FACULTY DISCUSSION GROUP ON RECENT DEVELOPMENTS AT TING-HSIEN. Tinghsien as a center of rural reconstruction has undergone a number of changes during the last year. What exactly are the changes and what is taking place in Tinghsien must be of great interest to the Yenching Community, especially as the University is a participant in the new program. Dr. Y. K. Chu has been visiting Tinghsien constantly. The discussion next Tuesday evening will be under his able leadership. All interested are welcome to attend.

PIANO RECITAL. On Wednesday, February 3, a Piano Recital will be given by Mrs. Mabel Rhead in Bashford Auditorium at 8:15 p.m. Mrs. Rhead is from the Department of Music of the University of Michigan and has already given much-appreciated recitals in Shanghai, Nanking, and Peiping. Yenching is fortunate in having her for this occasion, when her program will consist of compositions by Bach. As Mrs. Rhead is generously giving this recital free, there will be no admission charge. All members of the University are cordially invited.

DR. STUART will make another brief trip to Shanghai, to attend educational meetings, and also, a meeting of the Shanghai alumni, leaving Monday evening, February 1, and returning on February 8.

CHORUS PLANS FOR THE SECOND SEMESTER. For the first part of the coming semester there will be two choral groups at work, one on Messiah concerts and one on an entirely new program. The Messiah chorus will meet regularly on Tuesdays from 7 to 8 p.m. in Sage Hall, whereas the other group will meet as usual no Thursdays at 6:45 p.m. in Sage Hall. Due to the fact that the music for the new program will not be ready until February 11, there will be no meeting of this group until then. The Messiah group will first rehearse on February 4 and then on February 9.

The Chorus is scheduled to sing in the 'Kung Hsueh' Auditorium in Tientsin at 5 p.m. on Saturday, February 20. It is also planning to sing in Nanking during the spring vacation (tentative date is April 12). Due to the fact that the Shanghai Choral Society is giving the Messiah next month, we feel it would be unwise to duplicate the same music in the same season and location.

The singers in the *Messiah* concerts are selected singers, while for the new program we invite "all those who like to sing" regardless of whether they have ever sung before or not. This semester's music consists of selections from every age beginning with the 10th century. A Chinese melody has been included arranged in 'organum' and 'faux bourdon' representing 11th and 12th century types of music. Representative numbers from every century for a thousand years have been carefully selected, edited, printed and will be ready for all those desiring to participate in such an interesting and educational program. The first rehearsal is on Thursday, February 11, at 6:45 p.m. in Sage Hall.

YENCHING REPRESENTATIVE AT PARIS CONFERENCE. Mr. Shadick has been appointed Yenching representative at the International Conference on Higher Education to be held in Paris on July 26, 27, 28, in connection with the Paris Exposition. Mr. and Mrs. Shadick are planning to spend next winter in Paris.

FACTS ABOUT ALUMNI. Now that our Alumni and Alumnae are having opportunities to do more and more significant things in the various fields of their interest throughout China, it would be interesting to us all, if members of the faculty, upon learning of such activities of our graduates, through reading or otherwise, would kindly notify this office. In this connection, the following from the China Weekly Review, February 20, 1937, under "Who's Who in China" is worthy of note:

"Miss Anna An-li Huang, diplomatic official; native of Fukien; born in 1911; graduate of Yenching University, Peiping; joined the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, September 1934; appointed Attache to the Chinese Embassy in London with the brevet rank of Third Secretary, December 1936, which post she now holds; she is the first girl in the Chinese diplomatic service to have attained the rank of Secretary; well versed in English and Chinese, she also speaks German and French fluently; she is the younger sister of the well-known Chinese poet and calligrapher, Huang Chun, senior secretary of the Executive Yuan; address: Chinese Embassy, London, England."

CONTRIBUTIONS IN AMERICA. In view of the importance to us in American giving to philanthropic causes, the following may be of interest to this community:

Lowest Percentage. In spite of returning prosperity, the people of the United States last year registered the lowest percentage of giving to church, education, and philanthropy that has been recorded in any year since 1925, according to Charles V. Vickrey, president of The Golden Rule Foundation, presenting a report to the National Committee for Religion and Welfare Recovery.

