The Christmas Pantomime makes its final bow to the Public. The sum of \$65.00 was realized from the sale of tickets and private donations, \$15.00 of which has been sent to Miss Ch'en I to cover the deficit on the Chengfu Nursery School, and the remainder to Mr. Chang Hun-chung for the children's bed in the Ching Ho hospital. It is the hope of the producer that this bed might be permanently supported by the children of Yenching University. Perhaps there are some children who would be willing to form a small group to take an interest in the bed, and to see that each Christmas enough money is raised through a performance, with, by or for children, to carry the bed each year. No doubt

"Uncle Bi" and Miss Grace Boynton, both of whom have always displayed a distinct weakness for children's plays, would be willing to help. Any children interested might send their names to "Uncle Bi" or Hilda Hague. The producer would also plead not guilty for the outrage perpetrated on the Yenching parents and their offspring in the Admiral's Song. The Admiral himself has been seen more than once to raise his hands and solemnly pronounce, "I didn't do it". The song unquestionably started out (as the verse and chorus on the Mead children will attest) to give high moral uplift to the show, but no one seems willing to take the responsibility for what happened to it afterwards. The fact that the artist from Peiping who drew the cartoons took the afternoon train to Nanking on the day she finished the drawings, seems to indicate that *she* might have had a guilty conscience.

Radio from Dr. Y. M. Hsieh—"Met Dr. Paul Anderson at Cal. Tech and had a nice talk with him. He sends his best wishes to all his friends in Yenching University thru the faculty bulletin. Hsieh".

Miss Myfanwy Wood. A letter of Christmas greetings has been received from Myfanwy and Gwladys Wood. Since the beginning of October Miss Wood has been doing full work on deputation for the L. M. S. in various places in England and Wales, visiting colleges for the British Student Christian Movement, and speaking at a large meeting in Bristol for the China Christian Universities Committee. She says that everyone is keen to hear about China, and people are much better informed than on her previous furloughs. The whole general tone is, "How can we best show our sympathy with China? How can we best help her to do her enormous tasks?"

"Mention of Dr. Chao reminds me to tell you how tremendously happy he is. Oxford is just right for him . . . He and I spent the day of October 28th at various functions connected with the consecration of R. O. Hall as the new Bishop of Hongkong. It took place at St. Paul's Cathedral and lasted three hours, and was an extraordinary mixture of simplicity and grandeur. To Dr. Chao and me it was a thrilling experience. And Dr. Chao spoke in the afternoon at a meeting in one of the ancient halls of London, one that escaped the Fire of London; and I was very proud of China's representative. You know just how *well* he spoke".

From T. C. T'ang, University of Missouri: "Just back from Sam Groff's home in Grayville, Illinois. Spent my Thanksgiving holidays with Sam and his parents. And doubtless we were over-joyed to see each other again. I had a big time in Grayville. Sam introduced me to scores of his town-folks. My visit created quite a sensation. It was not until then that most of them noticed a Chinese has black hair!

"After having missed Chinese food for more than four months, Sam was crazy to have some Peking dishes. -- I managed to cook a few Chinese dishes and we had a real Chinese meal, which we ate with chopsticks and bowls. His parents were certainly startled.

"I gave a talk on "Christian Activities in China" at the Presbyterian Church in Grayville Sunday morning. The audience showed tremendous interest.

"Mr. Vernon Nash took me to visit his parents and brother in Holt, Missouri. Mr. Nash spends most of his time giving speeches on China besides doing regular teaching in the University. Mrs. Nash also talks quite often at churches and Y. W. C. A's, her subjects being mostly on modern Chinese womanhood.

"I am busy working on my thesis besides regular class work. Mr. Nash is my adviser."

In the report of an address of mine to the students at Yenching University, appearing in your issue of January 13, I am quoted as regretting that a misunderstanding had arisen between the foreign members of the faculty and the students. As far as I can observe, there has not been the slightest difference of opinion between the foreign and Chinese faculty members in relation to the conduct of our student body or the policy both the students and the University itself should take in the present national crisis.

Council Meeting Postponed—On account of examinations the regular Council meeting scheduled for Monday, February 6 will be postponed one week to Monday, February 13, at the usual time.

Faculty Devotional Group—The group will meet as usual for a devotional meeting on Tuesday evening, February 7. We cordially invite all those interested to meet with us on this first occasion in the new semester.

University Lecture. The University is very fortunate indeed in having secured Professor Paul Pelliot, one of the foremost European sinologists, now on a visit to Peiping, for a lecture on Friday, February 10. Professor Pelliot will speak on the influence of Western art in China. The lecture will be in English and will be illustrated with lantern slides. The time and place will be announced later.

University Assemblies—It is hoped that Faculty members and their families will plan to attend these Assemblies. The first one will be held on Wednesday, February 15, at 11 a. m. in Bashford Auditorium, and will be held every week at the same time and place.

Letter Concerning the Present Situation—Printed copies of Dr. Stuart's letter are now ready, and may be had by those desiring them by calling at the President's Office.

University Cemetery. The Property and Finance Committee desires to report to the Yenching community for informal consideration a proposal for the moving of the University Cemetery. The present cemetery is located in the fields eastward of the Yen Nung Yuan and is rather inaccessible. The Committee has recently considered certain proposals for improving the appearance of the Cemetery and in this connection there has arisen the proposal to remove the Cemetery to a different site. The suggestion which seems to meet with favor is to locate the Cemetery in the extreme North West corner of the Wei Hsiu Yuan. It seems to the Committee extremely improbable that the North West corner of the Wei Hsiu Yuan will be required for building purposes at any time which can now be foreseen. The convenience and pleasant surroundings of this plot are evident and further landscaping improvements can easily be effected.

In matters of this kind the committee feels that the general opinion of the University Community may well be consulted. Accordingly, the proposed change is announced in this way and the Committee will welcome any expression for or against the proposal. If no cogent reasons against the proposal are brought forward it is probable that during the coming season the removal may be effected.

Any representations regarding the matter may be reported to Miss Cookingham, Secretary of the Committee or to Mr. Galt, Chairman.

University Service. Attention is called to the fact that a Chinese Chaplain's Committee representing both students and faculty has been formed recently to make plans for the Sunday Morning Services of the Spring Semester. In view of the critical situation at present the Committee feel that there is a need for the deepening and enrichment of spiritual life. While there are other activities of the Fellowship working toward the same end, the worship services on Sundays do provide an opportunity for spiritual renewal and fellowship. The Committee will therefore make an effort to invite as many prominent speakers as possible this term either from the city or from the University. Music will be conducted for experiment in different forms, such as quartette, choir, vocal and instrumental solo.

Special occasions of the Spring season will be observed according to the Church calendar prepared by the National Christian Council. The Committee will be glad to receive any suggestions and will try to serve the needs of those who are interested in the services of worship. The members of this Committee are Miss Chang Wei-chi, Messrs. Chen Jen-lich, Wang Chun-hsien, K. Y. Ma, Bliss Wiant and Andrew Cheng.

Opening of the Library on Sundays. In accordance with the action of the General Faculty Executive Committee of December 31, 1932, and that the Library Committee of January 12, 1933, the Library will be open on Sundays from 2-7 p.m. without stack service, and 7-10 p.m. with stack service.

Art Gallery News—An exhibition of drawings and etchings on Peking life is promised some time in February by Thomas Handforth, American Artist, Guggenheim Fellow, now residing in Peking. There will also be a talk by Mr. Handforth on "The Etcher's Art", illustrated by a moving picture. The film is a duplicate print from the Boston Museum of Fine Arts given to Mr. T'eng by the Harvard Film Foundation two years ago. Time and place will be announced later.

The College of Public Affairs has just published an Accumulated List of the Publications of the departments, and of individual members; copies of which may be had from the Dean's Office. There are also available a limited number of copies of a Report on the Research work of the College.

University Positions In Hunan. Hunan Provincial University wishes to secure two teachers for the coming semester or the coming year, one for Political Science (teaching political theories, municipal government, and administrative law) and one for Education (teaching introduction, history of education, and educational administration). Teaching load is from 12 to 14 a week. Salary begins with \$260 per month for 12 months a year. Returned students with teaching experience in China are preferred. Yen-ching faculty members who happen to know among their friends someone interested in these positions, will kindly communicate with Prof. Leonard Hsü of the Department of Sociology.

Miss Myfanwy Wood. In a letter from England a friend writes: "her address at Church on the Sunday was delightful. The clear way in she explained the Old and New China made us all feel the wonderful way things are working out there in quite a different light from any other speaker on the subject I have heard".

Dr. Shuhsi Hsü is due to reach Shanghai on February 4th. After reporting to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, he will return to Yen-ching to resume his teaching work.

Judge Kuo's application for leave of absence for one more semester has been granted by the F. E. C., in order that he may continue the work of reorganising the Mixed Court in Shanghai, a work which he has so admirably started.

