



Library—In further explanation of the appointment of the Committee regarding Library problems, the purpose of this Committee will be to assist the present Library Committee and the Librarian to study possibilities of improving the service in view of the enforced reductions in budget and inadequate space within the Library building itself.

The Reunion of the Yenching Alumni in Peiping. The Yenching Alumn in Peiping held their New Year's reunion on December 30, at 3:30 P M. at the Alumni Club House, 71 Teng Shih K'ou. One hundred and thirty persons were present, among them the oldest alumnus, Mr. Chuan Yao Tung, now eighty-eight years of age, father of Mr. Chuan Shao Wen, chairman of the Alumni Association. His granddaughter, a graduate of 1932, was also present. The youngest present, who also in the years to come may be a Yenching graduate, was only five years old. Other alumni were Mr. Meng Shen Wu, a graduate of 1889, and Mr. Wang Kow Chai of 1892.

Chancellor Tsur and President Stuart addressed the group, speaking on the One Million Dollar Endowment Campaign, and all present promised their support in this undertaking.

Other items on the program included music, refreshments, games, and magic.




Notice from the Students' Welfare Committee Office—K'ung Ch'ing Yün and Hung Chin Tsai withdrew from the University on account of personal affairs.

Dr. Stuart has been requested by Chancellor Tsur to return to Shanghai, and will therefore probably not arrive at Yenching until about the middle of this week.

Faculty Discussion on Rural Reconstruction. Because of Dr. Man niche's visit in Peiping during the early part of February, the original plan of holding a Forum on Tinghsien as a sequel to the visitation trip will be postponed. The meeting on the coming Tuesday evening will be devoted to the rural reconstruction experiences of Denmark, and Dr. Manniche will be our leader. He will address the University Assembly in the morning on this significant movement in a general way and will follow it up at the discussion period. Those who have time and interest might do some reference reading in the Library by looking in the catalogue under "Grundwig" or "Folkschule Movement" of Denmark.

The Charus begins its rehearsals on Thursday, February 8, at 6:45 P.M. in Sage Hall. This semester the great masterpiece of choral writing of the nineteenth century, "A German Requiem," by Johannes Brahms will be studied. As usual, the doors of the Chorus are thrown open to membership to all those who desire to sing. This is a community organization with both faculty and students freely participating in it. It offers a unique opportunity for student-faculty contacts on an equal basis. Faculty members are particularly welcome because of the support which students feel from faculty members. Come for this first meeting and thus help start it with enthusiasm.

Friday Fellowship Group. The first meeting of this group is to take place on Friday, February 9, at 8:00 p.m. at the President's House. There will be brief reports from the various Fellowship groups and from the team which went to Changli for winter service.

Clergy Fare Certificates. Application blanks for Clergy Fare Certificates for the use of faculty and staff members, who are planning to go to the United States this year, may be obtained in the President's Office. It is important that those wishing to make use of these should send their applications as early as possible to the United States.

Yenching Ice Carnival and Winter Frolic will be held on Saturday afternoon and evening, Feb. 10. The program, starting at 40'clock, will have three main divisions, as follows: races, fancy skating and fancy costume competitions on the skating rink; an ice hockey game between the student teams of Tsinghua and Yenching Universities; a band concert and program of entertainment in the auditorium.

The U. S. Marine Band, under the direction of Seargeant August A. Olaguez, band master, will play upon the marble boat during the afternoon program. They will also give a special program in the first half of the evening's entertainment, assisted by a male quartet from the Marine Corps. These features of the annual event are made possible by the kind permission of Col. P.M. Rixey, commandant of the U.S.M.C. in Peiping.

A campfire will be lighted at dusk on the bank of the lake near the hockey rink. Those who attend the Carnival are invited to bring a winter-picnic supper with them to be eaten during the playing of the ice hockey game. The department of home economics will also serve meals in the Luce Pavilion on the island.

The afternoon program will include open speed races on the ice for 100, 200 and 1,500 meters, fancy skating, singly and in pairs; an exhibition of fancy skating by Mr. Chao Wu-shan, formerly skating exhibitor for the Empress Dowager; and a parade of fancy dress costumes. Awards and prizes for the first three places will be given in several of the events.

In the second half of the evening program in the auditorium, an exhibition of folk dancing and a Scottish reel will be given by faculty groups. Other numbers will include harmonica selections by a student quartet of artists upon the mouth organ, a procession of historic characters, Chinese songs, demonstration of Chinese boxing, and a Chinese play.

Arrangements for the day are under the direction of the Men's Faculty Athletic Council. Proceeds will be allocated to the various student athletic clubs which have charge of intercollegeiate competitions under the new method of administering sports by the Department of Physical Education. All-day tickets will be sold by student athletic leaders at the following rates: \$1 for reserved seats in the auditorium, sixty cents for unreserved seats. Those who buy neither of these will be asked to purchase "cooperation tokens" if they desire to appear upon the ice after 4 o'clock. These tokens will be sold for twenty cents. The three kinds of tickets will all be in the form of tags which purchasers are requested to wear. A special souvenir program is being printed. Fuller details concerning the events will be published later.

January Academic Summary. Because of the examination week and the winter recess, the January Academic Summary will be combined with that for February and will be announced when the latter is due.

Public Lecture. Mr. Hung has continued his careful researches regarding the history of the gardens that are included in the present Yenching campus. His previous lecture on the Shao Yuan of the famous Mi Wan-chung will be recalled by all the university group. Mr. Hung has now collected a large number of documents regarding the garden of Ho Shen and the story of the rise and fall of the great Ho Shen, Privy Councillor and minister of state of the emperor Ch'ien Lung. At the public lecture on Thursday, February 15, Mr. Hung will share with the university community what he has learned of this great statesman and adventurer and what he has discovered regarding the Shu Ch'un Yuan, the magnificent garden Ho Shen developed, a rival in grandeur to imperial gardens. The Shu Ch'un Yuan covered what is now the main part of our campus, including the lake, the stone boat and our beautiful "earth hills". We can

always count on entertainment and historical accuracy in all that Mr. Hung presents.

Women's College Faculty Meeting. The regular meeting of the Women's College Faculty will be held on Thursday, February 15, at five o'clock in the Deans's Residence. Tea will be served at 4:30.

