DR. J. C. LI RETURNING. Word has been received that Dr. J. C. Li and family and six students left Hongkong for Tientsin December 26 on the S. S. Yochow, which means that they will be back at Yenching probably before the middle of January.

FROM DR. HSU. Dr. and Mrs. Shuhsi Hsu send their Christmas greetings to their colleagues and students in Yenching. "May we unite in wishing that peace will soon return to the earth and good will again prevail among men".

FROM MR. 78'Al. Letters have been received from Mr. Stephen Ts'ai, one en route to Hongkong where he boarded the Empress of Asia, leaving December 10. He had met with a group of over thirty Yenching students and alumni. Many of the students are eager to return to Yenching for the spring semester. The other letter was sent from Yokohama, dated December 18, on board the Empress of Asia where there were only 16 passenger in tourist class. Quoting, "This boat spent one whole day in rushing to the rescue of the Hoover. We were near Foochow when the SOS call from the Hoover was picked up. With full steam we reached the scene at 10 p.m. We couldn't see her very clearly but were told by another boat standing by that our help was not needed as the McKinley was coming from Hongkong. We lost about twelve hours, but had plenty of time according to schedule, as we did not call at Shanghai." Mr. Ts'ai expects to reach New York about January. 4.

MRS. WOLFERZ' DEPARTURE. Mrs. Louis Wolferz left Yenching last Thursday for her home in Ann Arbor, Michigan, where she will have medical treatment. She hopes to return to China in a few months.

FROM THE SALVATION ARMY. A letter has been received from Commissioner Benwell of the Salvation Army telling of the thousands of cases of destitution in the city, and saying that they appreciate the fact that Yenching has helped them as well as our relief work here.

North China Council for Rural Reconstruction" has recently adopted new arrangements: 1. Seventeen people are to be sent to Kweichow to help in the provincial program. This will probably follow three lines. The Institute will help in a provincial investigation, in planning, and in experiment. The staff of the Institute will assume the primary responsibility with the help of the provincial government and other educational institutions in Kweichow. 2. Seventeen are to work in Szechuan. Some will aid in the work at Shih Yen Hsiang experiment at Paisha. Another group will work in Yung chuan. This work in Szechuan is to help in the training program being worked out there, but is primarily to secure data to discover future possibilities for the Institute.

with, an old and slow steamer. It has an immense capacity for cargo and we have been delayed at Chefoo and Tsingtao by endless shipments of peanuts, beans, and other Shantung products. At the latter port we spent 49 hours, delayed in part by the quarantine officer. Of course regulations against working cargo from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. aggravate the delays. We are due in Shanghai early tomorrow morning and unless we have fog I should make the connection for Hongkong with just enough time. This uncertainty has of course added to my anxious impatience. I have sent a radio message asking what hour the Potsdam sails tomorrow and am waiting for the reply which we may never get because even the wireless equipment is defective. As against all this, we have had continuously good weather, very friendly officers and fellow passengers, comfortable indolence for enforced rest and the reading I only have apparently on steamers. So if we arrive without mishap tomorrow morning and I get aboard the Potsdam I shall not complain overmuch. We have had almost no news which adds to my restlessness, only tantalizing scraps. Greetings to everyone."

A second letter, received several days later, indicates that he expected to be able to make the connection easily with the Potsdam,

'A GERMAN REQUIEM' by Johannes Brahms will be sung by the Chorus on Saturday, May 28, at 7 P.M. in Bashford Auditorium. This is an inspired work for chorus, and takes its place among the greatest achievements of civilization in the field of music. Because of its difficulty few choral groups are willing or able to produce this music. On the other hand, its transcendent beauty, the eternal message of comfort, hope, and faith as expressed through some of the choicest bits of Biblical literature (arranged by the composer himself) have removed all difficulties and have released the power for the overcoming of obstacles.

It was first produced seventy years ago as a memorial to the mother of the composer who had died three years previously. The title 'A German Requiem' is in contrast to the Latin Requiems sung at memorial services in Roman Catholic Churches. In the Latin liturgy the very first words in this service are "Requiem aeternam pacem" (Rest in eternal peace) from which the whole service receives its name. In the Requiem by Brahms he has chosen the words "Blessed are they that mourn" for the opening words. Because these words are non-traditional and because this work is not a liturgical one, he has chosen to call it a German Requiem.