Prof. T. S. Wei of the Economics Department has been called by Mr. Sun Fo, President of the Legislative Yuan, to assist him in Financial Legislation in the Ministry. Mr. Wei has tendered his resignation to the University and it has been accepted. His courses will be taken over by Mr. Che Ching-po, as part-time lecturer.

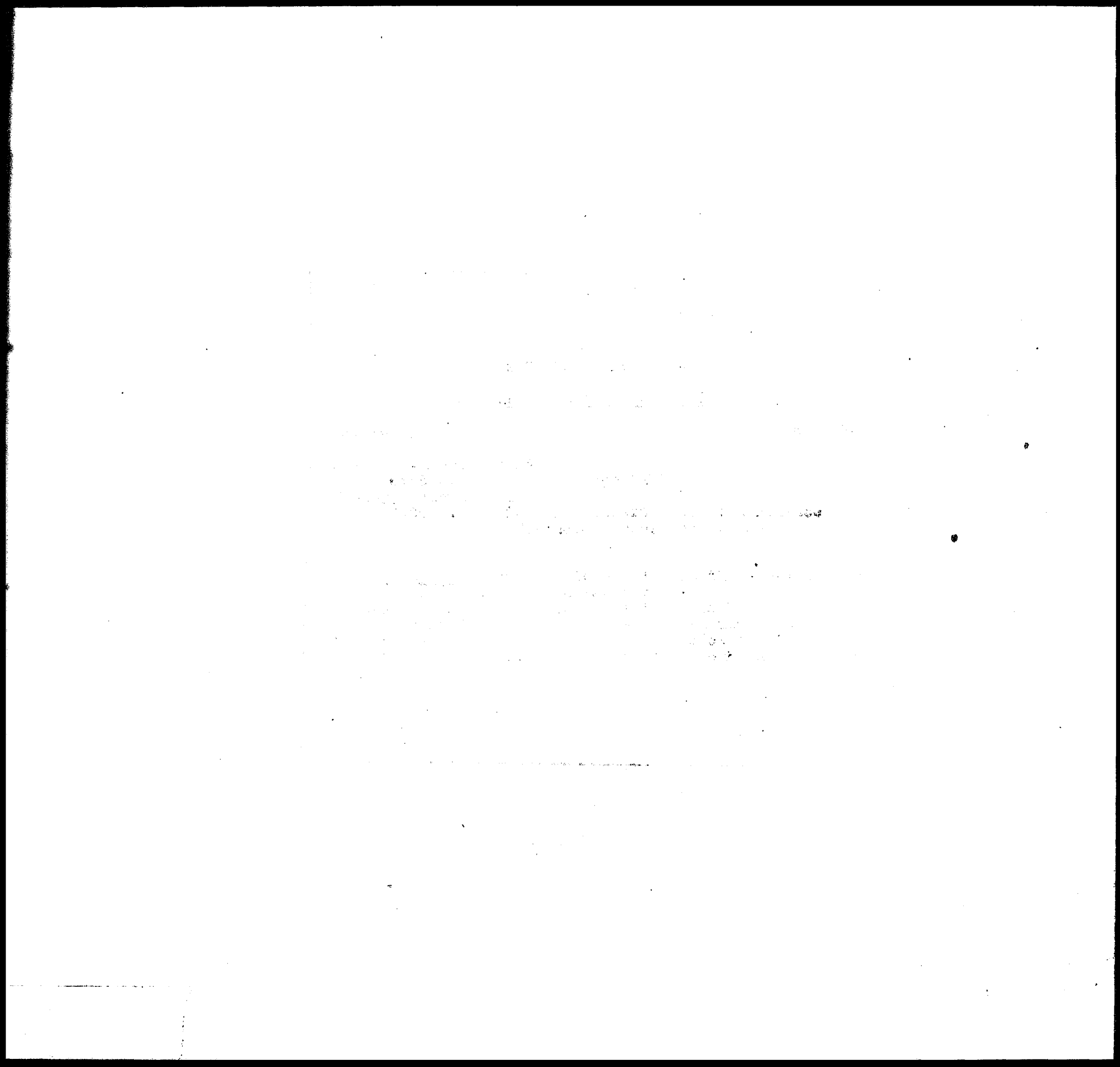
"So far I have glorified Yenching. I have been very happy and I feel perfectly natural in the friendly hours with the cultured folks in Oxford and in England in general. — — —

Anti-Rabies Inoculation. This should be given to all dogs once in twelve months to prevent them from becoming mad and so endangering the lives of any one near them, especially children.

Last year about this time Dr. Tolstikoff inoculated a number of dogs here. He charged \$2.00 *each* for the vaccine (cost price) and \$1.00 per head for inoculating, including his fare to and from Peiping, provided the number of dogs was over 15.

Whoever wishes to have their dog, or dogs, inoculated should inform the Business Office and pay in the charges as soon as possible. Dr. Tolstikoff is prepared to come to Yenching on Saturday, March 4, 2 to 4 P M, in the Biology Building. Steps will be taken to destroy all dogs which are not inoculated.

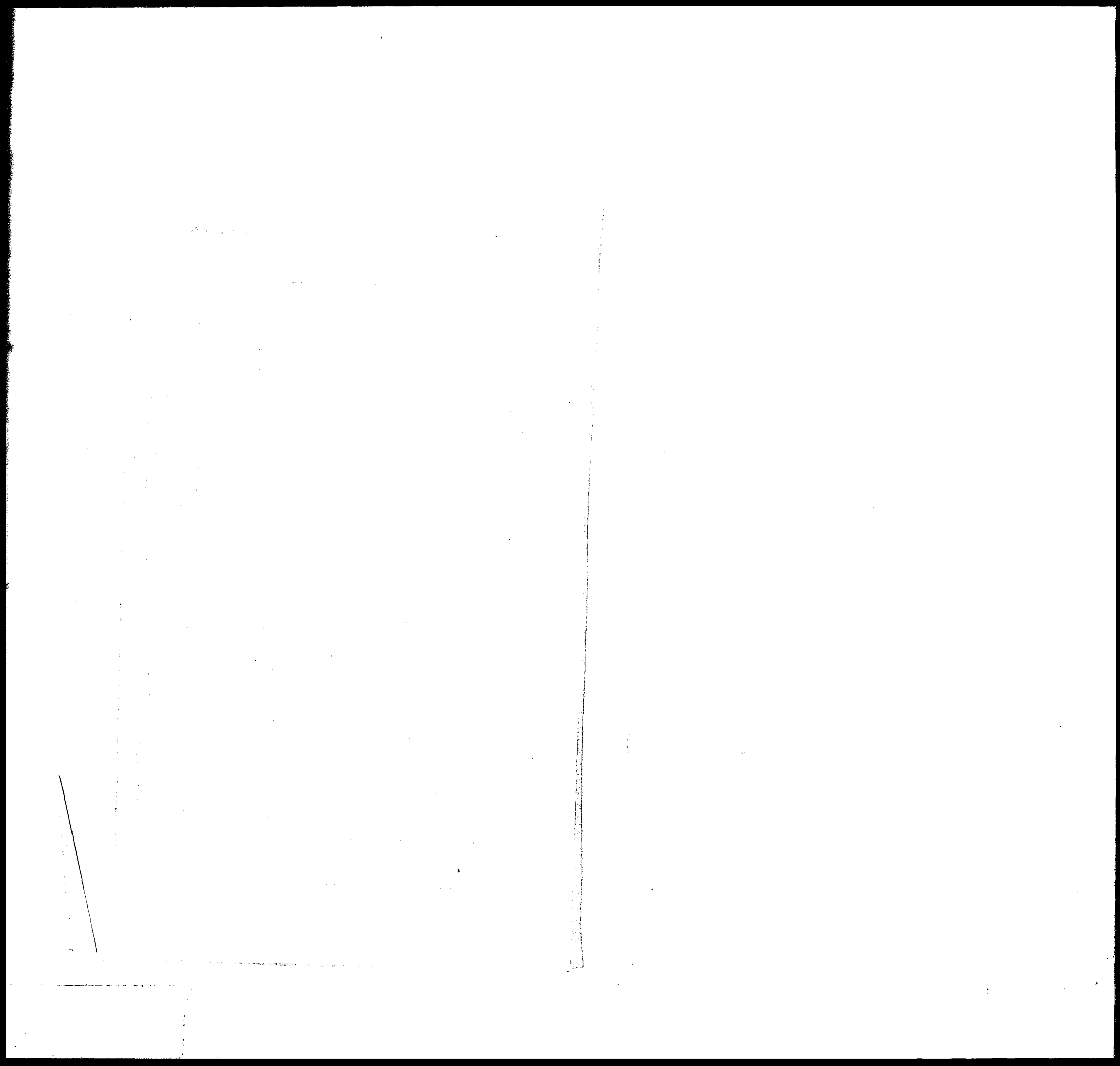

孫總理逝世紀念會

本校於本星期一上午八時五十分在大禮堂舉行孫總理逝世紀念會，由代理校長陸志韋先生演講，略謂今日爲孫中山先生逝世八週年紀念日，孫先生是一有作爲的人，他的死雖然同常人一樣，不過每到他死的那一天，使我們不期然的發生欽仰。他的遺囑上說「開國民會議及廢除不平等條約，尤須於最短期間，促其實現」。現在國民會議既未開成，取消不平等條約亦辦不到，這兩件事只好留待最近將來。目前最低希望，惟有盼黨國當道諸公，能做到他們所宣言的，「精誠團結」四字云云。