Public Lecture of the School of Religion. The third lecture will be given on Friday, February 16, at 4:15 p.m. in Ninde Chapel. All members of our community are welcome. Dr. Ph. de Vargas will speak on the subject: "Early Jesuits in China". The lecture will be in English.

Prayer for the World's Christian Student Movement—On Sunday, February 18, there will be a service of prayer for the World's Christian Student Movement, at the time of the morning church service. A special offering will be taken for the Federation.

Report on Faculty Campaign Pledges. The Faculty Campaign Committee wishes to express its profound appreciation to the members of the faculty and staff for their generous response to the endowment Campaign. Pledges totaling \$92,000 have been received from 168 members with still a few to be heard from. This number does not include most of the Mission Board appointees who, due to uncertainty of their salaries, are not yet able to make definite pledges. But they have already begun to make contributions from month to month with varying amounts. It is, therefore, safe to say that when we have heard from the few who have not yet sent in their pledges, we will have reached our goal of \$100,000.00.

Arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Morton. The School of Religion is glad to announce the coming of Mr. Thomas Ralph Morton who has joined the Faculty of the School for the spring semester through the influence of Mr. T. M. Barker and the kindness of The Mission Council of the Irish Presbyterian Church, Manchuria. He will give courses in the New Testament and also a new course in Rural Evangelism. Mr. Morton is an M. A. of Glasgow University and did his theological work in Trinity College of the same University. He came to China over eight years ago. During these years, he spent six months in the College of Chinese Studies (usually known as the Language School), three years in Y.M.C.A. work, and the remainder in evangelistic work at Hsin Ming Tung, Liao Ning. On his furlough he wrote a book called Life in the Chinese Church which was published by the British Student Christian Movement. Mr. and Mrs. Morton and their three children are living in No. 38 Yen Tung Yuan. Their presence is not only a great joy to the School of Religion, but also an enrichment to the University community at large. To them a hearty welcome is extended.

New Members of the Department of Journalism. The Department of Journalism as well as the Yenching Community extends a cordial welcome to these new members:

Mr. Hubert S. Liang of Shanghai has joined the faculty of the Department of Journalism. He will serve concurrently this year and probably during a part of next year as executive secretary of the Million Dollar Endowment Compaign Committee. Mr. and Mrs. Liang and their two small children are now living at No. 14 Lang Jun Yuan.

Mr. Liang has been a member of the staff of the National Committee of the Y M C A since 1928. At the same time he has served as a part-time lecturer in Journalism in the University of Shanghai and has been a special China correspondent of the *Detroit News*, the *Christian Science Monitor*, and *Time*. He was graduated from DePauw University in 1924 with a B A in Journalism and a year later took his M A degree at the University of Chicago. Thereafter for almost two years he was an editorial worker on the staff of the *Detroit News*.

Or. Rudolf Lowenthal, a German Journalist, will spend this year in North China, studying the Chinese language and things Chinese. He plans to live in the Nan Sû She, at Yenching, and has agreed to have charge of the course in Comparative Journalism during the coming semester, serving in an honorary capacity.

Dr. Lowenthal received his doctorate degree from Berlin University last July in Economics and Journalism. His dissertation dealt with the world supply and demand of newsprint paper. Previous to his studies in Berlin, Dr. Lowenthal has been enrolled in secondary schools and colleges in his native city of Schwerin, Mecklenlenburg, and had served on the staffs of publication in both Germany and France. He speaks English, French, Swedish, and Russian in addition to his native language.

Mr. Edgar Snow, correspondent in China of the New York Sun and the Consolidated Press, will teach the course in special feature articles, and advanced news writing. Mr. Snow is the author of a recently published book, Far Eastern Front which has been very favorably received by reviewers and the general public both in the Orient and in Western countries. Articles by him have also been published by leading American magazines and newspapers. Mr. and Mrs. Snow are living in the summer home of Mr. and Mrs. James Ch'uan, 8 Chun Chi Ch'u, Haitien. Mr. Snow is serving in an honorary capacity.

Mr. H. J. Timperley, China correspondent of the Manchester Guardian and a part-time worker in the Peiping bureau of Reuters, will teach the course in Correspondence, dealing with news agencies and the work of special correspondents. Mr. Timperley has recently returned to Peiping from a trip around the world. He has lived in China for many years. His early newspaper experience was in Australia. He is now living in the Peking Hotel, and will come out one day a week for consultation and research. Mr. Timperley is also serving in an honorary capacity.

The Faculty Conference on Higher Education at the meeting on Tuesday evening, will consider the subject, "Laboratory Method in Science Teaching". The requirements of laboratory work in the sciences enter deeply into academic and curriculum problems in the University and a discussion of the subject should be of general interest. Invitations to be present and give opening addresses on the topics have been accepted by Professors W.H. Adolph, William Band, and J. C. Li, representing the three sciences which make most use of laboratory methods.

All members of the Faculty are invited to attend the Conference and participate in the discussion.

University Lecture. Note change of time for the University Lecture from Thursday to Wednesday, February 28, 4:15 P.M. in McBrier 103. The Lecture this week will be by Mr. H. J. Timperly, correspondent for *The Manchester Guardian*, and honorary lecturer in the Department of Journalism. Mr. Timperly's subject will be "East to West and Back in 1933," in which he will speak of his recent journey around the world.

The Department of Philosophy is anxious to secure copies of Introduction to Reflective Thinking by Columbia Associates (Houghton Mifflin), for reference reading by students in Reflective Thinking. Any one possessing a copy of this book will confer a favor by loaning the same to the Chairman of the Department.

Faculty Reading Group. As announced in last week's Bulletin, the next meeting on March 13, will discuss the general topic: God in the Modern World. In preparation, each member of the group should have read at least one of the following four books, all having already been introduced to the group:

Lyman, The Meaning and Truth of Religion Horton, Theism and the Scientific Spirit Van Dusen, The Plain Man Seeks for God Gilkey, What Can We Believe?

Have your name placed on Mr. de Vargas' list for these books, or for Basil Mathews' John R. Mott which is also circulating.

