Of the \$150 held for needy cases about us, \$75 is to be used immediately for children's padded garments, which are greatly needed, and the remaining \$75 is being reserved for special food for Chinese New Year. As yet no report has come from Miss Richards' orphanage, but there will be a further report from the Relief Committee next week.

FROM DR. STUART:— Chungking, March 9:

"On the whole it (the rural conference) was in excellent spirit and the results as good as could have been expected. The N.C.R.R. is reorganized to include: Mass Education Movement, National Health Administration (personnel training), P.U.M.C., Nankai, University of Nanking, and Yenching, with a Governing Board of the Institute. Franklin Ho is Chairman of the N.C.R.R., James Yen and Robert Lim, vice-chairmen, H. D. Fang, Secretary-Treasurer. These, except for Dr. Lim, and with Fang as proxy for Ho, together with Dean Chang Lu-ch'tian of Nanking, Dr. C. C. Ch'en and Dr. Wu Wen-tsao, are the Governing Board. S. Y. Ch'ti will be full-time Director. Tingfan will be liquidated except for some medical and agricultural projects and the main work centred in this province near here."

"Dr. Houghton and I are leaving in the care of S. Y. Ch'ü on Monday by car for Kweiyang and Tingfan on the 11th and returning here the 16th. I shall leave for Kunming on the 29th and get to Hongkong about April 7. The Yenching graduates have a meeting for me here this evening. I see them daily when they call here where I stay, and elsewhere. I shall have been here a week this afternoon and this is the first quiet morning I have had for letters, etc...am quite well, constantly occupied somehow and enjoying my experiences. Greetings to everyone."

Chungking, March 17:

"Dr. Houghton and I are just back from a trip to Kweiyang and Tingfan which took all the past week but was very interesting. The evening of our arrival the Yenching and P U M C graduates had a joint dinner of welcome for us, presided over by Dr. Y. T. Tsur, and the last evening dinner was given by Gov. Wu Ting-ch'ang. Between these events we were busily occupied, and spent one night at Tingfan where also we saw a number of our old students and the work they are doing. In the two places there are at least 63, including 14 "amphibians", as those who studied in both institutions describe themselves. It took two days each way by car and the whole trip occupied a week."

The music and words are most appropriate to this season of the year when we see before our very eyes the enactment of the creative powers of nature in tree and flower. Likewise the sentiments of human love which are most evident in the and flower. Likewise the sentiments of human love which are most evident in the spring time have their proper place in the scheme of the oratorio. Variety in the musical framework of this famous composition makes it a thrilling experience from beginning to end. The Chorus plays an important part in expressing the proper feelings of humanity; there are beautiful solos for soprano, tenor and bass to be sung by Mrs. Wiant and Ch'i Yü-chen; by Liu Chün-feng and Li Ping-t'ai; by Ch'i Nai-ch'in and Dr. McCandliss. There are trios which will be sung by a double trio of students; there are duets for Adam and Eve after they emerge in the scheme of creation. Those portions which are direct quotations from General and a recitatives whereas the other nortions are adaptaquotations from Genesis are sung as recitatives whereas the other portions are adaptations from Milton's masterpiece: "Paradise Last". Although this work was composed fifty years after the "Messiah" its popularity overshadowed it for years. At present both of these great works are found in the repertoire of the great choral societies in the world. BULLETIN. This will be the last issue of this Bulletin this session.

For some months past plans have been forming for a Faculty Recreation Club. This University has always placed an emphasis on organizing athletics for students both for their physical health and for the benefit to their studies from recreative sports. By the same reasoning the administration desires to promote similar advantages for the faculty. The department of Physical Education has also generously agreed to render such service as it can. I earnestly hope that a large number of the faculty and staff will avail themselves of this opportunity.

BYLAWS OF THE FACULTY RECREATION CLUB

- I. The maintenance and promotion of faculty recreation shall be a joint responsibility of the University Administration, the Department of Physical Education, and interested members of the faculty.
- II. 1. The Administration shall be responsible for allocating for faculty recreation purposes, suitable grounds, buildings and equipment. In view of this responsibility the property and funds formerly provided and owned by the Faculty Tennis Club shall be transferred to the University.
 - The Administration, after approving the annual budget of the Club, including a system of fees to be charged members of the faculty for the use of recreation facilities, shall be responsible for deficits in capital or current expenditures.
- III. The Department of Physical Education, through its representatives on the Executive Committee, shall be responsible for the preparation and upkeep of grounds and equipment, and for the organization and promotion of various forms of faculty recreation.
- IV. 1. The general affairs of the Club shall be under the direction of an Executive Committee, consisting of: Two members appointed by the Administration,

Two members appointed by the Department of Physical Education. Three members elected at the annual meeting of the Club.

- 2. The Executive Committee shall elect its own Chairman and Secretary.
- The functions of the Executive Committee shall be the following:
- Matters concerning the general scope and policy of faculty recreations.
- The preparation and approval of the annual budget and accounts.

 Arranging for, and reporting to, an annual meeting of the Club, or such special meetings as may be required.
- The Executive Committee shall appoint one of its members from the Department of Physical Education as financial manager, who shall be responsible for administering the budget in accordance with University practice.
- The University Bursary shall serve as the treasury of the Club.
- The Secretary of the Executive Committee, or another member chosen by the Committee, shall be responsible for the collection of fees, and the payment of the same to the Bursary
- The Executive Committee shall adopt its own procedure as to meetings, and may adopt its own bylaws.
- The fiscal and administrative year of the Club shall extend from the first of July to the end of June.
- An annual meeting of the members of the Club shall be held during the month of February, for the purpose of hearing reports, discussion general policies, electing representatives on the Executive Committee, and other business.
 - Occasional meetings may be called by the Executive Committee, or upon the written request of ten members of the Club. One-fourth of the fee-paying members of the Club shall be considered a quorum.
 - The Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Committee shall serve as the corresponding officers of the Club meetings.
- VI. The term of office of the members of the Executive Committee shall be one year, commencing from July first. Vacancies in the Committee, if among the representatives from the Administration, or of the Dep't of Physical Edecation, shall be filled by the original appointing body; if among the Club representatives, vacancies may be filled by co-option by the Executive Committee.
- VII. These Bylaws my be amended by regular process at any annual meeting of the Club. providing the amendments are approved by the Administration and the Department of Physical Education.

In the case of certain persons not as yet customers of the Dairy, for whom a milk diet has been prescribed by the doctor, applications for supplies should be addressed to the Acting Controller who will endeavour to arrange for their needs.