全體師生大會黃子通教授演講

本星期全體師生大會，由陳其田院長主席，黃子通教授演講，大意略分三點：第一須有責任心，中國爲民主國家，國家興亡，匹夫有責，中國人只望國家好，並攻擊別人不好，自己却不往好裏去做，類如現在說宋子文不好；但當他做學生時，是被同學公認爲幹練人才，我們若是不滿意現在的當道，我們就應訓練我們自己比他們千百倍的好。第二應有

為社會謀幸福的精神，中國人家族思想太重，按中國文化早已發達，然常為金遼元清等族征服，就是吃了只顧家族不顧國家的虧，所以我們應當打破家族主義，努力為社會服務。第三應有良好組織，中國人之最大缺點為無組織，一事發生，則眾議紛雜，但結果誰亦不負責任，學生會即係練習組織之最好機會，若謂現在可以隨便，將來做官時自然會好，那是萬無此理的。

本校來學年招生計畫

本校招生委員會，因本學年行將終了，於近月來開會多次，根據以往數年之經驗，擬就下學年招生改進計畫多項，茲擇要述之如下：

一、史地試驗改為社會科學常識——舉凡史地、經濟及其他社會科學以及中外大事等，均包括在內，據本校招生委員會之意見，深信此種改變當能較切實際也。

二、數學試驗分兩次舉行——按本校已往入學試驗，文法學院所用數學試題與理學院所用者完全相同；而投考文法學院之學生對數學多不興趣，且少預備，以致考試成績，往往欠佳。本校有鑒及此，乃決定自本年度起，將數學試驗分為普通與甄別二種。普通試驗於七月入學試驗時舉行，試題較易，為凡欲入學者最低限度之數學試驗；甄別試驗於九月開學時舉行，試題較深，凡已錄取之新生欲入理學院及法學院之經濟學系者，須再受此試驗。其不能及格者，須補修算學，或改入文學院及法學院之政治學系。

三、報名時免受身體檢驗——歷年新生於報名時均須先檢驗身體，經醫生證明無疾病者，方准與試，惟按諸實際，報名投考者，每三四人只有一人錄取，故決定自本年度起，投考者於報名時免受身體檢驗，惟已錄取者，須於入學前由著名醫生檢驗，入學後並須由本校校醫檢驗。

四、加試科學實驗能力——自本年起免繳科學實驗筆記，而於考試中加試學生之實驗能力。又關於選考科學，以前本規定三種——即物理、化學、生物——考生可自三者中選一種應試。現改為自民國二十四年度起，取消生物，只許自物理化學兩門中，任選一門應試。

五、國文注重文言——鑒於社會上之實際需要

自本年起，國文考試雖仍有白話文，但所注重者則為文言文。

頃奉惠書，知母校教職員抗日會本愛國之精神，實行調查日貨，發見緞綢一種，以為日貨之冒充，川貨者，來函詢問，命予調查，弟即進城與該舖接洽，並以來樣相示。據云：此種緞綢，確係該舖出品，暢銷於平津，並多為日人所購，該舖之運出者皆素色，特寄上貨樣數種，祈廣為宣傳，以副提倡國貨之精神為禱。弟雖返川，而於母校之事業，關懷更切，九一八事變後，母校之教職員及同學，對於抗日事業，多有表現，或於燕大校刊，或於平津各報，皆見有記載，忠勇愛國，實堪欽佩。弟自來蓉，任教半載，即被舉為社務主任，內則指導學生生活，外則辦理實際事宜。年來除指導學生參加各種民衆運動，以期喚醒國魂外；自暴日出兵滿洲，我亦組織義勇軍，並舉行抗日遊藝募捐會，獲得二千元，以千元濟馬占山，千元濟下江災民，上海事變後，我亦募捐濟十九路軍。……母校內教職員及諸好友，乞代致意，恕未另箋，敬祝春祺，弟體康敬復。

Rural Reconstruction Group. Ch'ing Ho is noted for its excellent propaganda. Can the work itself be defended under keen attack? Mr. Chang Hung Chun will not make a speech on Tuesday evening at the President's House, but will help us all get down to some of the fundamentals of rural reconstruction through concrete discussion of the Ch'ing Ho work. All welcome.

Regulations Regarding Permanent Property or Equipment Assigned to University Divisions or Departments and not longer required for their use. (Adopted by the Faculty Executive Committee March 14, 1933)

1. No division of the University shall dispose of any article of permanent property without the approval of the Comptroller, who is responsible for the completeness and accuracy of the inventory of University property.
2. If an article, not longer needed by a division, is of a type generally useful as a part of University equipment, the Comptroller shall have the article removed and stored, or transferred to another division which may be in need of the same. In such cases the division from which the article is removed should not claim compensation.
3. If mutually agreeable, divisions of the University may arrange to exchange articles of equipment, upon the approval of the Comptroller.
4. If an article not longer needed, be a specialized type of apparatus or equipment not useful in other divisions of the University, then the head of the division and the Comptroller shall consider the best method of disposition. In the case of cash sales the division concerned cannot, as a matter of course, claim the funds realized from the sale, but its right to claim such funds shall be given consideration.

5. If it is proposed that funds receivable from the sale of an article which has become inadequate for its purpose be applied toward the purchase of a better article, this step may be taken upon the approval of the Comptroller.
6. In the administration of the above regulations, interpretation and decision regarding issues which may arise, shall be the responsibility of the Faculty Executive Committee as the budget-making body of the University.

The President's Car. Following are the general regulations governing the use of the President's Car :

1. The car is for the use of University Officials on University business, the cost of operating the car to be charged to the office concerned.

2. University Officials entitled to use the car are the following: The Acting Chancellor and Acting President.

The Deans of the three Colleges, Dean Ssu-tu, and the Dean of the School of Religion.

The Director of Studies, the Treasurers and the Librarian.

The Committee on Lectures, or the University Assembly, for the use of lecturers.

The Physicians of the University or of the Women's College.

The Chief Engineer.

3. Requests for the use of the car should be made to the secretaries in the President's Office.

4. Any requests for the use of the car for emergency purposes should be presented to the Acting President.

5. The car is not for hire for personal or non-official uses.

Owing to inadequate antenna we cannot guarantee sending all U.S. messages direct to California: but important ones do get there at once, the rest are relayed in shorter steps.

Entrance Information Sheet in English—The 1933 Entrance Information Sheet in English is just off the press. Copies may be had by applying to the Admissions Bureau.

Notice from Alumni Bureau (March 15)—Twenty nine teaching jobs in fourteen middle schools in various parts of China are now open. These posts include: six for Chinese, two for English, two for German, one for Music, three for Home Economics, three for History and Geography, two for Education, four for mathematics, one for Physics and Chemistry, one for Biology, one for Physical Education, and three for matron and teaching for girls. From Dr. T. C. Chao—A letter has been received by Dr. de Vargas from which some of Dr. Chao's activities and interesting experiences are mentioned here:

January 19—Began a Speaking Tour of English Universities:
Bristol University: "Chinese People as Portrayed by their Poetry"

January 20—Liverpool University: "Chinese Philosophy of Life"

January 21—At the home of the proprietor of Alfred Holt Company:
"Chinese Painting"

January 22—Cathedral of Liverpool: Preached to about a thousand people—after which he was made a Commoner of the Cathedral by the Dean—a typical English ceremony which he enjoyed very much.

January 23—Liverpool—Talked to Students

January 23—Manchester University: "China in the Modern World" which proved to be a fight, Dr. Chao answering questions for forty minutes after the lecture, finally winning the day.

January 24—Birmingham University: "Chinese Conception of Poetry"

January 27—Cambridge—received by Mr. I. A. Richards—spoke on Chinese poetry—enjoyed greatly having dinner in the hall at the high table, and participating in the evening of intellectual fellowship which followed.

January 29—Chinese dinner at Cambridge with about twenty Chinese students.

Dr. W. H. Adolph has just returned from a trip to Tsinan where he gave several lectures and addresses at Cheeloo University.