The request for Van Dusen bore successful results, which encourages us to notify the group that Niebuhr's *Moral Man and Immoral Society* has been lost from the School of Religion shelves. It would be much appreciated if this also could be returned as promptly.

Exhibition. In honor of Washington's Birthday, an exhibition of pictures of Washington and scenes from his life is being held at the History Department, M 200. All are welcome.

Honors for the Biology Department. Last September the Sun Yat Sen Institute for the Promotion of Culture and Education in Nanking announced a series of competitive prizes for students in Biology, and asked the Biology Departments of 16 universities to send in the names of their best three students during the academic year 1932-33, together with evidence of their attainments, such as examination papers, theses, laboratory books, etc., and an official transcript of grades.

The results have just been announced: all three Yenching students stood high; Shen Shih-chang (1933) and Chang Tsung-ping (1934) stood third and fourth among the six in a special class to receive \$100.00 each, and Miss Hu Meng-yu (1933) stood first among eight in the first class to receive \$60.00 each.

"The local chapters having voted unanimously in favour of establishing a Phi Tau Phi chapter at Nankai University; the National Executive Council has authorized the representatives of the aforesaid institution to proceed to organize the chapter.

"Dr. W.A. Riley, Past President of the American Society of Parasitologists, proposed by Lingman Chapter for honourary membership, has been elected by the local chapters; and the election has been ratified by the National Executive Council."

Report of Ice Carnival. The emphasis in Yenching's annual ice carnival and winter frolic on February 10, was, willy-nilly, upon the frolic. Continued unseasonable warm weather had "rotted" the surface of the ice until skating events of any skill or consequence were impossible.

The committee had anticipated such a misfortune, and were prepared to turn the carnival into a gymkhana to a considerable extent. Events of various kinds were run off anyway, most of the time and interest were concentrated upon footraces, run in shoes on the ice, chair-races in which a boy pushed a girl sitting in a chair upon the ice, and similar laughable entries.

Mr. Chao Wu-shan, 70-year-old skater, once a skating exhibitor to the empress dowager, made a sporting effort to give the crowd some examples of the 'stunts' which Tzu Hsi used to admire. The Yenching and Tsinghua hockey teams agreed that a real game was not possible but agreed to add to the entertainment by playing a period in the slush with mixed line-ups, the forewards being exchanged. Each squad managed to push in two goals.

During all this time, a festive atmosphere was being created from a peng built upon the marble boat by the Marine Band. Although the number of participants on the ice was less than in other years, the entire Ping Hsi community and many guests from the city lined the banks to watch the fun throughout the afternoon, and jammed the auditorium for the evening events which were run off as per schedule.

If records could not be set up in other ways, carnival and frolic surely made history in the surprising number of persons contributing their services in a variety of ways to provide a program. Proceeds from the admission tags sold will be allocated by the men's faculty athletic council to the sports clubs which now carry the responsibility for intercollegiate competitions in Yenching. General University funds in the department of physical education in Yenching are now used almost exclusively for the promotion of the intramural athletic program.

The council, composed of Messrs. R. A. Wee, Harry B. Price, Stephen Ts'ai, R. C. Sailer and Vernon Nash, wish to extend their most hearty thanks to all who helped in any way during the day. Special acknowledgement is due Col. P. M. Rixey, Sergeant August A. Olaguez, Band Master, and the members of the Marine Male Quartet; to Hirschbrunner's for announcements during their time over XOMO; to the San Yu and Yenching Presses for contributions of printed materials; to the Chronicle for advanced publicity; to Mr. Chin Yu-shan, national shuttlecock champion for his special exihibition; to the staff of the Department of Physical Elucation for Women in Yenching, Miss E. Stone and Miss Y. M. Ch'en for the coopted service; to those two numerous to mention who served as judges and officials during the day, and who performed on the stage or behind the scenes in the evening. Unusual time and effort were given by Miss Doris Cummings in the direction of the English Country Dance by a faculty group, by Mrs. H. E. 

Note on Rural Reconstruction Discussion. An Abbreviated Story of Chinese Philosophy. JANUARY AND FEBRUARY ACADEMIC SUMMARY FROM THE OFFICE OF THE DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

Punctuality in Handing In Grade Reports For the Last Semester

The faculty has reason to be proud of its fine record in the matter of turning in grade reports to the Office for the last semester. Altogether only three members have been delinquent and they are all part-time lecturers. It is safe to say that the hearty cooperation and sense of responsibility on the part of the faculty as demonstrated by this record is difficult to find elsewhere in China or abroad.

Spring Enrollment Of Students

As reported in the Registration Table published in the preceding issue of the Faculty Bulletin, a total of 769 students are registered in the University for the spring semester. This marks a record for spring registration in the history of Yenching. The figure for the last spring was 692, which was, however, specially small due to special reasons.

Faculty Interest In Rural Reconstruction

The fear that the faculty interest in the general problem of national rural reconstruction for China might be a fad of the time should be definitely dispelled by now. Throughout the autumn semester a biweekly faculty discussion on the various phases of this general topic was held and well attended. During the cold winter recess a group of 23 people, mostly faculty members, took a visitation trip from Yenching to Tinghsien, and a symposium on this visit occupied one of the discussion meetings this semester. Yenching is further fortunate in having had Mr. Chen Chu Shan and Dr. James Y.C. Yen of the Mass Education Movement as guests on the campus at different times during the last few weeks. Individual interviews as well as group conferences have been held by members of the Yenching faculty with these leaders of the rural reconstruction movement. One should also recall at this point that Dr. Chü Shih Ying of the same organization has also addressed the faculty discussion group, and Dr. Monroe T'ang conducted a seminar course in our Department of Sociology last semester. These contacts will not only bring the two institutions into closer mutual understanding, but will also lay the foundations for any cooperative scheme that might be developed to the benefit of both.

Dr. Manniche of Denmark gave a public address on the Danish experience in rural reconstruction in the University Assembly at the beginning of the semester, and followed it up with a faculty discussion that same evening. Other phases and problems of rural reconstruction will be studied by the faculty group during the coming months, and effort will be made to arouse interest among the student body as well.

