two resolutions were carried and the regulations of the new house passed. The ceremony was then over. According to the newly passed resolutions every member of the Association shall contribute from three to ten dollars per year for the new house and the five officers who will be in charge of the new house will be elected from the General Executive Committee of the Alumni Association.

Special Exhibitions—under the auspices of the Association of Peiping Institutions of Learning, special exhibitions will be held from November 6 to 13 in the following 8 places:

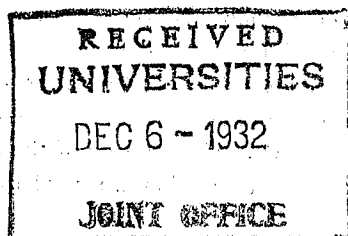

Faculty Discussion on Higher Education. As announced in last week's Bulletin, the subject for consideration is to be: "Formal Discipline, or, the Transfer of Training", and the leader will be Professor C. W. Luh, chairman of the Department of Psychology.

Perhaps some members of the Faculty are not aware of the significance of this topic in education at all levels. In nearly all discussions of academic problems, whether by informal groups, or by committees, or in the University Council, opinions are expressed which, often unconsciously, reveal attitudes toward this fundamental problem.

And furthermore, perhaps some members of the Faculty are not familiar with the long series of careful experiments conducted by psychologists and educators, and with the findings which the investigators have reported.

The whole subject will be systematically presented by Dr. Luh on Tuesday evening, and all members of the staff are invited to be present.

He expects to reach Shanghai about the first of January.

On his return trip to the University, he will visit Alumni at Hsiuchow, T'ainan, and Tsintao, expecting to reach Yenching about the middle of February.

I feel perfectly at home here. In fact I am not homesick at all, which is rather an unusual thing in the case of a man like myself! I must say that I enjoy everything and work with a great deal of pleasure. - - -

"However, I have begun to work hard. I worked nearly ten hours a day for the last few days. This is not because I have to, but because I have been allured to do so by the fascinating character of my task. I am asked to write out my lectures. So I cannot but be busy all the time. - - -

"I do not for the foregoing reasons forget Yenching. When my lecture tours begin, I shall have opportunities to discuss matters with people interested in our work. Please remember me to my friends in Yenching."

News From Hsieh Wei Chieh—After a safe and easy arrival in Seattle, where he was met by Mr. Bocker, he left for Chicago, and saw the Yenching students at the University, among others Mr. Wei Pai-shau, Miss Kwan, and Miss Chou. He writes: "Miss Kwan was newly elected the chairman of the Yenching Club. So we took our lunch together and I had a very good time with them.

"I am now starting work and studying in the Department of Chemical Engineering of the Ohio State University. I was appointed by our Chairman of the Department as an Assistant in the Chemical Engineering Machinery Laboratory. It is very interesting to me, for there are many machines which I have never seen in China, and important to Chemical Industries. I will try to work and study hard here in the Department."

University Lecture. The Education Club of Yenching University is cooperating with the University Lecture Committee in inviting Dr. Li Chieh-hsun to give a public lecture on Thursday, Dec. 8, in McBrier 103, 4:00 p.m. Dr. Li has had long experience in educational circles and comes to us well prepared to discuss the future of Chinese education. The lecture will be given in Chinese.

The List of Publications from the College of Natural Sciences during the year July 1, 1931 to June 30, 1932, is indeed a splendid one, and the University may well be proud of such a fine record of achievement. Those interested may secure copies at the Dean's Office.

Office Space Re-assignment. The Faculty Executive Committee is considering certain minor re-assignment of office, reading room and class room space for some departments. It was felt that there might yet be other needs just as urgent, which have not been brought up because of a cooperative restraint on the part of the people concerned. Mr. Y. P. Mei would appreciate having all similar requests sent to his Office through the Chairmen of Departments on or before Saturday December 10th, so that the University might be enabled to deal with this matter in an impartial and comprehensive way. This is to be regarded certainly not as an invitation for general departmental expansion, and in fact the result of the study might mean retreat for some departments.