Hou Shu-tung is having a busy time at Liverpool University with his work, and also giving talks on China. At a recent "Changing China Exhibition" at which a film including Yenching was shown, Mr. Hou declared the Exhibition open on the Educational Day. A report on his speech published in the Liverpool Times, in which he spoke of China's rapid progress since the Revolution and her struggles for political democracy, may be seen in the President's Office. He is also booked to give a talk on Chinese Poetry to the Liverpool Poetry Society. In his letter he speaks with appreciation of the help which Professor Roxby and his friends have given, in putting the Chinese students into touch with English life.

Radio From Dr. Stuart to Dr. Galt: Astounding American sympathy for China here—saw Mrs. Galt and Wendell yesterday—thanks for radiograms—very comforting—health excellent—kind remembrances to all.

Mr. Tsao I, the Alumni Secretary, returned to Yenching on March 7 from a three months' trip to central and northern China. Mr. Tsao has travelled more than 5000 miles, visiting about twenty-five large cities in nine different provinces, and calling upon 580 alumni and alumnae, and having had twenty-five conferences. He has also given several lectures and attended discussion groups in several junior and senior middle schools. He has reported that twenty-eight Yenching graduates are wanted as teachers in various middle schools.

The Alumni Association buildings in Shanghai and Nanking will soon be constructed, and a sum of \$415 will be contributed to their Alma Mater by the branch Alumni Associations of Tangshan, Tsingtao, and Changli. 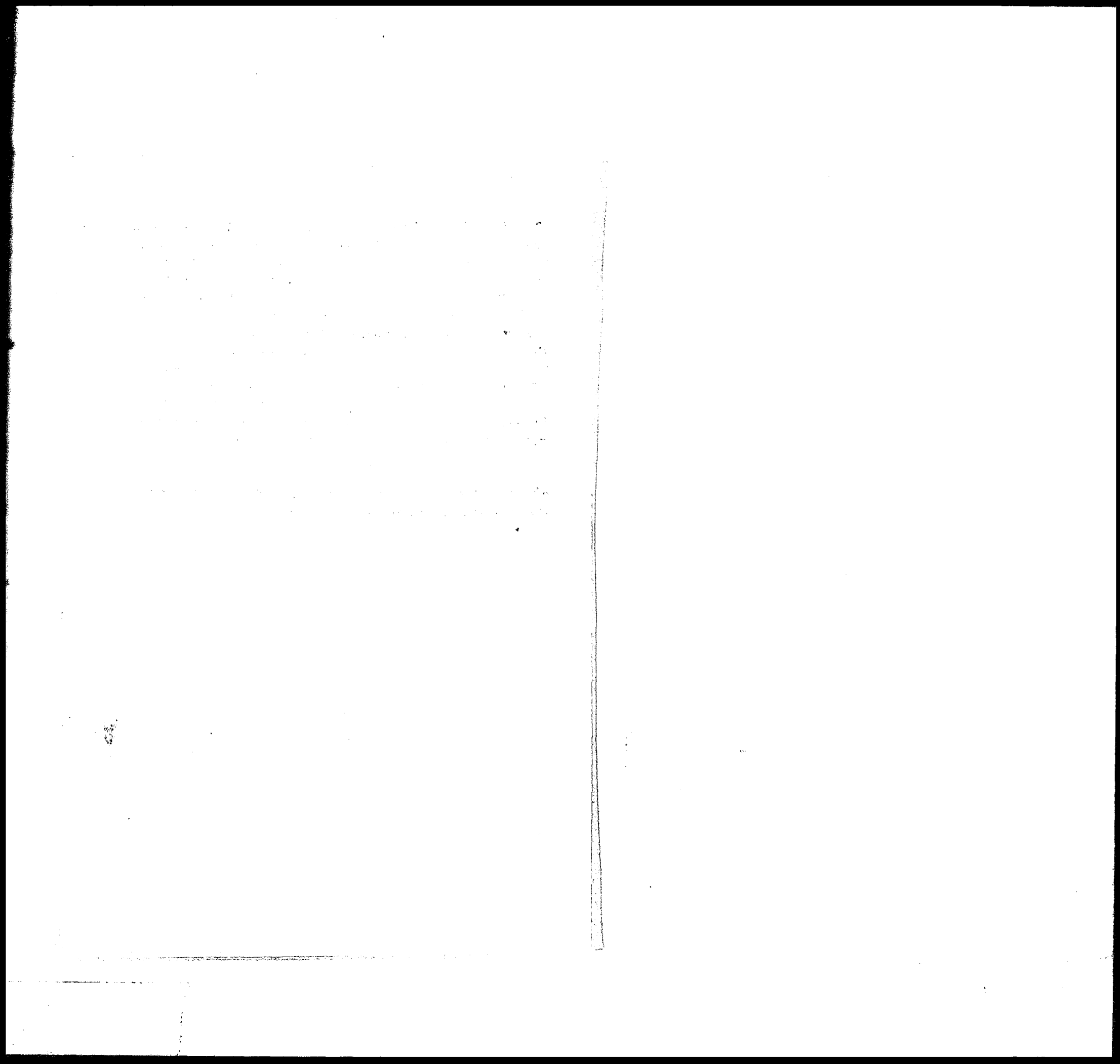

Grain Marketing in Hopei Province, an Interim Study, by Mr. J. B. Tayler and Mr. Li Ying is now available, and can be procured either from the Department of Economics or the College of Public Affairs offices, at 30 cents a copy. The study describes the organization

and functioning of some typical markets in Hopei Province, and studies the movements of prices and their interrelation in various markets. The report is in three parts. Part I describes the marketing system as a whole, followed by a detailed description of individual markets at Ching Ho, Chochow, Tsangchow, Shihchiachuang, and the central markets as Peiping and Tientsin. Part II presents data concerning the measure in use, and costs involved in marketing, monthly and yearly fluctuations in price and quantity, and the relation between price movements in different markets. Part III gives a summary and makes certain suggestions especially regarding statistical service necessary to provide a basis for the dissemination of market information to the farmers.

But, although the play may be light, the work the students have put into it certainly is not. The cast is thoroughly competent, and after working hard for weeks, is able to put on a play which ought to be exceptional, with elaborate costumes and setting.

Moreover, duty calls. To descend to the sordid, this play is not produced for delight alone. The proceeds are all going to the volunteers.

The lecture on *Tuesday, May 16* will be given by Dr. de Vargas in Biology Building, No. 203, at 7:30 P.M. Dr. de Vargas has collected a good deal of material on the Chinoiserie period of Europe in the eighteenth century, and will illustrate his lecture with lantern slides, all of which promises to be very interesting.

On *Thursday, May 18*, Dr. Felix Valyi, Founder of the Asiatic Society of Hungary, has kindly consented to give an informal

lecture before the University audience at 4:10 P.M. at No. 103 McBrier Hall. For several years, Dr. Valyi has studied Asiatic cultural history in Europe and America, and he has been influential in promoting interest in Oriental studies in these countries as well as in his own. He will speak at Yenching on the impressions of *the cultural crisis in the Far East, with particular reference to Japan and India*. After the lecture, Dr. Valyi will be glad to answer questions, or to lead a brief discussion. The lecture will be given under the joint auspices of the University Lecture Committee and the Yenching Sociology Club.

Victrola Concert. The program for the Victrola Concert on Friday, May 19, will be Wagner's: "GÖTTERDÄMMERUNG". Celebrations of the 50th anniversary of this composer's death are being held all over the world this year. A printed synopsis of the complex story of the "Nibelungen Ring" will help to make the music more understandable, and will enable those who listen to enter into the spirit of this masterpiece of music-dramas.

Notice on "Comprehensive Examinations" of the University of Chicago. Out of a desire to break away from the credit system with its frequent abuses, and to give the undergraduates a coherent education has grown the *new college plan* of the University of Chicago, probably the most radical of the several plans in this direction that are being experimented with in American colleges. This plan received a good deal of attention on our campus especially in Dr. Galt's discussion group on education about two years ago. The feeling then was that this and other similar plans would stand or fall with the adequacy of the comprehensive examinations. The Board of Examinations of the University of Chicago has just published the comprehensive examination questions in the four general courses used

in June 1932, presumably to test the attainment of the students at the end of the first year of the two-year courses. The four general courses are in the Biological Sciences, the Humanities, the Physical Sciences, and the Social Sciences. The examinations are indeed comprehensive, the questions for the four courses total over 200 pages. Both the essay form and the more objective types of tests are used. The form as well as the content is suggestive.

It is believed that a considerable number of the faculty would be interested in taking a look at this collection of Examination questions: members of Dr. Galt's discussion group who discussed the Chicago Plan, those who are interested in educational tests, critics as well as supporters of the English educational system, members of the University Committee on Admissions, last but not the least, those who are actually responsible for setting the entrance examinations for the University.