Preparation For Admission of Students

The Admissions Committee had completed its deliberations before the end of the last semester in preparation for admission of students next spring. The scope, standards, and procedure for admission will be about the same as those of last year except that a new experiment will be tried in the admission of foreign students. The examination for qualified students from accredited schools will be given on Saturday, May 12, the ordinary entrance examination will be given on Monday, July 23, and Tuesday, July 24, while the examination for foreign students will be given on Friday, May 11, and Saturday, May 12. Entrance information material is being prepared for publication in the Admissions Bureau.

Plan For Military Training.

The University Faculty Executive Committee has taken action to enforce military training as required by the Government regulations beginning next fall with the Freshman Year.

Registration of Comprehensive Programme of Studies.

In accordance with the Plan for More Efficient Educational Guidance included in the Report of The Committee on Academic Policy and adopted by the University Council last spring, the Freshmen Doyens are making preparations to help the Freshmen students to map out a comprehensive programme of studies for the following three years, leading to their graduation from the University and preparing them for the fields of study or activity in which they are interested. In this endeavor, the department chairmen concerned will be asked to help.

PERSONAL NOTES

From Miss Cheney. Miss Cheney writes that she manages to keep busy with church work, mission study classes, and now and then a missionary address. "I enjoy it all, and am happy to be able to do it, but 'the heart that's in China'—you know!.....Last week I had an especial treat. Dr. Fong Sec (Laura K'uang's father) was guest speaker at a Rotary banquet at Lau Claire sixty miles from here; and friends invited me to go. The Rotarians in charge gave me the seat at Dr. Fong's right—and it was a most enjoyable evening. He had the pictures of Laura's wedding, which I was glad to see. And I was very happy over his address on international friendship......Please give my most cordial regards to all my Yenching friends. I miss them much, but I'm with you all in spirit very often."

From C. F. Wu. "Dear Friends: We have been here in Ithaca exactly five months and we are glad to inform you that we are coming home this fall.....I expect to complete my work around the middle of April. We will then leave Cornell and spend about eight weeks in visiting the museums in Philadelphia, Cambridge, New York, and Washington. We will sail for Europe some time in June and will sail for Shanghai in August, expecting to arrive in Shanghai before the middle of September.....We are very grateful to our friends for many interesting letters and news and we want to apologize for not having been able to keep up with our correspondence. We would like to request that from March 15 to June 20 all mail intended for us be addressed care of Dr. N. I have given two talks on Higher Education in China, and later Dr. Hunter of Tungchow and I are going to give another talk on this subject to the Faculty Club. People here are getting more and more interested in the activities of the Cornell in China Club..... We are well provided with news from home from different angles and hear regularly from our daughter in Soochow. We are now looking forward to the pleasure of seeing you again in the near future. Mrs. Wu joins me in sending you our kindest regards."

Letter From Mrs. Faucett: "Lawrence is working like a fiend, trying to get a set of books ready for Bengal which he has been asked to prepare. The series have been a great success so far. Turkey has adopted them for use in all government schools for three years with an option on five years. The first edition was sold out some time ago. He also is holding demonstration classes at the Stamboul Licée, and has to draw up a report for the Government next month. He had a strenuous time in London where the India Office put a desk at his disposal so that he could work on this Bengali Stuff. He saw Malbeth whom we have left in a splendid school at Bournemouth, who is getting wonderfully English !!"

PERSONAL NEWS

Dr. Leonard Hsü has been ill during the last few days, due partly to fatigue. In addition to serving as Adviser to the Ministry of Industries, he has been appointed concurrently Chairman of the Silver Committee, member of the Committee on Commercial Treaties of the Ministry of Industries, and Vice-director of the Bureau of Ruxal Reconstruction of the National Economic Council.

Hr. Wang Mu-k'e, of the class of 1932 and now with the Peiping Y. M. C. A., has been appointed technical assistant (技佐) in rural cooperation by the National Economic Council.


PERSONAL NOTES

Hiss Burtt—The Yenching Community will be glad to hear that word has come from Miss Burtt saying that plans have been made for her to return to Yenching. We hope to hear soon the dates of her arrival. On her return to China she will first spend a few months at the College of Chinese Studies.

From Chao-ying Mong: "I am glad to say that the second term of study is well under way with me. I am carrying about the same courses as last term and I enjoy them tremendously both in the courses themselves and in the way they are arranged and conducted here. I recently started on a research problem, assisting Professor Potapenko in his work and then I can choose any one of the following two topics: First, Intersteller Communication: and second, Communication with Ultra-Short Radio Waves. In the meantime I am practicing making special vaccum tubes for the production of Ultra-Short waves-radio waves of wave length of the order of one centimeter or less......It is a great pleasure to me to say that the work of Professor Hsieh with Professor Houston here has raised high praise in the scientific circle. I think that the quotation from 'Science Letters' will give a better picture of their work than I can depict..... 'The most highly developed parts of that highly developed field of the new physics, quantum mechanics, are not good enough to predict the results of clever experimenters. The Zeeman effect, which describes the behavior of an atom in a magnetic field, and the light given out by the hydrogen atom are the subjects under fire. So complacent is the physicist about these matters that the discrepancies would not be believed were they not put forward by the highest authority in the field. Prof. V. W. Houston, who has announced these results obtained at the California Institute of Technology with the collaboration of Prof. Y. M. Hsieh of Yenching University in China and L. E. Kinsler, a graduate student, is known to have done the best experimental work in both these fields. He is at the same time one of the country's foremost thereoretical physicists so that his interpretaions must be considered as quite reliable.

'In the other experiments with Prof. Hsieh on the fine structure of the hydrogen spectrum the results are startingly different from the predictions of the equation of Prof. P. A. M. Dirac, Boitish physicist. This equation represents the pinnacle of achievement in theoretical physics and was the main contribution of Prof. Dirac, who recently was awarded the Nobel Prize. But Prof. Houson and Hsieh show that even this equation is not good enough for exact work."'

Gonference on Higher Education. The subject for consideration next Tuesday evening is, "Yenching's Function in the Synthesis of Chinese and Western Culture. The report of the League of Nations Mission of Educational Experts to China, published last year, asserts repeatedly that Education and culture from the West must be more completely integrated with China's own culture. Schools and universities, so it is stated, are much too foreign. If these criticisms are just, what changes should be made, and in particular, what should be the attitude and policy of Yenching?