Sage Chapel. During the months of December and January, Sage Chapel will be open every day from 7:00 a.m. - 8:45 a.m., 12:00 m. - 1:00 p.m., and 6:30 p.m. - 7:30 p.m. for private meditation and prayer. The Monday evening service of corporate worship will be discontinued, but meetings for special groups may be arranged.

Chinese Students Entering the States—The President's Office has more evidence all the time that Chinese students entering the United States will have less difficulty in the future. This Office has recently received a letter from the Dollar Steamship Line explaining why some of the Chinese passengers seemed to have difficulty in the past few months.

"About the time the SS President Hoover arrived here (San Francisco) there had been a cholera epidemic in Hongkong and all vessels arriving at this port were strictly examined. Our Chinese friends, need not think because they travelled other than first class that there was any discrimination against them. Our own Canton agent, arriving on that vessel, as a first class passenger, was detained and we could do little to help him. This gentleman was held up for 24 hours. Hongkong passengers of all classes, and many travelling first, special and third class from Shanghai, suffered delay.

"Our Shanghai Office cabled us in July to do all we possibly could to help this party of students and to secure shore leave for them at San Francisco. We took this up with the Immigration Authorities, who informed us that subject to necessary Federal rulings the most benevolent consideration should be given. One Immigration Officer made it his entire duty to rush the examinations through, but the medical examinations could not be avoided.

"It is unlikely such a situation will again arise for some time, but severe quarantine had been established against China during this cholera epidemic, hence the formalities."

Community Chest Results. The treasurer of the Community Chest Committee announces that a total, to date, of \$1935.80 has been given or pledged, with the possibility that there will still be a little more. Although \$2,000 was the sum aimed for, we shall be able to add to the amount pledged sufficient from last year's surplus to make up the \$2,000 needed, reducing the contingency fund by that much. An exact statement of receipts will be published after it is reasonably certain that all prospective donors have been heard from.

The Chest Committee feels that, in view of the continued financial stringency, the Faculty and Staff have risen to the occasion and again been very generous. Practically all members have con-

tributed. If any were not reached by the callers, cash or pledge may be sent directly to the treasurer, Mr. Ritter, if desired.

In addition to the money for the Chest, the collectors this year also received contributions, as follows: for the Haitien Christian Church \$85; for the Ch'ing He Hospital (over and above its share of the Chest) \$104; for the Ch'eng Fu Nursery School, \$31.

It will be a great convenience to the treasurer if pledges are paid promptly, without reminders being sent. It will be impossible for the treasurer to send out a servant to collect, as several have suggested.

Ching Ho. The Hospital is practically finished. The looms and the spinning wheels are even now being moved in. A month ago nothing could be seen; now we can show you both the hospital and the wool weaving. Unfortunately, many of our friends were not able to go the last time, and so we are arranging for a further party on Saturday next, December 10th. The best way to get to Ching Ho is by rickshaw or bicycle, taking about one hour. A group will leave the Campus East Gate at 1.30 on Saturday afternoon. If you wish to join us, and would like us to make arrangements for your rickshaw, or if you wish to be shown the way, please notify Mr. Chang Hung-chün or Miss Dora Bent. Everyone who is at all interested in this work is invited.

Faculty Athletic Prowess Still Strong Beats Hoomalimali! "We have the records of athletic winners at Olympia for more than one thousand years, and these records tell an instructive story. They show that when any part of the Greek world was doing something to advance intellectually, it was winning at Olympia; but when it stood stagnant or declined in the world of the mind, it won no more victories at the games." etc. (Williams, J. F., Athletics in Education, Page 316).

This mind and physical relationship seems to apply to the Yen-ching faculty. In the old days at Kuei Chia Ch'ang the chief task was to build a new Yen-ching with a better location, better buildings, and better staff. That big task was accomplished. But when it was being done, the faculty athletic teams were winning on all fronts. Then, the faculty could win championships in basketball, tennis, baseball, and ice hockey.