The "Comprehensive Examinations" belongs to the Library, but is now temporarily kept in the Office of the Director of Studies for consultation by those interested. Please apply to Mr. Liu Chen.

There is also an advertisement for the syllabus that the University of Chicago has published for each of these four general courses as well as a number of special subjects. Departments and teachers of introductory courses may wish to order copies for reference.

PERSONAL NOTES

From Dr. P. C. Hsü comes the following interesting and exciting letter:
Dear Colleagues:

I have had a most interesting and exciting time since I left Yen-ching on March 2nd. I reached Amoy on March 31st and was the principal speaker at the South Fukien district students' Spring Retreat, which was held April 1-7 at Chuan-chow. From the 11th to the 16th I was at Lingnan University, Canton, in connection with their Special Religious Emphasis Week. I spoke no fewer than twenty times at Lingnan and other institutions at Canton. On Easter morning, I preached to a group of five thousand at an open-air service arranged by the Canton City Y.M.C.A. From April 21st to 29th I was in Foochow and spoke at all the fourteen Christian institutions there. So during the month of April I must have spoken at least forty-eight times. All that is very interesting, though somewhat tiring.

Finally came the most exciting time! I left Foochow on April 30th by S. S. Yung-shin. On May 18th at 6:50 A.M. the boat struck a piece of rock in a dense fog, off the coast of Haimeng, Chekiang. The boat did not sink until the following day, but the passengers were all pirated and some were kidnapped. I had also the misfortune, or fortune, of losing all my luggage, including my watch, ring and money. After having spent a miserable day and night, we were picked up by S. S. Chip-shin on May 2nd and arrived safely this evening at Shanghai. Is this not exciting?

I expect to attend the N. C. C. Biennial Conference at Sungkiang tomorrow and shall be back at Yen-ching on the 16th.

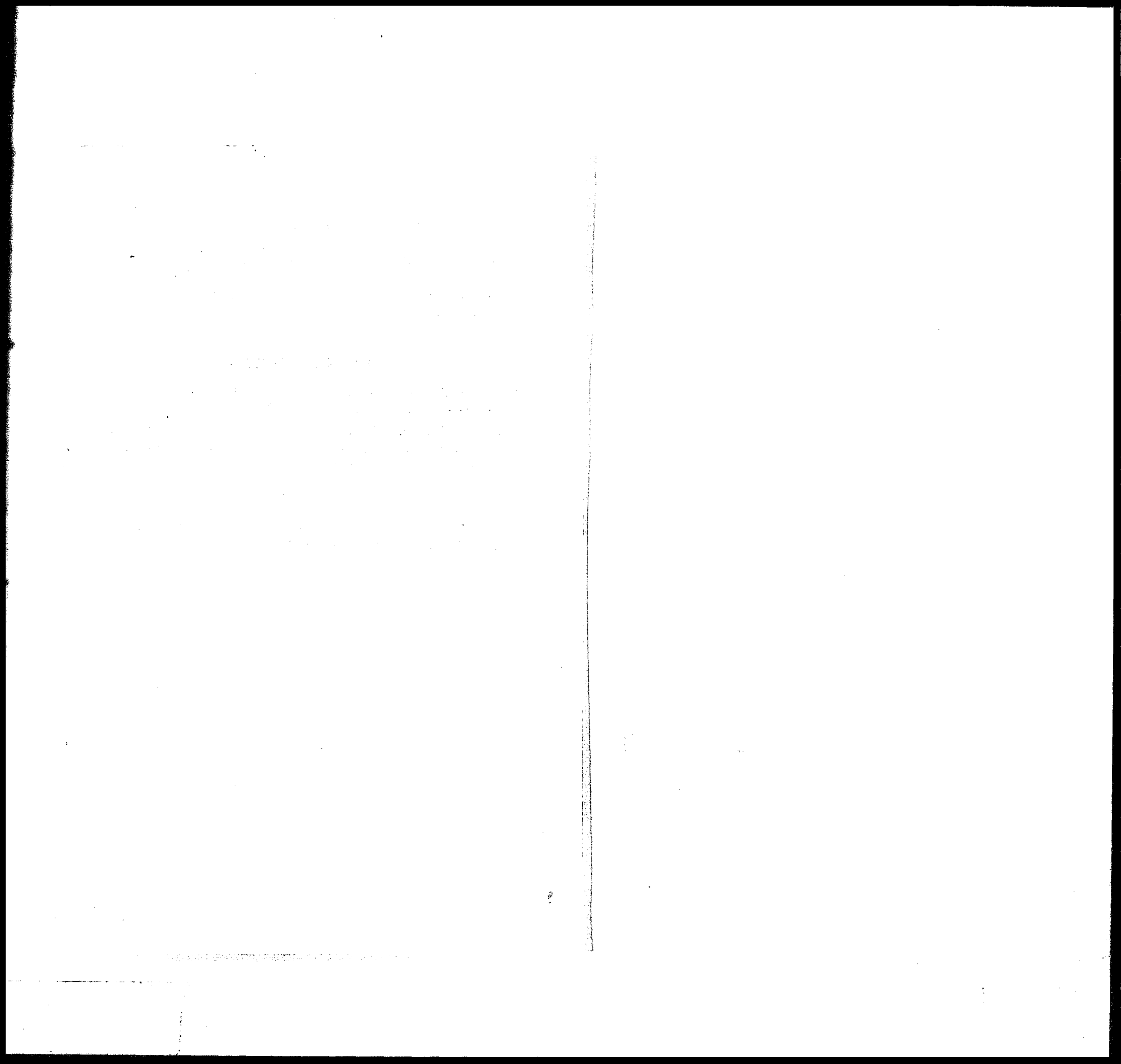

8. I pray that these excellent features may burst into flames.

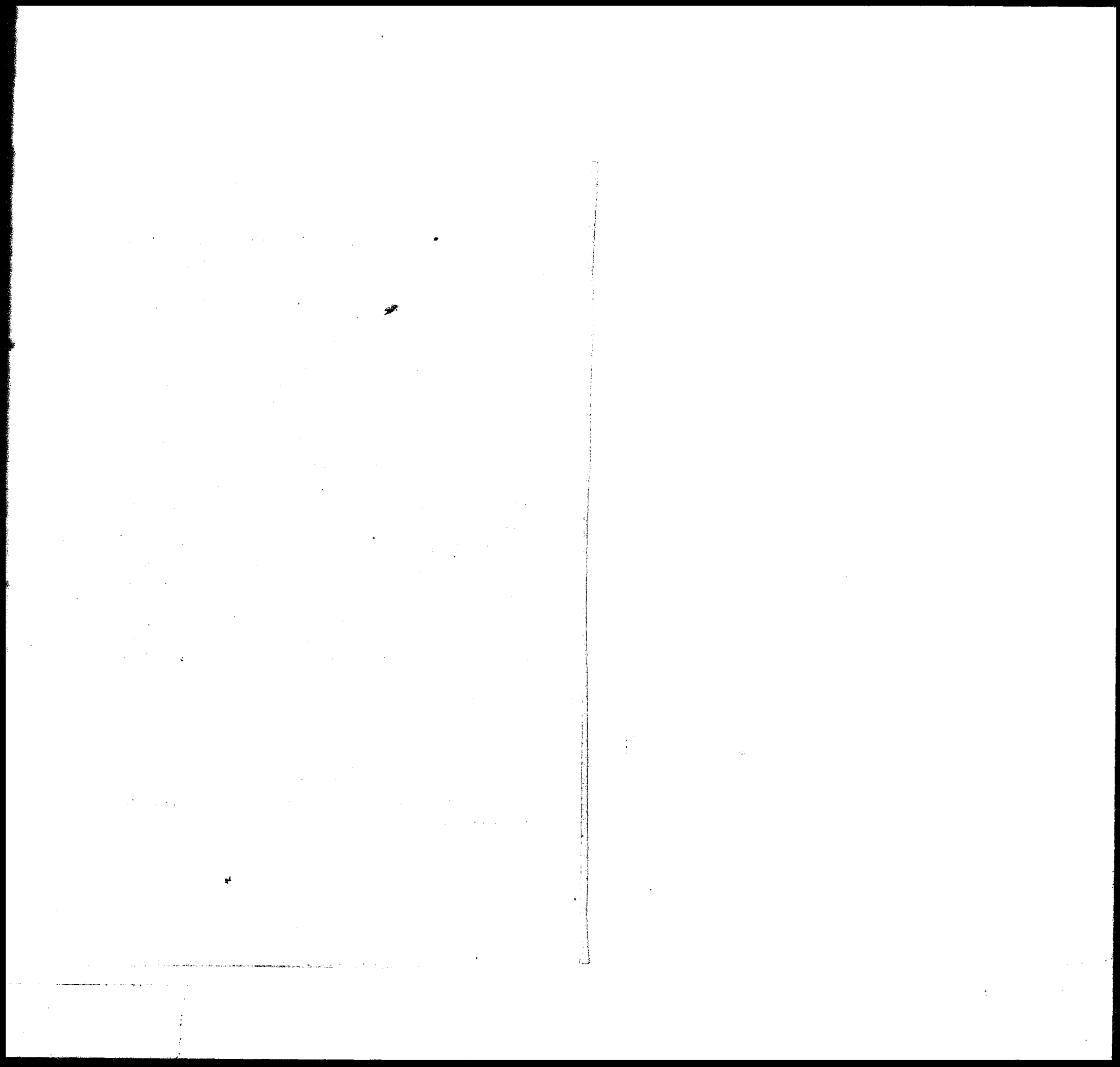

Please Return. Mr. T. T. Lew will appreciate it very much if the borrower of his *Re-thinging Missions* will return it to him, as he is in need of it at present.