Porter have been invited to be present, to introduce the theme with short addresses, and to take part in the discussion. All members of the faculty are invited to be present and participate.

Another printed letter by Dr. Stuart is being mailed to the members of the Advisory Council in America and other University friends. If members of the faculty desire copies for a similar purpose they may be obtained from the President's Office.



A WORD ON THE STUDENT DIVISION OF THE MILLION DOLLAR CAMPAIGN

All of us probably have a vague idea that the students are also trying to do something for the Million Dollar Campaign, and that they have set their goal at \$400,000.00. Beyond this our idea is probably not any too clear, and most of us, no doubt, would want to know more. Hence this brief statement.

Since the mass meeting last fall at which some general principles were decided and a good deal of enthusiasm stirred up, a Student Campaign Committee has been organized. The first step taken by the Committee was the organization of Shih-Jen-Tuan or Groups of Ten. Some eighty such Groups have been organized, partly by choice and partly by assignment. Several meetings have been arranged of the leaders of the Groups with the Campaign Committee and certain officers of the University. It is hoped that every member of the Group will pledge a minimum annual personal contribution of \$25.00. The pledge cards are already distributed and the Group leaders and the Campaign Committee are making strenuous efforts at getting a 100% result. The Assembly talk by Mrs. C. F. Wang last Tuesday was arranged with this purpose in view. Naturally some students are better off and some worse financially. For the former the \$25.00 minimum is not much of a problem, and it is hoped that they will be able to contribute according to their ability. For the latter it works a good deal of hardship, and yet heroic efforts are being made. A number of them have decided to do their share by working for the money. Much planning is taking place as to how this annual amount might be earned. Faculty suggestions to individual students or to the Campaign Committee will be appreciated.

It is expected that before the beginning of the Spring Vacation all students will have signed their individual pledges, and soon after they will be able to proceed with public solicitation. This will be done, however, also in a thorough-going and systematic manner. The idea is to cover the field in the most effective way and without duplication.

On the whole, one feels confident in saying that there is serious concern on the part of the student body in the welfare of their Alma Mater in spite of the frequent criticisms and comments about it. While the faculty contribution must have meant some sacrifice on the part of individual faculty members and their families, it might be encouraging for us to feel that our students are also doing their best in this common task that is so worthwhile.

Please share this news of my movements with those of my friends whom I had rather counted on seeing sooner. Please also ask that any mail for me be rather carefully laid aside until I can send instructions for it to be redirected."



HOW IS THE MILLION-DOLLAR CAMPAIGN COMING ALONG?

It is in answer to the above question which must be uppermost in the minds of those who are deeply concerned with the future of Yenching University that this statement is given.

Generally speaking, it can be said that the Campaign is making satisfactory progress. One of the most important steps taken thus far is undoubtedly the lining up of the "sponsors" or Tsan Chu Jen who represent a selected group of outstanding leaders of various walks of life of this country. Some of these "sponsors" have already started working for the Campaign and are obtaining gratifying results.

A private letter has been received indicating that one of the friends of the University has himself contributed one-third and secured from two other sources equal amounts making a total of \$30,000 to be paid over a five-year period. While this is not a formal pledge, it is an encouraging bit of news.

Another "sponsor" sent in a check for \$4,050 toward the Endowment Fund about two weeks ago shortly before sailing for the United States. Still another "sponsor," contributed on behalf of the Sin Wan Pao \$1,000 toward the journalism work of Yenching.

The alumni groups in Peiping, Tientsin, Nanking, and Shanghai are organizing themselves for the drive. A letter has been received from the alumni group in Foochow pledging their best support to the Campaign. Alumni in the other centres are expected to respond likewise. The general strategy adopted by these groups as well as by the student body on the campus is first to solicit among themselves and then among a selected constituency composed mainly of their relatives and friends.

The Peiping alumni, who started the drive among themselves last week, hope to have it completed by April 17 in order that they can devote their whole attention and energy to the larger Campaign. The students are also quietly canvassing among themselves. When this process is completed, they shall then be in a position to play their part in securing contributions from outside. The faculty

pledges have almost reached the objective of \$100,000. According to a report from the Treasurer's office more than \$9,000 has already been paid in.

Thus the Campaign stands. What has been done or accomplished constitutes a very small beginning of a gigantic task. There is a long, long way to go yet before we reach the final goal of \$1,000,000. But we shall eventually get there if all of us, faculty members and students, alumni and friends, are unitedly determined to make the Campagin a full success.

MARCH AGADEMIC SUMMARY FROM THE OFFICE OF THE DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

Visit of Inspectors from the Ministry of Education:

The six especially appointed Inspectors of Higher Education from the Ministry of Education were guests on our campus Saturday, March 31. In the course of a very thorough inspection, special attention was paid to classroom conduct, office efficiency, equipment of the science departments, library books, student life and athletics. The administrative officers of the University entertained them at lunch, and the faculty held a reception in their honor in the afternoon. Before leaving, they gave informal expression of satisfaction over several phases of the University.

Interdepartmental Cooperation in the Training of Major Students:

In pursuance of the recommendation in the Report of the Committee on Academic Policy, several departments are making plans to develop an interdepartmental program or programs for the training of students in their major studies. A concrete plan has been drawn up by the departments of Education and Music in this direction. Although such plans will raise certain problems under the present arrangement of academic administration, the Deans' Committee feels that the principle involved is very valuable and that the plan should be given a trial. It is hoped that experiences from this experiment will serve as a basis for a set of general regulations to be drafted at a later date.

Scheduling of Sophomore Courses:

The effort to schedule in a systematic way all of the Freshman courses last spring seems to have produced satisfactory

results. Plans are being made to extend this systematic scheduling to the Sophomore level this spring with a view to eliminating as much conflict and securing as much freedom of choice for students as possible. Faculty members concerned will be invited to participate in a conference on this matter soon after the spring vacation.

Current List of Thesis Topics:

Following the practice of last year, a list of the topics of theses that are being prepared by the candidates for the Master's and Bachelor's degrees at the coming Commencement has been compiled and printed by this office. Copies of this list have been distributed to members of the faculty concerned through departments. Extra copies may be had upon application at the Office by officers of the University either for personal interest or for other useful purposes.