The present faculty athletic members are showing strength. In the open tennis tournament of last fall in which student champions

entered, the finals witnessed two faculty members competing for the top honors. In the Cageball Interclass games the faculty team was the only one that could score against student teams. And now the faculty basketball team stands undefeated in the open tournament which is now in progress.

Last Monday night, unexpectedly the Hoomalimali after a most severe struggle on both sides had to give in to the faculty by the score of 36-26. The game was close throughout every quarter. The Hoomalimali team, all Hawaiian members, used every hula hula stunt and means to overcome the faculty, but to no avail. Their opponents shot from all over the floor and piled up the score to victory. The heroes were Lee, Yang, Wang, Pan, White, and Wee.

Yen-ching again is undertaking huge tasks even at a time of financial depression and political difficulties. She must raise endowments, improve facilities, and maintain her leadership in the world of scholarship. Can she do it? Just keep in mind her athletic teams are winning!

Born— We wish to welcome the following two members to the Yen-ching Community: a son, born to Mr. & Mrs. Chang Yin-t'ang, and a daughter to Mr. & Mrs. Koo Chih-an, both on December 1.

From Shu'ung Hou, Liverpool—"After thirty-eight days' voyage, I am now able to report to you that I have arrived at Liverpool safely. I deeply regret that I missed Mrs. Tayler in Liverpool Street Station. As the ship was almost one week late, and the day we arrived at London chilly and rainy, I did not expect that she would come out to look for me. But she was waiting in the Liverpool Street Station, and consequently disappointed.

"Upon my arrival at Liverpool, I found everything ready for us, because of the arrangements made previously by Prof. Roxby. I enjoyed very much the friendly air with which I have been received here.

"About eight months ago, a group of prominent Englishmen in Liverpool, including Prof. Roxby and Mr. Holt, the donor of the scholarship, established in this city a China Society with the furtherance of Anglo-Chinese friendship as its aim. To the Executive Committee of the said Society I have just been elected to represent the Chinese. Dr. T. C. Chao of Yenching and Dr. T. C. Kuo, the Chinese Minister in London, have been invited by us to give speeches here before long. We are also now considering inviting Dr. Shuhsi Hsu. But the possibility of his coming to England is a question."

News from the Parrs from New Zealand—Dr. and Mrs. Parr and the two boys had a safe, though hot, journey to Wellington (N.Z.), after delightful trips and visits in Japan and Hongkong. Dr. Parr writes to Dr. Stuart: "We arrived in Wellington on August 23 and found that part of New Zealand very windy and very cold, as it was just the end of winter. We all had to get into our warmest clothes, as, being very 'English', New Zealand houses and hotels are not equipped with central heating! - - -

"I succeeded in hiring a particularly good Ford car in Wellington. - - We very soon decided to leave Wellington and come up North after warmer weather. I am looking for a suitable district where we may be able to make a home after our visit to our relations, as we are very satisfied that the boys can probably get a

very good education here, and it is likely that we shall return to New Zealand soon. - - -

"We are anxiously looking out for letters from Yenching, with all the news of the new term. Mrs. Parr and the Boys (if they were here) join me in very kindest remembrances to you and to all our good Yenching friends."

Judge M. Y. K. Kuo. The following extracts from the *North-China Daily News*, regarding the inauguration of Judge Kuo as District Court President of the Shanghai Special District Court: "More than one hundred Chinese officials gathered in the First Special District Court at three o'clock yesterday afternoon (December 5th) on the occasion of the swearing-in of Mr. Kuo Yuan-kuan, appointed last month to succeed Mr. Chau Shien-chok as the president of the Court. The usual Kuomintang ceremony having been observed, including three bows before the portrait of Dr. Sun Yat-sen and the singing of the Party song, the new president raised his right hand and swore that he would devote his energy to the performance of his duties and would see that every cent of the court's funds would be spent for the improvement of the court administration. This was followed by a speech of admonition by Chief Judge Yoh Hua. The question of the abolition of extraterritoriality was touched upon in a speech delivered by Dr. C. T. Wang After the new president had replied in suitable terms, during which he said he would try his best to live up to the public's expectations, the ceremony was brought to a conclusion."