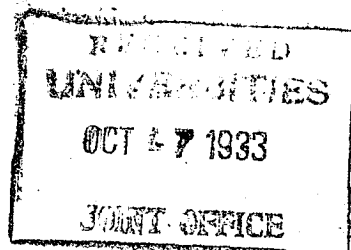

Y. and Carrie Tsu.....Greetings to everyone".

Discussion Group—About twenty-seven members of the faculty attended the discussion group last Tuesday night at the President's House. Chinese music played by a skilled young musician will be presented to music-lovers of Yenching on Monday evening, September 25th, at 7:30 in Bashford Hall. A third instrument on which he is skilled is one which was very much used in very ancient times and is called the "tanpula." It is the forerunner of the p'i-pa with a gourd for the back and snake skin for the front. It is so ancient that no music has survived, but new music has been written for it.

One who hears this concert will be experiencing the latest developments in the art of music today.

The Je Mao will open its season on Friday, September 29, at 8:00 P.M. in the home of Miss A. Wagner. An urgent request is made to arrive at the early hour announced, as the evening will be extraordinarily full with the production of a three-act play, welcome to returning and new members, and the regular annual election of officers.

The Campaign will last only a week. A committee force of fifty persons are working on it. They met recently at the President's House, where Dr. Stuart addressed them. The new members will be formally initiated into the Fellowship on October 8.

"Understanding Jesus"—The Fellowship is this year making "understanding Jesus" its central objective. To this end, small study circles (some student-faculty, others purely students) will be organized under

competent leadership. It is hoped that a large number of members—old and new, faculty and students—will take part in this worthy movement. Definite plans will be announced later.

The Admission Officer. A propos of the discussion on admissions, Mr. Y. P. Mei wishes to take the liberty of presenting the following short paragraph from Dr. Adam Leroy Jones, Director of Admissions at Columbia University, to interested members of the faculty, because it is so sweet :

"I suppose you know by this time that the admissions officer is gun-shy. He meets every day people who want to tell him just whom to admit to college from the enthusiastic alumnus who knows a prospective fullback to politicians and various others with axes to grind. You can see that, being accustomed to meeting that kind of situation, an admissions officer is likely to be a little bit hesitant about accepting every new idea that comes along,

"I want to say, however, that even an admissions officer has not always a closed mind. Of course, there is such a thing as having a mind too much open. Some people have minds that are open at both ends. Now that kind of mind doesn't get along very well in the kind of job where his deeds come back on him ; that is another way of saying that the admissions officer doesn't want to accept right away everything that comes to him. Most admissions officers are keen to know about and take into account information which will help them to do their jobs better. I think it is perfectly true to say that certainly in the colleges that I know best most of the officers of admission are interested in getting as complete a picture as possible of the students applying for admission. They may use bad judgment in selecting among those, but they are open-minded to the extent of wanting to know all the significant facts about the entering students. They are interested in experiments....."

Such requests must be accompanied by audited accounts of expenditures last year, and an itemized budget of proposed expenditures for this year.

The campaign for this year is planned for the week October 30-November 4. Before that time it is hoped all members of the community will have carefully considered this matter and will be prepared to pledge their contributions promptly and generously when seen by the solicitors.

Conference on Higher Education. The year's first session of the Conference on Higher Education will be held at the President's House Tuesday evening (Oct. 24) at 8:00 o'clock. Mr. Galt will report on an international "Conference on Examinations" held in England in 1931, attended by prominent educators from Germany, Switzerland, France, Scotland, England, and the United States. A report of the discussions at this Conference seems especially opportune in view of the more important place assigned to "comprehensive examinations" in changes now taking place in higher education.

University Lecture—Mr. Hemendra K. Rakhit, who is to lecture next Thursday on "What is Happening in India", has been for ten years Assistant Director of International House in New York City. He has been Editor of "India," the journal of the Hindustani Association of America, and president of that association. Mr. Rakhit has represented India at many student conferences and has lectured on India at Harvard, Cornell, Columbia, and other American universities and colleges. Mr. Rakhit is spending the winter in Peking studying conditions in China with special reference to international contacts and influences. In his lecture he will show how India is emerging from the conflict of Eastern and Western ideals, expressed in various aspects—religious, economic, political—of her national life.

Annuity Plan—Members of the faculty who are participating in the University Annuity Scheme may be interested in the following account which appeared in the New York Times.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—To help American Government employes take care of themselves in old age, the United States Treasury Department Beneficial Association has worked out with the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada a group annuity division.

A contract between the association and the Canadian company became effective in August while the drive for recovery of American business was at its height.

Officials of the association, all Federal employes and some of the divisional chiefs in the Treasury, made a formal announcement to the membership of several thousand workers, relating that the contract had been awarded.

All of the employes of the Treasury, the general accounting office, Reconstruction Corporation and Home Loan Bank Board were made eligible for participation in the association's announcement, to which was attached an application blank.

The association, established in 1892, is a non-governmental organization of Federal Treasury employes.

One of the officers, explaining the contract today, said that the company was selected by a group of the employes "after a careful investigation" of other insurance organizations.

Formation of the annuity program, he said, was "under the auspices of the association, but it is not trying to force anybody to buy an annuity with that or any other company, and if an employe wants to obtain an annuity with some other company, that is his right."

"The Sun Life Company does most of its business in the United States and most of its employes are in this country and most of its holdings are United States bonds," he added. "That was looked into very carefully."

In the printed announcement to members of the establishment of the annuity division, the association said "the Sun Life's United States department is in effect an American company, employing Americans and aiding American business."

PERSONAL NOTES

Mr. Kao K'e-yi. Word has been received of the arrival of Kao K'e-yi at Columbia, Missouri, and his enrollment in the School of Journalism of the University of Missouri. Mr. Kao was graduated from Yenching last June with a major in Journalism.

Mr. T'ang Te-chen, second Missouri-Yenching Fellow, obtained his M.A. (in journalism) at M.U. last June and, since September 1, has been Nanking Correspondent of the China Press of Shanghai. No official appointment to a fellowship at Missouri was made this year; Mr. Kao made the trip upon his own responsibility but it is expected that he will continue the excellent impression already made there by his Yenching predecessors. He was admitted to graduate status in the School of Journalism, candidate for the M.A. degree.

**OCTOBER ACADEMIC SUMMARY FROM THE OFFICE
OF THE DIRECTOR OF STUDIES**

November 1, 1933

Concerning dissemination of academic information to the faculty in the University, the policy during the last two years has been to present this information in the form of reports and announcements at the monthly meetings of the University Council, and then to circularize it among the whole faculty through the printed copies of the Council minutes. In compliance with the desire to save time at the Council meetings we have decided to publish a "Monthly Academic Summary" in the Faculty Bulletin at the end of every month preceding the meeting of the Council. If this experiment is favorably received by Council members as well as the faculty in general, the practice will be continued and verbal reports will be omitted at the Council meetings as far as possible. For the present issue of the "Summary", the following items among those that have come to our attention seem to be of interest to the faculty:

Training for Rural Reconstruction

The Deans' Committee is continuing its deliberations on the problems involved in the administration of training for workers for rural reconstruction. The Committee has reviewed the courses at the present offered in the University having to do with the proposed training course. The Faculty Discussion Group on "training for rural reconstruction" is continuing with enthusiasm. A visit to Chingho has been arranged for Saturday afternoon, November 4, and Chingho will be the topic for the next discussion. An invitation has been sent to Dr. James C. Yen of Tingsien to address our University Assembly, to confer with the Deans' Committee, and to discuss the problem with the faculty group. We are not yet able to announce definite dates for Dr. Yen's visit.

Measures to Increase Teaching Efficiency

A summary of the Deans' Committee discussion on this topic has already been circularized among chairmen of departments. The following opinions of the Deans' Committee may be listed for reference of the faculty:

- (1) That part-time teachers be engaged only where it is absolutely necessary.

