He was the station master at *Haibin* on the branch line of Pei-ning railway on December 5. Mr. Li was crossing the tracks just as the engine of a long line of cars pushed into the cars. 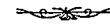

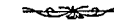

**DR. HUNG HONORED.** The following item appeared in the December 21, 1940, edition of the *Christian Science Monitor* of Boston, Massachusetts: "Chinese Educator Honored. Delaware, Ohio, December 20—Dr. William Hung, Professor of History in Yen-ching University, Peiping, China, and wellknown in this country for his part in forming the Harvard-Yenching Institute for the furtherance of Chinese studies, was honored at Ohio Wesleyan University here today. The Doctor of Laws degree was conferred upon him."

**ADMIRATION EXPRESSED.** In the Annual Reports Number of the Wellesley College Bulletin dated October 1940 and containing the report of the president of the college, the following remarks appear under the report given by Dean Hughes, chairman of the Committee on Graduate Instruction: "... And the admiration and respect of the Committee were expressed in a letter sent to Miss Lu Hui-ch'ing, in China, who under difficult and hazardous war-time conditions had completed a thesis on a comparison of the posture of Chinese and American girls, which to represent a piece of pioneer work important for the future welfare of Chinese girls."

### Bacteriological Report of Water and Milk

A. *Milk* from Yenching Dairy February 11, 1941.

Gas.....none  
Bacteria count.....19,000 per c.c.  
B. Coli.....negative

This low bacteria count of 19,000, as compared with the high count of 230,000 for January, indicates much higher degree of cleanliness in the milking process. It is to be noted that the highest bacteria count for grade A milk is set at 10,000 per c.c. while that for grade B is at 1,000,000 per c.c. Therefore, our dairy milk stands very near to grade A as far as the present finding is concerned.

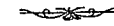

**MEN vs. WOMEN STUDENTS ON HONORS DAY.** The following figures in connection with University Honors Day on May 15 may be of interest. They do not include the fellowships and scholarships granted to graduate students, and duplicates have been excluded.

Of the number of students in the University (1026), 70% are men and 30% are women.

Of this number (1026), 83 or 8% received recognition on Honors Day.

Of the 83, 61% were men and 39% were women.

But, of the total number of men in the University (722), 7% received honors.

And, of the total number of women in the University (304), 11% received honors.

With regard to the Class of 1944: All of the students on the Honor Roll from the College of Arts and Letters were women; all of those from the College of Natural Sciences were men; the women had a slight edge over the men in the College of Public Affairs, the percentage being 60% and 40%.

**CORRECTION.** Announcement was made in last week's *Bulletin* of the granting of several Rockefeller Foundation Fellowships to Yen-ching graduates. The announcement should have read China Foundation Fellowships.

**REPAIR WORK.** In the past the staff of the Physics Department has repaired, free of charge, many receivers and other electrical apparatus for members of the Yen-ching community. This service is consuming an increasing amount of time, to the detriment of the efficiency of the staff members concerned. In order to minimize this, the Department, while not wishing to discontinue the service, will in future make a charge, not only for materials used, but also for the time spent by their staff and technicians.

**FREE RABIES VACCINATION FOR DOGS.** The attention of dog owners in Yen-ching Community is hereby called to the fact that on Thursday, May 29, from 8 A.M. to 3 P.M., the Animal Control Office of the Municipal Police Bureau will give rabies vaccination, free of charge, to dogs at the Police Station in *Kua Chia T'un*. The dogs will be licensed after the vaccination. The duration of the immunity thus produced is about one year. Unlicensed dogs will be subjected to arrest. Rabies is such a horrible disease that any man or animal contracting it is doomed to death. It is strongly recommended that all dog owners take advantage of this opportunity to have their dogs vaccinated.

**PIEN FOR PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT.** Dr. Stuart has just received the following letter, dated May 26, from Dr. B. A. Garside, Executive Director of United China Relief, Inc. in New York City.

We are deeply grateful to you and to the faculty and students of Yenching University for the scroll and the signatures by all of the students of Yenching University. All of this has been beautifully done, and we are amazed by the speed with which it was prepared and sent to us.

On the same "Clipper" we received somewhat similar scrolls signed by the students of nine of the other Christian Colleges and Universities in China—nearly 7,000 signatures in all. These are all being prepared for presentation

to the President during the next few days. We will try to arrange for Mr. James G. Blaine, the President of the U.C.R. Board of Directors, to present these to President Roosevelt personally. All this material will be immensely valuable in bringing the situation, accomplishments, and needs of China forcibly to the attention of America.

It has taken a long time to get our United China Relief campaign under way, but now at last it is beginning to move with a gratifying increase in tempo. China Week, which has just closed, was marked by a widespread and most friendly reaction throughout the United States. Money has begun to come in from all parts of the country, and though the amounts thus far received are not large we hope that the volume will rise steadily during the next two months. We will keep you informed of developments.

**COMMITTEE FOR MEN'S DINING ROOMS.** It has been decided to undertake another experiment in the management of this important feature of student life. This will be a practical application of joint administration, consisting as it does of five members each from the University and the student body. The former will include the Controller, the Chairman of the Committee on Student Welfare, the Bursar, the Chairman of the Department of Home Economics, and Mr. Huang Chung from the Office of the Director of Studies. The students will be elected.