Mr. Vickrey bases his findings in part upon the official preliminary report just issued by the U.S. Treasury Department. Income tax returns for 1935 indicate a total net taxable income of \$14,656,079,000, with \$305,279,000, or 2.083 per cent, deducted as contributions. In 1932, the net taxable income was \$11,055,757,000, with \$304,009,000, or 2.608 per cent, deducted as contributions.

A study of the Treasury Department's income tax reports for the past 20 years reveals that at no time have the deductible contributions reached as high as 3 per cent. They have hovered rather closely around 2 per cent—scarcely within speaking distance of the Biblical tithe or the 15 per cent which our government offers to exempt from taxation if contributed to religious, educational, scientific, character-building, or other forms of social service.

"Strange as it may seem, the depression year of 1932 produced the highest percentage of giving that has ever been recorded," said Mr. Vickrey. "Does it require suffering to produce sacrificial giving?" and "Can sterling character be developed without sacrifice?" are two questions suggested by this report.

Books of General Interest for the Library. The Committee responsible for purchasing books of general interest (in English) for the University Library is faced with the problem of attempting to buy some of the more important recent publications and also to fill some of the worst lacunae in earlier periods. FROM DR. SHUHSI HSU. Dr. Shuhsi Hsü would like to correct an impression which a passage in the last issue of this bulletin referring to his work may have created in the mind of the readers. He wishes to state that the Council of International Affairs which issues the Information Bulletin referred to in the passage is an independent organization; and that his being adviser to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and at the same time director of the said Council is purely accidental.

DR. LEONARD HSU is engaged in several interesting undertakings. He is planning to go to Java this summer as a delegate of the Chinese Government to attend a conference on rural hygiene under the auspices of the League of Nations, and is to present a paper on Rural Reconstruction in China. Also, at the January meeting of the Council of the League of Nations he was elected for three years a Corresponding Member of the Economic Committee of the League of Nations.

ALUMNI NOTE. Extract from a letter from Mr. Silcock: "I think you will like to know how well Fei Hsiao-Tung is getting on. He is a bright example of the way to make contacts and get the best out of his experience in this country. He came to see me a day or two ago and is evidently in very close touch with the two professors who are in charge of his work and sees a good deal of them in a friendly way as well as in the class room. He has been able, through the kindness of Professor Malinowski, to stay in the home of a cultured widow lady who has a good many friends constantly in and out of her house, so that he has a splendid introduction to English social life."

MR. H. C. CHANG has been hoping to return to Yenching for consultation on various matters, but has been delayed by pressure of duties in Tsinging. He is now hoping to return about the 25th of this month.

BARON ALEXANDER VON STAEL-HOLSTEIN, who passed away at the German Hospital on March 16, had been related to Yenching University through the Harvard-Yenching Institute for more than ten years. A subvention from the Hall Estate funds, made at the recommendation of President Stuart, made it possible for the baron to continue his studies in Peking from the summer of 1926. In 1928, he was invited to Harvard University, at the time when Professors William Hung and Lucius Porter also went there. With the organization of the Harvard-Yenching Institute, the baron was appointed as a professor of Harvard University in the field of Sino-Indian studies, but resident in Peiping, where he organized the Sino-Indian Institute with funds from the Harvard-Yenching Institute. Baron von Stael-Holstein was a distinguished scholar in Sanskrit and Tibetan literature dealing with Buddhism. He was occupied with translation of Buddhists texts and commentary upon them, using versions in the three sacred languages of Buddhism, Sanskrit, Tibetan and Chinese. His special contribution to scholarship came in the use made of Chinese and Tibetan works in elucidating the meaning of the Buddhist sutras in their Sanzkrit form. The baron was always a warm friend of Yenching University.

YENCHING GRADUATE AT THE CAVENDISH LABORATORY, ENGLAND. After being admitted to the Cavendish Laboratory of Cambridge University, of which Lord Ernest Rutherford is the Director, Chang Wenyü has made great progress in his study and has published the following papers:

Not long after her marriage Mrs. Barker developed heart disease and had to limit her physical activities. Indeed, after they left here and went to Manchuria she was practically an invalid. But her brave spirit never failed nor allowed her to cease from thinking first of others.

The cold of Manchuria was too severe for her, so last autumn after a summer at Peitaiho, they went to winter in Florida. The warm weather there was said to do her great good. Three months ago we heard that she had a stroke, but were soon relieved to know that she had quickly recovered. Suddenly within the last few days the news reached us of her death.