A comprehensive catalogue of all the graduation theses in Yenching has also been prepared by the Librarian. The Council at its next meeting will decide whether the catalogue should be printed and how widely it should be distributed.

Revision of List of University Fees:

Beginning with the next academic year, certain modifications to the list of student fees payable to the University will become effective. The notable modification is the increase of laboratory fees to bring them more in keeping with the actual cost of students' work in the laboratories.

Council of Secondary Education .

The Council of Secondary Education of the Christian Educational Association has called a conference for April 24-27 at Shanghai. The University has asked Professor Galt to attend the conference as its representative. Efforts are being made to reorganize the Regional Association of Secondary Education in North China. Yenching has promised to make its contribution to the Association by providing living accommodations and office facilities to its Secretary in the University.

Living Giant Salamanders—Four small specimens of these interesting primitive animals are now on view in the Biology Department Vivarium. They were procured with great difficulty by Dr. Lew Tingwei of Shanghai College, by special arrangement with a Shanghai restaurant. Their native habitat is the high mountain streams of West and Southwest China. They were brought by hand to the P.U.M.C. Immediately before the Retreat, at 2:00 o'clock a number of pictures will be taken (group pictures of Fellowship members, of officers of the various departments, etc.) These pictures will appear in the Annual report which is being prepared especially for the Annual meeting on May 11.

Faculty Rural Reconstruction Discussion. Dr. John B. Grant has kindly consented to lead the discussion next Tuesday evening. The topic will be something like "Medical Service in Rural Reconstruction in China". Those of us who were present at the Pre-Sessional Conference last fall and heard Dr. Grant's statement at the time are all no doubt eager to discuss with him more at length this line of rural reconstruction. Dr. Chen of Tinghsien might possibly be with us also. The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. as usual and all interested are welcome to attend.

University Lecture. Professor George Birkhoff, the distinguished Mathematician of Harvard University, now lecturing at Peita, and who has lectured at several universities in Japan, has consented to speak at Yenching on some interesting new attitudes and movements in American Education. Note the change to Friday.

No Friday Fellowship Group. On account of the Home Coming Day activities, there will be no meeting of the Friday Fellowship Group on Friday, April 27.

Dr. Stuart left on Wednesday, April 18, for a short trip to Shanghai in connection with certain aspects of the Endowment Campaign. He will return in about a week.

Military Fraining Review. Because of financial and other reasons the University has not been able to continue the military training program during the present year. Therefore the Senior and Junior men students, who had undergone military training during the previous years were asked to participate in the military training inspection ordered by the Government inspector. An intensive review

schedule was worked out for part of last week and part of the present week. The cadets were given a preliminary inspection by the administrative officers of the University on Tuesday, April 17. The students appeared in good spirits, and the drill gave evidence of sound discipline. The official review took place on the Tsing Hua field on the following morning. Both Yenching and Tsing Hua cadets participated. The Government representative seemed well satisfied with the performance and made special mention of the spirit of the Yenching troop.

Because of the drill schedule, the class attendance of the students involved has had to be somewhat irregular during the last few days. This is not only necessary but also has proved to be worthwhile as evidenced by the results. The experience has demonstrated to the University and to the students themselves that military training can be properly conducted, and, when properly conducted, can be of great educational value in cultivating such virtues as discipline, punctuality, and organized social living. Therefore it is not only gratifying to see that we have been able to pass the Government examination with honors, so to speak, but also to think that military training can be undertaken by the University in a serious manner beginning with the next academic year.

PERSONAL NOTES

From Dean Chou. "Here I am on the Baltic Sea on my way to Russia for an education tour. The party consists of about twenty people who are either directly or indirectly connected with education.... I left England two weeks earlier than the party in order to see Denmark. Hung Chiin was very good to arrange everything for me, so we utilized our time to the best advantage. We even took advantage of Sundays and Easter holidays. Hung Chiin is full of energy and spirit and I am very glad he came out. I am sure he will bring back to Yenching many new ideas. I have been in Denmark for two weeks during which we visited the Ministries of Education and Agriculture, technical colleges and schools, agricultural colleges and schools, folk high schools, experimental stations, domestic training schools of various kinds, and farmers' homes, etc. We found that things were extremely interesting and there is a great deal we can learn from them. Hung Chun is going to stay there for another week or ten days before he proceeds to Berlin. The party will visit Leningrad, Moscow, and Kharkov in Russia and then go back to England through Poland, Germany, and Holland. I shall arrange to stay in Germany for a week or so to visit schools. I think I shall meet Hung Chiin again in Berlin. The third term will be over about June 10 and I shall try to do a little visiting before I return in July. Please give my kindest regards to folks in

News from Miss Hague—"I spent most of the winter months in Toronto and now my plans are shaping. I expect to be in New York for a few days at the time of the Trustees' meeting, April 25, which I am graciously invited to attend! APRIL ACADEMIC SUMMARY FROM THE OFFICE OF THE DIRECTOR OF STUDIES

Military Training

The outcome of the Military Training review by the Government official has already been reported in a previous issue of the Bulletin. Because of the arrival of the Drill Master for Yenching appointed by the Government, the Freshmen men students have started on the Military Training program for the balance of this year. Beginning with next year Sophomore and Freshmen men students will be required to take Military Training.

Graduation Examination Committee

In accordance with the Government regulations, a Graduation Examination Committee is being organized. The Chancellor will serve as the ex-officio Chairman of the Committee and the other members will include the Deans of the three Undergraduate Colleges, the Director of Studies, faculty members of professorial rank and qualified scholars from outside of the University. Practically every department has suggested one outside scholar, and a letter of invitatiou is being sent to them by the University inviting them to serve on the Graduation Examination Committee upon the approval of the Ministry of Education. A full list of the Committee with a list of the candidates for graduation will be submitted to the Ministry of Education for approval.