The Committee on Community Welfare, corresponding to the Relief Committee of last year, was appointed by President Stuart at the time when the Community Chest campaign was undertaken.

Immediately upon the close of the Community Chest campaign the Committee met to organize and discuss the plans for its work. Mrs. J. C. Li, Chairman of the Community Chest Committee, had reported that about \$2500 would be available from the Community Chest. This sum, with nearly \$400 remaining from the Relief Committee's funds of last year, provided about \$2900 with which the present Committee is undertaking the year's work. This sum is much smaller than the total sum used by last year's Committee and it is hoped that other contributions from various sources may be received later.

The Controller's Office has generously made available for the Committee's office and centre of work, the University residence in Ch'eng Fu, No. 13 Hsi Yang Hutung—the same place which the Committee used last spring.

Mr. Hao Hwa-feng, the office secretary of last year, now enrolled in the Short Course in the School of Religion, is available for two days each week (Friday and Saturday) and the Committee is glad to retain his service on a part time basis. In addition, a new Secretary, Mr. Fan En-chu, has been engaged for full time. Mr. Fan, whose home in Haitien and whose mother has a position in the Women's College, is a graduate of the Lu Ho Middle School, and seems well qualified for the Committee's work.

In general, relief work will be undertaken according to the plans of last year. Applicants for relief should go (during the forenoons) to the Committee's office for registration. Subsequently each case will be investigated and measures of relief, within the general policies and resources of the Committee, will be adopted.

The Committee is grateful to the community for the generous contributions which enable the Committee to begin its work, and will appreciate sympathy, criticism, and cooperation as the work develops. In particular, the Committee would like to be informed of any vacancies which may be filled by men or women laborers.

 ${\it Later.} - {\it After}$ the above report was written the Committee held its third regular meeting and further plans were adopted.

Statements made by members of the Committee having close contacts with community life indicate that needs are more serious than last year. General conditions of poverty, unemployment and dislocation of business, compared with last year are as bad or worse, and needs are rendered more acute by the higher prices of food, clothing, and fuel. The office has been open only ten days and there have already been 78 applications for help.

The Committee has allocated funds for certain forms of relief—clothing, food, fuel, labor relief, etc.—and considers it necessary to plan at this early date for at least a small-scale porridge kitchen.

The Committee will be greatly in need of more funds before the winter is over and will welcome further contributions or reports of sources from which funds may be expected.

WINTER COLD PREVENTION INNOCULATION. The following has been received. Those who are interested in getting these preventions done, please apply at the Medical Office, Men's Infirmary.

'Cold' Vaccine

- 1. This vaccine consisting of heat killed rough Pneumococci type I is produced with an intention to study its value in preventing the secondary infection of cold. Those persons taking this vaccine are not promised that a cold will be prevented, but it is hoped that it might be milder, due to the production of heterophile antibodies in their system following these injections.
- 2. Persons receiving this vaccine are requested to furnish the following data:
 - a. Age, sex, occupation
 - Approximate number of colds in previous winters
 - Severity of the cold, the presence of fever, or bronchitis
 - d. Number of the colds after vaccination
 - Severity of the cold
- 3. The vaccine at present is put up so that the dose is o.i cc. to be given subcutaneously at three weekly doses. If desired, the injections might be continued once a week throughout the winter.

INFANT BAPTISM. Dr. J. F. Li will be pleased to hear from any parents who wish to present their children for Baptism on Christmas Day.

A SPECIAL OBJECT FOR YOUR CHRISTMAS OFFERING. The Committee on Community Welfare, as stated in last week's Bulletin, has made tentative plans for the opening of a chou ch'ang in the future.

In the spirit of the Christmas season, the Committee suggests that persons who feel inclined to help feed our more destitute neighbors may send to the Committee special Christmas contributions for the chou ch'ang.

The proposed site is the site of the former chou ch'ang, the old Temple at the southeast corner of Haitien. In this Temple there is an Industrial Orphanage partially supported by and partially under the control of, the Committee. A suitable place and equipment are available here and it is thought that the older boys in the orphanage can do much of the work. Thus the cost of operation would scarcely exceed the cost of grain and fuel. The ticket system, as adopted last year, would be used and the number of persons to be fed would be determined by careful investigation of need, and by the extent of the funds available.

Contributions, marked for this purpose, may be sent to the Chairman of the Committee, or direct to the Bursar's Office.