She will be mourned by many who knew her as a staunch friend, and who will grieve for the suffering of their old friend Tom Barker.

Dogs. An arrangement has been made with Dr. Benaradsky V. M. D. to take care of our campus dogs (in place of Mr. Tolstikoff who died last spring). Dr. Benaradsky is willing to come to us each spring and give the anti-rabies inoculation, and again in the antumu, when the mosquito season is past, to give a microscopic test for heart worms, this yearly treatment to cost \$5.50 per dog, large or small. On each visit he will in addition give each dog a careful inspection to see if it is in good condition.

Dr. Benaradsky is the first veterinary in Peiping to be able to give a scientific test for heart worms, an expensive and difficult disease to cure if it cannot be checked at the start. He is the veterinary for the Peiping Dog Show and for our own dairy.

REPORT ON RELIEF PLANS FOR THE YENCHING COMMUNITY

The University Committee on Local relief work appointed by President Stuart about the middle of September undertook two tasks: 1. To raise money for relief work. This was done by becoming responsible for the Community Chest and by appealing to the faculty and staff for contributions from October salaries. The response to the appeal was generous and the Committee appreciates the ready cooperation from the members of the University. A report of the funds secured will be made later. 2. To secure the organization of a committee so constituted as best to undertake the actual administration of relief work. This was accomplished by securing a committee of seven with personnel and representation as follows:

It is the expectation that the University Committee first appointed will appropriate to this second more representative committe, the sums from the Community Chest for relief work. And it is the hope that some of the organizations represented on the Relief Administrative committee may also be able to provide some sums for the common task.

The Relief Administrative Committee, believing that conditions of destitution will be such as to require continuous efforts throughout the winter season, has opened an office in Ch'eng Fu, in the compound of the No. 1 Kung Chang, in rooms very generously leaned by that organization to the Committee. A full-time secretary, Mr. Hao, has been engaged for

both office and field work. All the members of the Committee are cooperating by contributing of their time on a voluntary basis. Miss Cookingham has generously consented to have the Bursar's Office serve as Treasurer's Office for the Committee.

The plan reported above has been adopted in order to centralize and make as efficient as possible the relief work in the University community this season. The Committee will appreciate it if all cases of need coming to the attention of members of the University are reported to the Committee; and the Committee also requests that if faculty members, for special or personel reasons, wish to give relief to individual cases directly, that they report such plans to the Committee, in order that there may be neither confusion nor duplication in the general task.

The first major task of the Committee will be to make a general survey of community needs. In this, and in the later administration of the relief, it is the hope that students from the Social Work Division of the Department of Sociology may participate.

The office hours of the Committee's secretary in the Ch'eng Fu office will be from 9:00 to 12:00 a.m. daily except Sunday.

Any reduction on them will affect the University income and will increase the deficit which the present salary cut hopes to alleviate.

After giving the matter its most careful consideration, the Administrative Committee decided to continue the present charges without change.

An Open Letter to the Organizations of Peking :-

The suggestion has been made in the Executive Committee of the Peking Mothers' Club that many people this winter would be interested in a Christmas Greetings Club similar to that which has been carried on for several years by members of the PUMC. Such a club means that money ordinarily spent for Christmas cards would instead be contributed through a central treasurer to the charitable organizations of our city. The Christmas greetings would than be conveyed to one's friends through a published list of names under a suitable heading in the Peking Chronicle. Each person would be urged to designate the organization to which his contribution should be given, but if unlabeled it would be divided equally among organized charities. The list would be published first on Dec. 15 and additions would be made daily through Christmas Day. Mrs. R. L. Creighton, 14 Erh Tiao Hutung, An Ting Men Nei, has consented to act as treasurer. If the plan finds favor with you, she will receive your check, together with your indication as to the use of the gift, and she will issue you a receipt. All accounts will be carefully audited.

Two remarks are in order. Like many good ideas, this one started late, so it seemed necessary to formulate the plans at once without waiting to obtain valuable suggestions from each organization. If the scheme works this year, it can doubtless be improved upon next. Moreover since organizations in Peking overlap in membership, many people will hear of this plan in more than one connection. This seems unavoidable since, due to the shortness of the time before you would normally be buying your local Christmas cards, we can think of no other satisfactory way of sending out a general notification.