Request From Seniors Concerning Graduation Theses

A request from a group of Senior students asking for exemption from handing in the second copy of the graduation thesis has been received. The only additional reason to what has already been forwarded by students in other years is the financial need of the students on account of the Million Dollar Campaign. The matter has been given careful consideration by the Deans' Committee. The Committee has not felt it possible to waive this requirement, especially in view of the probable examination of the graduation theses by the Ministry of Education at Nanking.

Changes Regarding Use of Bashford Auditorium.

Died. A cable from La Mesa, California, reports the death of Mr. James Wolcott Porter at the age of ninety-six years and two months. Mr. Porter was a devoted friend of Yenching, contributing \$100,000.00 to its Endowment funds and giving a separate sum to make possible the Pagoda which bears his name Po Ya T'a. Mr. Porter was deeply interested in the missionary work of his sister and brother, contributing generously himself to the work of the North China Kung Li Hui, and securing large gifts to its work, from Mrs. Otto Tank of whose estate he was executor. Mrs. Tank gave the first large gift, \$30,000.00 to North China Union College, now represented in the original buildings of Lu Ho Middle School at T'unghsien; she also gave money for building Teng Shih K'ou Congregational Church and parish house; other gifts were made to Bridgman Academy and the Union Women's Bible School. Mr. Porter made possible the transfer of Kung Li Hui work from P'ang Chuang to Te Chou, in Shantung where the large plant including the Porter Hospital for women and Porter Academy are memorials to his mother and brother. His mother's name is also pertetuated in the Eliza Chappel Porter Kindergarten in Peking, and a building bearing her name in the Union Kindergarten and Training School in Foo Chow. Mr. James Porter regarded himself as a "silent Porter" in Christian work in China. He visited China in 1906, 1912 and 1917. In America he contributed funds for Endowment and for Mary Porter Hall and Hadley Cottage at Pilgrim Place, Claremont, a haven for retired Christian and Educational workers at

Mr. Porter's home, Rose Hedge, La Mesa, California, was a place of charm and beauty always open to guests and visitors from China, and a center of love and light for the community to the interest of which he also gave generously.

Mr. Porter's strength of character and his vital interest in all constructive movements in the modern world made him an inspiring personality to the very end of his life. He was a true Modern Saint.

PERSONAL NOTES

From a Former Faculty Member. "Could you please pretend that I still belong to the faculty group and let my small contribution count toward the Endowment rather than the deficit? I am staggered that the faculty could give \$92,000....... This carries lasting warm affection for Yenching and deepest gratitude for the privilege of having worked with you, and prayers for more freedom through more truth for more service, through all the years of Yenching."

From Hsiao Chih-chien, Yenching M.S. in Chemistry 1932, now studying at the University of Michigan: "I believe I told you about the courses I took last semester. I got along very well. After the final examination I attempted the first set of preliminary examinations toward the doctorate, and have passed them all. This set covers six subjects: Engineering materials, unit operations, metallurgy, inorganic technology, organic technology, and fuel combustion, and is considered as a prerequisite for a Ph. D. applicant. This semester, I registered for some advanced courses in fluid flow, heat transfer, evaporations, distillations, etc. and some courses connected with furnace design and control, at the same time spending some time in my research. I got the Chinese coal samples from the Geological Survey in February, say now that I'll be able to finish everything here within two years. The school requires me to take many courses, which, though quite beneficial to me in the training along engineering lines, take too much time. I have to leave things to the future to see how they turn out eventually.....I am proud to tell you that I've been initiated to both the Sigma Xi and the Iota Alpha Engineering Research Society. It will certainly add a little honor to our dear old Yenching."

(Note from his former teacher at Yenching: "Michigan has high standards in this department and his record seems to me to be extraordinary").

**EXTENSION OF ELECTRIC LIGHT SERVICE.** Last year as an experiment the electric current in the residences was extended to midnight. The Power Station meter showed that the consumption after eleven o'clock was not heavy. If, however, there is a real demand for the extra light this year, the Power House management is willing to extend it again. The Controller will appreciate knowing the wishes of the community on the matter.

SMALLEST RADIO TUBE EVERY FASHIONED. Dr. Meng Chao-ying, a lecturer in the Department of Physics, has just returned to Yenching after a three years' study at the California Institute of Technology, U.S.A. With his wonderful dexterity, he has constructed several "baby" radio tubes which have received world-wide attention. The inside diameter of the plate is only one-half millimeter and the grid diameter is even much smaller, two-tenths of a millimeter, which is smaller than the eye of an ordinary housefly. The shortest wave-length that can be generated by such a little tiny tube is but one centimeter long. The construction of the tube has undoubtedly both theoretical significance and practical possibilities.

Having secured his Ph. D. degree early last June, Dr. Meng immediately proceeded to the East, learning the technique of making commercial radio tubes at the Electrical Engineering Laboratory of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Dr. Meng will continue his research in the Physics Laboratory at Yenching.

The University Controller, Mr. Stephen Ts'ai, will present a report on the workings of University Schemes in the fields of salaries, wages, annuities, pensions, insurance, etc. All members of the Faculty and staff are invited to be present and to participate in the discussion.

Reception for Ambassador and Mrs. Johnson. The Reception originally planned for October 12, will be held on Thursday, October 22, from 5 to 6:30 p.m. at the President's House. All members of the faculty and their wives are cordially invited.

Joint Service. In this service we want to explore together the possibilities of creative Prayer, and of finding out God's plan for us in meeting the needs of China.

Ping Min Hospital, Haitien. Members of the Yenching community will probably be interested in the People's Hospital opened some six months ago in Haitien. This hospital is run under the auspices of the Peiping Municipal Government, and is one of five, four in the suburbs of Peiping, and one outside Hatamen. The Haitien hospital is in a splendid building, is beautifully clean, up-to-date, and well equipped. They have at present eight beds only, most of their work being with out-patients. They have had as many as 350 out-patients in a day, though their average is around 200. It is interesting to note that during July and August the women patients outnumbered the men. The charge for out-patients is two big coppers a visit; for in-patients forty cents a day first class, and twenty cents a day second class. This charge covers food only, attendance and operations being free. The superintendent in charge is Dr. Tsao, and he is assisted by five other doctors, who in addition to seeing patients at the hospital, will also visit

homes, making a charge of \$1.00 for the first visit. About nineteen nurses (men and women) serve the hospital, and there is also a nurses' training school. A patient recommended by a member of the Yenching community was operated on by Dr. Tsao some three week's ago, and is making a good recovery, and speaks with feeling of the good treatment she has received there. The hospital can be reached by telephone. Dr. T. C. Li or Miss Dora Bent will be glad to assist any members of the community who may wish to get in touch with the hospital, or who would like further information about it.