- (2) That only experienced teachers be asked to offer fundamental courses.
- (3) That questions concerning teaching efficiency be discussed frequently at the department meetings, and ways and means be devised to deal with particular problems as well as to promote teaching efficiency in general.
- (4) That each teacher be expected to conduct the examinations for his courses himself. Where special circumstances justify the teacher's absence at an examination, the responsibility for proper conduct of the examination should fall on the chairman of the department.

Further Dropping of Student by Admissions Committee

After much correspondence and investigation, it has been established that Hsü Chung Ch'üan (33316) entered the University as a transfer student by cheating. The offence is so glaring and serious that the student had also to be dropped.

Regulations Concerning "Auditing"

The term "auditing" is at present used in at least three different ways in the University. It needs clarification and redefinition. Sets of new regulations have been prepared for the discussion of authorities concerned, viz., the Graduate Committee, the Deans' Committee, and the Admissions Committee.

Campaign Committee. The following members have been asked to constitute the *Campaign Committee* for the Endowment Fund: Dr. Y. T. Tsur, chairman, Dr. J. L. Stuart, Mr. S. J. Chu'an, Miss Nettie Ssu-t'u, Mr. S. I. O. Ts'ai. This Committee will act as a

central promoting and correlating agency and will of course count on much active help from many others as the plans develop. Further announcements will be made after securing the approval of our Chancellor, who is expected to return to the city early next month.

Advisory Committee on Academic Policy and Advisory Committee on Administrative Policy. In accordance with the statement made at the faculty meeting when the Endowment Campaign was discussed, two committees have been requested to aid the administration in a study of all possible economies that can be effected without too serious injury to the work that must be maintained next year. One of these is the *Advisory Committee on Academic Policy* as printed in the Directory; the other, the *Advisory Committee on Administrative Policy*, consists of the following members: Mr. B. H. Miss Muriel Lester. Yenching is fortunate in being able to have Miss Lester as a visitor from Monday, December 4 to Friday, December 9 inclusive. She will stay at the Dean's Residence, but anyone wishing to entertain her otherwise should consult with Mr. P.C. Hsü, who has charge of her program.....Miss Lester comes from Kingsley Hall, London, of which she is the founder and director, and has been called the Jane Addams of England. To quote from letters, "Kingsley Hall is a centre of fellowship in the midst of a large industrial neighbourhood, run for the most part by the people themselves. There is no paid labor there. Neighbors come in constantly to do the garden, to cook the dinner, to polish the floor, or to lend a hand with the spring cleaning, but they neither get nor expect a halfpenny for their work. Its foundation is in the hands of no sect, but it is based on the life and teaching of Jesus Christ.....Miss Lester is also one of those who founded the Fellowship of Reconciliation, and is one of the finest spirits in the whole F O R Movement.....Miss Lester has also entertained Gandhi when he was in London." More detailed announcement of Miss Lester's visit here will be given in next week's Bulletin.

Faculty Trip to Tingsien. In line with our interest and study on the problem of national rural reconstruction, a faculty trip to Tingsien is being planned for either the New Year holiday or a

few days during the winter recess. Notice is served at this time in order to allow time for making the necessary arrangement with the officers of the Tingsien Station, who would not ordinarily welcome visitors outside of their Visitation Week which comes in the spring. From Dean Henry Chou. "You must have received the card I sent while I was in Rome. The Fascist exhibition was very impressive and the chief drawback was that I couldn't read Italian. It would have been much more interesting, if I could have. I stayed in Rome for only one day and then proceeded to London. I have been registered in the University College of the University of London. I enjoy my work very much.....The Parrs came to London last week on their way to New Zealand. I was very happy to see them. They looked just the same except that the two boys have grown a whole lot. We met several times, at one of which we had a Chinese dinner with Mr. Bentley present. It was a wonderful Yenching reunion..... I haven't seen Miss Bent yet, but I think I shall see her during the year.... I certainly miss Yenching and its faculty and students. The weekly Bulletin is a great reserve. It makes me feel as if I were in Yenching while I am reading it.....My present plan is to stay in the University College for the year and to utilize my vacations to visit schools both in England and the Continent.....Please remember me to the Yenching Community through the columns of the Bulletin."

From Meng Chao-ying—"I am glad to inform you that I am now well settled here and pursuing my study. I had a splendid journey on the sea. There were five Yenching people on the boat: Mr. Ch'u Sheng Lin, Miss Kuan Sung Shan, Mrs. Frame, Miss Burt, and I. We had a nice time on the boat and landed without difficulty on the 18th of September. The Veghte's came down to San Francisco to

meet Miss Kuan and they drove down to Pasadena and I came down here by train. The very next day I registered, and soon afterwards began my regular class work. The school work is fairly heavy, but I am now quite settled and acclimated. I am taking six courses which makes a heavy schedule for me, so I found it impractical to start any research work right away.....I am staying with Dr. Hsieh in a boarding-house which is only about five minutes, walk from the Institute. The place is so quite, clean and peaceful that I think it is an ideal place for studying. The Institute, as you know, keeps a very high scholastic standard and everybody here is ardent about research and progress. I hope that I can make as good use of my opportunity as possible. With all my good wishes and best regards to all my friends at Yenching."

From L. T. Huang—"Dear Friends: Here I am writing this letter to you in a red brick building of the colonial style. My window is facing a brick quadrangle enclosing a beautiful lawn. It takes me only five minutes to walk from here to Emerson Hall where Whitehead, Lewis, Woods, Hocking, and Sheffer, these famous philosophers, have their classes every day, and it takes not more than seven minutes to go to Boylston Hall where you can find Harvard-Yenching Office. It is inspiring to meet all these well-known philosophers, but it is also encouraging to see the young Americans more and more interested in Chinese studies. Doubtless, they are still going through a pioneering stage, but their enthusiasm will grow and their studies will be deepened.

"The U.S.A. is gradually recovering from her financial distress. Yesterday President Roosevelt made a nation wide speech on the radio telling the American Nation that since the NRA (National Recovery Administration) began, four millions of people have found their work and that the government will take into its hand the fixation of gold price or the value of the American dollar by buying and selling the surplus gold from the mines. The American president is working very hard on international problems. I hope that his policy will bring about the peace in the Far East and the peace of the world.

Faculty Discussion on Rural Reconstruction—In the study of the Mass Education Experiment at Tinghsien, we naturally desire to hear as much as possible from people actually engaged in the Experiment on the spot. For this purpose the Committee has secured the generous consent from Dr. Tang Mao-ju to lead our discussion next Tuesday. Dr. Tang has been one of the leaders of the Experiment from its very beginning. He will deal especially with the educational phase of the work.

There is also the possibility of Dr. Chü Shih-Ying visiting Peiping at the time of the next meeting. An effort is also being made to have him present next Tuesday. Dr. Chü is one of our own alumni and holds a very responsible position at Tinghsien. All members interested are invited to attend.

Women's College Assembly. On December 8th at the usual chapel hour, Miss Ting Shu-ching, General Secretary of the Y.W.C.A., will address the student body of the Women's College. Miss Ting is especially interested in presenting the Association as a field of endeavor for future graduates, and is expecting to hold individual conferences with upper-class students after the Assembly talk in order to learn the possibility of their identifying themselves sometime with the work.

Friday Fellowship Group. This meeting is open to everybody. Social Work students are especially welcome.

Yenching Bus Service—The President's Office has issued the following announcement to the faculty and students. Until the University can arrange for some form of safe transportation, temporary provision is available, as has been indicated in advertisements appearing in the public press.

"Yenching University, for the convenience of its faculty and student body, entered into agreement with the Mei Fu Garage authorizing them to establish a bus line between the city and the University. The buses of the Mei Fu Garage are permitted to bear the name of the University, and the University authorities have the right to make periodical inspections of the buses to determine whether or not they are in proper condition. The latest inspection by our own engineer

revealed that most of the vehicles used on this line are in such bad mechanical condition as to be unsafe. The University therefore asked the Garage that according to the arrangement these unsafe cars be repaired or replaced, and that, if the Garage failed to comply, this would force us to claim our right of terminating the contract.

"The Garage, instead of keeping its arrangement, has entered suit against the University, thus involving the issue in a slow process of litigation. Since the legal action was taken a month ago, several accidents or breakdowns have happened, some of which might have been tragic. Therefore the University warns members of our Community that hereafter it assumes no responsibility for those travelling by the Mei Fu Garage vehicles until we are notified that these have been put in proper condition and our engineer has approved them."

Women's College Infirmary—The new Infirmary for Women has been in actual use for over a month, and is thus proving its usefulness already. On Saturday afternoon, December 9, and Sunday, December 10, members of the faculty and staff with their families will be welcome to come to see for themselves how attractive this new unit is.

Health Record of Men Students. During the Academic year 1932-33 of the 562 men students only 160 were absent from classes on account of sickness. That is 28.47%. The remaining 71.53% did not lose even one hour through sickness.