Mr. Wang Chao-jung has accepted appointment as Executive Secretary of this Committee and will have his office in the one hitherto used for the *Chai Wu K'ie*.

**SHANGHAI ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS.** It has been planned that the Shanghai entrance examinations this year be conducted under the direction of a committee of which Mr. Ling Ching-yen will be chairman. The other members of the committee will be local Yenching graduates, including several who occupy positions in school administration. Mr. Huang Chung will be the executive secretary working with this committee.

**GROUNDS AND BUILDINGS COMMITTEE.** During the period of construction and of becoming settled on the present campus, a committee under this name was indispensable. It has seemed advisable to recreate such a committee even when new buildings and other improvements are only occasional and very limited in scope. It will serve to coordinate such minor extensions and will permit comprehensive planning over the whole area with a view to the different interests involved. The committee will welcome criticisms or suggestions as to buildings, landscaping, and other issues which concern the utility or beauty of our common possession in this campus.

The committee is Mr. Howard Payne, Chairman, Dr. Howard S. Galt, Mr. H. T. T'ien, Miss Augusta Wagner, Miss Alice M. Boring, and Mrs. Robert Chao.

**ROCKEFELLER FOUNDATION REVIEW.** It is not the function of this *Bulletin* to call attention to current publications. But the *Review of the Rockefeller Foundation for 1940* may be treated as an exception. This is not only because of the reference to its China Program, in which we have a small share, but also because of its comments on contemporary events, interesting to all who are concerned with the conservation or enlargement of human knowledge, and strikingly pertinent to our own present circumstances. A copy is on file in this office.

**STUDENT SUMMER CONFERENCE.** The Executive Committee of the Christian Fellowship plans to hold a Students' Summer Conference on the Yenching campus from June 30 to July 6 inclusive. More than sixty students, boys and girls, have already registered. If any others wish to attend, please notify Mr. Wang Chung-han of the Fellowship office as soon as possible.

**CHINA CHRISTIAN COLLEGES.** Statistical tables of the Christian Colleges in China for the current academic year have been received and are on file in this office for the inspection of those interested.

**JOBS FOR STUDENTS.** There is urgent need for more summer self-help work for students who have exhausted their resources. Any faculty members who have such work, whether regular or irregular, are requested to tell the Student Welfare Committee.

Wang, the Honorary Superintendent, showed that the contributions made a year ago have been used for the equipment and replacements needed for the Sanitarium and for the care of patients unable to pay full fees. The fees have been set at a rate to cover maintenance. Thirty-one patients have been taken care of for varying lengths of time, one-third of whom were Yen-ching students.

Contributions are now needed for the coming year for the care of patients who are unable to pay full fees. A minimum of \$500.00 is needed. Will all those willing to help by their contributions please communicate with Mrs. K. H. Chou, 16 Lang Jun Yuan, or send checks to her as soon as possible.

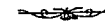

All of these works will be exhibited in the show case of the ground floor of the Library and may be inspected on request. Further gifts are expected in the near future, thus setting free funds for the purchase of publications which have appeared since 1941.

**Consultation service for Western books and literature** has been resumed for the convenience of faculty and students. Mr. R. Lowenthal will be glad to receive callers from Mondays to Fridays between 9 and 12 o'clock.

**Victory Honors.** In the list of Victory Honors announced by the National Government the name of Dean C. W. Luh was included among five others most of whom are University Presidents. While Dean Luh is unquestionably entitled to this distinction in his own right, yet it is gratifying to think of this as in some sense a recognition as well of Yenching University. There is an additional interest in noting that he seems to be the only person in occupied territory who has been thus honored.

*Exchange Scholarships.* The American Embassy in Chungking has transmitted for our information a copy of a letter from Professor Claudius O. Johnson, Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Scholarships, State College of Washington, Pullman, Washington, and a copy of the following act:

An Act authorizing the University of Washington and Washington State College to award scholarships and certain fee exemptions to students and graduates of foreign friendly higher educational institutions, provided similar reciprocal privileges are exchanged.

**Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Washington:**

*Section 1.* The University of Washington and Washington State College shall each have the authority to award, during each academic year, not to exceed fifty (50) scholarships, to students or graduates of universities or colleges of friendly foreign nations, and exempting such recipients from the payment of tuition, library and incidental fees for the scholarship period. Provided, that the University and State College obtain satisfactory assurance that educational institutions of the said friendly foreign nations will exchange now or in the future, reciprocal privileges to a similar number of students or graduates of the University of Washington or Washington State College.

Passed the House February 8, 1945.

Passed the Senate March 6, 1945.

Approved by the Governor March 16, 1945.

A. or Europe CNC\$2280 per word, deferred (I.C) half that amount; DLT, 1/3 of that rate per word. The minimum number of words is 25. The signs I.C or DLT must be inserted and are charged as one word. 5-letter code cables can now be sent, but the title of the code book and the text of the message in plain language must be given.

*Mr. and Mrs. Band.* Word has come that Mr. and Mrs. William Band have jointly written a book entitled *Dragon Fangs*. The book was written in England during the first four months of 1945 and has been published by George Allen and Unwin, Ltd., London. It tells of their escape from occupied China when the Pacific War broke out and of their adventures during the subsequent years before returning to England.