Faculty members and students not enrolled in this course are welcome.

HARVARD-YENCHING INSTITUTE MUSEUM. The committee in charge of the little museum of the Institute, which was recently opened to the public, has been surprised and greatly pleased by the interest that has been shown in the exhibits. A number of distinguished visitors from Peiping took advantage of the opening day last week to visit the museum, and since then visitors have continued to stream through the rooms. The museum was especially busy over the weekend. A group of nurses from the P.U.M.C. was brought out on Saturday afternoon, and on Sunday a second group arrived, together with the entire Ming

Ming School, in charge of the principal, Dr. Sui Wang. The exhibits are arranged so as to show a continuing story of early Chinese history, beginning with bones from the cave where the skull of the Peking Man was found, pottery of five thousand years ago, oracle bones and bronzes of the Shang period, and so on down to more modern days of Tang and Sung. Much interest was shown by the visitors in Mr. Schuster's folk embroideries which he most kindly allowed to be exhibited during this opening week.

If parents or teachers from the Foreign or Chinese schools on our campus would like to bring groups of children, the curators will be delighted to show them around and explain the exhibits, provided the time is arranged in advance. The museum does not plan to be open on Saturday afternoons or Sunday, unless by special arrangement.

## AGNES LEARMONTH MEMORIAL

A Committee consisting of Mrs. Porter, Mrs. Shadick, Miss Bent, Dr. Learmonth, Dr. T. C. Li, Mr. Ts'ai, and Mr. Bevan (convener), met on October 8 to discuss the administration of the fund in memory of Mrs. Learmonth.

It was decided that the funds available be administered by a self-perpetuating Board of Seven Trustees acting through a small executive committee composed of the manager, treasurer, and secretary.

It was decided that the funds should be used at the discretion of the committee, the Board of Trustees exercising supervision. The Board will meet as occasion demands, but at least once a year when the committee will make a report of its activities.

It was decided that the funds shall be used in principle in the following ways, though the committee shall have the liberty to use its discretion, and is not bound to any strictly determined programme:

- I. The locally collected funds to be used for financing the work in connection with Mrs. Learmonth's so-called "lame ducks", who generally are not "economic" producers, and for the relief, medical and otherwise, of this group.
- II. Other funds may be used more particularly for:
  - (a) General relief in needy cases—warm clothing, coffins, subsidies for those temporarily out of work, special food (milk, cod liver oil, etc.)
  - (b) Medical expenditures such as payment of hospital bills, medical treatment, transportation to and from hospitals, etc.
- III. Special cases as they may arise. (Already part payment for the schooling of a deaf and dumb girl is being supplied).

The proposals of this committee for the guidance of future action have been made with the purpose of ensuring as far as possible the continuance of the kinds of charitable work which were particularly near to Mrs. Learmonth's heart.

There are funds immediately available for cases under paragraph I of about \$600 locally contributed, and from stock in hand a few hundreds of dollars.

#### YENTA RELIEF FEDERATION

The Annual Meeting of the Yenta Relief Federation was held on November 25. The following were elected for the coming year: President: Miss K. K. Lei; Secretary: Miss Chia Yuan-ti; Treasurer: Mrs. L. E. Wolferz; Head of Investigation Department: Miss K. K. Lei; Head of Family Case Work Department: Miss Dora Bent.

The Yenta Relief Federation was first organised in 1930 with the purpose of co-ordinating all the relief work done by the various agencies in the Yenching community, and trying to prevent poverty by the application of scientific principles of relief. Its funds have been derived mainly from the Community Chest, and its aim is to investigate thoroughly any case referred to it either by individuals or by organisations, and where possible to try to set poverty-stricken families or individuals on their feet. The Federation is at any time willing to investigate any cases referred to it, and to help where possible. Its chief need is for jobs for its cases—plain sewing for the women, and unskilled coolie work for the men.

During the last sixteen months forty-two new cases have been investigated by the Family Case Work Division, and many old ones have been revisited and help given. The case worker has paid upwards of 300 visits during the year in order to find out at first hand what is the situation, and to try to meet the needs of the family or individual in the most effective way.

Members of the Yenching community who contribute so generously to our work through the Community Chest may like to hear briefly of some of the types of cases which have been referred to us during the year: One of the lower paid Yenching workmen was introduced to the proper department in order to get a cheap glass eye for his sister; a deaf and dumb girl of twelve years, undisciplined and untaught, has been put in the local government school for the deaf and dumb in Peiping where she will learn a trade in addition to ordinary elementary school subjects; A Yenching student whose relative wished to adopt a baby was put in touch with the Home Finding Society in Peiping, and a baby adopted; through the help of the P.U.M.C. Social Service Department an ex-soldier discharged from the army was helped back to his home in Shantung; when the father of a family died, a lean was made to his widow so that she and her eldest son could continue to make man-t'ou and keep themselves and four younger children from starvation; an ex-Yenching employee with T. B. has been found light work so that he may earn enough at home to support his family; the motherless five-year old of a West Gate ricksha coolie was given a "scholarship" into the Chengfu Nursery School so that she could be taken care of for part of the day while her father and brother are out at work.

PRICES OF DOMESTIC COAL. There seems to be some confusion about the prices of domestic coal. Last fall this office had an understanding with the T'ien Feng Coal Yard to have uniform prices of coal supplied to our Yenching households. The price list was published in this Bulletin on September 26. It was also stated, barring major courses, that the prices would hold good for the whole winter, and that there was no need of contracting forwards. Unfortunately, the war in Suiyuan broke out and it has been difficult to get rolling stock to transport coal. This, coupled with the formation of a cooperative selling organization in the Mentoukou mines has caused a rise of \$1.50 per ton for all kinds of coal. The present quotation from T'ien Feng is given hereunder. The management has assured this office that these prices will be good for the rest of the winter.