Progress of Committee on Teaching Efficiency

The Committee on Teaching Efficiency appointed by the President in accordance with an action of the University Council, UC-863, has been meeting among themselves and with the Deans' Committee on the question of procedure. A bilingual questionnaire on educational methods is being carefully prepared and will be distributed to all members of the faculty through their departments. An explanation will be made at the December Council meeting to enlist the understanding and cooperation of departmental chairmen. A schedule is being worked out for departmental consultation with the Committee, at which the Dean concerned with also participate. It is hoped that interest and attention would be stirred up on the matter of teaching efficiency in the University through this process. A formal report of the findings of the Committee will be submitted to the Council some time next spring. The above outlined procedure has received approval of the Deans' Committee.

Training For Rural Reconstruction

The Faculty Biweekly Discussion Group on Rural Reconstruction is continuing with enthusiasm with an average attendance of thirty people including some mature students. Its attention is at the present centered on the Mass Education Movement at Tingsien. Besides discussion among members of the Group, effort is being made to secure active participants in the Experiment to lead the discussion. A faculty study-visitation trip to Tingsien is also being arranged for the new year holiday.

The Deans' Committee is also proceeding more directly to a consideration of the organization of training programme for workers for rural reconstruction. A special meeting has been called for Saturday for this purpose.

Faculty Discussion on Large Classes

"How do we conduct large classes?" was made the topic for discussion at the last faculty conference on higher education. Over thirty people participated and practically all teachers having classes over twenty-five were present. Every teacher of a large class made a contribution to the discussion by stating the methods used. The group decided to continue the discussion at the next conference.

The Freshman Doyen Committee

The Freshman Doyens have already met twice among themselves and twice with teachers of Freshman courses to discuss problems concerning guidance to Freshmen. Most of the Freshmen have been interviewed already regarding their studies and general welfare. The mid-term examination results will be the occasion for further consultation between the doyen and the students. A real effort is being made by the doyens to get acquainted with their groups and to help them to make the proper adjustments. All members of the faculty are urged to get in touch with the doyen concerned when they find a Freshman getting into difficulties or making a brilliant performance in any connection.

Lectures on Italian

Because of the free offer of services from the Italian Legation to the University, the Deans' Committee has proposed to the University that a series of lectures on Italian literature and culture be offered next spring semester without academic credit. More permanent arrangement on courses on Italian will be considered with reference to the result of this experiment.

The Yenta Christian Fellowship has this year a membership of nearly 500, and more than one-half of this number are students. PERSONAL NOTES

From Chang Hung-chun, Singapore—"I am very glad to report that I had a very successful time in Java. Altogether I spent a month there. Though quite handicapped in the language, I managed to get the necessary information and the main ideas of the various systems that the Dutch Government has introduced to improve the rural conditions in Java. I was very nicely treated by both officials and the general public. They did everything possible for me to make my study. The Chinese officials and leaders were very helpful in making all the necessary connections. They seldom see an educated Chinese come to Java to study rural conditions.

I spent most of my time on the irrigation system, the agricultural extension service, the county health unit work, the village rice banks, the village banks, county banks, the village schools, the native industries, the training of both lower and higher native officials, the labourers schools, the training of adult farmers by short courses and demonstration farms, the supplementary schools to give village school teachers some knowledge in agriculture, and the agricultural schools to give native boys training in agriculture to teach them how to be good farmers. Besides I learned something about the general rural administration. This is all very interesting and instructive and will be very suggestive for my work when come back to China.

The weather in Java is quite warm. Fortunately some of the places to which I went are in the mountain regions and they are quite cool. Though I stayed only a month, I travelled quite a lot from the very west to the very east. It takes only twelve hours to travel from Batavia to Soerabaia. Because of the heat here, they do not work in the afternoon. But I used the short time of my stay in each place as an excuse to make them show me things also in the afternoon. I saved very much time in the way.

I left Batavia on the 18th and got to Singapore on the 20th, and will sail for Calcutta on the 23rd. While waiting for the ship I am making a study of the Cooperative Thrift and Loan Society in Singapore which is quite unique in its features and which they claim to be the best in the world.

I hope everything is going on well in the University and that you are making progress in the rural program. Please remember me to all my friends in Yenching and I wish you all a Merry Christmas and a very Happy New Year."

Wednesday January 17, 7:20 A.M. leave Peiping; 3:00 P.M. arrive Tinghsien. Saturday, January 20, 12:30 P.M. leave Tinghsien; 8:00 P.M. arrive Peiping. This would give us two whole days and one morning at Tinghsien. There was also the opinion expressed that a whole-week would be much more worthwhile than a half-week trip. If ten or more people would signify their desire to spend about a week for the trip, the group might return in two batches, both enjoying the reduced rates. Otherwise individuals not returning with the group will have to buy their own tickets. The Committee feels it is necessary to warn members against a rather hard trip because of inadequate accommodations, and this consideration might help them in deciding for the shorter or the longer trip.

Travel and expenses:—The railway fare to Tingsien costs about \$3.60 each way for third class, ordinary train. Second class costs twice as much, extra fare for express. Club rates could be arranged for third class travel only and it is hoped to secure a 50% reduction for the round trip. The group present voted for third class round trip at group rates. Divergent opinions should be addressed to Mr. Y. P. Mei.

All information, suggestions, and criticism concerning the trip must be sent to Mr. Mei during the first week of January.

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DECEMBER ACADEMIC SUMMARY FROM THE OFFICE OF THE DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

December 28, 1933

Progress of Committee on Teaching Efficiency

The work of the Council Committee on Teaching Efficiency is proceeding as planned. Copies of a bilingual questionnaire are being distributed to all teachers through the departmental chairmen at the proper time. The Committee has already met the teaching staffs of two departments, and will be meeting others at a series of departmental conferences lasting till about the end of March.

Training for Rural Reconstruction

The Faculty Discussion Group on Rural Reconstruction has been concentrating its attention on a study of the Mass Education Movement at Tingsien. Over 20 members will join a visitation trip to Tingsien during the winter recess.

A tentative statement on the training programme for the proposed Institute of Rural Administration has been adopted by the Deans' Committee to serve as a basis for arrangement with collaborating agencies.

Academic and Administrative Consolidation

Partly because of financial necessity and partly because of academic considerations, the Advisory Committee on Academic Policy has been considering the advisability of combination and correlation of certain departments in the University and change of emphasis of others. A Committee on Administrative Policy has at the same time been studying questions of greater economy and efficiency in University administration.

Discussion on Admission

The Admissions Committee has resumed its deliberations for admissions for the coming summer. While it wishes a more reliable device for admissions could be found, it does not feel the present data justify any radical change at this time. The scope and standards for admissions will probably be the same as those of the last year. Special problems have been referred to sub-committees for study. Suggestions from the faculty are welcome.

Library Investigation

Upon the recommendation from the Advisory Committee on Academic Policy the Faculty Executive Committee has asked for the appointment of a Library Investigation Committee.

Yenching-American Exchange Fellowship

Upon the suggestion from the American Office of the University and because of the considerable interest among students, arrangements are being made to institute a Yenching-American exchange fellowship service under the auspices of the Institute of International Education.

Application for Classification of University

Out of a desire to measure ourselves as a university and compare with the more standardized institutions, the Office of the Director of Studies is preparing the necessary material for the consideration of the Committee on Classification of Universities and Colleges in America, with a view of having Yenching rated by that authority since our University is conducted more on the American pattern probably than any other. If other national or international university classification agencies could be suggested, similar efforts will also be made.

The following letter written on March 6th has been received at the President's Office from Dr. Stuart :

"We are due in Seattle to-morrow and I shall send word of myself through you to the Yenching Community. The voyage has been a pleasantly uneventful one. As always when I have come this route we have had good weather, and physically I have kept in fine condition. With a cabin to myself and plenty of reading matter of different sorts I have been lazily unsociable and have made the most of this chance to be self-indulgent. My chief problem has been how not to speculate too anxiously as to what may be happening or getting ready to happen at Yenching. The radio messages are eagerly awaited each day and are anything but reassuring, although thus far, about as might have been expected. The big question is as to the next move of the Japanese. Meanwhile as we have come closer to this side of the Pacific the news is almost equally unpropitious for the special purpose I have in coming here! It is only the necessities of our financial issues and belief in how worthwhile is all that we are trying to do, that would sustain one in a venture which seems about as senseless in attempting to raise money in the America of today, as to be deserting one's associates at such a time in North China.

A radio informs me that I am to speak to-morrow evening at the China Club, and that Mr. Gee will also. It will be good to get busy again, and at least be occupied with trying to be useful. My greetings and solicitous remembrance to everyone. What I should like to hear about and hope for all of you can be easily imagined."

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
